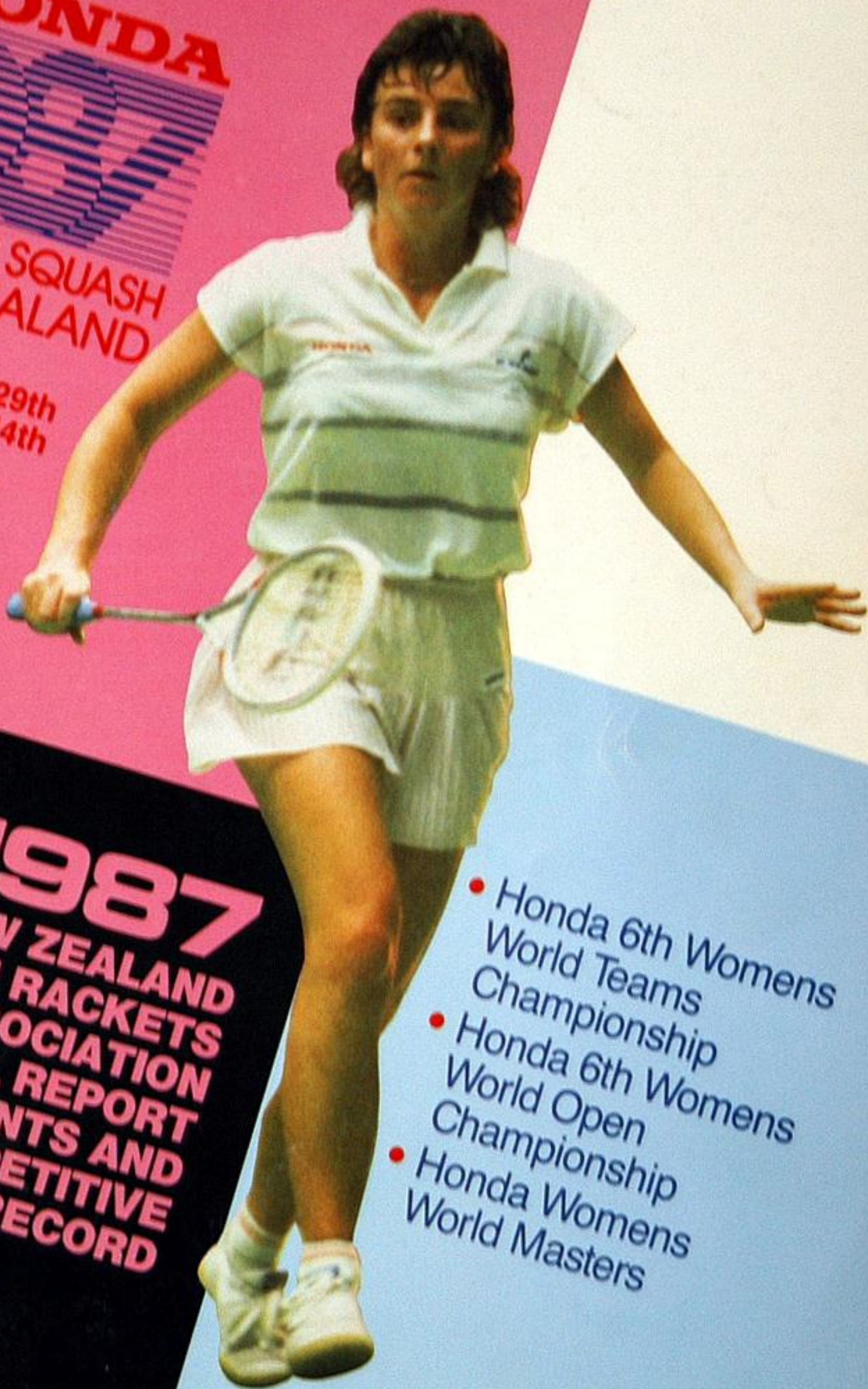

The past year has seen the sport of squash rackets attain a particularly high profile in New Zealand. This has been the culmination of many years of development in a number of different areas.

Some of the highlights have been:

1. The purchase of the clear vue squash court. This court brings an entirely new visual perspective to the sport resulting in greater media attention and higher audience participation both at the venue and from the armchair public (via television).

Already it has enabled the public of New Zealand to see champions such as Ross Norman, Susan Devoy, Jahangir Khan, Rodney Martin and Stuart Davenport.

The ability to finance the venture stems back to the years of membership growth when assets were generated from levy income enabling us to purchase the New Zealand Squash Centre which has in turn provided funds for this venture.

At the same time an external entrepreneur in the form of Harvard Sports Marketing has shown sufficient confidence in squash administration to

become involved in the purchase of the court.

2. This year we have had two world champions in Susan Devoy and Ross Norman.

Both have won numerous junior and senior New Zealand titles starting from an early age and have been associated with many of our leading personalities such as Dardir, Norm Coe and Bryden Clarke.

3. The Honda Womens World Squash Championship was a tremendous success highlighted by Susan Devoy retaining her world title on the clear vue court in front of a live (at the venue) and a live TV audience of the proportions that would make any sport or performer happy.

The Honda World Championships have attracted unprecedented media coverage with the event and its personalities constantly appearing in newspapers and magazines, on all radio stations and on television. I would venture to suggest that the public awareness of squash is at the highest level it has ever been by far.

Some years ago we set ourselves long term objectives regarding: playing standards at international level, public awareness, income from sponsorship and membership numbers. We have achieved most of the objectives set at that time despite some initial scepticism, but it is very important that we all go out and build on the achievements to date.

International Playing Standard — This depends upon a small group of individuals and will out of necessity fluctuate. The pool of talent that we draw from is small particularly when you consider that there are 1.3 million squash players over the age of 16 in the United Kingdom. Furthermore we are competing against a whole range of sports for this talent. Nevertheless we must broaden our base and encourage more youngsters from the age of ten onwards to consider squash an exciting sport to play. This may require introducing modified rules and equipment for this group. We must then provide the opportunities (coaching and competition) for the odd exceptionally talented individual who emerges, and encourage him or her to remain in the sport.

Membership — Measured by traditional methods our club membership has declined over recent years following the growth of the seventies. This is perhaps not surprising when faced by an upsurge in other leisure and fitness activities and commercial squash. However there has been a growth in the number of competitive players and juniors.

We must remember to cater for the social or casual player as he or she tends to be a low profile but very important component of every club. We must look at the promotional aspect of

coaching, make our clubs pleasant attractive places to both play and socialise, have fun and business house tournaments and most of all ensure that the competitive player does not dominate the courts too much and pays his/her share of the costs.

WOMENS WORLD CHAMPS

New Zealand Team Coach Norm Coe called it later "a clinical demolition job".

It finished with a backhand drive down the wall. England's Lisa Opie failed to return the ball. Susan Devoy plunged both fists in the air in rapturous delight. She had retained her world squash championship title.

The capacity crowd at Auckland's YMCA Stadium went wild with excitement. Devoy had beaten Opie in straight sets 9/3 10/8 9/2 in 39 minutes to prove once again that she is without doubt the world's top women squash player. A few minutes later television viewers throughout New Zealand watched the live action of Devoy hoisting the world championship trophy aloft. A fairytale finish to a magic event.

So ended the Honda 6th Womens World Open Individual Squash Championships — a 128 draw tournament played over seven days for a record \$50,000 prizemoney.

Eight days later another trophy was being hoisted in the air. This time it was for the world's best nation in women's squash and the jubilant winners were England. In the final of the 14 strong teams event the talented trio of Lisa Opie, Martine Le Moignan and Lucy Soutter had downed Australia by 2/1 to emerge victorious.

With this the 17 day championships ended. A magnificent festival of squash was over for another two years.

Two years of planning, meetings, letters, phone calls, negotiations, trips and sheer hard work had gone into staging the 1987 Championships in New Zealand. For Championships Director Susie Simcock the event had become a total occupation, especially in its final months prior to commencement. Likewise for Championships Secretary Wilma Halling and the other members of the Organising Committee who worked around the clock to ensure that all went as planned.

And go as planned it did. Players and officials from the participating 14 nations were lavish in their praise of the event's professional organisation and smooth running. Some wistful

comments were heard that "if only we could do this at home".

The Championships took place in Auckland from September 29th until October 14th and were played at the gracious Henderson Squash Club. The NZSRA's clear vision court was erected

at the YMCA for the last three rounds of the Individual Championship.

The Individual Championship, a Womens International Squash Players Association Grade A Tournament attracted a massive entry of 99 players and was held from September 29 until Tuesday October 6th. It offered the richest prizemoney ever at stake for a Womens World Championship and was accordingly rewarded by participation from every top female squash player in the world.

Susan Devoy was just too good for the field. She dropped only one set in the whole tournament and this to fellow Kiwi Joanne Williams in the fourth round. Against Opie in the final and Australia's Liz Irving in the semi finals the inevitability of her winning was just never in doubt.

This aside the contest produced splendid squash with everything to please even the most difficult follower. Former World Champion Vicki Cardwell showed what determination is all about

with her courageous quarter finals win over Martine le Moignan in five sets. le Moignan for her part gave a display of powerful play not often seen here. Beaten finalist Lisa Opie showed absolute artistry in shot making — for a little while against Devoy and even more so against Cardwell in their semi final. Cardwell again took things to five sets before bowing out to Opie's precision.

If Devoy was the favourite, darling of the crowds was an attractive third place getter Liz Irving. Always a popular player in New Zealand Irving had won a lot of sympathy following her shock omission from the

Australian team despite being the world's 6th ranked player.

She had a point to make about this, which she did quite well with victories over Australian players Sarah Fitzgerald and Vicki Cardwell during the tournament. Just for good measure she took the scalp of world ranked 5 Lucy Soutter as well. The crowd loved it.

Not only the crowd but also event sponsor NZMC Honda. The Championships with the Susan Devoy

quest took the imagination of the media. Screeds of squash were written in Auckland and New Zealand papers, the radio stations provided hourly updates and the action flickered across the nations television screens.

The final was seen live following a bold decision by the organisers to reschedule the start time 60 minutes later in the evening. A great moment for New Zealanders from Kaitia to Bluff to be with one of its favourites in her time of triumph. As well for the spectators at the match, the wonderful sight of Devoy winning on the brilliantly lit all transparent perspex court — an innovation which has taken squash into a completely new dimension.

England were just too good in the Teams Championship. New Zealand's hopes for the title took a dive in the pool match against arch rival Australia, still smarting over their test series loss to the Kiwis last year.

Again it was Cardwell who threw the spanner in the works defeating a jaded Devoy in five rugged sets to clinch the rubber for Australia. New Zealand thus qualified second in the pool, ran into England in the postpool semi finals and the matter ended there.

But who cares? Third in the World is nothing to be ashamed of especially with such fine teams from England and Australia to contend with. As well with the world standard improving so quickly in so many countries a result one can be proud about. New Zealand's team of Susan Devoy, Joanne Williams, Donna Gurran and Cheryl TeKani were fine ambassadors for the sport.

World Championships come and go, battles are won and lost. The 1987 event in New Zealand went beyond just squash however. It was a friendly, relaxed festival of sport with emphasis on personal, individual treatment. New Zealand's traditional reputation for hospitality and warmth to visitors was lived up to fully.

