PRESIDENTIAL REPORT

Upon assuming office at the last Annual General Meeting, I commented upon the challenges facing this Association with the pending transition to open squash for all players.

1980 has, indeed, brought forward major challenges to the Administration. Two issues have been particularly important, the decision to bring forward the date of squash for men players going open, and the decision made in relationship to the entry of the South African Professional, Roland Watson, to the Sun Alliance New Zealand Open.

June 1st was the date that the sport went "open" for all male players, thus joining their female counterparts who had been liberated some twelve months earlier. This decision was forced upon the Association when several clubs, in at least four districts, offered cash prizes or trophies in excess of the ISRF regulations. As the timing of the decision was vital to the conduct of the North Island, South Island and New Zealand Championships, each District President was informed of the exact position, along with the recommendation of the N.Z.S.R.A. Emergency Committee that the date be brought forward to 1st June, 1980. A vote of seven districts for and two against saw the recommendation ratified. It is disappointing to note that not one player or administrator had earlier seen fit to query the action of any of the clubs concerned. Communication is all important to the successful running of this Association, and it would appear that many club administrators are not aware of the Rules of either this Association or the I.S.R.F. District committees are the direct link from this Association to the member clubs, and it is disappointing to find that a lot of pertinent information does not appear to disseminate beyond some of the District Committees.

The second major decision was in respect of the entry of Roland Watson to the Sun Alliance New Zealand Open. The decision not to accept his entry was taken as the committee felt:

- that his participation in this event would constitute a significant contact in terms of the Gleneagles Agreement,
- (b) that this contact could have significant consequences on the future participation of New Zealand sportsmen and women overseas and.

(c) that the political climate in New Zealand had changed significantly over the past two years since he last competed in this country.

This decision was relayed to Mr Watson and to I.S.P.A., who, in turn, recommended that their members boycott the event. After consultation with the Sun Alliance Insurance, the Henderson Squash Rackets Club, and Television New Zealand, it was decided to proceed with the event. I must comment that the management of the Sun Alliance Insurance were fully informed at all stages, and they fully endorsed the actions of the Management Committee. The N.Z.S.R.A. then decided to send a special delegation to Adelaide to meet with the officials of I.S.P.A. and Mr Bruce Davidson and Mr Bill Murphy travelled to Australia to explain the New Zealand position to all concerned. Following these discussions I.S.P.A. agreed to withdraw its directive to members and those who wished to play could enter without fear of disciplinary action. This compromise was entirely due to the direct contact established between our representatives and I.S.P.A. and in the presence of the I.S.R.F. Chairman, Mr Murray Day, I would stress that the decision to refuse Watson's entry was not taken quickly or lightly, and the committee considered the alternatives of accepting or not accepting the entry. The final decision was made in light of what the committee considered was the best for New Zealand squash and for New Zealand sport in the future.

In April, some twenty-five people assembled in Auckland for a weekend seminar to look back to examine the present situation and to look critically to the future. The basis for attendance was by personal invitation to try and ensure that the meeting involved people who had particular expertise in many facets of coaching, managing, training and development. The numbers were purposely kept low to assess the response, and at the conclusion of the sessions all in attendance agreed that the whole concept had been admirably served. Several direct recommendations from this seminar have been able to be included in policy through the season, and in some areas the recommendations have been, or will be, referred to specialist groups for their opinions. The major recommendation that has been implemented is the adoption, from 1981 onwards, of the Englishtype squash ball, a significant change from the Australian-type ball that we have used over past seasons. Strong criticism was levelled at the Association at the seminar for not actively involving more people in the areas of training, coaching and managing teams, especially at international level. Mr Brownlee has been actively encouraging the coaches in the National Coaching Scheme to come through to top level by involvement in Regional coaching and also by being selected to take specific squads for the Association. This development will obviously take time to come to full fruition but is a start in the build up of coaching personnel. More concern, however, needs to be shown at the managerial level. The Managers Pool contains many names of interested and probably competent persons but not too many have had the necessary experience to be available for international appointments. One of the criteria currently applied to all nominees is the desirability of having managed a team to at least Interdistrict level, thus passing some of the responsibility for development initially back to the Districts. At the Senior events in Whakatane this year, three Districts sent men to manage their women's teams. The competence of the men to do this job is not at question, but with a women's international competition next year in Canada these districts would seem to be indicating already that they have no suitable female nominees for the position of Manageress.

The National Lottery organised by Hertnon Associates was an outstanding success. Total sales were \$216,794 netting a healthy fund to the Association after distribution of profits to the districts and participating clubs. The initial response to the invitations to participate were exceptional in Northland (nine clubs out of

ten), Hawkes Bay-Gisborne(8/9), Bay of Plenty (13/15), but disappointing in Auckland (11/24) and Canterbury (7/28). The Christchurch S.R.C. benefited however, by the lack of competition in the area by selling the highest total of books. The final sales were 70% of available tickets, and I am sure this figure could have easily been 10-15% higher if more clubs had responded in the affirmative to the initial invitation, as well as participating in the bonus available for ticket sales. With the 1983 International Squash Rackets Federation Championships being hosted in New Zealand, a firm financial base will be needed to organise the event. The Management Committee will provide at the Annual Meeting a projected costing of the event and offer for discussion alternative methods of funding this event, including the possibility of another National Lottery in 1982.

The growth rate of the sport in New Zealand in the affiliated clubs this year has been a steady 7.44%, giving us a final total of 51,899 players. With many of the commercial centres showing high occupancy rates conservative figures would indicate that up to 100,000 people are actively playing the sport. The New Zealand Squash Centre in Wellington continues to trade well under the managership of Mr Nick Cass, and with commercial centres also well established in Auckland, Christchurch and Dunedin this Association must try to establish an acceptable formula that will allow all these people to come under the umbrella of this Association, Affiliated Clubs will remain the backbone of the competitive and development scene in this country, and as long as the committees of these clubs remain active in the promotion of the sport and project an image of efficiency and enthusiasm for their members, clubs will continue to develop with the game.

This Association has now completed the first year's consultancy contract with Merchandising Consultants International represented by Mr J. Urlwin of the International Management Group. Mr Urlwin stated at the outset of this agreement that his task was to increase the visibility of this Association to the general public of New Zealand, and, if successful, this promotion of the Association would lead to the introduction of potential sponsors wishing to align themselves with our image/visibility. To our mutual satisfaction he negotiated contracts on our behalf with the B.C.N.Z. for television coverage of the New Zealand Open, with the Sun Alliance on a continuing basis for the same event, with Overseas Traders Limited, the holders of the Bob Charles franchise, as well as having a number of potential sponsors and promotions under consideration. Mr Urlwin has also been available and willing to act as an advisor on any contracts or discussions that we have held on our own behalf as part of the contract. Representatives of the Sponsorship Promotions Committee have met with Mr Urlwin on three occasions during the year and I am confident that if we continue on this basis into next season we will see a continued expansion in this most important field.

The Association has been well served in the fields of publicity this year, with primarily, the independent contribution of the New Zealand and World Squash magazine appearing regularly nationwide. Radio New Zealand have been most conscientious in their efforts to provide results for the listeners in this country, and through the local sports officers the sport has been well served with coverage of many of the important results through the season. Television New Zealand has been most enthusiastic in their response to televise the sport with the Sun Alliance New Zealand Open, the series of international matches played locally plus the screening of the series featuring Jonah Barrington and also the British Open final being on our screens during the year. Reporters from the main papers in New Zealand have been diligent in seeking the opinion of the Association about controversial matters and have been generally very factual in their coverage.

The demands made on clubs for venues suitable for National Events are now quite considerable in respect of court standards, changing facilities, relaxation areas, and suitable adjacent accommodation. Consequently, this Association is looking at all possible venues critically and I am confident that as some of the more established clubs are now upgrading facilities we will have an adequate number of suitable venues in both the North and South Island to ensure a good rotation of the major events. Whilst it is important to ensure that we appoint the best venues in terms of suitability for players and sponsors, it is also imperative that the players as well realise that they have responsibilities to the court to project the best image of the sport. Some of the matches this year involving our top players have not been good spectacles for the uniniated public and if we are to progress with sponsors this sport has to be able to portray to the viewing public the highest qualities of the game. It may well be that there is a misunderstanding of the intentions of Rule 12 and if this is so the sooner the referees and

the players can come to agreement of interpretation, the better for all.

Thanks to the Bay of Plenty Association and the Whakatane Squash Rackets Club who organised the New Zealand Championship and Interdistrict Teams Event and all who were present at Whakatane enjoyed the hospitality of the people there plus the meticulous organisation of the Championship Committee. Congratulations to Annette Owen (Remuera) and Frank Donnelly (Australia) for their title wins. The Cousins Shield and Mitchell Cup were hosted well by Mitchell Park who had the extra pleasure of winning the Men's title of Champion Club. Remuera continued their supremacy in the Women's event. The Graded Teams Events proved once again to be the highlight of the squash competitive year for the lower graded players as some 584 teams contested the District eliminations. The finals at the various venues again assembled groups of highly competitive players who, I am sure, formed new friendships over the finals weekends that will last for years. These events will continue to grow in stature and I am sure that the involvement of this Association with the finalist Clubs by way of travel subsidy is one of the direct benefits of affiliation. Thanks to all those Districts and Clubs who hosted the other National Events, particularly the junior events where, often, extra effort is required.

In March the team of Stuart Davenport, Dean Lovett, Wayne Rowlands and John Mills left to play in the World Junior Championships in Sweden under the management of Mr Neville Munro. On their way to the events a win over England in a test match was the precensor of a final placing of third in the World Junior Teams event and Stuart Davenport also secured third placing in the Individual event organised at the same venue. The team returned through the U.K. and played in the Drysdale Cup, and it is now history that Stuart Davenport beat the best junior field assembled to become the first New Zealand player to win this coveted trophy. The team also played at Singapore and won a test there on the way home.

