



REPORT OF THE ASSOCIATION

MR M.H. SUMPTER

PRESIDENTIAL

The year 1974 has seen continued progress and no significant problems have been encountered.

The Management Committee met 8 times during the season including three 2-day meetings. Two of these were at the South Island Championships in Christchurch and the NZ Championships in Hamilton.

The only alterations in the composition of the sub-committee were the appointment of Mr E.O. Sullivan as the new Southern districts' delegate in place of Mr M.P. Fenton now a vice-president and the retirement of the previous immediate past present Mr M.C. Day. This continuity and experience of members certainly assists the administration. All members serve on sub-committees and this results in an efficient sharing of the committee's responsibilities. I am grateful for the support and assistance I have received from all members. I also wish to express my appreciation for the thorough and cheerful way in which the secretary Mr D.R. Massam, has fulfilled his duties.

Apart from members of the Management Committee the operations of the Association have been greatly assisted by the contributions made by the Senior and Junion selectors, Junior Advisory Committee and Directors of Coaching and Rules and Referees as well as our ISRF delegate and Technical Director.

With the exception of the 1971 season the current year will undoubtedly have been the busiest domestic season in our history with visits from the United Kingdom men's team, Australian womens, colts and juniors. These internal visits were extremely beneficial and the committee intends to promote similar tours in future years. The interest and excitement aroused not only caused greater publicity but also afforded our own players the chance to meet opponents of greater experience with a different approach and varied game.

The NZ Championships and the North and South Island Championships were undoubtedly the highlights of the tournament season and the efforts of the host clubs and districts were major factors in their success. The overall standard was high and the men have greater depth and ability even if a truly world class player has yet to emerge. The NZ Junior Championships were well supported and exciting and the Bay of Plenty Association is to be congratulated on its efforts as a host district for its first national event. The sponsorship of national events by Rothmans and the Bank of New South Wales materially assists their staging and is appreciated.

The tour by the four teams to Australia was marked by results that were satisfactory in view of the non-availability of some of the leading players and the senior women performed with particular credit. It was the first time that both junior teams had competed in the championships. This participation was aimed at providing experience for the players and not to reward them for past efforts.

The Committee is pleased that the levies can be maintained at least for 1975 at the present rate but it is conscious of the need to control expenditure particularly in view of inflation.

The sport in the country continues to advance and both affiliated players and clubs are increasing each year. The advent of the glass back wall and other technical improvements should facilitate the rise of squash as a spectator sport and enable greater media publicity. This in turn will offer greater incentive to sponsors.

Although professional squash has yet to make any marked impact in this country it does seem that an Australasian circuit could be inaugurated in 1975 and if this eventuates the skills and ability displayed by the world's leading exponents should further promote the game in our country and stimulate our players.

FINANCIAL

R.G. Pollard, M.P. Fenton, M.H. Sumpter, D.R. Massam

The purpose of this committee is to ensure that Association funds are utilised to the best advantage. Our budget each year is calculated to cover all costs of running squash in New Zealand. The composition of our budget does take into account our cash flow and although we attempt to regularise this, at times we have large sums of money in our account. This is usually when affiliations are paid and rather than have this money 'sitting idle' we invest it to get the best result. Naturally our investments are normally short term although we have one that has been in force for some few years but is virtually on call.

Due to our constitution our loans and advances are subject to our own rules — viz, trustee security for monies lent outside our own organisation. The only loans not in this category are the ones we make to member squash clubs. The rules governing these advances were passed by the Management Committee and approved by the New Zealand Association at the Annual General Meeting.

The operation of this committee has proved profitable to the N.Z.S.R.A. by its investments and beneficial to member clubs by its loans to them. All advances whether to clubs or outside organisations are vetted thoroughly and made through professional accountants and qualified solicitors. There is no speculation involved by the Association and all information on investments is freely available to District secretaries at any time.

Annual Accounts for Year ended 31st August 1974:

Dealing with the accounts for the past year, the affiliation fees reflect the increased membership, and show the effects of increasing the junior affiliation fee as decided at last year's Annual General Meeting. Thus income from affiliation fees is increased over that of last year by \$6000, and income from investments is also higher.

Expenditure shows an increase in such fields as coaching, Junior Committee expenses, Management Committee expenses and secretarial, but it should be remembered that the comparative figures for last year cover only an 11 month period, and thus the current year's figures include an additional meeting of the Management Committee and reflect the increasing costs of travel etc.

