HONORARY SECRETARY

The present Honorary Secretary Mr R.O. Haddon of Palmerston North retires at the conclusion of this year. He has been Secretary for 21 years, continuously since 1953 and also in 1949 and 1951. Previous Secretaries were:-

1939 to 1948 Mr T.A. Gresson (Christchurch) (Deceased 1967)
1950 Mr P.W. Young (Timaru)
1952 Mr P.F. Black (Oamaru)

Mr Haddon was appointed a Life Member at the Interim General Meeting on 16th October, 1966 in recognition of his 16 years of service as Honorary Secretary up to that date. He was also a committee member in 1947 and a Vice President in 1948.

The New Zealand Squash Rackets Association was formally incorporated in 1939 with the object of controlling, advancing and regulating the game throughout the country. Even though Squash had been played competitively since 1932, no records prior to 1946 are in existence and this had been taken as a "War Casualty".

However, with the assistance of Past Secretaries P.D. Hall, the late
Mr Justice T.A. Gresson and Vice President W.E. Renton it is possible to record that
Squash was first played on a national basis in November, 1932, at the Christchurch
Club Court which with the Devonport Naval Base (Auckland), two courts were the only
available competitive ones at the time. The 1932 and first winner, the late
G.E.F. Kingscote, was recognised as the father of the New Zealand game, having played
extensively at the Bath Club, England, and is credited with having introduced the
drop shot to New Zealand and later the techniqueof making the ball die in the crack.

The first New Zealand Association in 1932, which was unincorporated, had Mr Vivian Riddiford of Wellington as Patron, Mr Kingscote as President, and Mr H.N. Watson (Palmerston North) as Vice President, Mr Hall being the first Secretary, holding office until 1936, when Mr Gresson succeeded him. During the pre-war years the Association acted only to organise New Zealand tournaments.

The important "firsts" in New Zealand Equash are recorded for this early period - 1933 the opening of the first Public (or open) Club at Timaru, and in 1934 the first visit of New Zealand Players to the Australian Championships at the Royal Melbourne Tennis Club Courts when D.W.J. Gould (Christchurch) reached the semi-final, and Hall the final, both being beaten by Harry Hopman of Davis Cup renown.

The first entry in the official minute book is a report dated 21st June 1946, recording 15 members divided into three classes:-

Cpen Clubs - Palmerston North, Timaru, Camaru, Hamilton.

Armed Services courts at Devonport Naval Base and R.N.Z.A.F.

Stations at Mhenuapai, Ohakea, Woodbourne and Harewood.

Private Court Cwners - P.D. Hall, J.E.F. Vogel and others.

A special General Meeting was held at Christchurch on June 21st, 1946 to consider reviving Squash following the war. This meeting was chaired by the President Mr Kingscote representing Wellington, with Mr Gresson as Secretary, the attending delegates being Messrs W.M. Maxwell (Palm. Nth), A.I. Cottrell (Canterbury), R.S. Mitchell (Oamaru), D.W.J. Gould (Christchurch), W.A. Lewis (Timaru).

At the first recorded Annual General Meeting held at Timaru on September 22nd, 1946, among delegates present were three North Islanders, A.H. Malcolm (Hamilton), who was elected as Vice President and A.D. Long and R.O. Haddon from Palmerston North, the latter being the current Honorary Secretary. At this meeting Mr R.S. Mitchell (Oamaru) was elected a Vice President.

On the 6th September, 1947 Mr Mitchell was appointed President, Mr Kingscote having retired on account of illness and being elected an Honorary Life Member. Mr Mitchell (Roy to all those who knew him well) was most generous in his interest in the game being the donor of the Mitchell Rose Bowl for the Women's Championship and the Mitchell Cup for the Women's Teams Competition, while he has assisted clubs at stages when they were building new courts or enlarging their premises, and in 1962 was elected a Life member in recognition of his services. He passed away in 1964.

Mr Gresson held the office of Secretary until 1948 when it was decided to establish the office of the Association each year at the club holding the Championships for the year. This operated for four years, with Palmerston North the headquarters and R.C. Haddon the Secretary in 1949 and 1951, Timaru, and P.W. Young in 1950, Camaru and P.L. Black in 1952. This system was not found entirely satisfactorily and in 1953 it was decided to establish the registered office in Palmerston North with Roy Haddon as Honorary Secretary, a position which he still holds.

ne Haw 2ndland Sourch Engine Langet migot migon Since that date, even though the President and Vice Presidents elected from outside Palmerston North are members of the Management Committee, the work of the Association has been carried on by a Committee of four Palmerston North members. including the Honorary Secretary, among whom were included well-known former players M.J. Rodgers, A.A. MacGibbon, Dr R.V. Hooper, D.D. Mochan, A.D. Long (1951 1953-1964) R.B. Clarke (1964-1966), E.H. Christmas (1951-67), A.M. Johns (1951, 1954-1968), I.W. Rowland (1966-69) and J.S. Tyler (1968-69) and T.A. de Cleene (1969).

In 1953 the Association instituted a special levy on players, the funds to be used for any purpose promoting Squash, including loans to new Clubs and subsidising expenses to teams travelling overseas. I have land would don't sait to glevinneine

A regular newsletter "Fairview" commenced in 1963 kept Clubs in touch with national results and international news, while the first Squash Rackets Annual was issued in 1962. Short se efocuted of northy as normalifed to brottobia astviv an

The Association has concerned itself with the construction of Squash Courts and with the assistance of Mr Arthur Wright as Honorary Architect drew up in 1962 its own "standard plan of Squash Court layouts with recommended specifications", such as installation of viewing windows in the back wall above the red line, and large side galleries. Subsequently a Design Brief and Construction Guide was prepared in 1969 by a Building Advisory Committee headed by Mr J.C. Austin and this has since been available to all enquirers. A modern trend in Squash Court building was initiated by Hamilton in 1960 with a luxurious building embracing 3 courts, followed by a magnificent four court set up at Remuera. A new pattern was set in 1964 when Henderson added a fourth and Championship court with tiered gallery, side gallery and viewing windows to accommodate 150 spectators. The standard was raised still higher when Palmerston North in 1966 added its fifth and Championship court with tiered seating and standing room for 220 using both sides and upgraded its facilities bringing into being a Squash Centre with Cafeteria and Shop controlled by permanent managers, one court being made available to the public. and marriagh Intense Istoom A

1971 saw the ultimate in Squash Court construction for New Zealand when for the 3rd International Hamilton erected a Squash Court of International Standard with viewing facilities for over 300 people. New Zealand now has a variety of complexes equal to any overseas.

At the first recorded Annual Coneral Meeting held at Timera on Section Pind. In 1963 with the object of improving the playing standard a tour by the Egyptian and Australian Professional Mohamed Dardir was arranged and enthusiastically received. He re-visited the country in 1965 and 1966 and commenced a 2 year engagement as Resident Coach for New Zealand in March, 1967. and (orango) Iladothi

In 1967 the International Squash Rackets Federation was formed and New Zealand became a foundation member with Great Britain, Egypt, Pakistan, India, Southern Africa and Australia. With the object of competing in all the proposed International series an annual levy of 40 cents was placed on all active members the proceeds going to what is called the International Fund. This ensures finance being evailable at the required time. to afrugo wan parblind o'sew you

With the growing number of Clubs, Districts were formed first in Auckland followed by Waikato, Central, Wellington and Canterbury and the administration system whereby the Association dealt with Clubs terminated at the end of 1967 with District Administration then taking over officially. In 1953 a team of four "up and coming" young players toured Australia. The team comprising P.R. Vesty and L.G. Milne (Timaru), M. Gunn (Camaru) and D.D. Mochan (Palmerston North). Vesty was the most successful player, reaching the semi-finals of the New South Wales Championship and winning the Queensland Championship.