Not only in Auckland, it might be added. Prior to the official start on Monday August 28th many of the visitors participated in the three warm up tournaments in Tauranga, Whangarei and Rotorua. Those who did come back all smiles. A good opportunity to have other cities become involved in the excitement and atmosphere of the event.

The 1987 Honda Womens World Squash Championships were an unqualified success in so many ways.

New Zealand through Susan Devoy and the NZ Team remains at the forefront of international womens squash. The sport in this country has received massive publicity and attention. Only time will tell how far reaching an effect this will have.

And the incalculable friendships and good will generated amongst the international squash fraternity. In this

day of increased competitiveness and seriousness it is reassuring to see that one of the basic tenets of sport still can succeed.

All this would not have been possible without the dedication and the work of the organisers who invested hours of their free time in planning and running this major and complex undertaking. To Susie Simcock and her team, a tribute

of appreciation for the work and effort and for this wonderful result to squash. The same to Backers NZMC Honda.

New Zealand has every right to be proud of the 1987 World Championships. The country has once again proved its ability and efficiency in world squash.

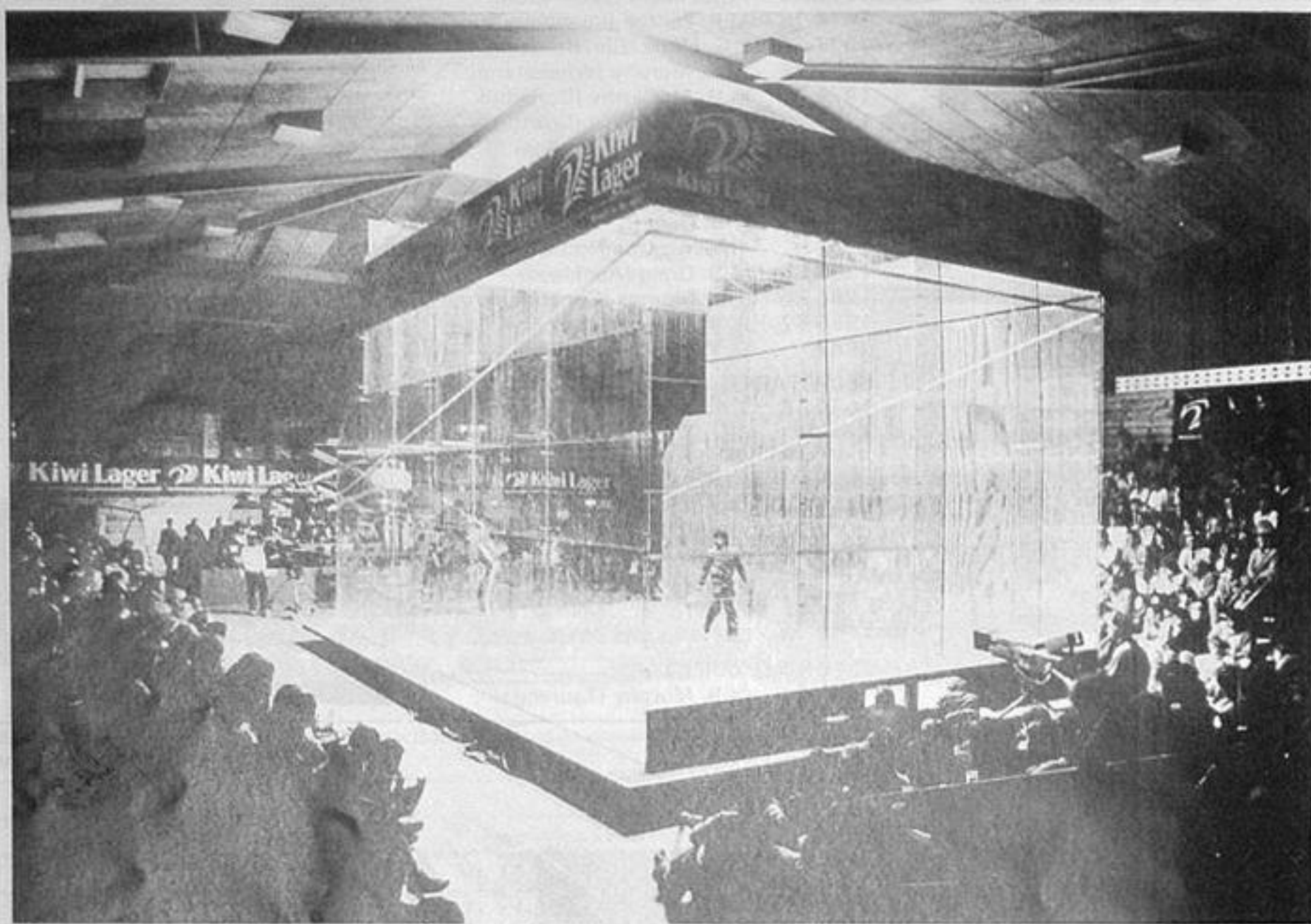

BREAKING NEW BARRIERS

Squash in New Zealand moved into a new generation in 1987. The clear vision era had begun.

The NZSRA took a bold step in January in teaming up with a firm of Auckland sports consultants to form a new company known as Harvard Squash Vision Ltd. This company bought and imported to New Zealand a Puchaux Squash Vision transportable all perspex court valued at around \$250,000 which arrived in June.

The court dramatically transformed squash as a spectator attraction. Instead of 300 people behind the glass back wall, now up to 3000 people can view the play from all sides.

This is the 'fish bowl' or one way effect created by a series of lines embossed into the blue tinted perspex. On one side light is reflected and on the other it is absorbed. Once the stadium lights are dimmed the brilliantly lit court lets the spectator see in easily but in no way impedes the play.

The 5.6 tonne court can be erected in almost any stadium provided the ceiling is high enough. It is fully transportable and packs into seven large crates.

The move to transform squash into the big league spectator sport category was prompted by the wave of success of New Zealand's top players Ross Norman and Susan Devoy and the resulting high profile and publicity of squash. There would never be a better opportunity to promote squash to the wider New Zealand sporting public and rid it of its private club elitism.

Harvard Squash Vision is run by six directors, three of whom are appointees of the NZSRA. They are the NZSRA Executive Director, former NZSRA President Bruce Davidson and Auckland businessman Neven Barbour. The other directors are Harvard Sports Marketing founder Lindsay Singleton, his partner Tom Johnston and Errol Simpson.

The first use of the court in New Zealand made history with a superb display of squash from present and past world champions Ross Norman and Jahangir Khan, womens world champion Susan Devoy and Australia's Liz Irving.

This was the Kiwi Lager Challenge Series played in Wellington and

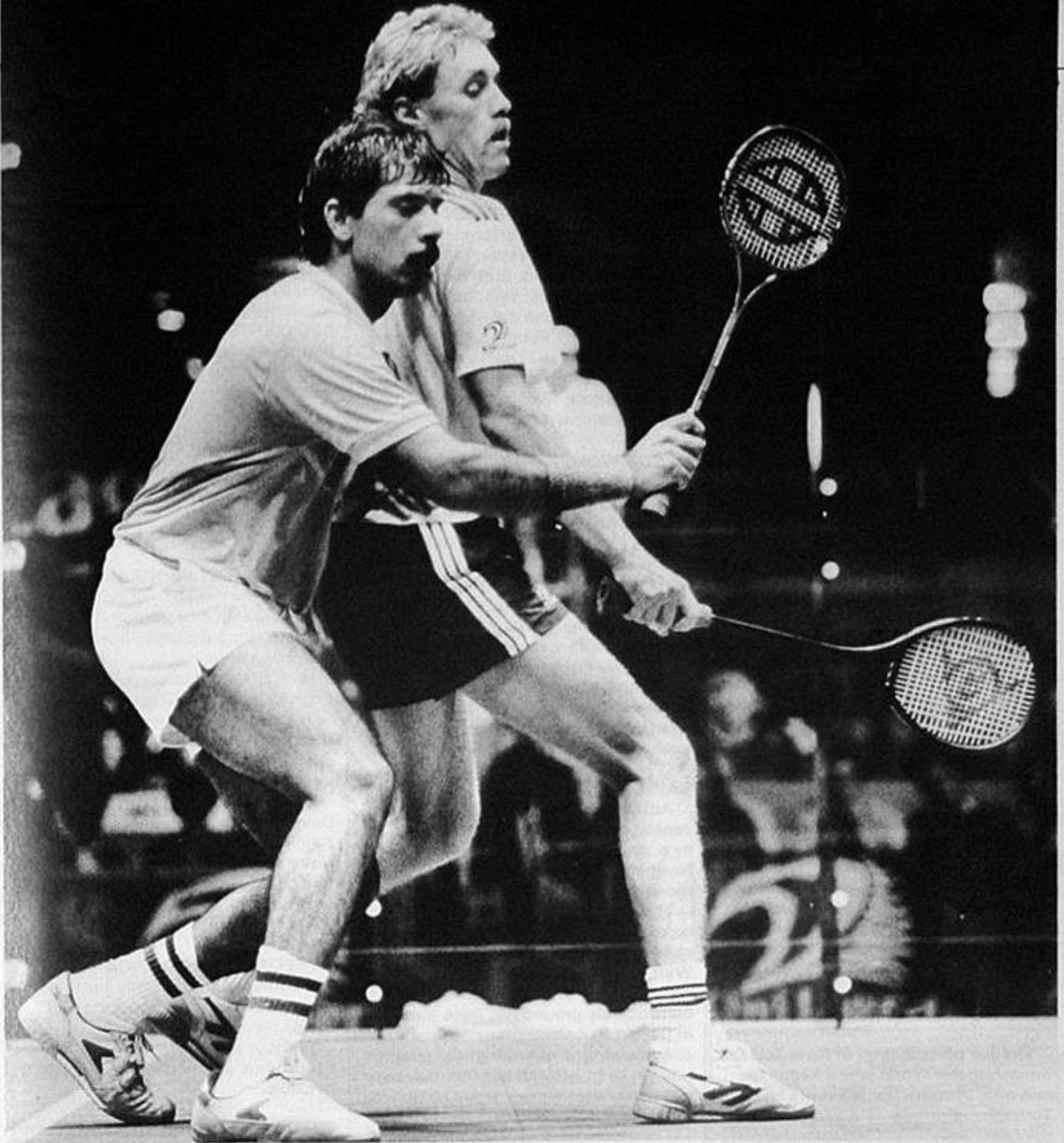
Auckland from July 5-12th involving three matches.

Large crowds turned out to see Devoy, Norman and the legend of squash Jahangir whom Norman had made immortal in Toulouse in October 1986 at the World Championships, ending his 5½ year unbeaten reign.

The Series was extensively televised and received heavy coverage in the media and on the radio.

Norman played exhilarating squash, especially in the first match in Auckland yet could not break through the Pakistani's defences and repeat the Toulouse result. Khan for his part had little difficulty finding the right motivation for the job — after Toulouse it had become a matter of importance to show New Zealanders in New Zealand that he was the undisputed No. 1 in the World.

