

## ROY OWEN HADDON 1908–1975 N.Z.S.R.S. HONORARY SECRETARY 1953–1971

"Mr Squash", "Curly", "Mr Haddon" to new members and juniors, or just "Roy". Sure, he did at times cause adversaries to call him other uncomplimentary names for his acute appraisals and forthright summaries as he poured energy and urgency into his great love, squash rackets, for you and me, at all levels. Those temporarily incensed have forgiven all such foibles and now join to salute his prodigious efforts to provide a stimulating life for so many in all walks of life.

Roy passed from this life on Queen's Birthday Weekend, 1975, not far short of man's allotted three score years, plus ten, and that to his family and friends was indeed a tragedy. That he had been playing squash and carrying out those many duties as he had done for years, and that these no doubt contributed to his exhaustion and physical demise, I doubt can be termed tragedy.

Squash was Roy's passion among a host of sporting, community and family activities. It made his life so full of interest by challenge, by travel, by people, by friendly rivalry, by the results that were achieved, that if he could have summarised his 39 years of active squash playing and administration, he would surely have said, simply "vintage years, everyone of them, weren't they?"

Roy held every position in the Palmerston North Club. Except club champion, and proved to be the mainstay of the club throughout his 39 years association. He outlasted a long list of squash enthusiasts – many of whom were his junior. A new member

once said, "You know, I've never belonged to any organisation or club where you get so much information and so many newsletters on what's going on — does that man do anything except squash club work?"

Well of course he did. A busy accountancy practice, Y.M.C.A., St Johns, Repertory, swimming, yachting, a vigorous young family, and his pet occupation, honorary secretary for the N.Z.S.R.A. from 1953—72. Roy's ability to pour out enthusiasm, seemingly endless energy, pages of minutes, itineraries, programmes, and new ideas never ceased to astound his associates and to try and put in perspective the amount of personal contribution to his many pursuits. I conservatively estimate that among all other work he visited the Palmerston North Squash Club at least 13,500 times in 39 years — to check the lights, the doors, the court register, the bar takings, the cleaning, and all manner of seemingly mundane tasks.

What motivated Roy with the urgency, tenacity and desire for progress? I think he liked people to need him and his particular abilities. He loved a bit of praise for a job well done, although he would only accept praise with an embarrassed half smile at the conclusion of yet another completed project. He had a fetish for showing a profit and after one first class tournament was checking the takings with the president, who was well pleased with the result and remarked, "Roy, that was a damn successful tournament". Roy never even looked up, he just said "Oh, I don't know, I haven't balanced yet!" This reflects the great pride he took in keeping the finances right so that continuity and upgrading with expansion of club facilities could be made.

Roy strode through the clubs of the world striving for progress in all spheres of squash and his contribution to the international scene can never be fully realised except by those players and administrators from countries who were in close association on international matters. During the era best described as from Hashim Khan through Dardir to Geoff Hunt, and including all that activity during this time, Roy could be best described as an axle rather than a spoke in the international wheel, such was his contribution.

Let all squash players in New Zealand, recognise this man's efforts and remember him in the light of the Reverend Hubbard's final salutation to nim —

"Roy Haddon gave so very much more than he ever received."

## President Reports



Although a fitting tribute to the late Roy Haddon appears elsewhere in the report I would like formally to record an acknowledgement on behalf of the Management Committee of his contributions and achievements as an administrator during his long association with the sport. I would reiterate our expressions of sympathy to his wife and family. I would also suggest that probably no one else in New Zealand has given a comparable service.

#### MANAGEMENT

The Management Committee again met eight times during the year, five times in Wellington, once at Christchurch during the New Zealand Championships, once in Auckland during the weekend of the Third NZ/Australia Test and once at Palmerston North at the annual general meeting. Members of the Committee have again fulfilled their task conscientiously and impartially both at meetings and in their various roles as members of sub-committees or in other capacities. The previous Southern Districts and Auckland delegates Ed Sullivan and Norman Coe retired early in the year and they were succeeded by Michael McCarthy and Mike Greig respectively. This meant that although the Committee was fortunate in maintaining a nucleus of experienced member it also had the benefit of the stimulus of new delegates. I would express appreciation for the contributions made by Ed Sullivan and Norm Coe during their period on the Committee when they undertook many tasks in a comparatively short period. The Secretary, Don Massam, has continued to ofter us his usual efficient and diligent assistance in his customary engaging manner.