This tour was followed by the first visit of an Overseas Team to New Zealand, an Australian Women's Team comprising Mrs R. Maddern, Misses F. Williams, M. Maher and B. Malcolm which aroused the greatest enthusiasum at all Clubs visited. Squash history was made in Palmerston North where the first international match in New Zealand was played, Australia winning 4/0. The New Zealand Team comprised Mesdames N. New (Palmerston North), M. Kennedy (Oamaru), P. Hunter and D. Gilbert-Smith (Hamilton). In the New Zealand Championship Mrs Maddern defeated Mrs New in the final.

In 1954 a team of three ladies - Mrs N. New (Palmerston North), Mrs M. Kennedy (Oamaru) and Miss D. Gilbert-Smith (Hamilton) - visited Melbourne for the Australian and Victorian Championships, in which Misses Morgan and Speight (England) played. Mrs New reached the quarter-finals in each event.

1958 saw the visit of the first Australian Men's Team to New Zealand. The team comprised Brian Boys, John Cheadle, Bryan Stuart and Vic Toohey. A test match against the visitors was lost., the following representing New Zealand - A.M. Johns, N. Coe, D. Nochan and G. Davidson.

In 1959 a New Zealand team visited Australia, playing matches against a visiting British team, all Australian States, and a test match, the only wins being against Queensland, Tasmania and South Australia. The team which comprised A.M. Johns, (Captain Manager), G.L. Bird, D.G. Green, N. Coe and R.B. Clarke, then took part in the Australian Championships, all losing in the first or second round, but Bird reaching the semi-final of the Junior Championships.

Subsequently, the British team comprising R. Wilson (Captain), M. Oddy, N. Broomfield, D. Hughes, J. Lyons, toured New Zealand winning all matches, including a test and competing in the New Zealand Championship which was won by Oddy with Broomfield runner-up. New Zealand was represented by A.M. Johns, R.B. Clarke, G.L. Bird and D.G. Green.

The second visit by an Australian Women's Team took place in 1960, the visitors, Mrs Joan Morey (Captain Manageress), Lois Wright, Caroline Kent, Beverley Meagher and Faye Grant, winning nine matches including a test and losing one, and competing in the North Island Championships won by Miss Wright. Misses B. Patterson, A. McKenzie, V. Milligan and Mesdames A. Tietjens and M. Naylor represented New Zealand.

In 1961 an Australian team styled the "Wallaroos" composed of R. Thomas (Captain Manager), and three "up and coming" young players, P. Papst, R. Pratt, and L. Anderson toured New Zealand visiting twelve Clubs, winning eight matches, losing one and losing the test. Messrs C. Waugh, I. Easton, L. O'Neill and R.B. Clarke represented New Zealand in the test which was won 3/1.

1962 saw the second visit of a Women's Team to Australia, Mrs M. Taylor (Captain Manageress) (Remuera), Miss M. Burmeister (Palmerston North), Mosdames H. Hargreaves (Henderson) and L. Brownlee (Hamilton), competing at Perth in the Australian Championships and Inter State Series. New Zealand defeated Western Australia and lost to the other States and also the Test 0/4.

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Two men players Messrs C. Waugh (Palmerston North) and I.T. Easton (Hamilton) also travelled to Perth at their own expenses and in the Championship survived three and two rounds respectively and then lost to the first and second seeds.

All six players gained a wealth of experience and assisted in improving New Zealand's position overseas.

In 1963 we received the third visit of an Australian Women's Team and sent both a Men's and Women's Team to Australia.

The Australian women's (under 21) Team comprising the Chaperone Mrs Jenny Irving (Victoria), the Queensland Champion Miss Dot Linde, Misses Dianne Bruce and Beverley Meagher (Victoria), Misses Marion Hawcroft and Heather Rhead (Queensland) won an unofficial Test, nine Club matches and drew one. Miss Linde won both the Corbans Invitation and the North Island Championships meeting Mrs Irving each time while Miss D. Bruce collected the Junior events.

Eight New Zealand representatives competed at Melbourne in the Inter State
Series and Australian Championships. They were Messrs C. Waugh (Palmerston North),
G. Bird (Timaru), J. Walker, and as Captain I.T. Daston (Hamilton) Mesdames
A. Stephens (Hamilton) who acted as Ladies Captain, H. Hargreaves (Henderson),
L. Brownlee (Hamilton) and Miss M. Meldrum (Palmerston North).

The Men's Team had five wins and two losses in the Inter State Series while Waugh and Bird reached the third round of the Championship. The Women's Team won only one Inter State match and Mesdames Stephens and Hargeaves also reached the third Championship round.

The 1964 was the heaviest season on record. A team of three most promising South Australian young players Miss Rosemary Robb, Messrs Trevor Tucker and Leigh Wilson toured through New Zealand gaining experience.

The fourth Australian Women's Team to visit New Zealand comprised the Manageress Mrs June McCraw (Victoria) and Misses Beverley Johnson and Sandra Croft (N.S.W.), Robyn Kennedy (Victoria) and Jennifer McDevitt (Queensland) the four girls again comprising an under 21 years team. They lost the first Unofficial Test, won the second and visited eleven centres playing matches and giving exhibitions. Miss Johnson reached the final of the Corbans and North Island Championships being runner up in each case.

Mens and Womens teams again visited Australia for their Championships and
Inter State Series. The teams comprised Messrs I.T. Easton (Hamilton) who acted
as Manager of both teams and Men's Captain, C. Waugh and T. Johnston (Palmerston
North), G. Bird (Timaru), P. Dibley (Remuera), Mesdames D. Deacon (Henderson) who
was appointed Ladies Captain, M. Waugh (Palmerston North), A. Stephens (Hamilton)
and Miss M. Meldrum (Palmerston North).

The Men's Team lost to Victoria and New South Wales, and won the remaining State matches while the three man team comprising Waugh, Johnston and Bird registered New Zealand's first International win versus South Africa 2/1.

The Women's Team lost against Australia (Test) and New South Wales and beat the remaining States. Mrs Deacon was runner up in the final of the Championship while Mrs Waugh won the Plate event.

Shine O'Dayer, Denis Scott and Neven Berbour.

To conclude the season an Australian Men's Team comprising Mesers Owen Parmenter Dick Carter, Ted Hamilton and Doug Stephenson toured New Zealand and compoted for the Slazengers International Trophy which they won by two matches to one. The New Zealand Teams were selected from Mesers Waugh, Johnston, Bird, Dibley and W. Deacon (Henderson). The visits of this and the Women's Teams was sponsored by Rothmans (N.Z.) Ltd.

Finally the Association sponsored C. Waugh to the 1964/65 British open and Amateur where he played with distinction and established New Zealand's name in international competition.

1965. The world amateur Champion Aftab Jawaid of Pakistan toured New Zealand playing and winning his matches against all New Zealand and invited Australian players R. Carter, O. Parmenter and C. Nancarrow. He visited 17 Clubs and took part in three tournaments at Henderson, Palmerston North and Hamilton. G. Hunt (Australia) also competed at Waikato but succumbed to Waugh in the semi-final. Waugh lost to Jawaid in four.