Devoy too made no bones about establishing who was queen of this castle with decisive wins over the popular Irving, who looked stylish yet could not muster the patience and hardness needed to slug it out with her tough opponent.



The Series, offering squash of such a high calibre with national appeal and the revolutionary court pushed the sport strongly to the forefront of public awareness during its seven day course. It was a significant curtain raiser to the next main squash event in 1987 — the Womens World Championships.

The arrival of the court in New Zealand was also of benefit to Australia who hired it for use in the New South Wales, Victorian and Australian Opens in Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane respectively.

The arrangement worked to the benefit of both sides of the Tasman and provided a stable basis for players to compete in the four Australian events — the New Zealand Open in Wellington

following on immediately after the Australian Open in Brisbane.

The introduction of the clear view court to top squash has made significant changes to a number of important areas such as sponsorship, promotion, marketing and publicity. Planning and staging major events involving the court now are extremely complex tasks with hundreds of elements requiring attention not applicable to conventional events.

Accordingly as part of the agreement with Harvard Squash Vision Ltd the NZSRA has an agreement with Auckland sports consultants Harvard Sports Marketing who provide professional assistance in many of the above areas.

1987 has been a learning year in the

new relationship both for the NZSRA and its consultants. In staging the Challenge Series, the NZ Open and the World Championships valuable experiences have been gleaned which will pay off in the seasons to come. The exercise has not been without a little suspicion from some fearful of the intrusion of commercial interests into the administration of the sport. Yet as the benefits of such co-operation became evident the role of professional services in the running of squash will become better understood and accepted.

1987 has been a milestone year for New Zealand squash in so many ways. On the court dazzling success has been seen. The court itself is a success of its own.

INTERNATIONAL EVENTS & TOURS

The full participation of New Zealand Squash in the World scene keeps the role of the International Events and Tours Sub Committee a very busy one.

With three World Championships in this calendar year, and the training of a squad to participate in another World Championship in early 1988 has meant a continued administrative support action over the year.

We thank the President Mike Greig for his attendance at meetings of the Committee and thus giving valuable input from his wealth of knowledge on the squash scene.

INTERNATIONAL PLAYERS

Our two World Champions, Susan Devoy and Ross Norman have been worthy champions and very predominant leaders of our sport.

With Stuart Davenport at World No 3 and Joanne Williams at World No 11 we have excellent back up. Following these are Donna Gurrin, with her extensive international experience, and the ever increasing prospects of

Stephen Cunningham and Rory Watt.

Work must continue though if we are to establish a broad base to support our top international players.

1987 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS BARCLAYS JUNIOR WOMEN

A very creditable performance from the team saw them retain their placing of third in the World. Both England and Australia are very strong, but we should in no way be deterred by this and continue to promote and encourage our Junior women. To this end, a squad has already been established, and named, to train for the 1989 World Championships.

HONDA WOMENS TEAM

At the time of writing the Womens World Championship in Auckland is about to start.

With a very heavy domestic scene in which our top players are expected to participate, it is difficult to get squads organised in a meaningful way. Problems experienced in this area and others must be overcome in future years if we are going to produce fully competitive teams. Once the team was named in August, regular training has been underway and the prospects of again making the final look good.

BAYLEYS MENS TEAM

Although the squad that is under the control of Don Cotter did not ever train as a squad, their progress in the Northern Hemisphere last summer was monitored.

This squad formed the base for back up of Norman and Davenport. The excellent effort of Cunningham and Watt in the NZ Open was most encouraging, and in the last two years considerable ground has been made up in the No 3 position of our team.

Again at time of writing, the event has yet to be played, but there is every possibility that we will again be playing in the World Teams final.

1988 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Barclays Junior Men travel to Scotland in 1988 to contest this event.

Trevor Colyer has been appointed Manager and since the beginning of this year he has had a squad of six in full training. This included a trip to the Australian Junior Age Group Championships in September. A team of four players will travel to Scotland and everyone will be looking for a much improved performance from that of our seventh placing at Brisbane in 1986.

MASTERS SQUASH

Although IET have had a lesser involvement in Masters during 1987, due to the excellent work done by the revamped Masters Committee, we did have the role of finalising the Test Series with Australia and considering the appointment of NZ Team Manager.

The test series in New Zealand in October could well be New Zealand's year and everyone certainly hopes the NZ Team under the guidance of Gower Dallimore will carry off the day.

HONDA CITY NZ OPEN

A very successful event was staged in Wellington in August. Although an entry of more of the top sixteen players would have given the tournament the higher level of prestige that the \$25,000 US plus \$10,000 US hotel bonus deserved the entry received was very gratifying, and certainly a vast improvement on the 1987 mens entry.

Wellington personnel are thanked for an effort that produced a first class event.

The 1987 womens title will go to the winner of the World Championships in Auckland.

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

Under the direction of Rod Hayes, this programme has continued to operate along the same lines as in previous years.

With the establishing of World Championship training squads at all four levels, and the work of the Junior Development squads there is considerable overlap in the various development programmes.

A full review of the International Development Group and our various training squads will take place in November of this year. It is hopeful that this review will set the programme for all groups for the next three to five years.

NZ SPORTS FOUNDATION

Our thanks to this body for the monetary support our players and teams receive.

Without this the levels New Zealand squash has attained would just not be possible.

FUTURE ACTIVITIES

The Committee has been successful in reinstating internal tours. These will take place from 1988 onwards and for 1988 the level of participation will be from the lower age groups in our Junior Development Squads.

Efforts are being put into establishing a combined mens and womens test series against Australia. With the use of the clear view court this would no doubt be a top line event. Participation of both countries top players is a must for this event.

CONCLUSIONS

My thanks to the Committee for their efforts over the year.

Continued planning must be a top priority for this Committee if we are going to succeed in International Squash.

NATIONAL EVENTS

With the 1987 season virtually over this subcommittee, whose responsibilities cover all aspects of events under the direct control of the NZSRA, can look back on another very successful year.

The Railfreight National Championships, Cousins Shield/Mitchell Cup, Moro Players Series, National Club Teams Championships, the Hertz-Aber Masters Championships, the Barclays Under 23 Championships and National Junior Events all come under our umbrella together with their relevant rules, formats and procedures. While this committee met formally only once this year in February, to set up the programme of events for the season, relevant personnel were contacted to resolve situations as they arose during the course of the year. Contact was also kept with other subcommittees such as the referees, the national selectors and the statisticians and we thank them for their input where it was required.

The relatively small workload of this committee this year reflects the excellent state of our current programme of events, the general

structure of our rules and format, and I see little major changes to these being necessary for some time to come. Of course no system is ever perfect and we have had sufficient feedback from the membership to remind us of that fact.

To summarise the season, the Tokoroa Club ran their second successive Under 23 Championships with such success that several reports suggested it be permanently allocated to them. However we have allocated the 1988 event to the Mana Club — the only other applicant.

North Shore hosted the Railfreight National Championships in the usual efficient manner and it was very pleasing to hear the complimentary comments from not only the players but also from the large contingent of sponsors representatives who attended the courts. This event for 1988 will be hosted by the Palmerston North Club.

The Cousins Shield/Mitchell Cup event was run by the Eden Epsom Club in their centennial year, and it was unfortunate that there were no South Island teams participating, highlighting the lack of finance available to clubs requiring to travel by air to our events. On the other side of the coin, so to speak, it is the availability of finance in some regions which is causing our committee to look at the format and rules of this event in greater detail. There now seems to be a real need to restrict the buying of players by a change in the player eligibility rule otherwise this event, while still popular with our top players, is going to lose all association with the reason it was first set up — that of the top grade club championship.

In contrast to that event the National Graded Teams events from B Grade to F Grade continue to thrive and from results received to date it is pleasing to note that our trophies will be blessed with a few new club names for the first time. The major hassle with these events this year was attributable to the computer grading lists, their availability and the anomalies shown on them. No doubt the National Statisticians will be commenting on this elsewhere in the report but suffice to say all queries, complaints and objections were resolved one way or another after referral to the relevant District Statistician for verification. Hopefully another year down the track will overcome these anomalies.

The Moro Series was given a shot in the arm this year by instituting a new points system devised to encourage our top players to support more events and to provide interest in the final placings for the duration of the series. While our objectives seem to have been achieved there now seems to be some modification required in the points relationship over the top four placings and perhaps a look at the number of

events to be covered by the series. For instance it may well be that the North Island and South Island Championships may be deleted and these will be considered by our Committee in due course. Thanks are due to the Districts for hosting this event as we are very conscious of the fact that in some areas venues and sponsorship are very difficult to obtain.

The Hertz-Aber NZ Masters event is being hosted by the Kawarua Park Club in New Plymouth and at the time of writing this report approximately 200 entries have been received. Add to this the Australians expected and you have a clear indication of the strength of our sport at this level. I understand that there are entries from two Australian State Teams in the teams event also.

Our tournament schedule becomes a more complicated document each year, with the newer clubs wishing to increase their competitive events and the established clubs retaining their traditional ones. There are very few weekends that the keen squash player is not catered for in most of our regions. An attempt has been made to spread out the District Masters events over a greater period for next season and I feel that with the co-operation of the Districts it could be spread even further yet.

The Secondary Schools event which has been held in Wellington continues to be extremely well supported and while the input for this event by our committee is minimal I can see that changing in the very near future.

I believe that we can look forward to 1988 with a few challenges on the playing scene but with the knowledge that the systems we have in place, appear to be what the players want, which is, I suppose, why this committee exists.

COACHING TRAINING & DEVELOPMENT

Most Districts got behind this programme and formed "District Teams", but the clubs seemed rather slow at accepting the concept. Club Committees should realise that it is not just the coaching that the "Club Coach" is responsible for, but the promotion of the Club within the local community. The Districts have not taken the programme as a vehicle for promotion of club activities to both attract and keep membership. With squash obtaining such a high profile at present, two world champions, it is a disappointment that clubs have not promoted their club as "the" club in town.

The late arrival of the coaching book from Australia meant the full potential of this book won't be seen until next season. That is enough of the negative for this year and we can now move to the rest of the programme that can only be described as successful.

NATIONAL SQUADS

This is one area we can be very proud of. Our scheme is in place and squads have been named along with managers two years before their event, allowing the managers to mould the team into a good working unit. This scheme gets players used to different personalities and accepting different points of view, the marriage of their own personal coach with the "squad coach", and the support that team training etc, brings which we all need to achieve our goals.

Our senior squads are difficult to administer with half the squad being overseas, but we must accept this situation, as international competition is vital to the progress of the individual players. We must also be aware of the amount of time and effort put in by the managers and budget for payment to these people or we will lose our more "professional managers".

DARDIR TOUR

The new look Dardir tour was very successful, but some doubts as to how it actually affects Dardir, still remain. The club clinics in most Districts were well received and most successful where publicity had preceded the visit. There is no doubt that this type of tour should continue, but the NZSRA must have more input as far as the actual itinerary goes. I have received letters from clubs who missed Dardir this year and want to be in first next year.

TRAINING OF COACHES

The Committee at its May meeting decided that this area would be left till March '88 and so nothing was organised in this department. Districts

however should be continuing their own training of coaches and should be ready to send a representative to the meeting next year.