#### PLAYING ACTIVITIES

We have experienced another full playing season both on the home and overseas arenas with the visit here of the Australian men's team and tours to South Africa of our women's team and to Australia of Colts and the 2 junior teams. The three test series in New Zealand was closely contested with the result being in doubt to the last match of the third and final test. The victory of New Zealand in the second test in Hamilton came at the end of a thrilling evening's squash and although this was a highlight of the season from our point of view it would be fair to concede that the Australians deservedly retained the Slazenger Shield. All players who participated in this series performed with distinction.

Although the women were defeated in the test series in South Africa the team nevertheless accredited themselves well and the experience gained must be of future benefit

It is anticipated that the Colts and Juniors will have profited from their tour and the achievement of the Junior Girls in finishing second in the Australian Inter-State teams event should be noted. Such tours are undoubtedly an essential part of our programme but their nature and frequency must always be the subject of consideration and review from time to time.

The New Zealand Championships in Christchurch were efficiently conducted by the Canterbury Association and the Christchurch Clubs. Our thanks are due to both. Trevor Johnston and Pam Buckingham were worthy winners of the New Zealand titles and both events were fiercely contested throughout with many exciting matches. The Bay of Plenty's achievement in winning the men's Inter-District event was to that District well justified satisfaction. Auckland as befitting a District with a Women President again proved too strong in the women's teams contest.

The Mitchell Cup and Cousins Shield continue to hold a prominent place in the season and it was gratifying to see a new name in the Hawke's Bay Club on the Mitchell Cup winners list whilst the fact that the semi-finalists in the Cousins Shield came from four different Districts indicates the fact that our leading men players are now more spread than they have been in the past. The B C and D contests are gaining more and more popularity each year and it was significant that six different Districts won these finals.

The Juniors had a busy season with a revised programme which in the main was a success although the scheduling of some of the events need modification in future seasons.

Wellington and Auckland won the Junior District teams events whilst Rod Hayes and Robin Blackwood showed both natural ability and maturity in their Junior open victories in September.

The Junior Management Committee is working enthusiastically and constructively and the recent adoption of a format for their future role should enable the Committee to play an even greater part in the future in conjunction with Senior administrators.

I would like to play a special tribute to Jack Tyler who retires this year from the Junior ranks after many years during which he has served as a member of the Senior Management Committee, Junior Selector and Junior Management Committee Convener. His contributions have unquestionably been a major factor in the development and consolidation of Junior Squash.

For the first time in memory, the Annual General Meeting is being held at a venue other than the Palmerston North Club and we have been fortunate in the way the Club and its members has so efficiently organized arrangements and offered us their hospitality.

The Management Committee has also been supplemented by the efforts of many others and in particular I would refer to Ken Mackwell and Bill Weld as Director of Coaching and Rules and Referees and their supporting District co-ordinators. I am also appreciative of the efforts of District secretaries and the co-operation we have received from them.

Reference should also be made to the transfer of headquarters of the International Squash Rackets Federation to New Zealand which I consider reflects the recognition given by members of that body to the status of Murray Day as well as to past New

Zealand administrators and acknowledges the efficient way the 1971 Championships were conducted here and their undoubted success. We are appreciative of the continued sponsorship from the Rothmans Foundation and others as well as the grants the sport has received from the Council of Recreation & Sport.

In conclusion I would mention that during the season I made visits to all Districts chiefly to attend either Senior or Junior events (although my visits to Southern Districts consisted of brief calls at the Aorangi Club Twizel and the Invercargill Clubs). It was most gratifying to observe the enthusiasm and ability of district and club administrators and I would like to express my gratitude to them for their friendliness and hospitality. It was also encouraging to observe the continued growth and expansion throughout the country of courts and players with the consequent benefit to the sport.

## FINANCE REPORT

#### LOANS TO CLUBS:

The 1975 season has seen an upsurge in loan applications that has all but exhausted our loans fund. As loans come from our accumulated funds, we have reached a stage where we will have to reimburse this fund from other sources. Application to the Council for Recreation and Sport has proved unsuccessful and we will have to look at other methods of injecting money into this fund. The logical way is by a special once-only levy on each registered player of between 50c and \$1.

Until such time as our cash flow i.e. repayments equal outgoings is equitable we are going to need a substantial injection of money into this fund.