COACHING National Director - K.A. Mackwell

The 1974 season marks the fifth year of the Rothmans National Coaching Scheme, a noteworthy year in that coaching activities were extended into the Colts field; greater use was made of professional services other than Dardir more club coaches were qualified than in any previous season; a national training and fitness programme was introduced, regional and national schools were of a higher standard than previously; Bruce Brownlee joined Trevor Colyer and Stephen Hughes as former juniors trained under the scheme to attain selection in the N.Z. Senior Team and Julie Park, the current N.Z. Junior Champion was awarded the most improved player of the year award.

The scheme has produced a number of dedicated District Coaching Co-ordinators who in addition to amassing a high degree of coaching skills have been responsible for the training of club coaches and the preparation of juniors for regional and national coaching schools. It is to Dardirs credit that many of these coaches, within the framework of the Dardir method, are now confident enough to branch out with new coaching techniques and ideas of their own. These coaches are now fully qualified to prepare players at a higher level than previously and so have Dardir free to coach more advanced techniques at Regional Schools.

There is a need each year to go back to basics and improve on the ball control of all coaches. No matter the theoretical knowledge attained a coach cannot qualify to the highest grades unless the art of placing the ball in the exact spot for the pupil to play the required shot is mastered. The teaching of ball control must remain one of the major aims of the more qualified coaches.

Unfortunately this year we lose the services of Nic Devcich (Auckland) and Mary Mackwell (Waikato) two highly qualified co-ordinators who were members of the original squad. We have gained Ted Yeend (Canterbury) now that Westland Clubs have affiliated and in Mike Greig (Auckland) we have an enthusiast in the coaching of Colts and Juniors in the Northern area. Other areas have also been well served by district co-ordinators Tom McQueen (BOP), Peter Powell (Central), Jim Pine (HB/G), Dawn Dryland (Wellington), Doug Laurie (Canterbury) and Danny Lyons (Southern).

There are many qualified coaches as back up to the above co-ordinators, Ken Turnbull (Waikato), Joan Lever and Sue Robertson (BOP), Ian McRae (Central), Peter Johnston (HB/G), Polly Robinson (Wellington), Roger Monk (Canterbury), and Michael McCarthy and Derek Bulman (Southern) who have worked unstintingly for their districts in the training of Junior squads and club coaches.

During the year we were fortunate enough to obtain a copy of an English Coaching film (in four parts) which has already been circulated in the southern districts. I have no doubt that this film will prove of inestimable value not only in the coaching sphere, but in the promotion of the game. Through the good graces of the Rothmans Sports and Cultural Foundation who have wholeheartedly backed the scheme since its inception we have experimented with Video Tape as a coaching medium and have recommended to N.Z. Management that they investigate the the purchase of such equipment for the future.

The successes attained in the past five years would not have been possible without the enthusiastic backing given the scheme by Dardir. He remains the pivot on which the whole structure revolves and we can only trust that his services will be as readily available in the future. However in my opinion whilst Dardir remains our national mentor we should do everything possible to encourage full time professional assistance, at the highest level, to augment the amateur coaches work at district level, much in line with the services so successfully rendered by Peter Dibley in the Wellington and Central area during the past season.

The Waikato District have seen fit to nominate me for a further term as National Director and if successful in retaining the post I have intimated that this will be my final season, during which time the revision of the coaching handbook; a closer liaison with professionals such as Peter Dibley, a comprehensive fitness training programme and the continued upgrading of coaches as well as Junior and Colt players will be our foremost aim.

RULES AND REFEREEING

National Director - W.W. Weld

There is still a somewhat indifferent attitude in some Districts toward refereeing and marking. This is shown by the small number of qualified referees there are in the various Districts. If the effort is not applied by District Administrators results cannot be expected at N.Z. level.

The introduction of Club Referee Badges has been a help towards getting District qualification and should be encouraged by all districts. District qualification is a step that must be taken before the N.Z. badge can be obtained. There is however, a large number of unqualified experienced referees who should be encouraged by their District to seek the necessary qualification.

In the past season 22 candidates have been either partly or completely examined. Of those 5 have passed and been awarded their N.Z. Badge.

In the main the practical examinations this year have been conducted by Mr I. Rowland and Mr I. Webster. Without their time and devotion to the job such good results could not have been obtained.