DISTRICTS

During the year approval (for coaching only), was given for an extra District, so we now have Southern split into Southern and Otago. The rest of the country seem to have their Districts working so we look forward to a successful 1988.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT

An interesting item on the ISRF agenda at the meeting held in England recently, was on a game to meet the needs of the five year to ten year old child. This area is being looked at by the Hillary Commission and by the Council of Sport in Australia. The need for racket skills to be developed at an earlier age than we have done in the past is very important. We also must realise that we will lose children to other racket sports but if we go about the whole project correctly squash should gain much more than it would lose.

Thanks to the District Directors for their co-operation over the year, to Elaine Penney as our Committee Convenor, Debra Rodgerson as the NZSRA Representative for their contributions, the NZSRA Office, Anne Murphy, Lois Smith, Bill Pye, Denis Bosworth, Robin Espie and Charmian Hayes, also to the many others who assisted in the coaching area.

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT GROUP



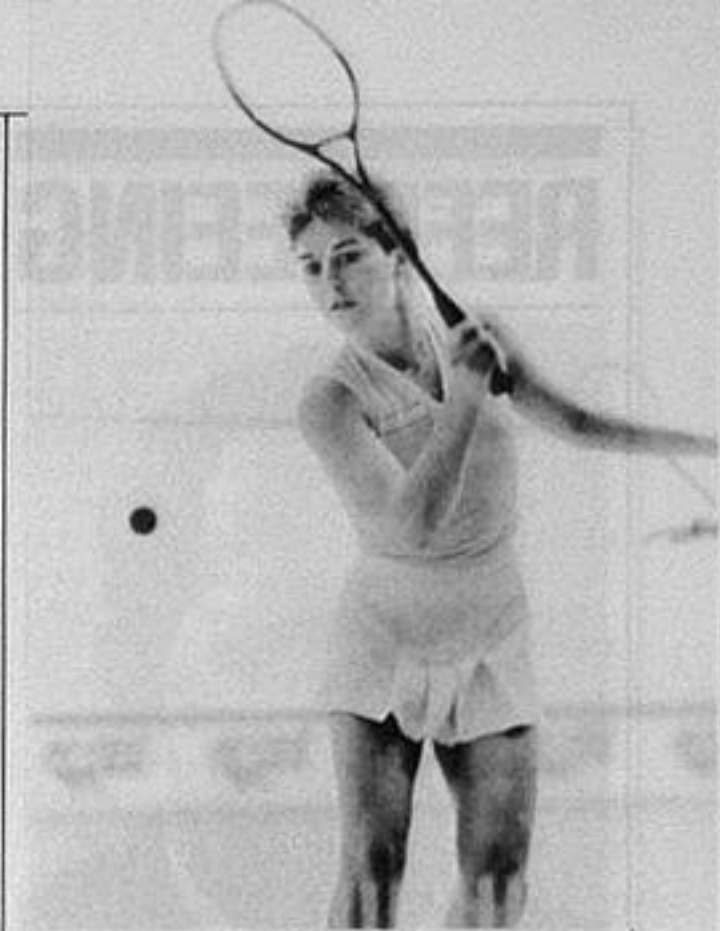

A busy year would adequately describe the 1987 season as far as the selectors are concerned. The selection of both the womens and mens teams to the world championships in New Zealand and England respectively were no doubt the highlights of the year.

The mens team to England was arrived at without too much dissension. The number three and four position is still a concern even though Stephen Cunningham and Rory Watt seemed to go through the season without any really serious challenges. The retirement of Ross Norman or Stuart Davenport will create a real problem for New Zealand to retain its high ranking worldwide.

Our New Zealand women have had a busy schedule leading up to the world championships in New Zealand and the selection of the team went "right to the line", with some midnight oil being burnt before the unanimous selection of the team. We are fortunate indeed to have Susan Devoy playing so many District events. Being available to play so many of the lesser players is so valuable to them even though I believe many of them don't take the opportunity to have a go as I am sure Susan would do if the roles were reversed. A few overseas players played in our District events with varying success. It is hard to place some of these players, especially those whose reputation precedes them, upon arrival. The performance does not measure up and they are well out of their depth.

It is pleasing to see some of our "domestic" players putting in as much effort as they did this year, our future looks bright by these players keeping both our internationals and our up and coming players honest.

During the year the rules regarding the "Moro Series" changed and we

would now hope the friction caused by the forever changing seedings will be overcome. The introduction of the random draw was welcomed by the selectors although some Districts did not in fact use it!! Some instruction on the random draw workings must go to Districts for next year.

The policy adopted by NZSRA to select squads/managers well in advance of the next championships is one of merit. Both the selectors and the manager/manageress can do plenty of planning to get a team to the Championships well prepared and fit.

The most improved players this year were Mike McSherry and Dianne Ellis. Their improvement over the season made this year's selection a very easy one.

Finally I would like to firstly thank Graeme Bird and Trevor Colyer for their support and co-operation over the year and secondly, sadly say farewell to "Birdy" who is retiring at the end of this season. Graeme I know has enjoyed his selectorial duties and never tired of "doing his duty". Our discussions during the year always finished up in complete agreement, but it sometimes took a long time to arrive at this satisfactory position. It is vital that "healthy discussion" remains a part of the selectorial process, as it does bring people together as a team.

REFEREEING

NATIONAL DIRECTOR — REFEREEING

In March of this year Dennis Winch who had again been appointed National Director of Refereeing, had to relinquish this position because of business commitments. Subsequently I was appointed acting director.

Objectives for the 1986-87 year were:

- preparation and selection of referees for the Womens Championships
- achieving more accuracy in markers calls and greater uniformity in refereeing decisions
- disseminating the interpretations of the existing rules agreed to at the second International Referees Conference in Toulouse 1986
- trialling the one serve rule without cutline and using American scoring

The following steps were taken to achieve these goals:-

1. 'Mini seminars' were held in Auckland, Hamilton, Masterton and Ashburton during major tournaments. Thirty one referees attended.
2. Two newsletters were sent to referees and one to leading players explaining agreed rule interpretations.
3. The Terminology Sheet and Instructions to Markers and Referees were revised and sent to all referees.
4. A second printing of the Rules Booklet was undertaken which included the interpretations agreed to in Toulouse.
5. Districts were requested to trial the possible rule changes.

6. Two pools of referees were selected for the two events at the Womens Championships. Those selected were:

Individual Championships: Pauline Boyle, Paul Devoy, Gary Hutchinson, Gary McBeth, Kevin McGeown, Alan Solly, Phil Taylor, Sandra Tinkler, Jenny Webster.

Teams Championships: Judy Burgess, Vicki Edmonds, Chas Evans, Rod Hayes, Peter Highsted, Gerald Moss, Warwick Stoupe, Nichol Taylor, Merv Torrie.

Following the trials over the past two seasons a report was sent to Tony Swift, Chairman of the I.S.R.F. Rules Committee. The NZSRA supports the one serve game, retention of the present intervals between games but accepts there should be flexibility in this for some countries and that present scoring ought to be continued. There was little support for American scoring as it was felt that this would significantly alter the nature of the game. I will be attending the I.S.R.F. Rules and Refereeing Committee meeting to be held in London during October which will consider the results of the trials from all member countries and will then make its recommendations to the ISRF. Part of the funding for attending this meeting is from the ISRF.

Following the second International Refereeing Conference in Toulouse which established the procedures and criteria for accrediting International Referees I have been confirmed as having satisfied requirements for this qualification and with David Donnelly from Australia become one of the panel established for assessment and control of this grading. Chas Evans, Peter Highsted and Warwick Stoupe and one Australian will be assessed for the International Refereeing qualification during the Womens Team Championships. National referees to qualify this year include Bill Bradley (Royal Oak), Vern Pere (Henderson), Bob Emerson (Te Puke), Paul Masters (Hastings) and Eddie Thompson (Hawkes Bay). Next year I am hopeful that several leading players who have indicated interest will be able to become qualified. The Derek Cook

Memorial Trophy was awarded this year to John Taylor in recognition of the very significant contributions he made as tournament referee at the Womens Championships. I would like to acknowledge the support of District Directors, the members of the refereeing committee and especially Chas Evans and John Taylor for their sharing responsibility for directing the seminars.

Thanks are also due to those who have acted as Tournament Referees and to Anne Murphy and Robin Espie for their assistance.

The 1987 year has seen the greatest change in the grading system that most

of us have experienced with the introduction of a national computerised grading system.

I find it an ideal time to be in the first year of my position as National Director, to be totally involved at the commencement of the National Computer Grading System.

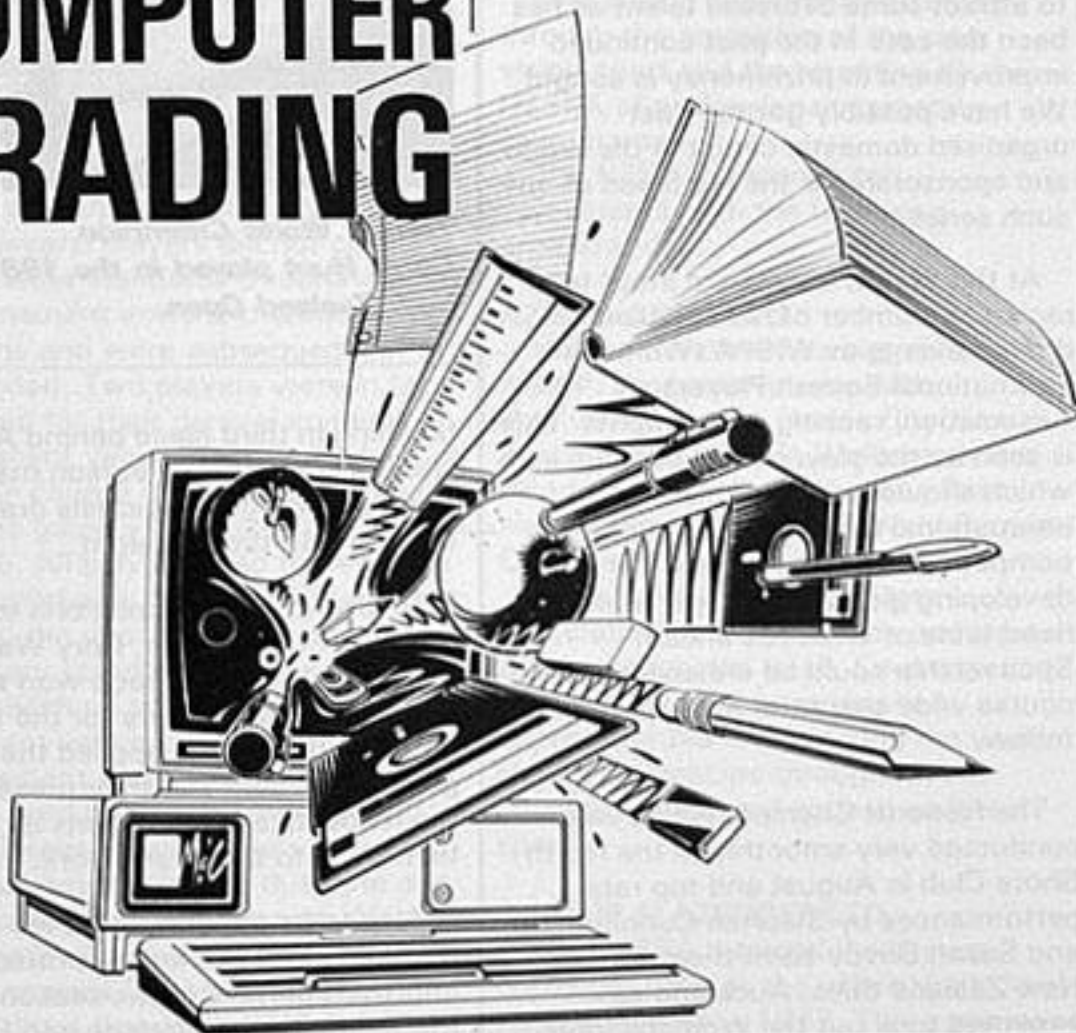
It was just on two years ago that all districts voted to join a National Computer Grading system and it was to this end that the computer was set up in Wellington to draw on their experience — as a district a computerised system had been in practice for some time. We were very fortunate to have Shirley Ainsworth to take on the position of National Co-ordinator and it is unfortunate that she has recently shifted to Christchurch necessitating us to find a new Co-ordinator. Thank you Shirley for persevering to get the system off the ground. I believe the position has become a great deal larger than was first envisaged. We have been very fortunate to be able to employ Kaye Jackson, Auckland District Statistician to take on the job of running the computer, which has recently been

relocated in Auckland, Kaye has the experience of being involved in statisticians for a number of years and she also has a personal interest in believing the system is workable.