This would give us a substantial amount to help new clubs plus existing clubs who wish to upgrade their present facilities. We think that this financial assistance, even though small, does help our member clubs and indicates to other lenders and mortgagees that the N.Z.S.R.A. is prepared to support the project.

all of which affected our Budget and caused over expenditure in some categories. For 1976 we have built in safeguards to counteract further increases which are expected to have greater impact once devaluation starts to take effect.

The Accounts for the year ended 31 August 1975 show an increase in affiliation fees of \$2,500 over that of the previous year, but total expenditure has increased by over

\$6,000 giving an excess of expenditure over income of \$2,998 for the year.

The increased expenditure arises mainly from additional expenditure on Colts, secretarial and overseas tours, together with items which have not occurred beofre — viz. the Annual Report at a net cost of \$335, and the sending of our delegate to the I.S.R.F. Special General Meeting at the net cost of \$1420.

The spending on overseas tours was an excess of budget with a number of factors contributing to this such as increases in air fares and devaluation.

Nevertheless, the overall financial position remains healthy with accumulated funds of just on \$39,000 and prospects for the coming year with the natural increase in membership and increased affiliation income will cope with planned expenditure, particularly if the hoped for assistance from the Council for Recreation and Sport is forthcoming.

- New rules for the International Amateur Championships have been finalised.
- The Rules Committee are progressing well on their report of revised rules of squash.
- Canada has been named as the venue for the 6th International Amateur Championships in 1977
- Russia has held preliminary discussions for establishing squash in their country.
- The Headquarters have moved to NEW ZEALAND.

Overwhelming support was given to New Zealand, at the June Meeting in London, with the result that world squash is now administered from New Zealand.

It is one thing to be accorded the privilege of administrating the sport but another to ensure that the confidence placed in the newly elected officers is well founded. It is a challenge which we have willingly accepted with the full realisation that it will not always be easy.

The sport is on the threshhold of expansion in explosive proportions and we must be ready to cater for this expansion. Among other things, we must give serious consideration to —

1. The production of the first I.S.R.F. Handbook

The future of the sport

 Should application be made to have squash included as an Olympic Sport (and if not)

b) Should the distinction between Amateur and Professionals be

abolished.

(c) Should the Federation become involved in establishing a Women's International Championship or should we assist the women in establishing their own Federation.

(d) How stringent should the rules be for accepting new members.

(e) Should the game of doubles become a Federation concern.

The closest possible dialogue must be held with the Professional Association.
 We have much to learn from each other and we must grow together for the betterment of our sport.

It is appropriate to place on record an appreciation to those that founded the Federation and to the Officers who guided the destiny of the sport during the initial eight years and in particular Peter Phillips, John Horry and Chris Campbell. Let us not forget the debt we owe to these gentlemen.

Advice has been received from the office of the Minister of Recreation and Sport that they believe Squash Rackets is the first sport in New Zealand to be honoured with the Headquarters and Chairman of any sport.

We must not be complacent, but We in New Zealand must capitalize on this honour

### COACHING - National Director, K.A. Mackwell

It is my pleasure to report on the coaching scene for 1975 where we 'came alive' at National level and achieved a greater degree of participation at regional, district and club.levels than previously.

Perhaps the most noteworthy feature of the year was the National School held in Hamilton in May which was attended by 16 coaches from Whangarei to Invercargill. Here papers were presented on a variety of coaching techniques, practical court work was critically assessed by Dardir and school members and a theme of 'think squash' was initiated. Dardir in contrast to previous schools was used to a minimum on court but to a maximum in clinic participation where his analysis of the various ideas put forward by coaches were most helpful. It is gratifying to find our top coaches are developing their own techniques within the broad concept of the scheme and all who attended agreed the school was a milestone in our development.

I feel we now have a nucleus of grade 4 coaches with the ability and confidence to coach at other than junior or beginner level and it is gratifying to see more clubs seeking their advice.

Two national costs schools and a junior school were held during the season. One of the colts schools was also utilised as a selection school (coaching schools are not a satisfactory venue for selection purposes in my opinion) and the junior school was held as a 'top-up' weekend for those players selected to travel to Australia. There was

an even standard at these schools which together with restricted numbers assisted materially with greater participation and the amount of work covered.