An Australian Women's under 21 years team comprising Misses Lyle Hubinger (Queensland), Sylvia Achurch (N.S.W.) Kay Farmer and Jan Merrett with Mrs Jean Ray (All Victoria) as Captain/Manageress toured New Zealand winning 5 matches and taking part in three tournaments.

Mr Norman Coe as Manager led a team to Australia comprising Charlie Waugh, Trevor Johnston, John Stevens, Peter Dibley and Mrs Megan Waugh which won three of six matches in the Inter State Series, waugh reaching the quarter finals of the Championship and losing to Hunt.

The first British Momen's team to visit New Zealand comprised Mesdames Pauline White (Captain) Fran Marshall, Misses Anna Craven-Smith, Anne Price and Sylvia McClare, and with Australian champions Mrs Heather Blundell and Dick Carter competed at the New Zealand Championships, Mrs Blundell beating Miss Craven-Smith and Carter beating Waugh in the finals. The women won all their matches including a Test 3/0.

1966. A Mens, Womens and Junior Mens Teams under the managership of Mr Bryden Clarke attended the Australian carrival, the Men's Team losing only to N.S.W and Victoria and being ranked third. Trevor Johnston reached the quarter finals, while a Women's Test was won by Australia 4/0. The teams were:-

1967 Australia. Men's and Women's teams and selected Juniors accompanied by Henderson Club members journeyed to Adelaide for the Australian Inter State Series and Championships. The Men's Team did well to record fourth placing in the Teams Event while the komen's Team played magnificently to come a clear second. The teams managed by Mr W.A. Green (Timaru) comprised:-

1967 Juniors to Sydney. A team of four Junior Cirls competed in the New South Wales grade championships securing three grade wins and two runner up placings. They were: - Misses Julie Hislop, Margaret Bentley and Margaret Lynch (Palmerston North), Sue Reid (North Shore) with Mrs Elernor Tyler (Palmerston North) as Manageress, while Ir Jack Tyler made the preliminary arrangements and travelled with the team.

INTERNATIONAL SERIES

Probably the most exciting tour for some years was the participation in the First International Series at Sydney and Melbourne of a Men's Team comprising Messrs Charles Waugh (HSN), Trevor Johnston (PN), Peter Dibley (REM), Don Burmeister (PN) as a reserve and Roy Haddon (PN) as Manager.

The team performed better than was anticipated in the Teams series gaining third place by defeating Great Britain, South Africa and India; and losing to Australia and Pakistan. In the Individual Championship, Messrs Waugh, Dibley and Johnston reached the third round.

INTERNATIONAL TRANS TO NEW ZEALAND

Edmond (Managor), N. Barbour (REM), T. Colyer (HSN), M. Lilley and G. Stewart (Both KP) provided experience for our Colts.

This year saw the highest peak of Squash when New Zealand was host for the 3rd International to teams from Great Britain, Australia, Canada, Pakistan, India and United Arab Republic. Host Centres were Palmerston North, Henderson and Remuera for the teams event and Hamilton for the Individual. The New Zealand team comprising Messrs F.N. Coe (Manager), T. Johnston, D. Burmsister, L. Green and C. Waugh won two matches defeating Canada and India for fifth place.

This was the year for our Juniors with Mr K.A. Mackwell as Manager, Stephen Hughes, Bruce Brownlee, Robert Lust and Bryce Taylor visited Melbourne when first three won the Under 18, 17 and 15 age group titles, Taylor being runner up to Brownlee, while Shane Kennedy (with Mr T.R. Johnston as Manager) competed in and won the Victorian Junior Championship.

- 1. The Game, How Played The game of Squash Rackets is played between two players with standard rackets, with balls bearing the standard mark of the S.R.A. and in a rectangular court of standard dimensions enclosed on all four sides.
- 2. The Score A match shall consist of the best of three or five games at the option of the promoters of the competition. Each game is 9 up: that is to say the player who first wins 9 points wins the game except that, on the score being called 8 all for the first time, hand-out may, if he chooses, before the next service is delivered, set the game to 2, in which case the player who first scores two more points wins the game. Hand-out must in either case clearly indicate his choice to the marker, if any, and to his opponent.

Note to Referees: If hand-out does not make clear his choice before the next service the referee shall stop play and require him to do so.

- 3. Points, How Scored Points can only be scored by hand-in. When a player fails to serve or to make a good return in accordance with the rules, his opponent wins the stroke. When hand-in wins a stroke, he scores a point; when hand-out wins a stroke, he becomes hand-in.
- 4. The Right to Serve The right to serve first is decided by the spin of the racket. Thereafter the server continues to serve until he loses a stroke, when his opponent becomes the server, and so on throughout the match.
 - 5. Service The ball before being struck shall be thrown in the air and shall not touch the walls or floor. The ball shall be served on to the front wall so that on its return, unless volleyed, it would fall to the floor in the quarter court nearest the back wall and opposite to the server's box from which the service has been delivered.

At the beginning of each game and of each hand, the server may serve from either box, but after scoring a point he shall then serve from the other and so on alternatively as long as he remains hand-in or until the end of the game. If the server serves from the wrong box there shall be no penalty and the service shall count as if served from the right box, except that hand-out may, if he does not attempt to take the service, demand that it be served from the other box.

- 5. Good Service A service is good which is not a fault or which does not result in the server serving his hand out in accordance with Rule 9. If the server serves one fault he shall serve again.
- 7. Fault A service is a fault (unless the server serves his hand out under Rule 9):

 (a) If the server fails to stand with one foot at least within and not touching the line surrounding the service box (called a foot fault)

(b) If the ball is served on to or below the cut line;

- (c) If the ball served first touches the floor on or in front of the short line.
- (d) If the ball served first touches the floor in the wrong half court or on the half-court line. (The wrong half court is the left for a service from the left-hand box and the right for a service from the right-hand box.)
- 8. Fault, if taken Hand-out may take a fault. If he attempts to do so, the service thereupon becomes good and the ball continues in play. If he does not attempt to do so, the ballshall cease to be in play provided that, if the ball, before it has bounced twice upon the floor, touches the server or anything he wears or carries, the server shall lose the stroke.

Serving Hand Out - The Server serves his hand out and loses the stroke: (a) If the ball is served on to or below the board or cut of court or against any part of the court before the front wall.

(b) If he fails to strike the ball or strikes the ball more than once;

(c) If he serves two consecutive faults.

Play in a Match is to be Continuous After the first service is delivered, play shall be continuous so far as is practical, provided that at any time play may be suspended owing to bad light or other curcumstances beyond the control of the players for such period as the referee shall decide. The referee shall award the match to the opponent of any player who, in his opinion, persists, after due warning, in delaying the play in order to recover his strength or wind, or for any other reason. However, an interval of one minute shall be permitted between games and of two minutes between the fourth and fifth games of a five-games match. A player may leave the court during such intervals, but shall be ready to resume play at the end of the stated time. Should he fail to do so when required by the referee the match shall be awarded to his opponent. In the event of play being suspended for the day, the match shall start afresh, unless both players agree to the contrary.

Note to Referees: A player may not open the door or leave the court other than between games without the referee's permission.