To make this eventuate the job of Club Statistician under the direction of District Statisticians has taken on a very important role to ensure each competitive club player has a code which he or she knows correctly and to ensure all results for their particular club are forwarded in the appropriate manner. Thank you to Club and District Statisticians for the extra effort that has been required this year.

Whilst the system will only work entirely correctly with 100 per cent effort on the part of players and statisticians we should make every endeavour to put this into practice. I believe a number of teething problems are still to be ironed out and tolerance has to be shown but I am sure the coming year will show a more accurate and realistic grading list.

COMPUTER GRADING

Our first grading list from the computer was published in April of this

year. Since then there has been the June and August lists, but these have not been without a few problems that we hope the system is now getting on top of.

From the outset it was said that computer grading would take twelve months or more to settle down and sort out players in their right order within grades.

The problems that caused the hold up in results are being ironed out and although June and August were not computed on full results, the final list for the year in November should see results completely up to date.

The education of the District Statisticians, Club Statisticians and players into computer grading has been a major undertaking. Results have to be sent in regularly and on time, deadlines have to be met, interclub cards etc have to be neat and tidy, and players have to remember their codes. If all these are brought into line then the operation of computer gradings should be such that the benefits we expect will materialise.

In July, Shirley Ainsworth advised that she would be moving to Christchurch and did not wish to continue as our computer operations person after that shift. This brought about the decision to move the computer to Auckland and subsequently the appointment of Kaye Jackson as our operations front person. The system was operative in Auckland as from mid September.

With this move to Auckland, Ian Schofer and Paul and Shirley Ainsworth dropped off the committee and Elaine Penney and Kaye Jackson came on. Our thanks to those three Wellingtonians for their time and effort put into computer gradings.

Special thanks to Unisys for their sponsorship and assistance over the year. The Association is making every effort to ensure maximum exposure for Unisys and all levels of squash.

PLAYERS REPRESENTATIVE REPORT

Probably the most significant development of the 1987 Squash season has been the importation and use of the Puchaux Clearview Court, which it is hoped will add a new dimension to the game in this country. While having been used for the exhibition series in July, the NZ Open in Wellington and the upcoming Womens World Open, it is perhaps too early to judge whether this court will enhance the games television appearance, boost sponsorship revenue and increase numbers playing squash, as is sought. This significant undertaking in buying the court is applauded by the players.

We are weeks away from the most important event on our international stars calendar - the Mens and Womens World Open. Firstly Susan Devoy will be attempting to regain her World title on home ground followed closely by Ross Norman and Stu Davenport's assault on the Mens World Open in Birmingham. A tournament victory would be a great boost for squash as indeed a victory in the teams event either here or in the UK would also be most welcome. By virtue of the NZSRA conducting the Womens event in this country, tremendous public support and goodwill for squash is ensured.

On the domestic front a successful Moro Tournament Players Series took place this year with 10 district events plus the North and South Island Opens making up the circuit. The points system this season was modified to give greater incentive for players to travel to the far flung tournaments by implementing an appearance points structure. This system had the desired effect with 14 players out of the top 16 (top 8 men plus top 8 women) having competed in more than half the events.

Congratulations to Donna Gurr and Danny McQueen the winners, who exemplified the spirit of the series by playing 9 and 10 events respectively. Robert Wyatt also deserves a mention in being the only player to compete in 11 of the 12 tournaments. He was rewarded with second place. This was the first season that there has been no TPC final playoff and the finals this year were barely missed. The payout was made in the players finishing order after event No 12 which must surely be a fairer method of splitting the prizemoney.

One area causing slight concern is the reduction in prizemoney at two or three of this season's district opens. If we are to continue having our senior players on the domestic circuit and look to attract some overseas talent as has been the case in the past continued improvement in prizemoney is sought. We have possibly got the best organised domestic circuit in the world and sponsorship is the life blood of any such series.

At this stage, moves are afoot to register a number of next season's district events as WISPA (Womens International Squash Players Association) ranking tournaments. This is seen by the players as a positive step which should help not only our international women gain tough competition but also benefit our developing girls who will get a first hand taste of what lies ahead. Sponsorship could be enhanced and of course wide spectator appeal would follow.

The National Championships were conducted very smoothly at the North Shore Club in August and top rate performances by Stephen Cunningham and Susan Devoy earned them further New Zealand titles. Auckland as expected took out the Womens Inter-District teams event while the Bay of Plenty Mens team overpowered Wellington to gain their first teams title since winning the event 12 years ago in Christchurch. That year Bruce Brownlee and Trevor Johnson provided the necessary firepower for the Bay.

Our NZ junior girls team performed creditably in England some months ago

finishing in third place behind Australia and England. Marie Pearson made the most of a tough individuals draw by making it to the last eight.

Finally, my congratulations to Stephen Cunningham, Rory Watt and Cheryl Te Kani who each won senior representative honours for the first time. All three have applied themselves greatly this year and their presence at the respective World Opens is testimony to their hard work.

Also to be congratulated are Michael McSherry and Dianne Ellis rated most improved players of the season. With McSherry living in Nelson and Dianne Ellis domiciled in Invercargill it appears the South Island has momentarily struck back as regards this year's honours list! With both players coming from lesser squash towns their dedication is an example of how significant improvement can be gained regardless of the location.

DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE

The 1987 season saw the Disciplinary Committee once again having to be convened.

It was pleasing to see that generally the behaviour of most of our top ranked players during the season was of a far better standard than previous years.

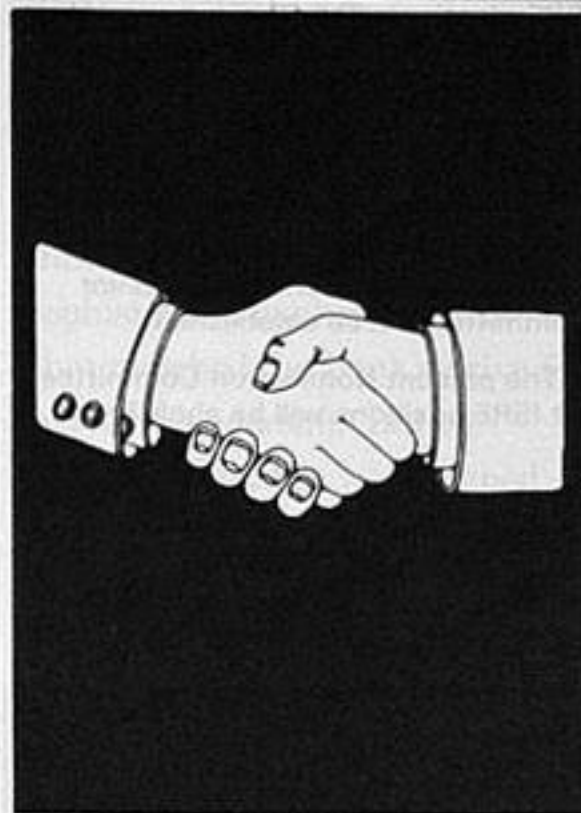
Whilst the NZSRA does not want to become the villain it also has to act in a responsible manner and any adverse report received on player conduct will be investigated and dealt with accordingly.

Unfortunately during the 1987 season several players did not conform to acceptable standards of behaviour and tournament entry and withdrawal conditions and were subsequently reprimanded. Two players were in fact suspended for their general conduct at a tournament venue. This type of behaviour cannot be tolerated and only brings the game of squash into disrepute. All players need to be aware of the importance of sponsorship to our sport and the need to adhere to a satisfactory standard of dress and conduct both on and off the court at tournament venues.

Tournament entry and withdrawal has also seen an improvement during the 1987 season and players must enter tournaments by the due date and on the appropriate entry forms. Also late withdrawals must be advised to the Tournament Director preferably direct and not through a third party. Failure to adhere to these procedures will result in some monetary fine to the player concerned.

It is not a pleasant job adjudicating on disciplinary matters but it has to be done by someone and the decisions made try to make the game of squash a more enjoyable activity for you and I as players to be associated with.

SPONSORSHIP



Sponsorship continues to be a significant priority for the Association and it is indeed fortunate in 1987 to have been able to maintain its good relations with its partners in the commercial field.

This area is one directly effected through the acquisition of the clear vision court and the retention by the NZSRA of professional marketing consultants.

The NZSRA presently has agreements with the following organisations.

NZMC HONDA LTD

Honda completed its biggest year of squash sponsorship ever with involvement in the Honda City New Zealand Open held in Wellington, the Honda New Zealand Womens Team and the Honda Womens World Squash Championships.

The benefits of the long term association between Honda and squash are now apparent to all. Coverage and exposure of the above reached unprecedented levels during the year. Honda dealerships throughout the country now regard squash as 'their' sport.

The NZSRA retained the Dunlop Slazenger balls as the official balls for NZSRA events in 1987. This agreement has now been extended to cover the 1988 season. Dunlop was the official Ball for the 1987 Womens World Championships.

HERTZ RENT A CAR AND ABER LIMITED

Hertz and Aber jointly sponsor Masters squash which continues to grow through the active District Masters events and the popular Hertz

Aber New Zealand Masters Championships held this year in New Plymouth.

As well the companies support the Hertz Aber New Zealand Masters Team which competed in October against Australia in a three test series.

BARCLAYS NEW ZEALAND LIMITED

Barclays sponsor New Zealand Junior Squash. Its wide ranging support covers the New Zealand junior circuit, the Barclays New Zealand Junior Mens and Womens team and their development squads. In 1987 Barclays extended its sponsorship to cover the popular Under 23 Championships.