My personal thanks go to my Secretary, Mrs B. Smethurst, whose cheerful acceptance of onerous chores has made my task this year much easier.

STATISTICIANS Alison Childs

Following a recommendation from the Statisticians' meeting in November, 1973, the "A" grade was split into A1 and A2 groups. The national selectors were asked to submit for each grading list the names of those players whom they considered were of A1 standard in New Zealand, the number listed being left to their discretion. There have been no more than 12 men and 7 women listed at any one time and there has been one name only dropped from the men's list, with one new name only added, and one name dropped from the women's list, but no addition. Overall a sad commentary on the progress, or lack of it, of the younger player.

Several Clubs, as well as some District Statisticians, have expressed the opinion that publication dates of the first two lists should be brought forward. As there are more tournaments now being held early in the year, it is felt that the May date could be altered to one at the beginning of April, and, with the N.Z. Championships being held mid-July, the second publication could be, say, some time before entries closed. This particular list is the one followed for the National Teams Competition, and with an earlier date, would give Clubs plenty of time to select their teams.

It has been noted that a large number of Clubs have not always submitted lists to their District Statisticians, and therefore there may be players entering tournaments with false gradings. Not all Club Statisticians yet realise that it is their responsibility to ensure that their players supply them with competition results, and that they, in their turn, submit up-to-date lists to District Statisticians.

It appears from the results of the National Teams Finals, that the men's gradings are, on the whole, fairly even, but that there is wider disparity between the women's, especially in the "C" Grade. District Statisticians have received copies of the full results of the Cousins Shield and Mitchell Cup, and of the "C" and "D" Grade competitions, and necessary adjustments will have been made for the October issue.

V. Hargreaves, J. Taylor, G. Haddon

With the change in selectorial policy, which was determined by the Management Committee, there was a reduction of Selection Tournaments. Instead of nominated selection tournaments other than the New Zealand Championships, Bank of New South Wales Inter-District Championship, North Island and South Island Championships it was to the nominated players advantage to attend as many of the District Championship tournaments as possible. With the exception of two or three cases the players adopted to this policy very well. In an endeavour to reduce the amount of travelling by the selectors, the "area" system was used whereby John Taylor's territory was north of North Island Championships while John Taylor attended the South Island Championships and Gerald Haddon attended the Waikato Championships. It is recommended that this overall policy be adopted again for the 1975 season and that in the event of visiting International Teams they meet, in addition to the National Tournaments, at the first District Championship.

Their policy for the home tests against both England and Australia was to select the in form players at that point of time while for the Australian Championships they were given the opportunity to blood some of the younger players.

INTERNATIONAL SQUASH RACKETS FEDERATION M.C. Day

Outwardly it appears that 1974 has been a most negative and un-productive year on the I.S.R.F. scene but foundations have been laid for a most active 1975.

The Officers in London have been frustrated, in spite of holding 15 Meetings during the year, by the apparent lack of support and progress on the following topics.

- Finalisation of a New Constitution.
- Definition of an Amateur
- 3. Establishing the World Open Squash Championship.
- Reports from Pakistan regarding progress in their preparation for the 1975 International Series.
- Support by Member Countries for the Technical Advisory Committee.
- Report from South Africa on the 1973 International Series.
- 7. Report from the Rules Interpretation Committee.
- 8. Manufacture of an I.S.R.F. tie.
- 9. Being unable to persuade Russia or China to become involved in the sport.

In spite of all this, progress has been made in the following areas:

- Applications for Membership have been received from Kuwait, Bermuda and Jamaica.
- Canada has been supported by Member Countries, including New Zealand, in its application to include Squash Rackets in the 1978 Commonwealth Games.
- For the first time all Member Countries were currently financial.

Mr Alf Watt, who has been the Vice-Chairman of the Federation, had to relinquish his position upon his return to Australia and we are all indebted to him for his contribution to the sport.

Mr Naseem Ahmad, a Solicitor and Counsellor at the Embassy of Pakistan in London is Vice-Chairman elect.

1975

It appears likely that the next General Meeting of the I.S.R.F. will be held in London in May/June 1975. Dramatic changes in the Administration of the I.S.R.F. may take place by virtue of changes in the office bearers and the situation of the Headquarters.