In strict contrast the regional schools held at Ngaruawahia, Wanganui and Christchurch endeavoured to cater for too many players. The standard, that of the Rothmans Teams Event, was again high and it is difficult to do justice to 24 players of this calibre over a weekend. A further breakdown at district level appears desirable and indeed is planned for the future.

At District and club level the progress made has varied according to the enthusiasm engendered by the District Co-ordinator. Auckland along with Central, Canterbury and Southern, largely because of distances, have wisely delegated responsibilities and this could well follow to advantage in other districts as suitable coaches are trained.

The number of less experienced players coming forward to be trained as coaches is another feature of the past season. Whilst these coaches have a lot to learn, their keeness has proved to be contagious. They are doing a good job in many new clubs which have been hesitant in nominating such players in the past. It was also pleasing to see several well known vintage class players qualifying.

The need to train for squash was more universally accepted during the past season. A special 3 year programme is underway for top seniors and leading colts; nominated players for overseas teams participated in a 3 month pre season programme and a 'run of the mill' schedule was drawn up for those players sufficiently motivated to get out and get fit.

The distribution of the coaching film caused some major problems due partly to clubs and districts not adhering to the timetable but mainly due to lack of communication in advising the films had been forwarded. A specific procedure is to be spelt out for future distribution. The films, were shown in all but two districts and were appreciated by all who attended the screenings.

Another feature of the season was a request from the Education Department to write and publish a coaching handbook for schools. The book was especially written for teachers and goes into more detail than the revised Association counterpart. It is currently in the hands of the Government Printer and is to be available to the Association at cost later in the year.

During the year we have had many frustrating delays in our endeavours to obtain video tape equipment for use in coaching, refereeing and other facets of our sport. We have been assisted by the Minister of Sport but have not had the same initial support from the Minister of Customs. However, we are confident that suitable equipment will be available later in the year.

In past seasons we have cut our cloth according to the budget monies available for the scheme and we gratefully acknowledge the co-operation and understanding of New Zealand Management in this respect and the material assistance given by the Rothmans Sports and Cultural Foundation. The setting up of a Ministry of Sport coincides with our development planned on a regional basis which will require a larger budget in the future and we are confident the Ministry will assist us in this and other fields.

It was our honour and pleasure to again be a member of the Rothmans coaching team that visited the West Coast early in April This visit could well be the last of its type planned by the Foundation. These schools which have been held over a number of years and visited many minor centres have been responsible for introducing thousands of intermediate and secondary school children to a wide variety of sports. Our thanks go

to Rothmans for their foresight in including squash as one of their sponsored sports and for their assistance with the coaching scheme since its inception

Finally it is again my pleasure to acknowledge the assistance given by Dardir and thank him for his continued interest in the scheme. For those still willing to listen and observe, Dardir remains a fountain of knowledge for all squash players and not simply for those coaches and juniors with whom he has worked in recent years. Other professionals are now entering the field and our special thanks to Peter Dibley for his assistance in the lower North Island. These players are becoming an important part of the overall scheme and we visualise an expanding role for them in a regional scheme. Our special thanks to the District Co-ordinators and their assistants for their enthusiasm in administering the scheme at district and club level. I'm certain nobody would object if I singled out Jim Pine in Hastings and Peter Powell in Stratford, two of the original co-ordinators who are still with us and commend them for the lead they have given other co-ordinators and coaches. To a legion of club coaches too numerous to name in this report, but whose names and grades will be available at the Annual General Meeting, my thanks also for their sterling efforts.

#### TOURNAMENTS - D W.R. Smart

During the year there were 191 tournaments held throughout the eight districts in New Zealand and it was particularly noticeable that during the year the lower graded players were being catered for with the greater number of tournaments being held for them than in previous years.

A notable inclusion in the Junior Tournament calendar for 1975 was the introduction of a N.Z. Junior Open Tournament which was held for the first time in Auckland.

It is to be noted that in 1976, the N.Z. Management Committee will not approve of A Grade Invitation Tournaments being held between the 1st April and 31st July 1976 and this has been done in order that those players selected in N.Z. squads for overseas tours are able to play in the tournaments they desire

During 1975 the N.Z. Management Committee appointed a liaison officer and it is intended that the liaison officer liaises with clubs and districts throughout N.Z. who are holding national fixtures with the object of obtaining continuity within the tournament circuit.

I would like to thank all the district secretaries who have co-operated throughout the year in advising change of tournament dates and liaison matters.