Dean Lovett, the most improved male player of the year, was assisted by the N.Z.S.R.A. to compete in both the Malaysian Championship and the Singapore Championship. A Women's, Men's and Junior Girl's Team managed by Mr Bryden Clarke and Mrs Susie Simcock attended the Australian Championships at Southport in September playing in the Individual event and contesting the Interstate Titles. The members of the Men's Team accepted the offer of the N.Z.S.R.A. to compete in the World Open in Adelaide and these players gained valuable experience against the top world professionals. The Sun Alliance New Zealand Open followed the World Open Championship and after the initial setbacks, a most impressive field assembled at the Henderson Squash Rackets Club. An Under 23 Team with Mr Viv Hargreaves as Manager completed a most successful tour through the Central North Island, and the Singapore selection made many friends on their tour in June. The visit by this side was a most enjoyable one for all who had contact with the team and, ultimately, the N.Z.S.R.A. was able to acede to the request of the Singapore Squash Rackets Association to provide a New Zealand coach to assist in the development of a coaching scheme and help for their referees. Mr N.I. Gifford was able to go to Singapore in September and was also able to assist the Malaysian Association in their preparations for the Malaysian Open. Whilst the traditions of the sport lay more with Pakistan and the U.K. the N.Z.S.R.A. has, I am sure, a role to play in the development of the sport in the Pacific Basin and we are fortunate to be able to send such practical assistance to these newer Associations in the promotion of the sport.

In this financial year the Association assisted several players to the United Kingdom and grants were made to Annette Owen, Ross Norman, Robin Espie, Paul Viggers and Brian Barnett. Norman continued his good form from the 1979 I.S.R.F. event at Brisbane and was runner-up in what was the last British Amateur Championship. He then turned professional and established 26th ranking with I.S.P.A. prior to his return to New Zealand in July. He also became the first squash player to be a recipient of a grant from the New Zealand Sports Foundation which will assist the further development in his chosen career. Espie and Barnett played through the U.K. season and remained in Europe and the United Kingdom and Viggers and Annette Owen returned to play in the New Zealand season. Bruce Brownlee, Murray Lilley and Howard Brown continue to play internationally. Brownlee, presently ranked No.7 in the World, has stated his intentions to spend more time in New Zealand in future years and this will be anticipated with interest by all New Zealand players as he remains our leading player.

The appointed National Directors have continued to work willingly and well for the Association, with both panels of selectors putting in many attendance hours at the various nominated events through the season. The statisticians

at District level have produced the year's lists at the due dates. Most districts now utilise several people, each looking at specific groups, but I just wonder if there is the amount of movement between grades that the ever improving standard of play would suggest. In the area of Refereeing there have been some very positive moves with the grading of referees early in the season and the invitation to selected people to sit the examinations to justify their grading. A number of the graded personnel were present at Whakatane and were utilised in an appointment system from the quarter-finals. The inevitable complaints surfaced yet again when the players did these duties during the early rounds of the Individual and again in the Teams Event and I would recommend that all Districts should put team members through a Rules Course as part of the training build up for future events. The coaching organisation has been most capably absorbed at the top by Mr Colin Brownlee and his continued enthusiasm ensures that matters of coaching, training and development are never allowed to submerge from sight for any length of time. Mr Brownlee has been reappointed for the second year of his original contract and I am sure that in the new season he will be actively pushing all coaches to develop themselves and our players to new heights.

All members of the Management Committee have responded well to the demands that have been placed upon them. The last four meetings of the Committee have extended from Saturday to include Sunday, a mark of the amount of work that now crosses the table for the Committee's attention. Sub-committees have been conscientious in preparing planning and submissions between meetings and these meetings have, again, been an additional demand on time. The contribution made by the Executive Officer, Mr Bill Murphy, continues to expand. His enthusiasm for the task has not wilted one iota, and the Association is most appreciative of the time given willingly to this post. Mr Murray Day continues to lead the International Squash Rackets Federation in his capacity as Chairman, and Mr Don Green has again attended the meeting of this body as the N.Z.S.R.A. Delegate. Both these gentlemen have put many hours of personal time into this field and have both acted as tremendous ambassadors for this Association.

It is with regret that the Association notes the deaths of Brigadier Park, the long-time Patron of the Auckland Association; Mr Bill Renton of Timaru, who won the Men's Championship in 1938 and 1939 and who was present at the

Championships in Timaru some forty years later; Mr David Lezard, the Secretary of the Wellington District Squash Rackets Association; and Mr Derek Gook, one of the three co-ordinators of the National Refereeing Scheme. To these and along with others of the squash playing fraternity that have died during this past season — may they rest in peace.


In retrospect, 1980 has seen several vital fundamental changes to the sport in this country and these have been well accepted by the majority of interested people.

1981 will see heavy demands on finance in competition overseas as we have the Men's Teams event in Sweden and the Women's Teams event in Canada and these events will be a heavy drain on the coaching, selecting and administrative branches of the Association.

1982 promises another Junior World event and 1983 has the show piece, the I.S.R.F. Teams event in New Zealand, and planning has already commenced but will quicken during the next two years.

The Association has in the member Districts, enough capable and willing administrators to ensure the continuing development along the sound lines developed by past committees. It is now basically up to Districts to develop and promote these people forward to sustain development.

COACHING, TRAINING and DEVELOPMENT

Director: - Mr Colin Brownlee

A far greater understanding of the Coaching and Training and Development Programme was probably the major advancement this year. This has happened from more activity at all levels of coaching and possibly most important, was the development at District level, mainly at District Management meetings, where members of the coaching scheme explained their case very well and gained support from administrators for the recognition of coaching. The majority of Districts now realise that to enable advancement to be achieved the first requirement is enlarged and more efficient administration, and the Districts that have done this are gaining the benefits and it is already starting to show that the best organised Districts are the ones that are producing the results.

The development of area administration with Districts is continuing and the importance of this cannot be over-emphasised as it is certainly proving that by spreading the workload it is far easier to establish an efficient administration which in turn is giving more players the opportunity of receiving coaching. The escalating costs have been held reasonably well through the introduction of area administration and coaching and I predict that it won't be long before the majority of coaching, training and development work will be done on an area basis with the District Coaching Management becoming mainly a policy-making and controlling body.

At National level I have been quite definite that only players that have done the preparation and work to an acceptable level will be included in national squads. The time has gone when potential is sufficient reason for selection in a national training squad as potential without dedication will not produce international players. It is now quite clear and understood by all squad members that if they do not improve or do the work set by our national squad coaches they will automatically be replaced. Consequently, the squad training sessions are starting to achieve the correct aims and so justify the expenditure allocated by the New Zealand Association.

This year saw the introduction of regional coaching and this was established quite well even though the timing was not good, but initially it has achieved its purpose by formulating a sound policy for future years. It will be with regional coaching that promising players are

taught the requirements of national squash for playing, coaching and training, and it should be from these players that any future national squad members are selected.

A real bonus for me has been the discovery of a number of very keen coaches who have shown that when given the opportunities, have the ability and keeness to become excellent coaches.

Of any specific department, physical training has probably advanced the most. Eventually all Districts have appointed Training Directors and most of the established areas have also and they are all looking for information and guidance from the National Director. Far more players are realising the necessity of planned training schedules and it is gratifying to see more players warming up and using stretching exercises prior to playing matches.

All national programmes will from now on be planned through the period November to April and with this the system has achieved quite a remarkable breakthrough. It has been recognised for some time that off-season coaching and training has been necessary but this coming year will be the first time it has been achieved, mainly because we have stronger administration at National and District level, but probably more important, coaching administrators to make it work.

My thanks to the Districts that are fully supporting their coaching committees in their work and the ever increasing number of coaches and administrators that are working so well in or at all levels of the scheme.

For me it has been an exciting year, not all easy, but the problems we have had have been good ones as they have all been associated with growth and development.

My policy has always been that it is the New Zealand Association's responsibility to provide the opportunities for players and coaches, not necessarily the finance also, as a limitless coaching budget will not necessarily produce top players. Determination, desire, dedication and plain old-fashioned guts are the main ingredients to becoming a champion and money can buy none of these, but players that show these qualities should be assured of full assistance from the New Zealand Association.

PHYSICAL TRAINING



Director: Mr Rob Crothall

This year, even with the introduction of the Junior Development Squads, our squad training weekends have been similar in number to previous seasons. As is normal most of these weekends were conducted at the completion of the 1979 season or pre-season 1980. Emphasis has been given to the women with the 1981 World Championships in mind. With the advent of Open Squash and some of our players (especially men) being active on overseas circuits, careful planning will be necessary to continue

to prepare our top National sides in the proper fashion. Some plans to help achieve this have already been mooted.

My commitment at District level has been limited this year, but with the interest shown the Coaching Scheme and very much improved activity towards the preparation of Club and District sides, I see my role increasing over the next year or two.

It was pleasing to witness progress that has taken place in regard to warm ups etc. at the National Championships held at Whakatane. However, it is also interesting to note that many players still do not prepare themselves properly nor is their training done on a regular and progressive basis. Even top players noticeably fade quickly after one tough match, so how can they possibly expect to go on through hard quarterfinals, a tough semi-final and then a final to become New Zealand champions. To get there this process may have to be repeated a number of times over many years and only the highly motivated stay on. So the message is that our game skills need hours and hours of work yet and the supporting fitness programme must be long and steady using the correct fitness components in prepared programmes.

Many Districts and Clubs now have appointed training people and the smallest commitment at all levels will in the long term help our National squash. For the players there is no excuse for not seeking good advice, doing the necessary work and achieving personal goals.

REFEREEING

National Director: Mr N.J. Gifford

This year has been the turning point in refereeing in New Zealand. The year saw the advancement of a scheme, that whilst still in its infancy, will I am sure be the blueprint of what we have been searching for for most of the last decade. The scheme as such has been acceptable to both adminstrators and players and now we must tabulate and produce, as I suggested last year, a system that can be understood by everyone involved.

The meetings held during the year have been most beneficial to all those who have attended. From our District Co-ordinator's meeting held in April came a feast of changes.

Grading of National Referees perhaps saw a few people upset by the inclusion of players into the ranks. We have explained to most people the reasoning behind doing such a thing and in all cases this has been accepted. Any of the players whose names appeared on the list of National Referees circularised to Districts in May and who have not in fact sat and passed their theory examination will have had their names deleted from this list produced at the end of the year.

At all times we must keep in mind the necessity to have vast numbers of qualified referees by the 1983 I.S.R.F. Championships. I personally don't think it will be too great a problem when you look at the large numbers we have as the base of our pyramid. With some form of incentive scheme to be introduced in the very near future I feel confident that refereeing in New Zealand is on the way upwards.

We are very much aware that to play tournament or competitive squash requires a ratio of referees to players of one-to-one, the only sport with such a high ratio, so until refereeing becomes as important to everyone as the actual court, we will have refereeing problems.

The introduction this year of tournament referees was something new. We did in fact have our teething problems in this area, and would hope that we can learn from our mistakes and next year be just that much wiser.