Mr Peter Phillips, who has been Chairman of the I.S.R.F. since its inception, resigns under the rules of the Constitution. He has carried a heavy burden during the term of his office.

The Meeting may resolve that the Headquarters of the I.S.R.F. move from England. Should this occur all the Officers of the Federation, because of geographic reasons, will be new. New Zealand has indicated it is prepared to provide the Headquarters of the Federation and at the appropriate time and to nominate the Chairman.

NEW ZEALAND'S ROLE

Although the N.Z. Club Squash Player sees little or no apparent benefit from our Membership of the I.S.R.F. it is a vital link between Squash Countries that must be preserved. It enables us in New Zealand to enjoy an equal say in the development of the Sport throughout the World and ensures that the International Scene embraces New Zealand.

BUILDING ADVISORY COMMITTEE J.C. Austin

- 1. INTRODUCTION
- 1.1 This committee was established in 1969 with a brief to produce support technical information, for use by architects, engineers, builders and others involved in new building projects which would have the effect of raising and unifying the standards of court construction in N.Z.
- 1.2 Information was produced in the form of standard plans for a hypothetical 2 and 4 court squash club together with a brief which outlined salient points not able to be included on drawings. The information was originally sold to potential users to recover the initial costs of production and more recently given away free.
- 1.3 As a means of obtaining increased standards of design and performance of squash playing facilities the total exercise has largely been a failure in that the information generally has not been utilised in whole or in part by the authors of new projects.
- 1.4 We believe that it is in the interests of the NZSRA to make every effort to ensure that buildings erected for squash:
 - a) achieve uniform standards of technical performance in a playing sense to satisfy the requirements of its users.
 - do not make an "undesirable" impact on the environment in which they are built — generally residential.

If the Association agrees with these broad aims, some effort will be needed to ensure a more effective communication with the authors of new projects and some broad recommendations have been made to the Management Committee on this point including the reproduction of technical information in metrics.

2 DAY TO DAY FUNCTION

- 2.1 a) To inspect plans and specifications referred by the Management Committee in support of a loan application to determine whether the building conforms to current NZ Standards.
 - Act in an advisory capacity to builders, designers and in some cases, club administration and court operators wishing to obtain specific technical advice.
 - e.g. i) performance of various materials used in court construction
 - ii) wall construction
 - iii) dimensions and general planning standards
 - iv) lighting and ventilation
- 2.2 There is no committee involvement and essentially, John Austin is undertaking a technical advisory service on behalf of the Association, in addition to giving specific responses to application for loan finance.

In general, almost all the loan applications relate to buildings which contain technical and/or planning deficiencies and there exists a continuing frustration that the Association's Technical Office is, in a onse assisting with the establishment of what in many cases; are buildings of a very inferior quality of design and performance.

3. TECHNICAL SERVICE

- During the current year the technical information was supplied in response to inquiries from all over the North Island and on one occasion from the South Island
- In addition 9 loan applications were dealt with in the normal manner, compared with 14 in the 1973-74 year.

INTERNAL TOURS INTERNAL TOURS M.P. Fenton W.R. Murphy

1974 saw the most activity for many years with tours by Australian Women, Juniors, Veterans and Colts, an English SRA side and the Australian Professionals Geoff Hunt and Ken Hiscoe.

No doubt many N.Z. Squash players, particularly in the smaller towns, had the opportunity to see high calibre players in action and in many cases compete against overseas opponents for the first time.

The heavy programmes all within a short period of 2 or 3 months taxed District administrators and itinerary organisers however.

From this great burst of activity the following points can be noted for the future: -

- Touring teams prefer a rest day before and after Test matches.
- It is preferred that they play matches against Districts rather than in local tournaments.
- (3) Communications with overseas bodies need to be improved. Lack of information regarding composition and arrival times of teams caused endless frustrations in the planning of itineraries and many unnecessary alterations.

The above points show the need for more advanced planning of internal tours.

Overall this years heavy programme has instilled tremendous interest and it is to be hoped that these types of tours can be continued.



N.Z. CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 1974 N.Z. Squash Championships held at the Hamilton Squash Rackets Club Courts, 12th to 20th July 1974 attracted an entry of 165 players.

In the Men's Events: 64 players contested the Amateur Championship, five the Veterans Championship and sixteen in each of Divisions 1, 2 and 3.

A draw of 32 in the Amateur Championships and 16 in Division 1 made up the Ladies draw.