## BUILDING ADVISORY COMMITTEE - John Brown, John Austin

In line with past years, this committee has continued to provide technical information and advice on new building projects and to ensure that the basic standards of court construction as set down by the NZSRA are met.

It is obvious from some recent project plans inspected that there still appears to be a common basic range of faults. Most of this seems due to lack of understanding by clubs of the constructional requirements of squash courts and squasy play and not utilizing the information available.


Main faults are: Selection of unsuitable construction methods, including poor blockwork, leading to plaster breakdown and condensation. Lackof ventilation, lack of lighting and variance in selection of materials.

The introduction of glass as a full back wall of squash courts has resulted in a tremendous advance in the viewing of squash play and the ability to televise. This is more expensive than the solid construction normally used but when resultant advantages are considered it is a wise investment.

Two types are available, the free standing wall as used in NZ so far, and the "Lintol" type, being virtually a panel between a solid head and floor over the full width of court.

Clubs installing glass walls should give careful consideration to screening behind glass walls and continuation of side walls to assist ball vision. Gallery structure and lighting intensity are equally important.

## RULES AND REFEREEING - National Director - W.W. Weld

The move toward improving the standard of refereeing in the country is gaining momentum as some of the newer clubs now recognise the importance of this side of the game and more players wish to become qualified. This movement is being promoted by major tournaments that schedule and demand all players to referee after they have played.

Sets of coloured slides on refereeing and marking instructions have been circulated to all districts. These slides will simplify elementary instruction and help standardise marking and refereeing instruction throughout the country

The standard of refereeing and marking shown by some of our top referees in the recent tests against Australia was below standard. Some of the markers showed a complete disregard of the recognised calls and some referees lost control of their match when the players applied pressure by not making a genuine attempt to get to and play the ball. To overcome this problem a short list of international class referees must be established and they must qualify each year to hold this grading.

This season eight New Zealand Referees badges have been awarded. There are still many players with refereeing ability who should be encouraged to become qualified.

I would like to thank Dianne Smith for her time, effort and skill used in designing and painting the cards used to produce the instructional slides

## SELECTORIAL - V. J.W. Hargreaves (Convenor), J.R. Taylor, G.P. Haddon

Selection policy for 1975 was similar to that of last year whereby it was mandatory, for those wishing to gain New Zealand representation, to participate in either the North Island or South Island Championships together with the New Zealand and Inter-District Championships. In addition it was to the nominated players advantage to attend as many of the District Championships as possible. Due to the shortage of time it was unfortunate that selection for both the Women's team to tour South Africa and the Men's team for the internal tests against Australia had to be made at the conclusion of the North Island Championships. To enable the players to gain the benefits of training, practice and playing as a unit it was decided to select the mens team for the 1976 International Squash Rackets Federation Championship at the conclusion of the Inter-District Championship.

In an endeavour to assist with the improvement of the standard of squash within New Zealand all nominated players were forwarded, during December 1974, a training schedule by Ken Mackwell the Director of Coaching. The programme which included road running, skipping, court running together with court practice, commenced on January 1st and carried on for sixteen weeks. To keep the players honest they were required to report their progress every two weeks to Viv Hargreaves. All the top players, together with some others, trained under the guidance of their own physical training instructors. However, those who were able to see our programme through showed definite signs of improvement and they were rewarded by encouraging results and performances during the New Zealand and Inter-District Championships. It was interesting to note that those who appeared to give the training away at various stages through the programme faded, in some cases badly, during the championships. It is often said that the New Zealand championship week is too demanding but it is the lack of preparation by those who complain.

## INTERNAL TOURS M.P. Fenton W.R. Murphy

The 1975 season saw only one tour of overseas players through the country. After a gap of many years we were hosts to a team of four from Australia, they being Ray Lewis, Kevin Shawcross, Terry Cheetham and John Manning. For the first time matches were not played against Clubs but were restricted to District matches only and the Australians were successful in defeating each of the eight districts. Some comment has been made that they found some of the Districts not up to standard and on whether or not it is worthwhile for teams such as this playing all Districts. The attitude of the Internal Tours Committee is that if Districts do not get matches against these better players their standard will never improve. The Committee also endeavoured to have all three tests played at a weekend and this proved to be in a sense the undoing of New Zealand, as our players had obviously not recovered from the hard test in Hamilton on the Friday night when they fronted up for the vital third test in North Shore on the Sunday. We will have to note for future years that in short tours of this nature one test at least will have to be played mid-week and that the tour should culminate in a test and not in a match against a District as was the case this year when the final match was against the Auckland District and was played two days after the

third test. It became somewhat of an anticlimax.