22. Duties of Marker - The game is controlled by the marker, who shall call the play and the score. The server's score is called first. He shall call "play" in respect of a good service and "Fault" (rule 7 (b) (c) and (d)), "Foot Fault" (rule 7 (a)), "Out of Court" or "Not up" as the case may be. If in the course of play the marker calls "Not up" or "Out of Court" the rally shall cease. In doubtful cases the Marker should always call "Play! If the marker's decision if reversed on appeal a "Let" shall be allowed except that if the marker fails to call a ball "Not up" or "Out of Court" and, on appeal, it is ruled that such was in fact the case, the stroke shall be awarded accordingly.

If after the server has served one fault a "let" is allowed, the marker shall wall "One fault" before the server serves again.

When no referee is appointed, the marker shall exercise all the power of the

23. The Referee - A referee may be appointed, to whom all appeals shall be directed, including appeals from the marker's decisions and calls. He shall in no way interfere with the marker's counting of the game except upon appeal by one of the players or as provided for in rule 17. The referee shall decide all appeals. The decision of the referee shall be final.

First Note to Referees: Notwithstanding the above, in the absence of an appeal if it is evident that the score has been called incorrectly, the referee shall draw the marker's attention to this fact.

Second Note to Referees: It is recommended that, where there are both a referee and a marker, the referee shall appoint the marker to call foot faults and the referee shall indicate, if necessary, the box from which hand-in shall serve.

24. Power of Referee in Exceptional Cases - The referee has power to order:

(a) A player who has left the court to play on.

(b) A player to leave the court for any reason whatsoever and to award the match to his opponent.

(c) A match to be awarded to a player whose opponent fails to be present in

the court within ten minutes of the advertised time of play.

(d) Play to be stopped in order that a player or players may be warned that their conduct on the court is leading to an infringement of the rules.

Note to Referees: A referee should avail himself of this rule as early as possible where one or other of the players is showing a tendency to break the provisions of rule 17.

25. Colour of Players Clothing - Players are required to wear white clothing. The referee's decision thereon to be final.

APPENDIX 1 Definitions

Board - The expression denoting a line, the top edge of which is 19 inches (.483m) from the floor, set out upon the upper edge of a band of resonant material fixed upon the front wall and extending the full width of the court.

Cut Line - A line set out upon the front wall, six feet (1.829m) above the floor and extending the full width of the court.

Game Ball - The state of the game when the server requires one point to win is said to be "Game Ball".

Half-Court Line - A line set out upon the floor parallel to the side walls, dividing the back half of the court into two equal parts called right half court and left half court respectively.

Hand-in - The player who serves.

Hand-out - The player who receives the service.

Hand - The period from the time when a player becomes hand-in until he becomes hand-out.

Not-up - The expression used to denote that a ball has not been returned above the board in accordance with the rules.

Out of Court - The ball is out of court when it touches the front, sides or back of the court above the area prepared for play or passes over any cross bars or other part of the roof or the court. The lines delimiting such area, and lighting equipment and the roof are out of court.

Service Box or Box - A delimited area in each half court from within which hand-in serves.

Short Line - A line set out upon the floor parallel to and 18ft (5.486m) from the front wall and extending the full width of the court.

Striker - The player whose turn it is to play after the ball has hit the front wall.

The service boxes shall be entirely enclosed on three sides within the court by lines, the short line forming the side nearest to the front wall, the side wall bounding the fourth side.

The internal dimensions of the service boxes shall be 5ft 3in (1.601m)

All dimensions in the court shall be measured, where practicable, from the junction of the floor and front wall.

The lines marking the boundaries of the court shall be 2 inches (5.0cm) in width.

In respect of the outer boundary lines on the walls, it is suggested that the plaster should be so shaped as to produce a concave channel along such lines.

The width of other painted lines shall not exceed 2 inches (5.0cm)

All walls shall be white or near white. The space below the board shall be white. All lines shall be coloured red.

The front wall shall be of composition. The side walls and back wall shall be of wood or of composition.

The floor should be of wood for covered courts and of composition for open court

The board and the space below it to the floor and the area above the height of play on the back wall should be constructed of some resonant material.

APPENDIX 111 Dimensions of a Racket

The overall length shall not exceed 27 inches. The internal stringing area shall not exceed 82 inches in length by 72 inches in breadth and the framework of the head shall measure not more than 9/16 inch across the face by 13/16 inch deep.

The framework of the head shall be of wood. The handle shaft shall be made of wood, cane, metal or glass fibre. The grip and foundation may be made of any suitable material.

(a) To control advance and regulate the game of Squash Rackets throughout New Zealand.

(c) To make arrangements incidental to visits of all teams to New Zealand, and to manage and control all New Zealand representative teams playing within or outside of New Zealand.

(d) To settle disputes or differences between Clubs and/or Districts affiliated to the Association and appeals referred to it by any such

Club and/or District.

(e) To make necessary regulations and by-laws for the government of the Association generally and to do all such lawful things as may be incidental to the above objects or any of them.

(f) To affiliate to the Squash Rackets Association, England and to any

other similar Association.

(g) To purchase lease hire or otherwise acquire land buildings and other real or personal property which the Association may from time to time deem necessary or expedient or useful in connection with any of the Association's undertakings or activities and that either alone or in conjunction and to build erect alter or improve or contribute towards the cost of building erecting or improving any such buildings or

other property as aforesaid.

(h) To invest any of the Association's funds in such investments or assets as the Association may from time to time decide upon (notwithstanding that the same may be of a wasting speculative or reversionary nature.)

(i) To do all such other matters and things as in the opinion of the committee shall be conductive to the attainment of any of the foregoing objects or to the exercising of any of the foregoing powers. Adoles to come at INTERPRETATION of noite align and lease to

(i) Member Clubs being Incorporated Squash Rackets Clubs in New Zealand or its dependencies.

(ii) Individual members being persons admitted to membership on payment of such subscription and subject to such privileges

(iii) Honorary members and Honorary Life members being persons elected for a stated term or for life at a General Meeting of the Association on the recommendation of the Management Committee in recognition of services rendered to the Association and subject to such privileges as the Association may decide.

(iv) Associate Members being corporate Commercial Squash Centres or any corporate organisation or person owning courts or any person corporate company or corporate body interested in the promotion of the game subject to such privileges as

the Association in General Neeting may decide.

(v) Incorporated District Associations consisting of member clubs within its District.

(b) Classification for the purpose of membership, Clubs shall be classified as Open as Restricted.

(c) Open Clubs. Clubs formed with membership open to all persons (if approved by their committee in terms of their rules) shall be classified as Open Clubs.

(d) Restricted Clubs. Social Clubs or Clubs with membership restricted or limited to certain specified persons, shall be

classified as Restricted Clubs.

(e) The Association shall have the right to re-classify any Club

(f) Professionals shall be eligible for membership of the Association, on such terms and conditions as the Association in General Meeting may decide.

- (g) Individual members of this association belonging to a body of persons not a corporate body shall be treated by the Association in the same manner as an incorporated club for the purpose of these rules where not contrary to the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.
- (a) Election of Lembership: Clubs desirous of joining the Association may either apply directly to the Secretary of the Association in writing or forward the application to the Secretary of the District Association in the area in which the club is situated and such District Secretary shall forthwith forward the application to the Secretary of the Association. The application will be considered at the next Management Committee meeting and the Management Committee may in the discretion accept or refuse any application for affiliation. The Association shall forthwith upon the application being accepted or refused advise the District Association concerned of the receipt of the application and such decision shall bind the district association. It shall be a condition of the acceptance of any application for affiliation that the applicant club shall become a member of the District Association governing the area in which the club is situated. Each club so applying must furnish such particulars and information as the Management Committee may require.