Rheineck supported the Association in the printing of the official NZSRA entry forms which are distributed to every New Zealand affiliated squash club.

Bayleys Real Estate Ltd of Auckland is a new sponsor to squash, with agreement reached in September for it to sponsor the New Zealand men's team at the 1987 World Championships in England. The team is now titled the Bayleys New Zealand mens team.

UNISYS

The New Zealand computer grading system is backed by Wellington centred Unisys Ltd formerly Burroughs. The company provides a B22-6 computer plus servicing and backup for the computer grading system which has now completed its first year in operation. The agreement between the NZSRA and Unisys has been renegotiated in 1987 and will continue for the next three years.

ISRF

The 1987 Annual General Meeting of the International Squash Rackets Federation was held in London on 24 October 1987 and was attended by a record number of member countries. The two days prior to the Annual General Meeting were used as seminar days and provided a very useful interchange of ideas on a variety of matters.

The following were the main decisions during the Annual General Meeting.

1. World Championships Calendar

New Zealand was allocated the third Junior Womens Individual and Teams World Championships in 1989. Norway will host the 1991 event. Australia will host the Womens World Championships in 1990 and Germany the Junior Men in 1990. Finland will host the 1991 Mens Team Championships.

2. Standards Scheme

The scheme for the approval and testing of court materials and components by the ISRF approvals committee will be introduced from 1 January 1988.

3. Constitution

Associate member status in a non voting capacity but with the right to

attend and speak at meetings has been given to Womens only Associates, WISPA and ISPA.

No proxy voting will be permitted at ISRF meetings. The Chairman and Vice Chairman will now be titled President and Vice Presidents in order to bring the titles into line with other international sports federations.

The Rules Committee has been renamed the Rules and Referees Committee. A Coaching and Junior Committee will be established.

The present Nomination Committee for ISRF positions will be abolished.

4. Junior Squash

The ISRF resolved that urgent action will be taken to develop to a Junior equivalent of squash for children in the 5-12 age category.

5. Finance

The ISRF showed a surplus of 12307 pounds for the year ended 31/12/86. Membership fees will remain unchanged in 1988.

6. Tendering for World Events

Countries wishing to host ISRF World Championships will now have to provide formal detailed applications.

7. ISPA - ISRF

The motions from England and Germany seeking a splitting of the roles of ISPA and the ISRF were withdrawn. Accordingly the ISRF Executive Director Roger Eady will continue to also act as Executive Director of ISPA.

8. International Referees

ISRF accredited international referees will be given the opportunity to officiate at all events conducted under the auspices of the ISRF.

9. World Championships Rules

The ISRF Fixtures Committee will consider extending the two pool system for up to 16 teams and not 12 as is presently provided for.

10. Seminar Topics

The various topics discussed over the two seminar days prior to the ISRF AGM included -

- (a) Sponsorship of Squash
- (b) Squash and the Olympics
- (c) World Squash - How should countries work together
- (d) The International Rules and Referees Development
- (e) ISRF Approvals
- (f) Squash and the Media



COMPETITIVE SQUASH 1986

New Zealand enjoyed perhaps its fullest ever competitive season in 1987 with a feast of events catering for every standard of player in the country.

Quite obviously the Womens World Championships were the highlight of a very busy year. As well the Norman/Khan/Devoy/Irving Series with the introduction of the clear vision court attracted wide exposure earlier on.

Internationally the season saw much activity throughout its course.

Following the Challenge Series in July, the Barclays New Zealand Junior Womens Team competed in the World Championships in England in August. The New Zealand Open was held in Wellington with a strong international field.

Then in September the Womens World Championships were played in Auckland. At the same time the Barclays New Zealand Junior Mens Squad was competing at the Australian Junior Age Group Championships in Brisbane.

The Bayleys New Zealand Mens Team competed in the Mens World Championships in England which commenced in mid October. Two weeks later New Zealand wrapped up its international programme with a three match masters test series against Australia.

Domestically the programme was equally as full. The Moro Series ran from May to July including all 10 District Open Championships and the North and South Island Championships.

Following on from this the Railfreight National Championships were successfully staged in Auckland at the North Shore Club with strong entries.

The Barclays Junior Circuit ran smoothly with this year's major events staged in Auckland, Oamaru, Wellington and Ashburton. Masters Squash showed continuing popularity

with the Masters District Opens and the New Zealand Masters Championships held this year in New Plymouth.

Once again the National Graded Club Teams Event proved a big success with graded players of all abilities around the country competing in the District Eliminations with the winners advancing to the national finals.

MENS WORLD CHAMPS

New Zealand overcame initial shaky form to retain its world second placing behind Pakistan at the Mens World Squash Championships held in London from October 22-31.

New Zealand sponsored for the first time by Bayleys Real Estate Ltd was untroubled in reaching the pool play offs with wins over Canada, Finland, USA, Wales and Denmark, despite No 1 player Ross Norman's erratic form. Team mates Stuart Davenport, Stephen Cunningham and Rory Watt had too much depth for their opponents.

In the post pool section New Zealand's chances were done no harm with a favourable semi finals draw against fourth seeds England, whilst the strong Australians were drawn against Pakistan.

New Zealand reached the final with victories over Egypt and England. Anchorman of the side was Stuart Davenport at No 2 who was unbeaten until the final. Ross Norman improved steadily as the Championship reached its final rounds especially with a confident win over England's experienced Gawain Briars.

In the final against Pakistan the top seeds New Zealand lost 3/0 but not before a magnificent match between Norman and the newly crowned World Champion Jansher Khan which went to 9/6 in the fifth and had the capacity crowd at London's Albert Hall giving the players a standing ovation.

Davenport could not establish himself against Jahangir Khan whilst Stephen Cunningham lost in three to Umar Hyatt Khan.

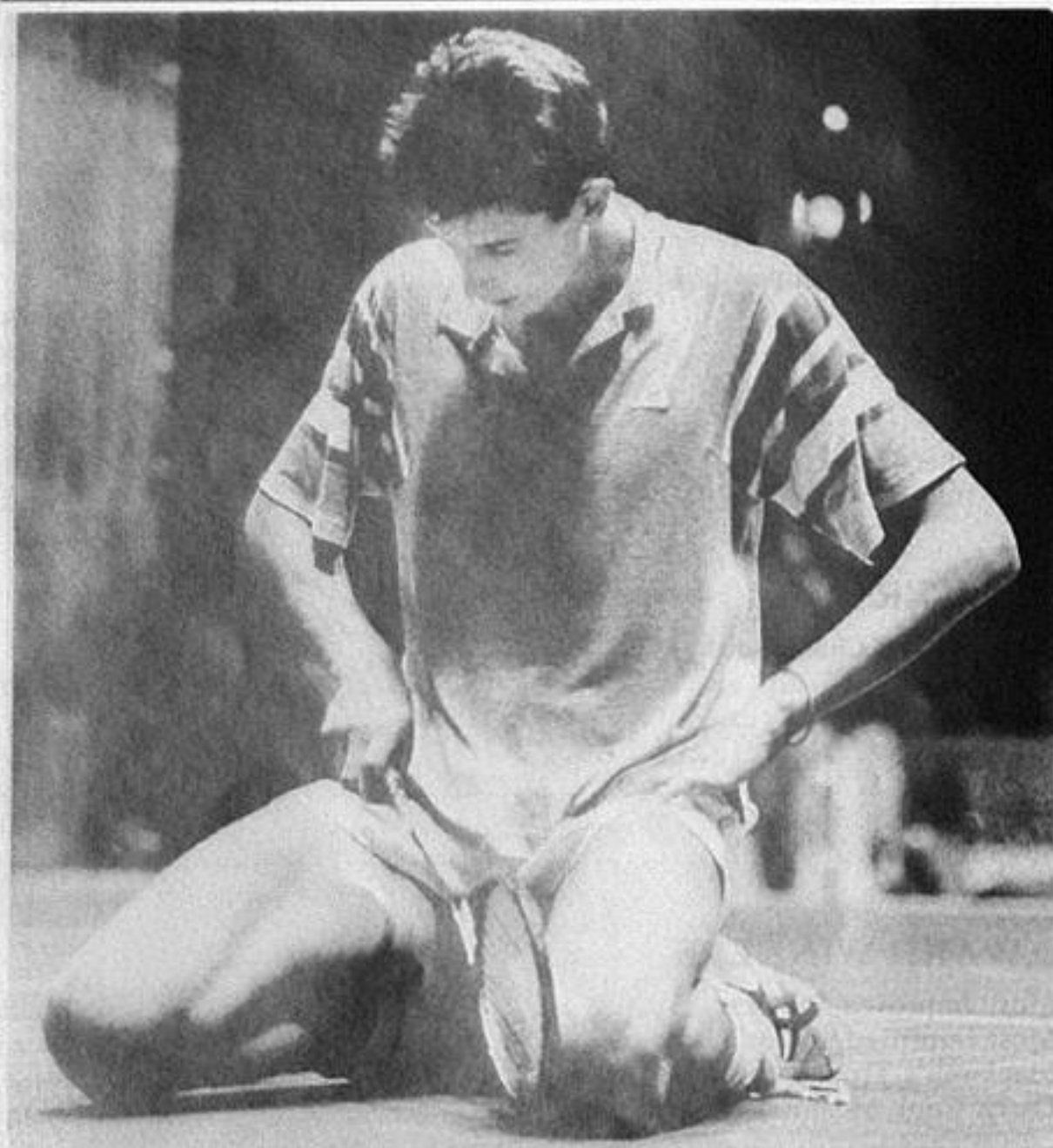
Second place is an extremely good result in light of the present strength of Pakistan with the present and past world champions Jansher and Jahangir. This result will guarantee New Zealand's second seeding at the next Championships in 1989 in Singapore.

New Zealand was managed by Don Cotter and coached by Dardir el Bakary.

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A NEW CONCEPT IN SQUASH

Auckland's Trevor Colyer is spearheading a new concept in the preparation of New Zealand's international junior squash teams for their bi-annual World Championships.

Colyer, a former national representative player and holder of a string of titles both here and overseas, is Coach of the 1988 Barclays Junior Men's World Championships Development Squad. His job is to prepare the squad over an 18 month period to maximum levels of fitness and skill to ensure the best possible result at the next Junior Men's World Championships which take place in Scotland in April 1988.

Colyer's six member squad consists of the country's top junior prospects for 1988. The players are Glen Wilson (Auckland), Tristan Franklin (Christchurch), Jason McLaughlan (Waimate), Paul Steel (Whakatane), Matthew Taylor (Edgecumbe), Andrew Clarke (Auckland).

Since its selection in November 1986 the squad has assembled regularly for three day training camps in Auckland. Between camps each player has had a strict training programme which he must follow. Colyer monitors progress constantly.

"International Junior Squash is now almost as professional as open competition," Colyer said. "To even stand a chance of holding our own we have to adopt professional long term training methods which up to this point have been quite unknown in New Zealand junior squash. In the past we would start preparing for a World Championship about 3 months beforehand".

"Our players require more discipline and must learn how to train consistently and efficiently. The Squad's workload is tough but I make no apologies for this — I'd rather that our players find it heavy going here, rather than on the court in Scotland" he said.