I would like to thank all those people who throughout the year worked hard at establishing something that I feel is most worthwhile, and to those people who have taken time to either write a few lines, or by personal contact, put forward their views, on behalf of the Referees, I thank you.

It was a sad moment indeed, very recently, to hear of the untimely demise of one of New Zealand's squash refereeing characters. Derek Cook had done what I considered to be a great job in promoting to the players of our country the scheme that we have adopted. He was, I think, the ideal person for such a task, and the gap left by him will indeed be hard to fill.

SELECTORIAL

J.R. Taylor (Convenor), M. Isaacs and Mrs P. Lee

The selection panel of 1980 was completely changed to that of 1979, only one, the convenor, having served as a selector on a previous occasion. It was also notable that Mrs Pat Lee was elected as the first woman to serve on the senior panel.

One change of note regarding the attendance at selection tournaments was instigated. The selectors announced the major tournaments they would attend and suggested to all players desiring consideration that they attend as many of these as possible. Those failing to attend a significant number of tournaments and not having sufficient performances ran the risk of not being considered. One stipulation was that players must play in the New Zealand Championships and Inter-District Teams event.

The announcement by the I.S.R.F. that the game would go open internationally from 1st September, 1980 and the subsequent A.G.M. decision of New Zealand to adopt that date seen ed to be a logical choice at the time. However, the decision that the best players available (including professionals) were to be selected to represent New Zealand at the Australian Championships in September raised many hidden problems. One of these was that any professional available for Australia would not be able to play in the New Zealand Championships to prove (or disprove) his claims to a team spot.

Fortunately, the decision in May to advance the date to go open to June 1st allowed all affected players to be eligible for selection.

It was disappointing that some of the younger players New Zealand assisted to Europe did not return to play in the New Zealand season but it was pleasing to see the improvements made by Paul Viggers and also the four members of the Junior Men's Team that played in the Junior I.S.R.F. in Sweden. The subsequent performances by Stuart Davenport in winning the British Junior and his results in both Junior and Senior events on his return to New Zealand point to a promising future.

The women's squash was evenly contested and no one woman emerged above the others over the duration of the season. Annette Owen was victorious in the New Zealand Championships, Jenny Webster in the North and South Island Championships and Pam Guy in the Bay of Plenty Championships. Joanne Milne finally emerged with notable victories at the New Zealand Championships and Susan Devoy, our leading Junior Girl, showed she could also successfully compete at top level in the senior ranks.

It was disappointing to the selectors that the stipulation by New Zealand Management earlier in the year that the best players available be selected for the Teams competing in the Australian Championships could not be changed. This stipulation made it difficult to "blood" players in Australia on the fringe of selection, so with international events coming up in 1981 in Sweden for the men and Canada for the women, the "building for the future" policy was somewhat limited.

A number of "seeding lists" were issued by the selectors over the season. These lists reflected current form at the time and were designed to assist tournament controllers in seeding tournaments not under the control of the N.Z.S.R.A. These seeding lists should not be confused with the ranking list which takes into account performances over the whole year.

Now that the game is open, selectors will be faced in future years, with selecting teams from players who may spend much of their time playing and living outside New Zealand. To ensure that we do not discriminate against or for the "locals" a clear policy will need to be laid down by N.Z.S.R.A. so that squash in New Zealand does not suffer.

STATISTICIANS

NATIONAL WOMEN'S STATISTICIAN -Mrs P. Lee

The 1980 season has raised various points with regard to Statisticians' duties.

The National Teams events, now becoming one of the year's most sought after titles for Clubs, is causing some concern to District Statisticians due to the close proximity of the July grading list and the closing date for entries to this event. In some cases Clubs are most loathe to lose their top players to a higher grade at this time and "weaken" the side. Next year's grading list dates will come up for discussion at the A.G.M. and it is generally felt that the timing of the lists should be changed. Entries for New Zealand Championships closing in July have also caused concern due to the fact that the present July list is not printed and distributed in time to enable improving players to be put into a higher grade for this event.

The finals of the National Team events this year were not as evenly contested as in past years. Results from these events were not received in time for sending to District Statisticians prior to the October grading list. This we hope will be rectified for next year's event with a change of dates in grading lists.

The question of the number of A grade women on our District lists has been raised this year, the suggestion being that we should in fact have more players in this category. This point will be discussed at the Annual Meeting of Statisticians. There appears to be the need for more movement of players on our lists between grades up and down. In some cases players are holding positions on lists without actually having results to prove same.

The role of a District Statistician is becoming more demanding each year due to increasing numbers of players, and thanks must go to each District Statistician for the time and effort they put in on behalf of the players. Their job is often a thankless one.

NATIONAL MEN'S STATISTICIAN — Mr Gower Dallimore

This year statisticians are celebrating fifteen year's of service to New Zealand squash. It began when Alan Ward and Alison Childs set up the national grading system in 1965 linking and supporting players through Clubs and Districts to a national chain which is now part of the fabric of our squash society.

It is thrilling that our system enjoys a high international reputation and is the envy of players and administrators in advanced and developing squash countries alike. It is also gratifying to hear them say how the system inspires them, a tribute to the efforts of all Club and District Statisticians over the years. All has been done in the face of rising numbers of players who more than once have threatened to engulf the system.

To mark this accomplishment and set the sights for the future, it is hoped that the outcome of the Annual Meeting in November is that players profit from improved legislation and forward thinking proposals. All need to appreciate that any ideas brought forward are in the interest of competitive squash and to strengthen their support of the system.

Whilst the path to maturity has not been smooth, the future prospect is distinctly rocky. Amongst other challenges, we face continual rising numbers of players at competitive level, increasing numbers of Clubs, and above all the time required to collate the hundreds of Inter-Club and Tournament results received from Clubs and Districts. More than ever before, New Zealand squash players will need a flourishing and forceful organisation to help them to advance their competitive ambitions and promote their preferred way of life.

Brief district summaries for the season are listed below:

NORTHLAND — A welcome newcomer to the Inter-District scene and although finishing a predictable last in both the senior and junior events, showed great spirit and competitiveness. The North can only improve with the intense competition these events provide. Full credit to the Kaitaia E grade and the Whangarei D and E grade teams for finishing in the top half of the graded teams events.

AUCKLAND — Having won the Senior Inter-District Teams event for the last five years, Auckland were in no mood to rest on their laurels and again proved invincible in this competition. The Junior Team were also unbeaten in their series but somehow finished in third position — must be a peculiar points system. Mixed results in the graded teams: runners-up in both B and E grade, fifth and sixth positions in C and D grades respectfully, and a highly undergraded Henderson team collecting the F grade competition. A first in Auckland this year was the District U23 Championships.

WAIKATO — Still a major force in New Zealand squash; equal first in the Junior and runners-up in the Senior teams. Hamilton won the C grade with the help of two B graders, collected the E grade title, third in B grade, fifth in D grade and sixth in F grade. The Hamilton Club, although relinquishing their vice-like grip on the Cousins Shield to Mitchell Park, still remain the strongest Club in the country.

BAY OF PLENTY – Strong in administration but at present fairly weak at competitive level and finished in the bottom half in all team competitions. Have not fielded a B grade team for the past two seasons. Their prospects should be rosy as Bay of Plenty has several youthful players holding high gradings.

CENTRAL — A season best forgotten. The Inter-District Senior Team played to its seeding and finished in fifth position and the Juniors were seventh out of nine teams. But in the graded events, B, C, D, E and F grades Central were last, and in some cases badly st! A downward reshuffle has been necessary to strengthen the middle grades. One further cause for concern is that there are only three juniors and two colts being C2 grade or higher.

HAWKES BAY- GISBORNE - Collected the Junior Teams title and this District still remains one of the most promising with their abundance of younger players rising to higher ranks.

The Senior Team severely handicapped by the absence of Davenport, and after last year's heroic effort in reaching the final, finished in ninth position. No B grade team this year but the other graded teams performed well in the national finals, third in C, fourth in D, and second in F grade.

WELLINGTON — The season's main achievements belong to (1), Mitchell Park for winning the Cousins Shield for the first time since 1971, and (2), Tawa, triumphing in the B grade competition. Wellington Clubs were also runner-up in C grade and third in D grade and in the Inter-District Teams finished fourth in both the Senior and Junior events. Strangely, this District has yet to provide either a Men's or Ladies' Senior National Champion!

CANTERBURY — Underestimating their ability at District level and have several younger players requiring promotion. The Senior Team finished a creditable third and the Juniors fifth in the Inter-District Team events. Christchurch Football won the D grade and other national finalist placings were fifth in B grade, sixth in C grade and well down in E and F grades.

SOUTHERN — Has the largest numbers of Clubs and players in the country but the vast geographical size of the District causes problems at competitive level and makes a statistician's task difficult. Fared poorly in the Inter-District Teams events (sixth in Senior and eighth in Junior) but as usual were dominant in the graded finals, B grade — runners-up, C grade — fourth, and D grade — second. Southern has yet to claim the titles of either the Senior and Junior Inter-District events and the B, D and E grade competition.

PLAYERS REPRESENTATIVE

Paul Devoy

Another interesting season of squash has passed us by. Like most seasons, the year has had both its high and low points.

First of all it started with a very successful tour of Britain and Europe by the Junior Boy's Team. The performance of the team and in particular, Stuart Davenport, demonstrated that our standard is the equal of other squash playing countries. Perhaps the players who have given the greatest enjoyment this year are the development of the Junior Girls. Last year, when the tour to Australia was proposed, it was felt that our girls would struggle against the Austral-

ians. However, our juniors have progressed to such a stage where they managed to come second in the Interstate competition on their recent tour. The Senior Men's team also performed excellently. While they did not play so well in the individual competition, their effort in winning the Teams event shows that our standard is reasonably level with Australia. The Senior Women's Team finished fifth in the Teams events but this was a good effort when you look at the strength of a number of the Australian State sides.

The "open" game came into being on 1st June, 1980, not without controversy. I opposed the change of date from 1st September, feeling that the decision had been made and should stand. However, the ruling that Neven Barbour was a professional and the possible witch-hunt to follow forced the decision to 1st June. As it turned out the North Island and New Zealand Championships were very successful tournaments and perhaps enhanced by the presence of Norman and Donnelly who would have been excluded otherwise.