(b) Districts:

(i) The initial districts may be 6 - Auckland, Waikato,

Central, Wellington, Canterbury and Southern and such

Districts shall be recognised as member districts on

acceptance by the Management Committee of the applications

of such districts but the boundaries of such districts shall be determined by the Management Committee.

(ii) The Management Committee is empowered at its discretion to alter such boundaries and to recognise such further districts as shall apply to become member districts. The Management Committee shall have regard to the following criteria before acceptance of such districts:-

(a) The minimum requirement for future districts shall be at least 5 clubs with a total of 1000 members or -

(b) The geographical boundaries and the size of the area of the applying district are such that it is more practical and convenient for the administration of Squash in the area that such a district be formed.

(iii) The future allocation of Districts shall recognise that the South Island be divided into at least four districts in the

appropriate time.

(c) Resignations. No member shall retire from the Association until the member has paid the subscription and any arrears due, and shall have given notice in writing to the Secretary of the wish to resign. Such notice must be given 14 days prior to the Annual General Meeting or the member will be liable for the subscription for the ensuing year, provided that in all cases members shall be liable for all debts due by the Association at the date of the acceptance of the resignation.

(d) Suspension or Expulsion. The Association in General Meeting may suspend or expel from membership any member wilfully disobeying any of the Rules or By-laws or guilty of any conduct rendering the member in its opinion unfit or unsuitable to be a member of the Association or deserving of suspension or expulsion provided that before suspending or expelling the member, the member or representatives of the member shall be given the opportunity to wait on the meeting to hear any accusations against the member, ask questions and give explanations and the meeting shall hear any defence on behalf of or by the member.

(e) Purging the Register. The Management Committee shall have power from time to time to purge the list of members and to delete therefrom the names of any members whose subscriptions remain unpaid for more than

three (3) calendar months from the date falling due.

6. (a) Subject to the right of the Association in Annual General Neeting to make any alteration it thinks fit the subsription of each member club shall be as follows:-

(i) \$1.00 per active member (except school juniors but including University and Teachers College Students), based on active membership for the previous financial year and as shown in the

Annual Report of the Club.

(ii) The subscription of new clubs building, owning or leasing their own courts be \$10.00 for the first year, 50% of the full subscription/levies for the second year and full subscription/ levies thereafter at the discretion of the Management Committee.

(iii) The minimum for open and restricted clubs be \$10.00 for

subscription only.

(iv) Provisional membership of clubs building courts be \$2.00(b) Individual and Associate members, shall pay such Subscriptions as is determined at an Annual General Meeting.

(c) Subscriptions shall be due on the 1st April in each year except those of new members which shall be due on the date of their election and must be paid within one month of due date. (d) The Association in General Meeting may also decide what further fees and levies, if any, may be paid for any purpose covered by these rules. (e) Clubs must within 7 days of a request being made supply to the Committee a full list of their membership. GENERAL MEETING (a) Annual General Meeting. The Management Committee shall arrange for the Annual General Meeting to be held annually at such time and place as the Association or Committee may determine. (b) The Management Committee may at any time and shall within 14 days after a requisition in writing signed by two district associations or their delegates or by four members of the Management Committee (which requisition shall set out the business proposed to be transacted at such meeting) convene a special General Meeting for any purpose or purposes. At any such meeting only the business set forth in the notice shall be dealt with. (c) Attendance at General Meetings. The following shall be entitled to attend General Meetings -Officers of the Association and the Patron. (ii) Mombers of the Management Committee. (iii) Each District shall be entitled to nominate to attend three delegates for up to 2000 affiliated financial Club members four delegates (excluding school juniors) *and five delegates for over 4000 for between affiliated financial Club members (excluding school juniors). 2001 and 4000 (iv) Travelling Equalisation. All delegates, the President, affiliated Vice-Presidents, Management Committee members shall be included financial (excluding in the Travelling Equalisation account the total of which shall be apportioned among Districts on the basis of delegate entitleschool juniors) ment. (d) Voting at General Meetings: Each delegate present in accordance with Rule (c) (iii) shall have one vote and the voting shall be by a show of hands or Secret ballot if called for. No persons other than a delegate may vote. (ii) The chairman of the meeting whether or not he is a delegate shall have a casting vote. (e) No District may have more than two delegates from the same Club. If a delegate is unable to attend the meeting then the District shall be entitled to appoint another person to act. No person shall be entitled to be a delegate for a district unless he belongs to a member club within that district. (f) Procedure at General Meetings. At all General Meetings the chair will be taken by the President but if he is not present at the time when the meeting is due to start those present shall elect a Chairman from among the members of the Management Committee present and willing to act and if no member of the Management Committee is present then from among the delegates generally and the Chairman so elected shall remain in the Chair until the arrival of the President. (g) The quorum at a General Meeting shall be at least nine persons present and representing al least three district Associations. (h) Notices of any Special General Meeting and of the Annual General Meeting shall be sent by the Secretary by circular to all district associations and members of the Management Committee not less than 21 days prior to the date thereof such notice to state all business which it is proposed to lay before any General Meeting of the Association.

8. (a) Subject to the decisions of the Association in General Meeting the entire management and control of the Association affairs and property both real and personal shall be in the habds of the Management Committee, all of whom shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting.

(b) The officers of the Association shall comprise a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer or a Secretary-Treasurer and a

Chairman of the Management Committee.

(c) The Patron may be appointed at any Annual General Meeting

(d) The President, Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer or Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected annually at the Annual General Meeting by delegates and shall hold office until death, retirement or election of the successors. Such officers shall be eligible for re-election.

(e) The Management Committee shall consist of the President, two Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer or Secretary-Treasurer and one delegate appointed by each District which must if its delegate does not attend in person attend by proxy. Emergency committee to consist of President,

two Vice-Presidents, Secretary and/or Treasurer.

(f) Delegates at any Annual General Meeting may appoint a Secretary or a Treasurer or a Secretary-Treasurer who is not a financial member of an affiliated club where there is such a person who, by reason of his professional qualifications or otherwise is particularly suited to fulfil such an office and such appointment may be on such terms and conditions as the Annual Ceneral Meeting may determine. If such a person be appointed to one or both of such offices he shall be an ex officio member of the Management Committee but shall possess no power of voting.

(g) The officers of the Association shall not assume their offices until the termination of the Annual General Meeting at which they are appointed.

(h) Any casual vacancy occuring, apart from District delegates, in the Management Committee during the year may be filled by the Committee, the appointee to be approved by the Officers.

(i) All Officers and members of the Management Committee must be financial

members of member clubs.

(j) Quorum for Management Committee Meetings. At any Management Committee meeting (3) three persons present shall constitute a quorum and the Chairman shall in case of equality of voting have a deliberative as well as casting vote. Each member of the Management Committee shall have one

not vote subject to 8 (f) hereto.

(k) Management Committee meetings. The Management Committee shall meet at such times and places as it may from time to time decide and a meeting shall be called on the requisition of the President, Chairman of the Management Committee, Hon. Secretary, two Vice-Presidents or two of the Committee members. Any such meeting so requisitioned shall be called within seven (7) days of the receipt of such requisition.

(1) The Management Committee at its first meeting after the Annual General Meeting shall elect a Chairman who shall when present occupy the chair.

(m) Any delegate may be replaced by his District at any time.