As well as playing the eight Districts and the three tests the Australians also competed in the North Island Championships held at Wellington.

A team of four led by Mrs Wilma Halling (Auckland) as Manageress left N.Z. on August 1st for a five week tour of the Republic. It was a most enjoyable trip, but because of west distances covered, very tiring. The hosts were charming people and did their best to kill the team with kindness. They were taken to the top of Table Mountain, down a gold mine and driven 1000 odd km. to see Kruger Park, to mention a few trips.

The girls arrived in Johannesburg, to Capetown (12 days) played Provincial team, Western Province and South African Championships; Port Elizabeth (3 days), Durban (3 days), Provincial teams and tests, Johannesburg (2 days), Welkom (3 days) provincial teams; Johannesburg (5 days) S.A. Invitation team and 3rd test.

Although the team lost the 3 tests they won the 6 provincial games comfortably. Pam Buckingham and Julie Hawkes were semi-finalists in Western Province Champs, and Julie Hawkes reached the semi-finals in S.A. Champs. The team trained hard and consequently were very fit — a fact remarked upon frequently by South African players.

The overall standard of women's squash in South African appears to be much as here, except that NZ has far greater numbers playing, making each division correspondingly deeper. Accordingly, their organisation is not as sophisticated as ours; they have no gradings, no qualified referees or coaches, although they do a lot of coaching, especially at schoolgirl level, and they have an annual schoolgirl provincial teams tournament.

Their strength lies in their No. 1 player, Jill Eckstein, and Val Bridgens who lost 3/2 to Eckstein in S.A. Champs at 22. She looks very promising.

## COLTS: Convenor N. Coe

The season started with a Boy Colts School at North Shore Club on the 15th and 16th March. The school was also a selection tournament, and was attended by the National

Selectors. There were 20 players in attendance, 3 did not appear, they were S. Kennedy Auckland, V. Pere Auckland and D. Sharrock, Bay of Plenty. This is a large number to do real justice with, but we did manage with the help of the Colts Co-ordinators and Selectors. Also if it had not been for the generosity of the North Shore Club, allowing us extra courts, we would not have managed at all. We are grateful to the Club. I trust this school was of benefit, the players who took part seemed to enjoy the session.

On the 5th April, we held a Colts School in Auckland for the Girls at Remuera on the 5th and Ponsonby on the 6th. 14 girls attended, just a suitable and workable number. Only Dardir and myself ran this school, and though some of the girls who attended were not of a good standard, we did give them the chance to be involved, and we hoped motivated enough to strive to greater heights. I fully realise that most of the girls or boys who attend these schools are ex Junior ranks, and have attended the Junior Schools, but we do still get that boy or girl who have come into Squash later and they usually are far more keen than those who consider themselves part of the establishment, or who have not made National sides, even though they have come through the Junior ranks, they are keener and more dedicated in most cases.

The Colts Boys team chosen to go to Australia, were of the best on the day, but I do not favour selection on a Round Robin basis. The tour of Australia cannot be counted on results, but experience gained. With the introduction of the fitness programme, this alone had quite a remarkable effect on the Colts. I would like to see it now established in other centres, and in southern centres, this will really raise our over all Squash standard. Most important, each area must have a player who will set a standard, who is prepared to do the work load, and be a leader so the others can follow.

The match arranged by New Zealand for the Colts against Australian team in Tauranga was of great value.

Auckland, Waikato and Bay of Plenty played a round robin match in September. Central, Wellington and Hawkes Bay will do the same in 1976, as will the South Island districts. The Colts in the South at this stage, are a wee bit different to the North, as they are in most cases the senior representative for their districts, so they do get a lot of top squash though not a lot of tournaments.

I'm still not satisfied with the years work, or what has been achieved. I know the coordinators and myself can do still better. What does please me is the respect shown by the Colts to the Co-ordinators and myself.

#### JUNIOR SQUASH

The Junior Advisory Committee have used the last year of administration to bring together all district ideas and explore avenues for increasing Junior participation on a national basis, and have conducted the assistance to Junior affairs on a high level with our attendances at N.Z. Management. attendances at N.Z. Management.