It appears that next season we will be playing with a new ball. This decision was made with very little reference to the players and it is hoped that the Slazenger ball does play with the same characteristics as the Dunlop ball, otherwise the whole point of the exercise will be lost. Providing the remit is passed it also seems next year's New Zealand Championships and Inter-District Teams events will be open to New Zealand citizens only or those people who have resided in New Zealand for the previous twelve months. This seems sensible in view of the fact that management is trying to promote a New Zealand Open as well and it is important that there is a distinction between the two events.

The end of this season will be remembered for the controversy over the New Zealand Open. After a substantial sponsorship was arranged with Sun Alliance and a good overseas entry was assured, the whole tournament collapsed when New Zealand Management announced its decision not to accept the entry of the South African, Roland Watson. At the time of writing this article, a compromise of sorts had been reached, but the entry for the event is not as star-studded as previously. It appears that the New Zealand Government is holding an economic pistol to the heads of New Zealand Sports Bodies and forcing the sporting association to make the decisions which the Government is too scared to make itself. The effect management's decision will have on the future of the New Zealand Open will be watched with interest.

A particular matter which perturbed me this year was the attitude of some members of management at both Senior and Junior levels to our Junior players who are still attending school or university. It must be remembered that the Juniors have other obligations besides squash, and that if a player elects to pursue his academic career or for that matter, other interests, then that decision should be respected.

Thanks again to the management for the opportunity to represent the players and no doubt we are all looking forward to successful tours next year to the Men's World Championships in Sweden and the Women's in Canada.

INTERNATIONAL SQUASH RACKETS FEDERATION

1980 has been a momentous year. Following the decision reached at the General Meeting in Brisbane last year, squash as far as the I.S.R.F. is concerned, went open from September 1st and a new era where all participants are players has begun. No one believes problems will not arise, but the I.S.R.F. is convinced that the game will be better for the move. Changes in administration were anticipated and the 1979 meeting set up an "Open Squash Committee" with Murray Day as Chairman, and this met with representatives from the Women's Inter-Squash Rackets Federation (W.I.S.R.F.) and the International Squash Players Association (I.S.P.A.) in March this

At the September General Meeting of the I.S.R.F. held in London, recommendations from the Open Squash Committee were put forward by the officers. As a result of this the Constitution of the I.S.R.F. has now been altered to allow the number of officers to be increased by two and these two positions are for "the Chairman of the W.I.S.R.F. or her nominee" and "the Chairman of I.S.P.A. or his nominee". This means that all sections of squash are now in the one organisation which must benefit the overall development of the game. Representatives of both W.I.S.R.F. and I.S.P.A. were present at the General Meeting in London and spoke encouragingly in favour of working together.

The 1980 meeting was the largest meeting held by the I.S.R.F., bringing together representatives from seventeen countries, W.I.S.R.F., I.S.P.A., and eleven observers. Murray Day was re-elected Chairman, (a signal honour and indication of approval for his efforts in making the organisation a World Body), and Ian Stewart (Canada), was elected Vice-Chairman. Michael Sumpter is Executive-Director and John Austin is Treasurer. It is hoped to raise finance from sponsorship to enable the appointment of a part-time or full time Executive-Director reasonably soon and it is probable that he would reside in London. The change in name from Executive Secretary to Executive Director was made appreciating that the duties would change with the new administrative format. There are now thirty-five member countries of the I.S.R.F. comprising nine Founder Members, seven Full Members, fifteen Associate Members and four Provisional Members.

DECISIONS FROM THE GENERAL MEETING OF IMPORTANCE WERE -

- Matching pastel clothes will be permitted in I.S.R.F. Tournaments.
- 2. No further changes in playing rules for at least three years.
- 3. Specifications for rackets to be brought down early next year, the S.R.A. (Eng.) to work with the British Standards Institute on this.

- General Meetings of the I.S.R.F. to be held annually in future.
- The 1981 International in Sweden will have an Individual as well as a Teams event.
- The 1982 Junior International will be held in Singapore and Malaysia.
- Another Handbook is to be produced in 1982.

It was a good meeting with most member nations taking an active part in proceedings. The New Zealand Officers, especially John Taylor, who has been replaced by Ian Stewart, were the subject of favourable comment for the job they have done for the I.S.R.F. The obvious willingness to accept change and plan harmoniously for the future indicates a healthy organisation, well prepared to lead international squash through the eighties.

WOMEN'S SQUASH

1980 has seen the emergence of a new National Champion in Annette Owen, and indeed, of a new runner-up in Robyn Blackwood. It is the first time since 1967 that neither Pam Guy nor Jenny Webster have figured, in one capacity or another, in a New Zealand Championship final. They both are, however, still very much forces to be reckoned with. Pam took Annette to five games in the semi-finals, defeated her in the Teams event, and then again in the Collegians Invitation Tournament. Jenny had an excellent record in the Australian Championships, reaching the third round, where she went down to Sue King in five, and in the Teams event, losing only one match, and with her best performance being her defeat of Marion Jackman.

Joanne Milne has made great strides this season, and with her defeat of Jenny and Pam in the Nationals she certainly earned her place in the team to Australia. Young Susan Devoy is another who has improved greatly, and her winning of this year's Most Improved Player award was justly deserved. Earlier in the year, she won the Under 19 Queensland title, defeating Donna Gurran. She reached the semi-finals of the Australian Junior, and lost only one match in the Junior Teams event.

Overall, performances by the Senior and Junior teams to Australia, ably managed by Susie Simcock, were an improvement on last year's, and are an encouraging sign that New Zealand women may be climbing back into world contention. The squad from which the team to the World Open in Canada, in a year's time, will be selected are training hard under the direction of Norman Coe and Rob Crothall. In that year there should be seen even bigger improvement if the squad continues to show the dedication to training required of players competing on the world scene.

The visit to New Zealand for competitive matches by three members of the British Women's Team that toured Australia has been a bonus, and New Zealand Management are to be thanked for their efforts in making this possible.

Our relations with the W.I.S.R.F. are somewhat nebulous at present. In our dual-sex association, women have become used, or inured, to their squash activities, on the National scene in particular, being organised and run to a large degree by men, and although they may moan about any seeming injustices, are, in the main, too apathetic to get out and do something for themselves. It is to be hoped that the coming season will see a closer involvement with the Women's Federation.

PUBLICITY

After a period of eight years on the Management Committee and with an awareness that the sport needs to promote greater media exposure, the opportunity to be the official Publicity Officer represented a challenge. The season has reinforced my opinion that for publicity, administrators must be prepared to pursue every opportunity. This will necessitate their contacting as many sports journalists, radio officers, etc. as possible and endeavouring to achieve a liaison with them. It may also require the provisions of articles and appearances on radio. In many instances newspapers and radio stations are unable to supply their own personnel but are generally quite happy to accept contributions. An enthusiast can often persuade the media that greater coverage of a tournament is warranted although some journalists consider that squash is a sport to be played and not watched or followed.

Success at an international level contributes significantly to public interest. As a generalisation, more New Zealand teams compete overseas than at home and greater attempts must be made to arrange internal tours including tests.

Attempts were made this season to provide previews of all major tournaments and these were distributed to the media. Background information was also provided regarding players. Endeavours were also made to predict the likely outcome of matches during the national championships at Whakatane so that journalists who were not familiar with the players' reputations

were able to assess whether a surprise result had occurred and was therefore worthy of comment.

I believe that with the exception of television, where sponsorship and advertising etc. are necessary adjuncts, that those involved in the sport are capable of achieving a higher level of newspaper and radio coverage and that a campaign from an outside firm with little feeling for the sport is unlikely to be beneficial.

There is a shortage of information supplied by one District to another, although the New Zealand and World Squash Magazine does contribute in this field.

It is presumed that each District has its own Publicity Officer and I recommend to the Management Committee that consideration should be given to those holding this position to forward to the National Publicity Officer all information by way of newspaper clippings, tournament results, etc. that they consider would be of interest outside their own area. This would then enable the publication and distribution of a national newsletter incorporating topics of interest about national, District, Club, playing and administration. It would also assist in providing background information for the press releases and tournament programmes.

TOURS

Sub-Committee: M.S. Greig (Convenor), R.B. Clarke, J. Anderson, W.R. Murphy and Mrs L. Smith

Tours tend to be taking an increasing share of our expanding National Budget. This is due not only to increased costs but also to an increased level of competition.

The basic tours policy is:

- Participation in the International Men's and Women's Teams events which are normally held every two years.
- Participation in Boy's and Girl's Junior International Teams events as far as finance will permit.

- Tours overseas for Seniors and Juniors with intention of developing players and managers in order that our teams will do well in the International Teams events, and some of our players will do well in major International Tournaments.
- Internal tours by New Zealand teams in order to give players and managers touring experience and to give Clubs an opportunity of seeing a higher level of squash.
- Internal tours by overseas players with the intention of providing different and increased competition for a broader band of our top players. Also to give more Clubs and Districts an opportunity to see leading overseas players.

6. In addition, partial assistance is given to some individuals to enable them to tour overseas in order to develop their game. This latter item is the most controversial one and there is controversy whether the money has been well spent and whether it should be an N.Z.S.R.A. function.

1980 TOURS HAVE BEEN -

Junior Boys to International Teams Event

This has been reported on elsewhere and it is sufficient to say that it was very successful. The next Teams events will be in Singapore and should cater for both sexes. Cost should be less relatively and we are likely to be sending two teams.

Australian Championships

Senior Men's and Women's and a Junior Women's Team were sent to the Australian Championships at Southport in Queensland.

J23 Internal Tour

This involved visits to Clubs in the central North Island area plus participation in three tournaments. It is becoming a regular feature of our programme and Clubs are requesting such visits.

The tour has been kept to the May holidays to suit students who make up a good proportion of U23 players.

At this stage there would appear to be scope for a South Island tour and also for an internal tour by Juniors. This would provide both managers and players with touring experience which would stand them in good stead for International events.

OTHER TOURS

Pakistan

P.I.A. hold the "Hashim Khan Trophy" event approximately every two years. This is a Men's event, and our team will be participating in this during November, 1980.

Australian Men

Theoretically the N.Z.S.R.A. has an agreement for reciprocal tours, but we are owed a tour by the Australian Association. Unfortunately, they have had difficulty organising this tour. The concept of reciprocal tours with Australia is one which we hope to extend to the reciprocal basis to both men and women in the Senior, Under 23 and Junior categories.

OPEN SQUASH

Although the 1979 Annual General Meeting in Taupo in November adopted the principal of Open Squash commencing from 1st September, 1980, and this seemed a logical decision at the time, subsequent events justified the decisions of the National Management Committee to bring the date forward to June 1st and make the 1980 major Championships open to all players, both men and women.