(a) To consider and adjudicate on any apparent infringement of the Rules of the Association, anograpa nolfaloossa ad

(b) To settle any question which may arise and which is not especially provided for in these rules.

(c) To enquire into the conduct of any Club, Team or player affiliated to or under the control of the Association and to impose any penalty including disqualification or fine which the Committee may consider fit. Any such penalty shall at the discretion of the committee be enforced and carried out by all Districts, Clubs and Teams affiliated to the Association.

(d) To summon witnesses to appear and give evidence at an enquiry held by the Committee or any person or persons appointed by it and in the event of failure or refusal to attend, to impose such penalty as the Committee

may consider fit.

(e) To debar at its discretion any persons from playing in any competition controlled by the Association who, in the opinion of the committee, derives any direct or indirect pecuniary benefit from the game of Squash Rackets.

DISQUALIFICATION

10. (a) District Associations and Clubs must advise the Association of the names of Club members or Clubs who are disqualified or suspended for any

reason in accordance with their rules.

(b) No player who has been reported to the Association as having been disqualified by any affiliated Club shall be allowed to play under any other affiliated Club without the permission of the Management Committee or until such disqualification is removed. In addition to any other penalty provided for by these rules, a Club which commits a breach of this rule shall if the Management Committee so decide, be liable to forfeit all matches in which a disqualified member, who has been so reported and notices of whose disqualification has been forwarded to the Club takes part.

(c) Right of Appeal. Any District Association, Club Team, Player or member aggrieved by any decision of or any penalty, disqualification or fine imposed by the Management Committee shall have a right of appeal to a General Neeting of the Association which may by a majority thereof allow or disallow such appeal. Such appeal must be made within 21 days after

notification of such decision.

DISTRICT GOVERNMENT

11. (a) Districts shall be incorporated and shall act on behalf of the New Zealand Association (hereinafter called "The Association") and shall be the local authority on behalf of the Association. The recognition by the Association of a District shall be deemed to be an agreement binding upon the District to enforce the rules of the Association and any breach of this agreement shall render a District liable to such penalty as the Association shall decide.

(b) Affairs pertaining exclusively to the Clubs within a District shall be under the control of the District subject to the right of the Association to intervene in matters affecting the Association where it sees fit. Each District shall draw up rules for the purpose of local government but such rules must not conflict with the rules of the Association and must be

approved by the Association.

(c) Club representation is to be as provided in District Rules subject to the right of each Club within the district to have at least one delegate

present and voting at any District General Meeting.

(d) The innual Meeting of a District shall be held not later than 7th March in each year provided that should unforeseen difficulties arise the District may with the consent of the Association postpone its Annual Meeting to a later date.

(e) Each District Secretary shall within seven days after the Annual Meeting of the District furnish to the Association a copy of its Annual Report and duly audited Balance Sheet together with -(i) The name of each Club affiliated to the District. (ii) The names and addresses of the officers of each Club. (iii) The number of members of each Club as at the 31st December previous. (iv) The amount of fees and levies due by each Club for the current financial year and which shall be due in accordance with rule 6 (c). The Association may approve the Districts as its agents for the collection of these has subline to fees and levies, I had more any fir no cost hand faming and add to (v) Such other information as the Association may require. (f) Subject to a Right of Appeal to the Association each District shall have over Clubs, members, officials and others within its listrict, powers of suspension and cancellation of appointment similar to the powers of the Association. FINANCE, ANNUAL REPORT AND AUDIT 12. (a) The financial year of the Association shall end on the 30th September (b) A Report of the year's activities and an audited Statement of Accounts shall be prepared by the Management Committee for presentation to the next Annual General Meeting. (c) At the Annual General Meeting of the Association an Auditor shall be appointed to audit the accounts of the Association and to certify the Annual Balance Sheet. In the event of the Auditor being unable to act the Management Committee shall have power to appoint another then is his stead until the next Annual General Meeting. No person shall be appointed to hold office as Auditor who is an officer of or delegate to the Association. (d) The Management Committee shall control and invest the funds of the

(d) The Management Committee shall control and invest the funds of the Association. All funds shall be paid into a Bank or Banks and the signature of at least two officers or members of the Management Committee shall be necessary for the withdrawal.

Severage Belgioning and ALTERATION TO RULES

13. The rules of the Association may be altered, repealed or replaced by a resolution of a three-fifths majority of the votes recorded by those present at any General Meeting. The Notice calling it shall have specified the proposed alteration repeal or substitution but nothing in this rules shall prohibit the amendment at any General Meeting of any proposal which has been specified in the notice calling the meeting. Notice of any motion importing a change in the Rules shall be forwarded in writing to the Secretary not later than one month before the date of the General Meeting, Twenty days, notice of such proposed alteration to be given to all members.

COMMON SEAL

14. The Management Committee shall provide a Common Seal for the Association and they shall have power from time to time to destroy the same and substitute a new one in lieu thereof. The Common Seal shall be kept by the Secretary and shall be used only when directed by the Management Committee and for the purpose of executing documents shall be affixed in the presence of two (2) members of the Management Committee.

15. The Association may at the discretion of the Management Committee raise or borrow money upon any mortgage or debentures or other security charging any of the real or personal property of the Association or any part or parts thereof and the Association may borrow any money either by way of overdraft or otherwise without security at the discretion and upon such terms as the Management Committee may from time to time decide.

16. The Management Committee shall have power to make, alter or appeal such By-laws as it may think fit for the well-being of the Association and the decision of the Management Committee on all questions shall be final and binding unless and until set aside or varied by the Association in General Meeting. The Management Committee shall have power to delegate all or any portion of its powers to any sub-committees, person or persons as the Management Committee in its sole discretion may deem fit.

USE OF FUNDS

17. No profit or other funds of the Association shall be used or made available to be used for private pecuniary profit of any individual member either during the active life of the Association or on dissolution.

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18. In case of any dispute as the interpretation of these Rules the Management Committee shall be the sole authority and its decision shall be final.

DISSCLUTION OR WINDING - UP

19. Upon the winding up in accordance with Section 24 of the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 of the Association its assets (if any) shall be realised in such manner as the Management Committee may decide and after satisfaction of all debts and liabilities any surplus proceeds shall be distributed in such manner as determined by a General Meeting called for that purpose.

COACHING SCHEME

The New Zealand Coaching Scheme includes the following principles approved on 1st November 1969:-

(i) To teach correct Squash in a uniform menner following basic principles of instruction established by Dardir, official resident coach to the New Zealand Squash Rackets Association.

(ii) To instruct Juniors and Beginners in basic techniques and assist their development, where possible, to qualify them for coaching by Dardir.

- (iii) To initiate and encourage activity in our own and other affiliated clubs.
- (iv) To qualify by examination based on Dardir's coaching syllabus for official recognition as fully qualified amateur coaches.

To impliment the principles, the following appointments are required annually:-(a) By New Zealand - National Director of Coaching
(b) By Districts - District Co-ordinator of Coaching

Weekend Schools are being held for these officials, the Co-ordinators then organising schools in their respective districts.

There is also an Annual School for selected juniors.