With the recent formulation of definite rules for Junior management administration, the opportunity is now there for us to work side by side with N.Z. Management for the greater benefit of the game as a whole. This will relieve N.Z. Management of a large administrative burden which is growing year by year. With few exceptions all delegates have contributed greatly from their experience for the benefit of other districts. When we have met the one aim has been to improve all aspects of the game and administration for the player.

Parents of players have given advice and criticism freely to any members attending tournaments and we feel this involvement of many people is proving one of the most valuable contributions to Junior squash for parents know who their representatives are and also know that their ideas will be freely discussed at our committee level for presentation to N.Z.

We who are in very close touch with the Junior players and their wants can see what is required far better than those of we Senior administrators who have tried in the past to administer from afar. We have felt that there has been a breakdown in communication between Junior and Senior delegates in some districts but now know with the formal establishment of the Junior Management Committee this position will be rectified.

Our background work has been rewarded by the obvious rise in overall standard — and the success of teams touring to Australia. With an established calendar of well organised, highly competitive events Juniors can plan the season ahead knowing that the organisation of administrators working for them have their interests at heart.

This will always be the case because all members are devoted to their tasks, and have expressed their desire to continue their assistance towards the Junior aspect of squash.

I have expressed my intention to retire from squash administration this year. Having been involved with administration for sixteen years, many of these being on the

Management Committee and the last nine solely interested in the Junior aspects of squash, I can look back and honestly state that these would have been the most satisfying years of my life. Many people, old and young, have contributed to this satisfaction, but the ultimate has been to see the growth of Junior numbers, standard of play, exemplary manners on and off the court, and the establishment of a Junior Management Committee.

No person could have ever asked for more.

Over the years from the mass of Juniors on display the selectors have endeavoured to encourage those whose present natural ability indicates a definite value to N.Z. squash in the future. Selection on this basis requires taking into account a number of variables never considered at senior level. Included are age, ( is a brilliant 15 year old better value than an established 18 year old?) current physical development (is the sudden 2" in height & stone in weight responsible for the present lack of co-ordination?), educational committments (maths or Melbourne, Brisbane or bursary? that is the question), natural enthusiasm for the joy of living (common aim for 18 year old senior swimming champions is retirement — to commence living), the o opposite sex (a temporary off-court diversion for boys, but for many girls over the age of 12, a continuing upsetting influence), parents (very often well meaning by providing every opportunity and encouragement but often misguided in their expectancy of producing a champion), future prospects (how many administrators fail to appreciate than an 18 year old "champion" is only relative to other juniors and is not a ready made international senior at 19?)

If the computer-like self selection of seniors based on a series of wins or losses, is uncomplicated by comparison, the junior selectors have no complaints. Only satisfaction that insight into many possible distractions during the early years of a squash career has guided and protected talent to a stage where it can do itself and N.Z. full justice.

## STATISTICIANS - G. Dallimore, A. Childs

Following a year's trial, the system whereby the 'A' Grade was divided into A1 and A2, with the national selectors submitting the list of A1 players, was abandoned by a decision of N.Z. management. It is noted that some districts are still dividing this grade into two, which harms no one, but calls for more accuracy by District Statisticians.

The publication dates laid down for the May and July lists still arouse some criticism, with the July date being the one most in contention, coming as it does at the start of the N.Z. Championships. However, with entries for this event closing about six weeks before, the May date is the only practical one, and similarly, the July date is the earliest time possible to be of any relevancy to the gradings for the National Teams Compettion.

Some clubs are still not sending in their lists which makes the District Statistician's lot much harder. They cannot be expected to keep track of all the results of the every growing competitive squash population, and club statisticians must be made to understand that they are responsible for submitting up to date lists, even if the recommendation is for no change.

We would like to thank all Statisticians, District and Club, for their efforts, largely unsung and often criticised. Their task is growing, not only in size, but in importance, and the work they do is much appreciated by NZ and District Managements

#### PLAYERS LIAISON - Shane O'Dwyer

The last year has seen some progress made in this field of improving player awareness and communication in relation to the management and organisation of squash in NZ as it affects them. However, there is still room for improvement and this will come as more players become involved in the players liaison activities through two way communication.

To set the ball rolling a Players "Grapevine" has been set up consisting of a Players District Delegate, all top 20 ranked men and women nominated players and District Secretaries who will be fed with an information circular concerning specific players affairs.