The distinction between amateur and professional women squash players was abolished in June, 1979 in this country following a decision earlier that year by the Women's International Organisation. In the intervening period little evident change in the playing or administration of women's squash eventuated. Even though the arrival of the 1980s should pre-suppose there should be no distinction between men and women, the effect of the introduction of open squash should be more easily gauged by reference to the men.

The fact that a club or association may now advertise the money at stake, might encourage sponsors to increase their contributions but it could also arouse the interest of the tax officials.

Administrators throughout the world will all face considerable problems in determining the composition of national teams, and will the "stars" be prepared to adopt the honour of playing for their country as sufficient reward or will they demand substantial payments? The experience of tennis raises doubts, for despite their vast incomes, superstars such as Jimmy Connors and others have shown a reluctance to engage in the Davis Cup competition for all its great prestige. As most of the professionals enter into contracts with agents or managers, the decisions may be made by the latter and they will be more interested in commitments that earn money rather than glory.

Until squash can rely upon greater spectator revenue from the advent of courts that will permit increased audiences, it is doubtful there will be enough available finance to provide administrators with adequate funds to entice all players to be available for national honours. Although rowing is an amateur sport without any real prospect of attracting adequate funds from spectators, the success of oarsmen at Olympics and other national regattas has ensured that fund raising activities including raffles have achieved sufficient success to enable New Zealand to reach International force.

Can squash hope to achieve similar results? The support that the recent Squashfund '80 appears to have produced suggests that affiliated squash players wish their sport in this country to continue to progress.

It should, of course, also be asked whether the affected players will view the situation in the same light.

Undoubtedly, the emerging competitors will see International contests as an opportunity to advance. Other complications could arise from attitudes like those displayed by members of an Australian group competing for Pakistan's Hashim Khan Trophy when they made sure that their fourth player did not play in any matches so that prize money would not have to be shared with him.

In the period since women abolished any distinction, there has not been any evidence of similar conflicts. The women's situation may be simpler as relatively few are able to become full time professionals although this will no doubt change.


Another problem to be faced will be the method of assessing performances of candidates for selection when some are still overseas and others are at home. The established celebrities, such as Bruce Brownlee and Ross Norman, would command automatic places, but preference for more obscure choices is likely to be given to those whose form in their own country could be more easily gauged.

New Zealand sportsmen who have generally been conditioned to a basic amateur approach where the incentive to serve "Queen and Country" (to quote tennis' Onny Parun) has been dominant may maintain a similar pure approach in the immediate future. Such an attitude is unlikely to exist beyond the mid-1980s particularly if our players continue to enhance their world ranking to such an extent that like international airline pilots, they will assess their earning capacity as relative to world-wide standards. The fact that amateur sports such as rugby generally have been able to maintain an amateur criteria should not presuppose that such a simplistic view will still be accepted in 1990 by squash players.

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DISTRICT FOCUS

HAWKES BAY-GISBORNE

Squash first began in the H.B.—Gisborne District region when a group of enthusiasts led by John Tonkin, Mike Rout and Ken Elliott, had on 24th June, 1955, the articles of Incorporation signed and sealed to form a club.

The Club was the Hawkes Bay Squash Club and its premises were a two court complex built in the old Napier City reservoir in Cameron Road. Although these amenities weren't as plush as today's modern complexes, the lounge commonly known as the "grotto" became well known by many squash players throughout New Zealand.

Until 1964, this was the only Club in the District, and in this period they really had squash to the fore by hosting the North Island Champs in 1956, Cousins Sheild in 1957, New Zealand Championships in 1959, and had Don Mochan as 1956 New Zealand Champion. In those days balls were two for 2/6, and if one could see the conditions that events such as the above were played under, then today's players in their modern complexes and surrounds have nothing at all to complain about.

In 1959 the one and only Squash Test to ever be held in the District was hosted by the H.B. Club. That day New Zealand played Great Britain and lost the rubber, four nil.

In 1964 a breakaway group of members formed a Club at Havelock North and met with immediate success. From then until 1970, Clubs at Gisborne, Hastings and H.B. Lawn Tennis were constituted. These five Clubs belonged to the Central District Association in the five years from 1965 to 1970.

With five Clubs, the necessary number to form a District, the scene was set for squash to take another step forward in this area.

The H.B.—Gisborne District Squash Association was thus formed at a meeting held at Havelock North Club on Saturday, 31st October, 1970 at 9.00 a.m. This meeting was chaired by Mr Jim Newbigin, and the following officers were elected:

This was the 7th District to be formed in the New Zealand Squash Association.

Since 1970 another four Clubs have been formed, these being Waipukurau, Gisborne High School Old Boys, Otamauri District, and Wairoa Athletic. Wairoa is our youngest Club (1975), while the Otamauri District and Squash Club, situated up the Napier-Taihape Road, is one of those unique clubs that spring up from time to time. Their court is in a superphosphate bin, and its fertilizer in the summer and squash in the winter. So instead of squash players, for half of the year they have front end loaders contesting the obstruction rule.

"What other Districts can boast a water reservoir and a super bin for courts!"

In 1978, Havelock North got with it and constructed the first glass back court in the District. This is still the only one.

Our District is very proud of the Hastings Tennis and Squash Club, who in 1980 won the New Zealand Council of Recreation and Sport and Black and Decker "Club of the Year" award. This was from a total New Zealand-wide entry of 900 Clubs.

Players:

Since Don Mochan represented New Zealand in 1956, we have had three other players gain New Zealand honours. They are Jane Weir (nee Wood), Jenny Rickets (nee Greive), and our latest, Paul Viggers.

Junior New Zealand reps. are Paul Viggers, Stuart Davenport, Wayne Rowlands, and Linda Sanko. Our District provided three of 'he four players for the 1979 New Zealand Juni r Team and two of the four that went to the 1980 Junior World Championships.

Paul Viggers, Stuart Davenport and Robert Durey have represented the District in New Zealand U23 teams.

District Teams:

In 1970 the District Senior team played the first of what was to become an annual fixture with Central Districts for the Newbigin Shield. Since then two annual triangular events have been established, against C.D. and Wellington, and the other with B.O.P. and Waikato.

Three years ago, grade Inter-District events from B through to F were started against B.O.P. District.

The Senior team has fronted up each year at the New Zealand Inter-District teams event and a third placing in 1977 by the Men's team is the best result to date.

District Junior teams, especially our boys, over the last three years have always fared reasonably well. The boys have won the National title for the last three years, a feat all in this District are justly proud of.

Tournaments:

Each year the District holds both an Open and Closed District Championship, with the latter being the main selection tournament for the District team to the Nationals.

Annual competitions that are open to all Clubs are held each year in C, D, E grades (F still to come), and form a good fore-runner to the District teams eliminations.

All five major Clubs run at least three tournaments, both open and graded during the season. Others run one or two graded tournaments.

Over the years on the National scene we have held the New Zealand Championships in 1959 and 1973, North Island - 1956, New Zealand Junior Age Group 1975 and 1979, and New Zealand Junior Open, 1976.

At the top, Geoff Hunt and Ken Hiscoe played exhibition matches and conducted coaching sessions in July, 1974.

Interclub:

This is played on a weekly basis involving the six Clubs in the Napier-Hastings-Waipukurau area. Sixty-seven teams take part from April to October, and play is in all grades. Even the "super bin masters" from Otamauri have an F grade team and it is the highlight of the season for teams that have to travel to Otamauri, They run an opening tournament which consists of playing squash, golf and mustering (sheep).

Gisborne Club conduct an Inter-Club on a mercantile sponsorship basis.

District Personnel:

Some of the past and present persons associated with the District have given squash a great deal. Some of these are:

Jim Newbigin — was on the first committee at the H.B. Squash Club in 1955 and was reputed to have led the breakaway group to start the Havelock North Club. He chaired the first meeting of the District in 1970 and has been and still is a sponsor of many tournaments both in this District and others. Still takes a keen interest and a very active veteran player.

Dennis Smart — served as District President for five years and was on New Zealand Management Committee from 1968 to 1976. Put in a great deal of work initially setting up the Association. Is currently Secretary of H.B. Rugby Football Union. Eric Ball — served in various capacities on the District including a period as Vice-President, but then his Club omitted to nominate him for President at the appropriate time and so he progressed no further up the ladder. Eric spent many hours on coaching, rules and references, and was a Senior Team Manager to the Nationals.

Marty Jones — was first Vice President and has always kept Gisborne squash to the fore in District activities. Probably best known for the running battle he has had over the years with the Statisticians. It has always been thought that Gisborne players were under-graded, and Marty fought to have the rest of the District come around to his way of thinking. He did relent somewhat, but many feel he still got his way with the Stats.

Isobel Maclean — would be the one person who has given most to squash by way of years of service in the area. Isobel was on the H.B. Club Committee from 1961-63, a delegate to Central Districts prior to 1970, attended first District meeting, has served on committee in various capacities up until the last four years as the District Delegate on New Zealand Management. She has travelled length and breadth of New Zealand for squash and also managed District Rep. teams.

Alan Watton - much of the credit for the present boom in squash in the District must be giv-

en to Alan Watton, the current District Secretary. During his three year tenancy of this position. Alan has worked endlessly in setting up a smooth running, and, efficient system. Not only has he gained the respect of all administrators and players in the District, but also in other Districts and at National level. It is with great regret that the District learns of Alan's unavailability for re-election for a further term. Lindsay Bird - current District President. Lindsay has a long history as both an administrator and a player in many sports. She was Secretary of H.B. Squash Club from 1962-64, and of H.B. Lawn Tennis Club for seven years. On the playing side, she has been a H.B. tennis rep. for a number of years and is still holding her own in this field, and is a past H.B. Badminton Rep. A very active President, she keeps her finger on the pulse of all District activities. She is an astute leader, and has the respect of players and Clubs in the area.


District Future:

With existing Clubs adding to their present complexes and combined country sporting Clubs almost at the point of reality in building squash courts, the District is very hopeful of having increased membership in 1981. With a continuance of the very good Club/District cooperation that currently exists, the future looks very bright.

BAY OF PLENTY

The first courts in the Bay of Plenty area were those constructed in Rotorua by Colin and Lorna Brownlee. They were opened in 1965 and run as a commercial centre. The Rotorua Club was formed that year and affiliated to the Waikato Association. During the following six years, courts in a further seven locations were built around the Bay and the enthusiasm for the new sport was such that two of these courts were built by Kevin Treloar and Tom McQueen on their farms at Madetu and Waikite respectively.