STANDARD RULES RE CONDUCT OF TOURNAMENTS

- 1. Tournaments shall be classified as follows:-
 - (a) National New Zealand, North Island, South Island
 - (b) Local or District s.g. Manawatu, Canterbury etc.
- (c) Invitation e.g. Corban's at Henderson
- 2. All Tournaments shall be open only to financial members of affiliated Clubs and such overseas visitors as are approved by the Management Committee and their own Association.
- 3. Professionals registered with the Association may enter in Local and Invitation tournaments described as "open".
- 4. Members under 19 years of age on the opening day of the tournament shall qualify for Junior events.
- Male members 45 years or over and female members 40 years and over on the opening day of the tournament shall qualify for Veterans' events.
- For local and Invitation tournaments the Host Club will decide on the number of players in each event.
- 7. No player shall be entered in any tournament in any grade lower than that of his National grading. Players may play in a higher grade with their consent and the permission of the Host Club.
 - 8. Where more than sixteen entries are received in any one grade the Host Club has the right to subdivide or ballot out.
- 9. For National Tournaments, rules 6,7, and 8 shall apply, the Management Committee in conjunction with the host District or Club to exercise the discretionary powers included in these rules.
- 10. The North and South Island Championships shall be short weekend tournaments the maximum entries per grade of 16 to be played as follows Friday evening 1st round; Saturday morning Quarter finals; Saturday afternoon (or evening) Semi-finals; Sunday morning (or early afternoon) finals. Subsidiary grades may commence Saturday morning other rounds at half day intervals.
- 11. In the A grade event at the New Zealand Championships players shall not be required to play more than one round per day.
- 12. (a) In all Tournements no players shall be called upon to play more than twice in any one day and then only with an interval of not less than four hours between the completion of one match and the commencement of the second.
 - (b) However where a player is in two events then he must be prepared to play additional matches and every endeavour should be made to allow at least two hourly rests.
- 13. Those eliminated in the first round of a field of 16, and in the first and second rounds in a field of 17 to 32, shall qualify for a Plate competition which shall bear the name of the Tournament (e.g. New Zealand or Manawatu.)
- 14. The four quarter finalists eliminated in the A grade events may qualify for the "Classic Plate".
- 15. At the discretion of the Host Club the following additional Plate events may be held - Special Plate for defeated quarter finalists in Subsidiary grades. Consolation Plate for those eliminated in the Plate (see 13) These should be advertised on the Tournament Poster.

- 16. All matches shall be the best of 5 games. In exceptional circumstances lower grade and plate matches may be reduced to best of 3 games.
- 17. In events of 16, four players shall be seeded as follows:-No. 1 shall be placed at the top of the draw. No. 2 shall be placed at the bottom of the draw. No. 3 and 4 shall be placed at the bottom of the top half and top of the bottom half, to be decided by the toss of a coin.
- 18. In events having more than 16 players, eight players shall be seeded and arranged in order, 1,8,6,3,4,5,7,2,. Number 1,6,4, and 7 are placed at the tops of the first, second, third and fourth quarters of the draw respectively and Nos. 8,3,5,2, at the bottom of the first, second, third and fourth quarters so that 1 plays 8, 3 plays 6, 4 plays 5, 2 plays 7.
- 19. Zoning of visiting players is permitted to the extent that no two players from the same visiting Club may be drawn against each other in the first round
- 20. Markers & Referees (a) At all Tournaments all matches must be controlled by a marker. At the discretion of Host Clubs, referees may be appointed also. (b) 1. At National Tournaments and Teams fixtures every endeavour must be made to have a qualified referee and marker for each A grade match.
 - 2. All quarter finals, semi finals and finals of the A grade events and finals of teams matches must have a qualified marker and referee for each match.
- 21. There shall be separate Entry and Entertainment fees for all Tournaments. The Entertainment must be a voluntary one. The Management Committee shall approve the fees for National Tournaments. In all cases full details must be shown in the Tournament Poster or other notice calling for entries.
- 22. The Management Committee including the Officers shall be authorised to make variations to these rules in exceptional circumstances.
- 23. The Management Committee shall decide any dispute in interpretation of these rules.

RULES FOR CONDUCT OF NEW ZEALAND CHAMPIONSHIPS

- 1. The New Zealand Championships shall be held annually.

- 7. The venues of all finals shall be allotted by the New Zealand Association.
- 8. Clubs are to advise their teams to the Districts concerned in respect of District competitions and to the New Zealand Association in respect of the finals, fourteen days before the competitions take place.
- The composition of any team may be amended at any time up to 24 hours before the commencement of the particular competition, notice of same to be given to the District concerned or New Zealand Association and the Host Club concerned.
- 10. Cnce the competition has commenced replacements can be allowed only for genuine illness or injury or for any urgent or acceptable reason and then only for future rounds.
- 19. In all cases teams must be arranged in strict playing order of ability.
- 12. The National finals shall be seeded by the National Selectors.
- 13. All competitions shall be on a Knockout basis.
- Each individual match shall be the best of five games. 14.
- The team winning the most individual matches shall win the Tie. 15.
- The order of play for all ties in each competition shall be drawn out of a hat 16. except that No.1 shall play third.
- The Management Committee shall call for Entries which shall be forwarded by 17. Clubs to the Districts concerned.
- 18. All entries shall be accompanied by an assurance from each Club that in the event of it becoming the District Finalist it will travel to the venue of the Final.
- 19. The Management Committee shall make the venues of all finals know to all Clubs before entries close.
- In the event of a District finalist defaulting in the National final, the 20. District Runner up shall, if time permits, be given the opportunity of participating.
- Each District shall allot the venue of its District's competition. 21.
- The organisation of each competition shall be in the hands of the Host Club. 22.
- Each entry shall be accompanied by an entry fee of \$20.00 (or such other 23. amount as is decided at a preceeding General Meeting) for each team which amount is forwarded to the District Association concerned. the served and hardden's amoon (bound) .ugua

- 24. Each District shall retain \$20.00 from the total of the entry fees of each competition and forward same to the New Zealand Association for the winning teams (or substitutes) to compete in the finals. The Balance of the entry fees in each competition shall be forwarded to the Host Clubs to meet the expenses of the District competitions.
- 25. The New Zealand Association shall forward the fees collected from the finalists to the Host Clubs conducting the finals.
- 26. The Host Clubs shall use the monies received to provide all morning and afternoon teas, all meals (except breakfast) and also full Saturday evening entertainment for all visiting players.
- 27. The standard rules shall apply except where otherwise stated.

NOTE: The following additions were made by the Management Committee on 10th July 1970 -

- (a) Subject to no Club entering a team in a District Competition, a District may enter a composition team but such team cannot win.
- (b) A District can reduce the entry fee so long as \$20 per team is paid in respect to the finalists.

OPEN AND AMATEUR TOURNAMENTS

The words "open" and "amateur" in rel tion to tournaments in New Zealand are used as follows:-

"OPTN" Means open to all amateurs and professionals (e.g. Waikato Open Champs.)

"closed". (e.g. Auckland Champs. (Closed) means Auckland Amateurs only or Auckland Open Champs. (Closed) means Auckland Amateurs and Professionals only.)

- 1. This code is issued by the Management Committee to establish for all Clubs an inflexible guide as to the procedure required for the participation of visiting players in Club or District Tournaments, Exhibitions or Match Play Series.
 - 2. Subject to confirmation at the Annual General Meeting 1970, Clubs or Districts not observing the required procedure, may, at the discretion of the Management Committee be liable to a fine not exceeding \$10.00.
 - 3. The Code of Procedure shall be issued to all Club and District Secretaries in duplicate with the recommendation that it is displayed on the Club Notice Board or otherwise promulgated to all members.
 - 4. Players Resident in New Zealand.