The decision to form the squad in 1986 for the Championships in 1988 came after a thorough review of the last NZ Junior team's performance at the 1986 World Championships in Brisbane, where it finished 8th, losing to newcomers to international competition such as Canada and West Germany.

"In Brisbane almost all the top teams were headed by a full time professional player despite it being a Junior event" Colyer said. "Behind these players were then two or three more who do little else than play squash. This forced

us to reassess our methods and planning for 1988".

This year the Squad faced a full programme. In addition to the Training Camps and individual programmes it met regularly at major tournaments for competitive experience. In October Colyer took the players to Australia for experience on the tough circuit there.

Such a programme is not cheap. All up the squad's activities in 1987 cost the NZSRA something in the region of \$24,000. A major form of assistance is Barclays New Zealand Ltd which as official squad sponsor provides funding

support. "Whilst costs are high we must accept that they have to be met if we want to be successful" Colyer added.

New Zealand is taking the 1988 Championships seriously. The players all know that if they lag behind they will be unceremoniously dumped from the squad. Even now they know that only four will travel to Scotland. Colyer has little time to pamper stragglers. "It's got to be tough," he said. "The days of it being fun to compete are gone. Either you are successful or you're nobody. In Scotland in 1988 New Zealand will not be a nobody".

HONDA CITY N.Z. OPEN

The 1987 Honda City New Zealand Open Championship set numerous new milestones in the twelve year history of the event.

A record of US\$35,000 player remuneration was achieved for the tournament comprising US\$25,000 in prizemoney and US\$10,000 in free hotel accommodation for the players.

As well for the first time the New Zealand event qualified as part of the world men's Grand Prix consisting of the world's richest tournaments.

Australia's brilliant Rodney Martin won the 1987 title with an enthralling five sets win over Stuart Davenport on the new clear vision court at the Wellington College Sports Stadium.

This was the first time that the Open has been played out of Auckland and is an indication of the flexibility which this amazing court allows.

The event, rated as an ISPA grade 7, attracted the largest overseas entry since the 1983 mens world championships in Auckland. New Zealanders who made it into the draw were Stuart Davenport, Rory Watt, Stephen Cunningham, Lance Cooper,

Danny McQueen, Robert Wyatt, Scott Harrison and John Mills.

The entry of Martin delighted the Media. Only weeks before had the young unassuming youngster from Brisbane proved his calibre beyond question with a five sets win over the seemingly invincible Jahangir Khan in the final of the New South Wales Open. New Zealander's now had the opportunity of seeing what this prodigy was like.

Another name in the draw which sparked wide interest was that of the legendry Geoff Hunt — now injury free and despite the ripe old age of 38 back on the comeback.

Although winning his first round Hunt unfortunately contracted bronchitis and was directed by his doctor to withdraw from competition.

A couple of other old friends lined up in the starting blocks. Australian Ross Thorne was back as was England's Bryan Beesin now appearing as the reigning English champion. The pair eventually met in the quarter finals with Beesin winning in a glorious display of squash after Thorne had fought himself to match ball and lost it.

A feature of the 1987 Open was the quality and depth of the young players competing. The England U23 squad was there with players such as Jason Nicolle, Paul Gregory, John Ransome, Robert Owen and Chris Walker.

Similarly the future of Australian squash turned up with Phillip Trueman, Austin Adaragga, Ricky Curtis and

Rodney Eyles. A sobering thought when one considers that these will be New Zealand's opponents in the years to come.

The opening rounds of the event were held at the well appointed Khandallah Club with play switching at the last 16 stage to the clear vision court at Wellington College.

Publicity and media coverage were excellent and the semifinals and finals were televised by TVNZ. Surprisingly however spectator attendances were less than expected for quarter finals and semi finals days. The finals night crowd was reasonable although more would have been pleasing.

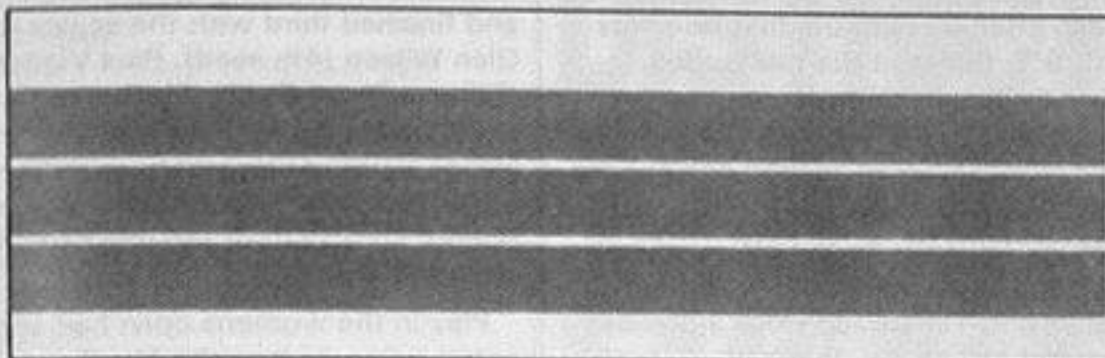
This may have been attributable to the early-week staging of the major matches in order to fit in with TV coverage requirements. As well squash in this new form is still in its infancy and a period of establishment is to be expected.

The 1987 New Zealand Open achieved a lot. It established New Zealand as an attractive destination for the touring professional players, with a well run, friendly tournament. This is to the credit of Tournament Director Roy Claridge and his team from the Wellington Squash Rackets Association.

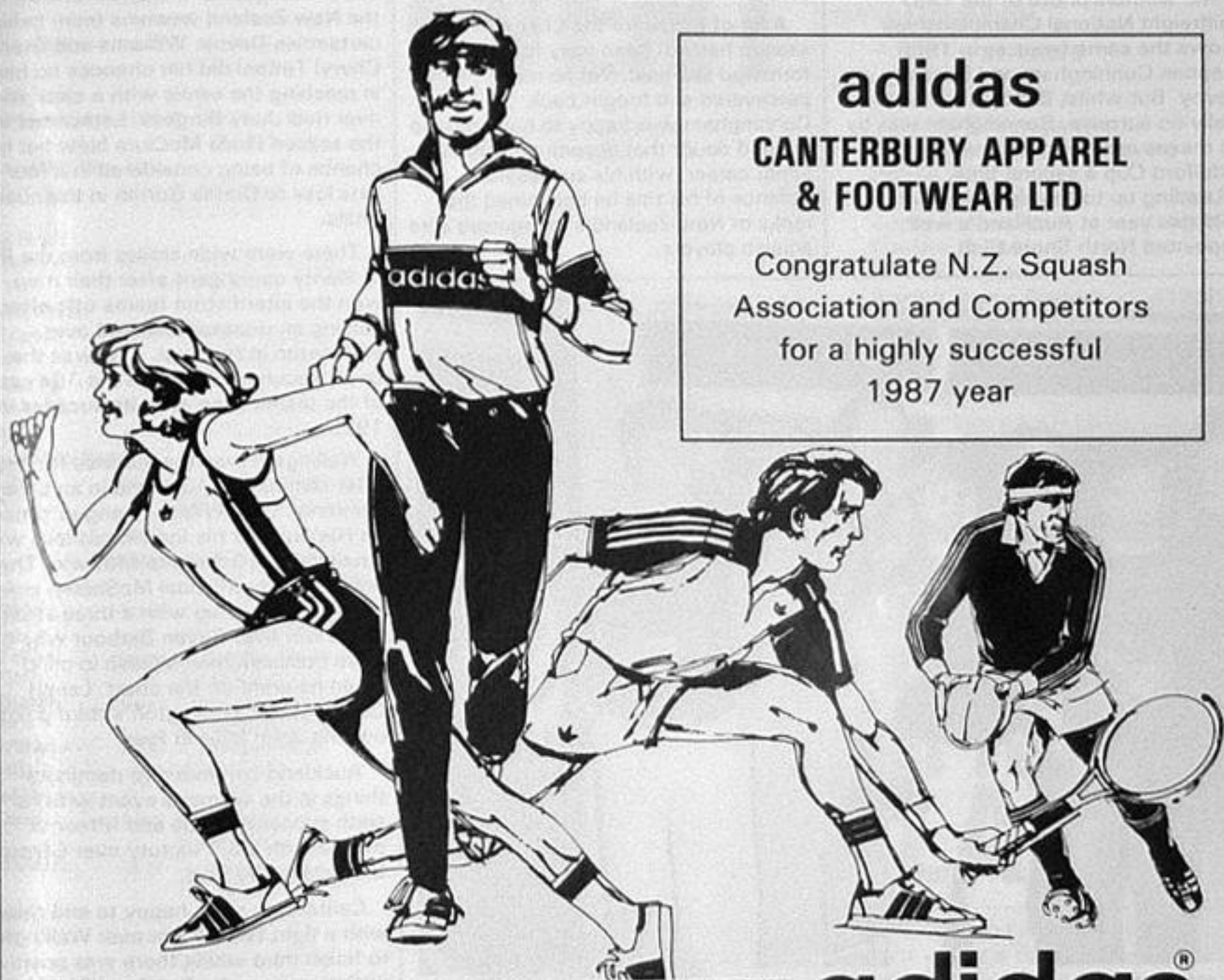

Competitors at the Honda City New Zealand Open in an informal pose.

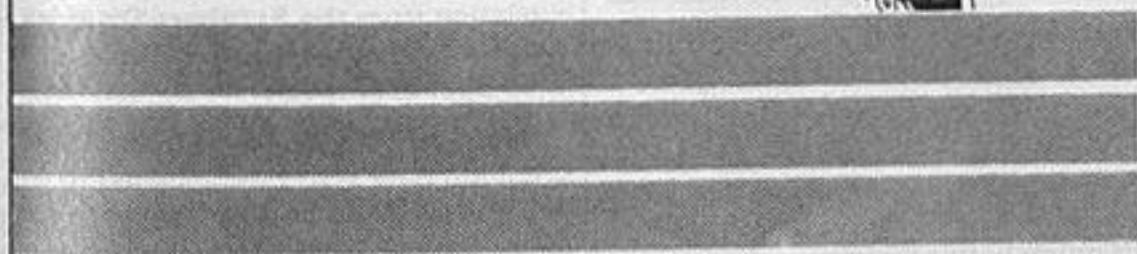


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RAILFREIGHT NATIONAL CHAMPS

1987 RAILFREIGHT NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS held at North Shore SRC August 7-15

The winners photo of the 1987 Railfreight National Championships shows the same faces as in 1986 — Stephen Cunningham and Susan Devoy. But whilst Devoy's win was really no surprise, Cunningham was by no means assured of his name on the Riddiford Cup a second time.

Leading up to the eight day event held this year at Auckland's well appointed North Shore Club

and a sojourn in Australia. As well he had developed his shot play introducing a new attack strategy which made frequent use of the volley boast, coupled with taking the ball early and using pace.

This notwithstanding the final was still a very close affair. Watt although not in peak form had the title within his grasp after winning the first two sets 9/0, 9/7. But then the tide turned, Cunningham became more assertive, Watt more hesitant and in the end there was no question as to who had got the better of the encounter.