On 27th November, 1971, a meeting was held at Treloar's Maketu residence for the purpose of forming a Bay of Plenty Association. The outcome was that for 1972, the Bay was a Sub-District of: the Waikato Association and then became a fully fledged District Association in 1973. In that year two new Clubs, Mount Maunganui and Geyser City, were formed and the Bay started its full status existence with ten affiliated Clubs. Additional clubs have started up in the intervening years until in 1980 there

are sixteen Clubs with over 4000 affiliated members.

The District has had three Presidents, namely Bryden Clarke (1972-76), Kevin Treloar (1977-78) and Neville Munro (1979-80). Two life members — Bryden Clarke (1976) and Bill Murphy (1979), have been appointed.

District Secretaries have been Bill Murphy (1972-76), Peter Little (1977-78), Linda Horgan (1979-80).

From relatively small beginnings with participation in the Waikato competition, Inter-club has grown to the stage where over 130 teams compete in four grades for both men and women. Men and women play alternative weeks as the number of teams has increased. Zoning has taken place in the lower grades and has helped in reducing travelling long distances on cold winter nights. Bay of Plenty have had their share of success in National Inter-club Fixtures with Tauranga winning the Mitchell Cup in both 1976 and 1978, Rotorua the B Grade Women (1969), Tauranga C Grade Women (1977), Tokoroa D Grade Men (1978), Whakatane and Tauranga D Grade Women (1974 and 1975) and Mount Maunganui F Grade Women (1980).

On the individual playing scene, Bay of Plenty takes great pride in the achievements of its District Representatives. Bruce Brownlee, the most successful and accomplished player ever produced in New Zealand hails from the Bay. He won the British Amateur and New Zealand Open in 1976 and the New Zealand Amateur in 1977. He is currently ranked seventh in the World in the hard competitive field of professional squash. Other New Zealand titles have come to the Bay through the fine performances of Trevor Johnston and Pam Guy. A highlight

of the Bay's history is the Men's 1975 Inter-District team's winning of the M.C. Day Cup. The Bay Women's teams have always provided strong competition and have finished in the first four places in each Inter-District event since 1973, and, but for the strength of Auckland, would have figured prominently on the winner's list.

The promotion and encouragement of Junior Squash has been a feature of this young District. Players from this area figure prominently in the list of National Age Group titleholders and the girls have won the Inter-District Teams event for the past two years. With young players of the calibre of Karen Lever, Susan Devoy, Donna Gurran, Danny McQueen and Robert Wyatt making their presence felt more and more it is confidently expected that more National titles will come the Bay's way in the not too distant future. A first for the District was the sending of a young Women's team to the 1980 Queensland Championships. The team achieved considerable success, with Susan Devoy winning the Under 19 title and continues to confirm the tremendous potential which she undoubtedly possesses.

The strength of any District lies in the structure of its affiliated Clubs and the Bay is fortunate to have so many willing and able administrators handling Club affairs. This is well illustrated by the achievements of various Clubs in recent years in improving facilities which now provide three glass backed gallery courts in the District and by the outstanding efforts of the Whakatane Club in organisation and running the 1980 National Championships.

With such Club strength coming to the fore the District Association can confidently look forward to continue its steady development in the years ahead.



With squash in New Zealand becoming a fully open sport on June 1st, 1980, the ranking lists this year allow, for the first time, all New Zealand players to be considered.

MEN

In releasing this season's ranking lists the Selectors have considered only those players who have played in New Zealand during the year, along with their form in overseas events. Players who would probably otherwise have been ranked, but are not, are M. Lilley, H. Broun, R. Espie, and C. Caird, who had no results in New Zealand, and B. Barnett who had insufficient performances in New Zealand and overseas.

Notable performances in the Men's List are Neven Barbour retaining a high ranking in spite of continuing surgence of more youthful players; Craig Blackwood's better form this year resulting in a lift from No.7 ranking in 1979, and Stuart Davenport's significant rise to No.5. Lovett, Oakley and Rowlands, three talented youngsters, have come in for the first time fairly highly placed, while Smith and Hibbert make their first appearance. Improved rankings by

the older players, Paul Devoy and Tony Naughton reflect better performances this year than in recent seasons.

WOMEN

There has been little change in the top three rankings of the Women compared to 1979, although Mrs Webster has established herself firmly as No.1. Ros Redpath has dropped noticeably, making way for a group of younger players in Blackwood, Lever, Milne and Devoy. The first time up ranking of No.7 for Susan Devoy is possibly the highlight of the list. Donna Gurran's results in Australia have earned her a notable first up ranking also. Other newly ranked players are Sharon Taylor and Cheryl Butler. Sheryl Clarke's lack of tournament play has resulted in her slipping down this year's list, while good form by the veteran Susie Simcock has seen her achieve her best ever ranking.

VOGEL ROSE BOWL (Most Improved Male Player)

Dean Lovett from the Hamilton Squash Rackets Club showed the aspiring Juniors of New Zealand that it is possible to go from No.4 Junior to No.8 in the Senior Men's Ranking and in between represent New Zealand in Great Britain, Sweden, Singapore and Malaysia surely the ingredients that dreams are made of!

Not without a great deal of effort did Dean achieve his successes which will no doubt be followed by further representation in the

AUSTRALIAN WOMEN'S CUP (Most Improved Female Player)

Susan Devoy from the Geyser City Club in Rotorua rose from No.3 Junior to No.7 Senior similarly to Dean Lovett. From no Senior ranking to a very strong ranking is indicative of the abilities and future prospects for Susan.

It is the first time that a Junior girl as young as sixteen years old has been a threat to our top ranked women and Susan's win over New Zealand Championship runner-up and No.4 ranked woman, Robin Blackwood early in the season was evidence of Susan's potential.



The continuation of visits to Australia by New Zealand teams this year took the form of Men, Women and Junior Girls travelling to Southport to compete in the 1980 Sun Alliance Championships and Interstate Team titles held from Saturday, September 13th to Saturday, September 27th. The participation by the Senior Teams was part of the buildup for the 1981 Women's World Championships in Canada and the 1981 Men's I.S.R.F. Championships in Sweden and all players were on trial for next year's big events. The fourteen strong party, after a farewell from the Auckland Association, settled into Surfers Paradise on Thursday - two days before the individual champs started - to get accustomed to the heat and faster courts.

Unfortunately, none of the Senior players went very far in the individual titles. All four men went out in the fourth round while only Jenny Webster went beyond the second round in the Women's. The Junior Girls fared much better with both Susan Devoy and Donna Gurran reaching the semi-finals. The Teams events followed the individuals and it was here the New Zealand Teams came up against strong, constant, competitive play and this proved invaluable for the Women's and Junior Girl's Teams particularly. The efforts of the Men's Team in defeating all Australian states and returning with the Sun Alliance Trophy was outstanding. As a team they played exceptionally well, particularly against the very strong Queensland and Victorian states. Australian Women's squash is very strong at the moment and it is obvious that considerable progress is required by New Zealand's young brigade before New Zealand Women's teams can expect to compete favourably with Australia and Great Britain, who are undoubtedly the top two nations.

The Junior Team, in finishing second behind Victoria played well and providing our top junior girls are given coaching and regular top competition there is no reason why this ranking is not improved on. Victoria upstaged everybody in the Junior Girl's events with unseeded Wendy Williams winning the individual title, after having possibly her hardest game against Susan Devoy in the semi-finals. Victoria then convincingly took the Teams title. It is apparent, and of interest to New Zealanders, that the weekly coaching and consistent tough competition, aided by jazz exercise ballet, has allowed

the Victorian Juniors to get ahead of other Australian states and New Zealand.

The three outstanding New Zealand players were Ross Norman, Susan Devoy and Jenny Webster. Norman for his victories over their third (Donnelly), fifth (Gllier), and eighth (Flynn) seeds during the Teams event, for his match in the third round against Geoff Hunt and for being awarded the trophy for the best male performer during the Championships. Susan Devoy was the only player to take a set off Wendy Williams, the Australian Junior Champion, and proved herself No.2 Junior in Australasia. Jenny Webster vindicated her somewhat controversial selection by returning to her top form. Her best results were, losing in five to Australia's No.3, Sue King, and beating

their No.7, Marion Jackman.

As a leadup to next year's World Championships the tour proved worthwhile as there is no substitute for overseas competitive experience and while recognising there is a lot of work to be done yet, at least the players, and especially the women, know where they stand in world

In an effort to derive more competition, a notable development in Australian squash is the rapidly expanding movement for Mature Age Group players. Promoted in age groups of 35 and over, these events are an obvious choice for New Zealand squash to organise as they offer exciting possibilities for many older competitive players to stay in the game while not having to pace with their younger competitors.



The Management Committee are satisfied with the overall result of the Association's accounts for the year.

New Balance Date

The accounts are for a 13 month period as a result of the change of Balance Date agreed at the 1979 AGM. The change in date has, as anticipated, assisted towards containing all of the year's playing activities in the financial year.

Income and Expenditure

The surplus of \$4135 is lower than forecast but this is mainly due to the higher than estimated Tours costs involved with sending the Junior Mens team to the ISRF Champs in Sweden and the teams to the Australian Championships.

Affiliation Levy income is, pleasingly, up a little on estimate through increased membership. (The membership report covers the actual growth figures.) The affiliation levy for the year was \$3 per player.

The grant from the Council for Recreation and Sport continues to gradually increase and prove very worthwhile assistance to the Coaching, Training and Development budget.

Escalation of internal airfares reflects in the increased Management Committee expenses, otherwise administrataion costs overall are in line with estimates after allowing for a balancing of the major items of Post Office charges and Printing expenses.

Both the Coaching, Training and Development and the Overseas Tours items within the Expenditure statement show nett figures after deduction of the 1979 provisions.

Following a reappraisal of the forecast in May it was agreed a further \$2000 should be injected into the Cousins Shield-Mitchell Cup and Graded Teams Events travel subsidies, however even with this, giving a 40% increase on the 1979 subsidy, increased airfares and the introduction of an F Grade saw the \$14000 subsidy return only 33%, as against 1979's 55%, towards the finalist Clubs' travel expenses.

New Zealand Squash Centre

The Squash Centre is now reflecting the excellent investment anticipated at purchase. This year sees a repayment to the Association of \$12500 towards the original funding advance and although the next 12 months surplus will be needed for capital improvements the Association will, in a much shorter term than initially expected, have Centre funds available for use.