- 5.2 In the event of the request being approved, a written invitation shall be directed to the player(s) which shall contain the following information:-

(a) Date of Tournament(s) or Exhibition(s). (b) Event(s) in which perticipation is

invited.

(c) Details of Travel and Accommodation.

(e) Approximate time of first match. (f) Advice of M.Z.S.R.A., approval.

(d) Expected date of arrival and departure from New Zealand. one ve between

A copy of this invitation shall be forwarded, simultaneously with its despatch to the player(s) to, breed antagoo , bestal droom , bustal droom , basing

(a) The Secretary, N.Z. Squash Racket Assn. (b) The Secretary of the Local District (c) The Secretary of the Player(s) State Association. or National Association or Governing Body.

NOTE This copy should be sent to the U.Z. Secretary to forward on, as N.Z. must request the permission of the invited player's Association for the player to travel.

In the event that the Player(s) is an independent professional (c) above may be dispensed with.

NEW ZEALAND REPRESENTATIVE BADGES

- 1. To qualify for the issue of an official New Zealand badge a player must be a member of an official senior team - (a) travelling overseas. (b) Playing in New Zealand an official representative team from another country.
- 2. At the discretion of the Management Committee individual players travelling overseas may qualify. The most of aver aver average and the adult a same of a second
- 3. Suitable badges for issue in other cases will be at the discretion of the Management Committee.
- 4. In cases of doubt the Management Committee will exercise discretion. (Note: This will preclude members of Junior Teams being issued with a Silver Fern Badge).

- The nominee must participate in the N.Z. Championships, either the North Island or South Island Championships and one District Championship of the current season unless there are circumstances beyond his/her control and acceptable to the N.Z. Management Committee.
- 2. The nominee must have played in at least three major Tournaments with strong entries in either "A" or "B" Grade during the current season in addition to Rule 1.
- 3. The nominee must have "A" or "B" Grading at the time of nomination.
- 4. The nominee cannot be a previous winner.
- 5. The nomination must be accompanied by a record of the nominees performances for the current year, number of years the nominee has been playing Squash when the nominee was elevated to "A" or "B" Grade.
- 6. Nominations are to be called for by the N.Z. Management Committee on a separate Circular with nomination forms attached. The nomination form shall be sent to Districts for distribution to Clubs and District Selectors six weeks before the selection date. Clubs and/or District Selectors shall return all nominations to their respective Districts who shall forward all nominations received to N.Z. The Management Committee shall forward all nomination forms and attachments to the National Selectors one week before the commencement of the N.Z. Championships.
- 7. Nominations close with the N.Z. Secretary two weeks before the commencement of the N.Z. Championships.

SELECTORS

- 1. Three Senior and three Junior Selectors shall be elected at the A.G.M.
- 2. Nominations are to be called for in writing similar to officers under Rule 9K.
 - 3. The duties of the selectors shall be :-

a. To select all New Zealand representative teams.

b. To select other teams or groups as requested by the Association.

c. To seed all National Tournaments and fixtures, senior and junior viz New Zealand, North Island, South Island, Cousins Shield and Nitchell Cup Competitions.

d. To issue Ranking Lists by 31st October in each year comprising -

(1) 10 Men and 10 ..omen

- (2) Such junior boys and girls as are deemed of sufficient standard.
- e. To select the most improved male and female player during each year.

f. To undertake any other duties as are requested by the Association.

GALLISRY MANUAS

Because of the encroachment of Social Areas into court galleries the New Zealand Association requires that at all National fixtures suitable gallery barricades be erected where necessary and that inside the gallery crea no smoking nor consumption of refreshments nor excessive talking be permitted.

OVERSEAS PLAYERS 19/7/69

Members of official overseas teams travelling in N.Z. are eligible to participate in the N.Z. Champs and also any overseas players entering at their own expense. Clubs and Districts have the option to invite overseas players to any Tourn ment except the N.Z. Champs and it is mandatory that Clubs and Districts doing so must obtain permission from the N.Z. Association before issuing the invitation (19/7/69).

The following are the conditions applicable in respect to applications for Loans by new Clubs:-

- 1. The maximum loan for buildings containing 2 or more courts shall be \$400.00. For building containing 1 court the maximum loan shall be \$200.00.
- 2. The building shall be constructed generally in accordance with the requirements contained in the N.Z.S.R.A., standard drawings and construction guide or to the approval of the Building Advisory Committee.
- 3. The loan shall be for a maximum period of 5 years at an interest rate no less than 69 and as determined by the Management Committee and shall be secured by a registered mortgage, guarantee or such alternative as is acceptable to the Management Committee.
- 4. Applications for loans shall be made by an incorporated society which shall be required to affiliate with the N.Z. Squash Rackets Association before the money is made available.

INVITATION AND SPONSORED TOURNAMENTS (approved 29/8/70)

INVITATION TOURNAKENTS are those where attendance of players is limited to those specially invited by the Host Clubs.

- 1. The Tournament is a CLCSED Tournament for these players only.
- 2. The invitation can be extended to overseas as well as N.Z. players.
- 3. Invitation Tournaments of this nature are usually subject to a sponsor e.g. Corbans Invitation at Henderson
 John Reids at Remuera
- 4. Invitation Tournaments are not to be used as Selection Tournaments by the N.Z. Association because of their closed nature.

SPONSORED TOURNAMENTS are those subject to one or more sponsors and to which any player in N. Z. may enter.

- 1. The Tournament is an CPEN Tournaments to all players.
- Certain players may be invited by the Host Club which may pay all or a
 portion of the travelling and accommodation expenses of these players.
 Such payment must be for bone fide expenses and must not in any way
 represent compensation for wages or salary lost through attendance.
- 3. The invited players may include players from overseas.
- 4. SPUNSCREA TOURNAMENTS may be used by the N.Z. Association for Selection of teams EXCEPT where overseas players are specially invited.

POSTERS FOR TOURNAMENTS (approved 31/7/71)

All posters for National events are to be approved by the Management Committee before printing and circulation.

All local posters are to be approved by the appropriate District.

PLAYERS REPRESENTATIVE ON MANAGEMENT CONSITTEE

The following conditions apply -

- (1) The representative is to be a Ranked New Zealand male player.
- (2) Nominations are to be received from all Ranked male and female players.
- (3) If more than one nomination is received a postal ballot is to be conducted among all the Ranked players.
- (4) The representative is to receive notice of all meetings and a copy of the Order Paper.
- (5) He shall attend meetings if requested by the Management Committee or attend at his discretion or at the direction of the players he represents.
- (6) He need only attend for the duration of the particular business involved.
- (7) He will not have a vote.
- (8) He will be re-imbursed for any expenses properly incurred in attending.

"JAI ALAI" SQUASH

This is a form of Squash entertainment based on "Jai Alai" as played at Manila. Several players compete playing single hands, the loser going off the court to the bottom of the queue. The first player to reach a stated number of points wins. Where the standard of participating players varies handicaps may be used. It is a very popular on social evenings.

PLATE EVENTS

In any Tournament a series of Plate Events ensures every competitor having a minimum of three matches.

The normal PLATE event is for defeated players in the first round of any Championship (or first and second rounds in fields of 32).

These who are defeated in the first round of the plate event then enter a CONSOLATION PLATE event.

The CLASSIC PLATE is an event for the defeated quarter finalists in A grade Championships. This name is reserved for A grade only.

In B and lower grades the event is named the SPECIAL PLATE.