1981 Affiliation Levy

No increase in the levy is recommended by Management this year. Although a deficit budget is projected the opinion is that this can be adequately handled providing the AGM decision supports the allocation of \$20,000 from the lottery proceeds to offset overseas tour costs.

National Lottery

A very successful lottery was organised during the year and although at balance date the final outcome is still to be determined an estimated \$60,000 will be shared amongst Clubs, \$6,000 between Districts and \$54,000 to the NZSRA. The Management Committee will be recommending that the NZSRA portion is used over 3 years to help finance the known overseas tour costs in this period.

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

GENERAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The general principles recommended by the New Zealand Society of Accountants for the measurement and reporting of results on an historical basis have been followed.

- 2 The accounts have been prepared on an income and expenditure basis.
- INVESTMENTS

The purchase of the N.Z. Squash Centre is shown at cost, together with the liability to the Bank of New South Wales Savings Bank by way of mortgage and the grant from the Council for Recreation and Sport. This grant shows as a liability to reflect the writing off over five years at \$10,000 per year, in lieu of the administration grant.

The trading result from the Centre has not been incorporated into the general funds of the Association.

5 STOCK

Stock has been valued at the lower or market value or net realisable value. Due allowance has been made for slowing moving stocks.

(a) There have been no significant changes in accounting policies during the year, except that there has been a change of balance date to 30 September, 1980.

(b) For a thirteen month period. The comparative figures for 1979 cover the 12 months

ended 31st August 1979.

NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

- 1 PRIOR PERIOD ADJUSTMENT This is an adjustment to the bank account held at the ANZ Bank, Sydney, which converts the previous balance to New Zealand currency, and adjusts for accrued interest.
- 2 NATIONAL LOTTERY \$127.678 is held in the Lottery Reserve Fund, to be distributed in the 1980/81 financial year to Clubs, Districts and the balance to be utilised by the New Zealand Association. A small portion of this fund is held in reserve for balance of prizes and organiser's expenses.
- 3 N.Z. OPEN RESERVE FUND This relates to entry fees and advance sales of season tickets held at the Bank of NSW, Henderson, as at 30/9/80. These funds will be used to meet tournament expenses.

NEW ZEALAND SQUASH CENTRE

REPORT FOR YEAR ENDING 30th SEPTEMBER 1980

The years operations have been characterised by a high level of bookings despite a rapid escalation in costs, particularly for fuel, power and wages and a very satisfactory surplus has resulted.

The Centre is open seven days a week from 7 a.m. — 11 p.m. with a court utilisation of approximately 70% and it is estimated that a regular clientele of about 1400 use the facilities and up to 5000 people over the year.

Coaching was given to nearly 300 beginners, many of whom have now joined Wellington Clubs and are playing regularly.

Special attention was paid to schools, with over 12 in the city using the Centre mostly on a regular basis. It is seen as an important part of the Centre's function to promote the game amongst students and even greater encouragement will be offered next season. Coaching is given without charge thanks to a number of players who have given their time voluntarily.

During last summer major work on the courts was carried out which involved the burning and scraping off of years of paint accumulation on the walls, repairs to the pitted concrete, sanding court floors, and painting walls and surrounds.

Major alterations were also done to both the upstairs and downstairs change rooms and this upgrading has brought the playing facilities to a high standard.

Work planned for this summer includes further upgrading and maintenance on the courts, rebuilding the reception area, incorporating retail shop facilities, shifting of downstairs entrance, upgrading upstairs lounge and improvement to food facilities. With completion of the above work the Centre will be much easier to run and provide full first class facilities to the public.

The Association is very fortunate that the centre has a stable, friendly staff enhanced by the enthusiasm of the manager, Nick Cass and the years result reflects great credit on this small but efficient team,

NZ SQUASH CENTRE — BOARD OF CONTROL

The Board under the jurisdiction of the NZSRA Management Committee, consists of four members from the Management Committee — The President, Immediate Past President, Chairman of the Finance Committee and the Executive Officer, together with three Wellington based personnel, appointed annually following the Annual General Meeting, and including where practical the Wellington delegate to the Management Committe.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For The 13 Months Ended 30th September, 1980

1 STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The general accounting principles as recommended by the New Zealand Society of Accountants for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on an historical cost basis have been followed.

- 2 The following particular accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of profit and the financial position have been applied:
- (a) Stock: Stock is valued at the lower cost based on the 'first in first out' method, or net realisable value.
- (b) Depreciation: For account purposes depreciation is calculated at the ordinary rate approved for tax purposes on the original cost. It should be noted that for this and future years a rate of depreciation on the building to equate the term of the current lease has been used.
- (c) The current figures are for a thirteen month period, other than depreciation which has been provided only on an annual basis. The comparative figures for 1979 are for the twelve month period ended 31st August, 1979.
- (d) The figure at present capitalised for alterations comprises architects' fees, payments to an outside builder, and that portion of wages and materials which it is considered relate to an improvement in the facilities.
- (e) The Balance Sheet shows the proprietor's interest, being the original cost plus surpluses to date less mortgage reductions. The liability for the borrowing from the Bank of New South Wales and the grant from the Council for Recreation and Sport, less reductions in these amounts since the original purchase are shown in the Association's Balance Sheet. The original loan from the Bank was \$200,000 and this has been reduced as at 30 September 1980 to \$162,497.
- (f) An up-to-date government valuation of the premises has been impossible to obtain, but a reinstatement estimate of the buildings for insurance purposes as at 16 July 1980 gives a figure of \$852,350.
- (g) Sundry Creditors includes provision for the repayment to the NZSRA of \$12500.
- (h) There have been no material changes in accounting policies since the previous annual financial statements, other than with respect to depreciation on buildings mentioned above.



N.Z. JUNIOR MENS EUROPEAN TOUR 1980

The team, comprising Stuart Davenport, (Hawkes Bay-Gisborne), Dean Lovett, (Waikato), Wayne Rowlands, (Hawkes Bay-Gisborne), and John Mills, (Wellington), left Auckland on 10th March, 1980 and travelled to London via Los Angeles. The day after arriving in London, the team was able to watch the final of the British Open between Geoff Hunt and Zaman at the Wembley Conference Centre. A demountable glass-backed court had been erected on the stage and some 800–1000 people were able to watch the final which did not reach the standard one expected from such renowned players.

The following day the team travelled to Fiddlers Green Squash Ranch in North Devon and spent five days getting over jet lag, acclimatising and getting down to serious practice. The weather was bitterly cold, the worst of the tour, and the courts exceedingly slow, making practice sessions difficult assignments. Some relatively minor injury problems were encountered at this stage but these had been overcome by the time the team moved on to Northampton to take part in the Dallington Jet Junior Tournament on 21st March.

Tournament performances here were very encouraging. The Australian team for the I.S.R.F. Championships were taking part and Stuart Davenport beat their No.1 in the final and Dean Lovett beat both their No.3 and 4 in taking out the third place prize. These successes gave the team confidence for what would undoubtedly be tough encounters ahead. The first of these was a test match against the English Juniors at Wembley on 24th March. All players turned on top class efforts, giving a 2/1 win as well as a victory in the match between the reserves. Stuart Davenport only allowed the very talented English No.1, David Thomas, 3 points in a performance that would have seldom if ever before, been seen from a New Zealand junior. Dean Lovett's win showed he had made tremendous progress and although Wayne Rowlands lost, he was up against a very talented Christy Willstrop, who on the night appeared the best of the English team. By now the team was completely at home and full of confidence in their ability to handle conditions slower and colder than experienced in New Zealand.

The next day it was off to Sweden to start the major assignment of the tour-participation in the inaugural I.S.R.F. World Junior Men's Championships. The team settled in at their hotel in Kungalv and for the next three days, practice was the only consideration interspersed with a test match against Sweden on the evening of 27th March. This resulted in a 4/0 win but some difficulties were being experienced with the conditions. The building was centrally heated and a bouncy sub-standard ball was used.

The Championships got under way on Saturday, 29th March, without the Pakistanis or two of the Bahamas team who had been delayed en route. Both Rowlands and Mills lost in the second round. Rowlands again lost to Willstrop but this time in a much closer encounter lasting one hour, twenty-five minutes. Mills went out to the No.3 Australian who went on to turn the tables the next day with Lovett. So it was left to Davenport to carry the flag, and he proceeded to reach the semi-finals without great difficulty. Here he ran into Chris Dittmar, the No.2 Australian, and bowed out in four games after an hour and fifty minute battle. The rallies were long with little between the players in a match which could have gone either way. On finals day, Davenport won the play-off for third place and Mills won the second round plate.

After a rest day the Teams event got under way with New Zealand winning their three preliminary pool matches against Bahamas, West Germany and Canada 3/0. Semi-final matches against Wales and Scotland were won by similar margins and we came up against Pakistan for a place in the final. We lost 1/2 with Davenport having a very fine straight game win over Sohail Oaiser in a match that took one hour thirtythree minutes to complete. Both Lovett and Rowlands played well but were not good enough on the day and so New Zealand had a play-off with England for third place. Here Rowlands gave the team a flying start with a very sound win and Davenport clinched the tie with a four game win over Thomas who had improved considerably from their first encounter. Australia won the final 2/1 against Pakistan and turned the table from their 3/0 loss in the preliminary pool. The conditions in Sweden suited the Australians and they took full advantage of them.

Back to England and participation in the British Open Junior Championships which turned out to be the highlight of the tour. The English, Pakistan and Australian teams were all taking part — Lovett reached the quarter-final and Davenport went on to win the coveted Drysdale Cup. His semi-final matches against the top two Pakistani were hard tough matches. Both went five games and he had to be very good indeed to win.

A three day stop-over in Singapore on the way back to New Zealand included a match against Singapore Juniors. Here again was a contrast in conditions with the heat oppressive for playing squash. However, the team survived this match 3/1 and so completed a tour involving ten test matches for nine wins and one loss. Davenport was unquestionably the star, with only one loss for twenty-four matches throughout the tour. With his Drysdale win and his World Championship performances, he proved to be the No.1 Amateur Junior in the world. However, his successes should not overshadow the very fine performances by the other team members who all achieved playing standards higher than their 1979 level. The results were a team effort and the biggest factor was undoubtedly the solid and sustained preparation undertaken during the four months prior to the tour. Without that build-up and the concentrated individual training efforts, the results would, I am sure, have been entirely different.

In brief, a first class tour and a tremendous experience. With the commitment to squash, there was little opportunity to see the tourist sights, but many interesting experiences were shared, including Wayne Rowlands being escorted from the DC10 at Honolulu by Airport Security, Manager being pick-pocketed in a London tube, fire in the team's hotel in Kungaly, a first class banquet at the conclusion of the World Championships, visits to Soho and Buggy Street in Singapore, and memorable hospitality from start to finish.

Junior playing standards around the world vary considerably and although almost every country has at least one very talented player, many lack depth. The sport is realtively new in a lot of European countries but they seem to have taken to it in a big way and their standards will improve. The top juniors are all potentially world class players and I am sure that names like Christy Willstrop (England), Carol Martini (West Germany), Chris Dittmar (Australia) and Sohail Qaiser (Pakistan), who will all still be juniors at the time of the next world championships in 1982, will be heard of in the years to come, as will our own players should they be given equal opportunities.



N.Z. PLAYERS OVERSEAS

The continuing policy of assisting players making tours overseas saw Ross Norman, Robin Espie, Paul Viggers, Brian Barnett and Annette Owen receiving grants and participating in the U.K. and Europe late in 1979. Ross Norman's effort to reach the final of what is probably the last British Amateur Championship was only the second time a New Zealand resident has been a finalist in this event. Ross lost to Britain's John Leslie who Bruce Brownlee had defeated in the 1976 final.

To date in 1980, Dean Lovett, Ian Borley, Robyn Blackwood and Karen Lever have been assisted in similar quests.

The grants to Robyn and Karen as 4th and 5th ranked players for 1980 are the largest yet made to women players. They should benefit immensely from this competition as a build-up to the 1981 season.

The season's most improved male player, Dean Lovett, was sent to Singapore and Malaysia to participate in their respective Open Championships.

With the growing squash scene in that part of the world, the N.Z.S.R.A. sees a continuation of the friendly Asian connection as beneficial to New Zealand's squash future and theirs. Dean performed well in the tropical conditions encountered and reached the quarter-finals in both events. The Players' Representative, Paul Devoy, participated in the Sun Alliance Australian Championships while on a private holiday to Queensland.

The World Open for men was staged in Adelaide and the four men that represented New Zealand at the Sun Alliance Australian Championships at Southport — Ross Norman, Craig Blackwood, Neven Barbour and Paul Viggers, were assisted as an extension to that event with air fares. Ross Norman defeated Frank Donnelly then met Geoff Hunt for the second time in a row with the result as expected, a win to the World Champion.

Other players overseas either permanently or temporarily, were led by our nationally ranked No.1 Bruce Brownlee, who maintained his position in the World rankings at No.7. Bruce reached No.4 on the computer rankings at one point and concluded his most successful season to date.

Chris Caird has been coaching in Germany and Robin Espie has continued his journalistic/ squash playing career in Europe also.

SUN ALLIANCE N.Z. OPEN

The controversy arising over Roland Watson inevitably affected the standard of the entry but the final draw was never-the-less, one of the best quality seen in this country. The Henderson officials were naturally disappointed at the withdrawal of so many topline players but they staged an efficiently-run tournament.

The highlight was undoubtedly the appearance of Jahangir Khan, who at 16 looks to be the heir apparent to Geoff Hunt as World Champion. Khan's demeanour both on and off the court was exemplary and an example to all our aspiring players. His technical ability and his temperament are incredible for one of his age. He certainly over-shadowed all opponents although the first game in his semi-final with Egypt's Gamal Awad was a classic example of patience, control and perserverance during the fifty-six minutes that they were on the court.

Although Khan lost this game, the mileage Awad covered sapped his strength and Awad could not sustain the pressure in the next three games. Although this game was not spectacular, both players were forced to move rapidly all around the court and there were very few loose or inaccurate shots.

Awad contributed notably to the Open and he was a delight with his agility, speed and touch. His quarter-final with Craig Blackwood was a pleasure and both players were on the move throughout and played many attacking and daring shots with relatively few errors. Blackwood had a very good tournament and could still be a force in World squash.

Bruce Brownlee had the easier draw although he struggled against Philip Kenyon and Glen Brumby and was lucky to survive against Kenyon. He was obviously not at the peak of fitness and in the final against Khan he was never a real threat apart from a brief period when he lead 6/3 in the second game.

Of the other players, Brumby and Kenyon are continuing to develop and Brumby is now playing more shots. Ross Norman met no opposition before the quarter-final where he was unable to handle Khan while Neven Barbour had a see-saw struggle with Kevin Shawcross but failed to take advantage of his chances. Rod Hayes played well against Khan and deservedly took the Pakistani sensation to four.

The Women's event, if perhaps overshadowed by the men, still created much interest and the presence of Britain's Jayne Ashton, Alison Cummings and Australia's Hillary Tudor and Carin Clonda provided an international flavour. The three players who had toured Australia all appeared to have benefited.

Jenny Webster was a worthy winner and apart from the National at Whakatane, has experienced a very good season. Robyn Blackwood has obviously advanced and could well have made the final. Annette Owen played excellently against Jayne Ashton but was erratic and inconsistent against Mrs Webster whom she seems unable to defeat in a major championship.

UNDER 23 SEASON

The importance of U23 Squash continues to be highlighted by an examination of players competing in the Inter-Districts Teams events. Nearly 40% of the players in the Teams events were in the Under 23 category and many more had only recently graduated from those ranks. The trend is further highlighted by an examination of the seedings for the National Championships where 10 out of the 15 New Zealand men seeded and 4 out of the 7 New Zealand women seeded were all under 23 years of age.

Furthermore the composition and success of Bay of Plenty and Hawkes Bay teams in recent years has shown the benefits gained by relatively young Districts, in promoting Junior and Under 23 players. Hopefully, the introduction of the new eligibility rule will lead to an extension of this policy by all Districts, rather than a tendency to "poach" or "buy" players.

Another aspect of the abovementioned trend that has been accentuated by the advent of open squash is the need for the players to appreciate that they in their turn have obligations to fulfill.

SLAZENGER UNDER 23 CHAMPIONSHIPS

These were held at the Christchurch Club over the Easter weekend which has now become a regular date for this event. Features of the event were:

- Rod Hayes winning the Men's event, the first time it has been won by the same person twice.
- Annette Owen winning the Women's event for the fourth time.
- The first time the event had been held in the South Island, resulting in a big increase in travel costs. With respect to the Men it was a success because of the way the Canterbury men played with many indicating that they were undergraded and underrated in comparison with their northern opponents. In the Women's event it was disappointing that only one South Island woman was good enough to make the top draw.

The entry from Southern Districts was disappointing and may reflect communication problems and lack of an U23 co-ordinator.

For the first time subsidiary draws were included for players not making the top draws. It is unfortunate that the budget cannot extend to providing travel assistance for these divisions. In spite of this the

- introduction was a success. This was one of the innovations to the Championship that has come from the Players' Meetings held at each event.
- Neither of the two winners were able to take advantage of the air ticket to the Queensland Championships due to a combination of work and financial commitments. This situation will be looked into for future years.

The Men's Championship was won by Rod Hayes, who after showing indifferent form up to the semi-finals, struck form and won the last two matches three straight. It was due reward for the pre-season effort Rod had put in, but it is disappointing that we haven't seen more of the same standard of play from Rod in the North Island. His current rankings would be higher if he produced more of the same form. Paul Viggers won his way through to the final most impressively and the final was a much closer battle than the score would indicate. This can be better appreciated when it is seen that the first game took twenty-six minutes.

Annette Owen who had just returned from a squash-playing trip to the U.K. She won through to the final without dropping a game. In the final, with Robyn Blackwood, the first two games were close and were shared one each. However, with Robyn not taking her attacking opportunities Annette pulled away to win in four games.

INTERNAL TOUR

This is now becoming a feature of our programme and is looked forward to by the players and seems to be appreciated by the Clubs visited.

The format of two or three tournaments and visits to Clubs seems to work quite well although this year there were problems in obtaining sufficient competition for the two girls in the team.

JUNIOR SEASON

The highlight of the 1980 Junior Squash must undoubtedly be the performance of the New Zealand Junior Men's Team with their third placing at the I.S.R.F. World Junior Teams Championships in Sweden, Stuart Davenport's winning the Drysdale Cup at the Junior British Open and the team beating Singapore on their way home completed a most successful tour.

At the end of the season our Junior Women participated in the Australian Junior Championships and Teams events. Susan reached the semi-finals and the team was equal second in the Teams Event.

A Singapore Young Men's Team toured New Zealand in June, playing one test against a New Zealand team consisting of Stuart Davenport, Dean Lovett, Wayne Rowlands, John Mills, Anthony McMurtrie and reserve, Rhys Powell, which New Zealand won — 5/1.

On the National scene, the first tournament was the locally sponsored North Island Junior Championships held at Palmerston North Club in May. Then came the New Zealand Age Group Championships jointly held at Remuera and College Rifles Clubs in July in which three South Island players were assisted to the event by the N.Z.S.R.A. The South Island Championships were held at the Burnside Club in late July where three North Island players were assisted to attend. The New Zealand Junior Open and New Zealand Inter-District Teams Event were held at Hamilton Club in the August holidays to complete the season. To these five Clubs goes the J.M.C.'s thanks for the use of their facilities and the help and cooperation of their members.

The individual results of the leading Juniors has been outstanding in 1980. Susan Devoy won the Australia Women's Cup for the Most Improved New Zealand Woman Player. Susan also won the New Zealand Junior North Island, New Zealand Age Group, New Zealand Junior Open and the Queensland Junior Championships. Donna Gurran was runner-up in all of these events. Stuart Davenport won the Drysdale Cup and the New Zealand Age Group Championship. Dean Lovett won the Vogel Rose Bowl for the Most Improved New Zealand Male Player for 1980, the North Island Championships, New Zealand Open and was runner-up in the New Zealand Junior Age Group. Wayne Rowlands was runner-up in the North Island

and New Zealand Open.

Another sign of the progress in Junior Squash was the number of Juniors who represented their Districts in the Senior Inter-District Teams Event. The J.M.C. must endeavour in the future to arrange, where possible, National Junior Tournaments so that they do not clash with any major Senior Tournaments, thus avoiding any Junior players having to decide which event to support, as we would hope that our top Juniors will continue to support National Junior events.

The New Zealand Girls' Development Squad had two training sessions and the Boys' Development Squad had one session while two hundred and forty Juniors have had the opportunity of coaching in the Spalding Regional Coaching Programme introduced by Mr C. Brownlee, New Zealand Coaching Director this year.