Many felt sorry for Rory Watt. After losing to Cunningham 10/9 in the fifth last year in Timaru, so close again this year but still no joy. But such is sport.

A lot of praise for the Champion. This season had not been easy for him. His form had slumped. Yet he had persevered and fought back. Cunningham was happy to have proved beyond doubt that despite no illustrious junior career, with his successful defence of his title he had joined the ranks of New Zealand's recognised elite squash players.

and began to play more confidently. Yet the World Champions ability to play pressure points saved her in the critical fourth set at a time when the match was beginning to develop into an even affair. Devoy once again.

Auckland's Scott Harrison was pleased with himself after his Individual Championship. He started seeded 13th and finished third with the scalps of Glen Wilson (4th seed), Paul Viggers (5th seed) and Danny McQueen (3rd seed) under his belt. As well evergreen Neven Barbour showed he is still to be taken seriously by bundling 8th seeded Robbie Wyatt out of the tournament in straight sets.

Play in the womens open had another carrot riding on it — the fourth slot in the New Zealand womens team behind certainties Devoy, Williams and Gurran. Cheryl TeKani did her chances no harm in reaching the semis with a clear win over rival Judy Burgess. Latecomer in the season Linda McClure blew her last chance of being considered in a four sets loss to Donna Gurran in the quarter finals.

There were wide smiles from the Bay of Plenty contingent after their men won the interdistrict teams title after gaining an unassailable lead over Wellington in the final. This was the Bay's second only win in the 16 years of the teams even after its success in 1975.

Wellington was the surprise finalist after eliminating Auckland in an upset semifinal. Glen Wilson avenged himself on Harrison for his Individuals loss with a nail biting 10/9 in the fifth win. Then brilliant junior Michael McSherry wrapped things up with a three straight upset win over Neven Barbour who had more business than squash in mind when he went on the court. Lance Cooper made Wellington's third point beating John Mills in four.

Auckland continued to dominate things in the womens event with its sixth successive title and fifteenth overall with a 3/1 victory over Central Districts in the final.

Canterbury were happy to end things with a tight two all win over Wellington to finish third whilst there was positive jubilation from the Southern Districts players following their fifth placing — their best ever result.

The 1987 Nationals continued the tradition now firmly established of being that event at which every leading New Zealand District squash player can measure himself or herself up against his/her peers. The organisation and atmosphere at the North Shore Club were excellent with a tribute due to the fine work by Championships Director Barry Lydford and his team. Long let this continue.

Rory Watt had struggled to find form to no avail. So did Susan Devoy but with much better results.

Devoy beat Joanne Williams 10/8 in the fourth set to take her fifth national title and was relieved not to have had to play a fifth set. She failed to find her customary sharpness and found herself making far more errors than normal.

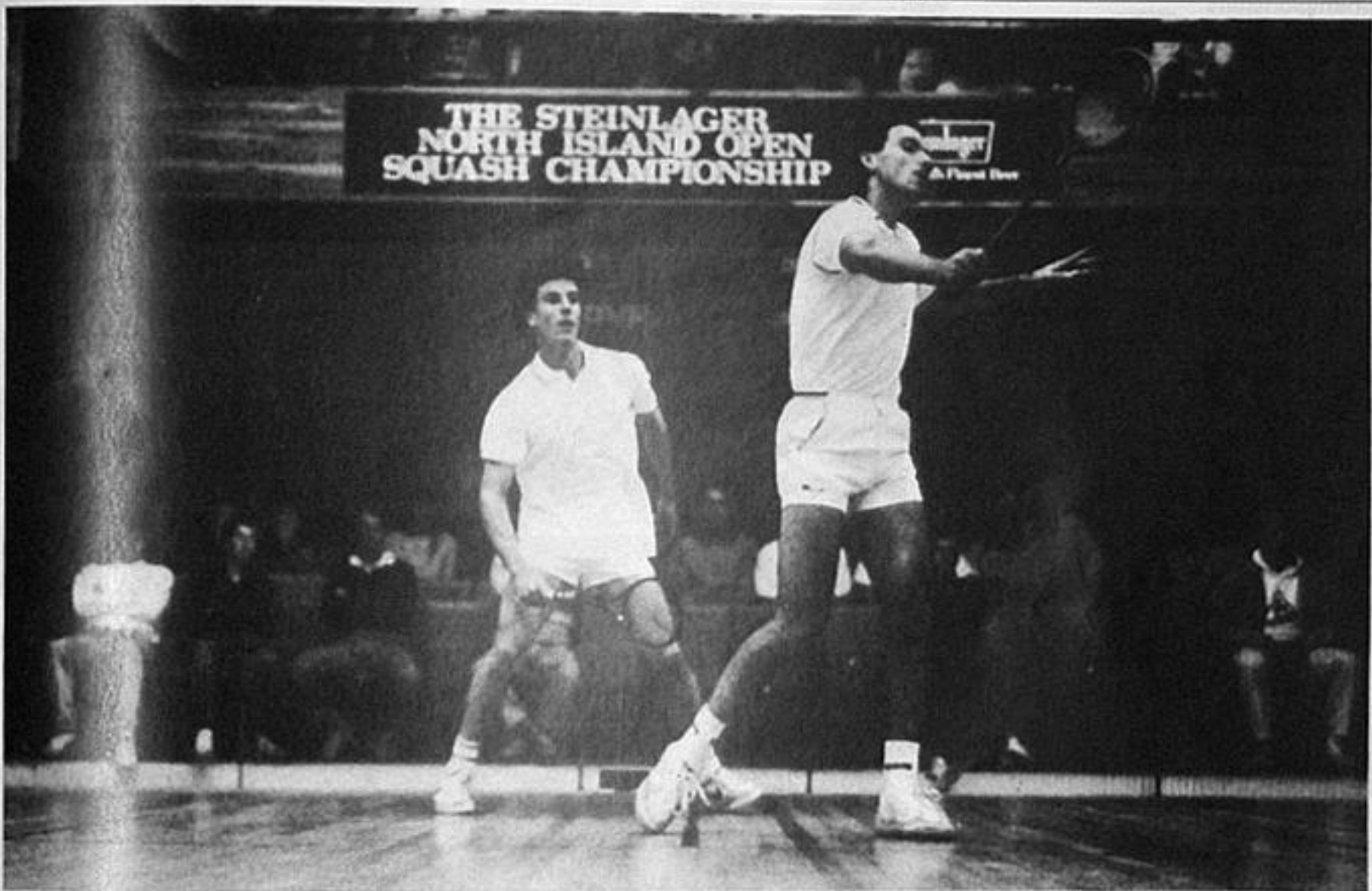

In addition players competing in seven or more events received a \$120 travel bonus.



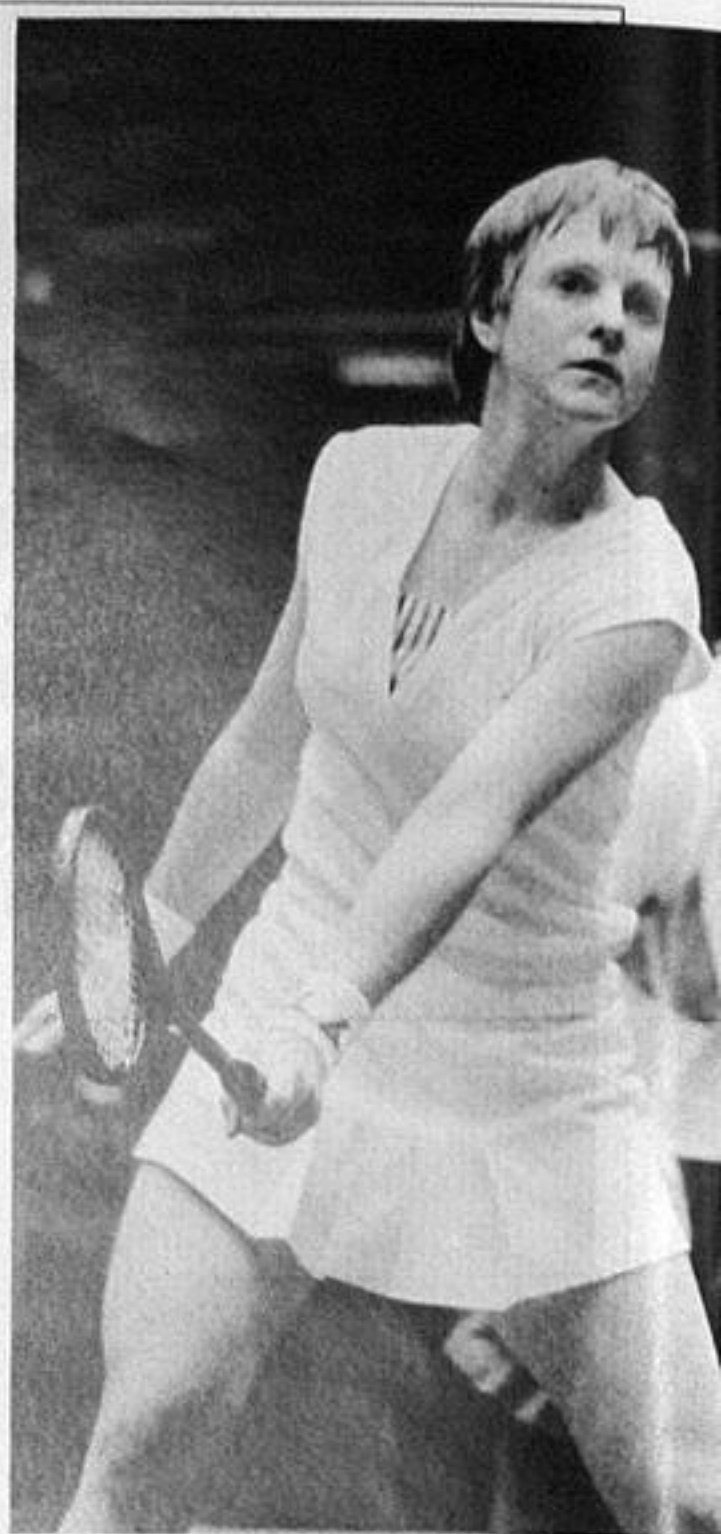
Danny McQueen (L) Winner of the 1987 Moro Series. Pictured vs Stephen Cunningham.

MASTERS SQUASH

This has been another busy year for the administrators of Masters Squash, highlighted by the visit of 37 Australians (27 players and 10 supporters) to contest the Annual Masters Trans-Tasman test series, and to take part in the Masters Championships and District teams events in New Plymouth on Labour Weekend.

This major internal tour has placed a considerable organisational and planning commitment on the members of the Masters Management Sub-Committee, and a tribute must be paid to the support, involvement and enthusiasm of its members. Gower Dallimore, Brian Miles, Phil Sim, Joan Terrell and our honorary secretary Jan Miles.

A special tribute must be paid to Brian Miles who masterminded an extremely successful Las Vegas fundraising evening in August which raised the incredible sum of \$6383.

This has been lodged with the N.Z.S.R.A. to be used for the future benefit of Masters Squash.

Our thanks are also due to Elaine Penney as the management representative on our committee, to Mike Greig for his interest and attendance at source of the meetings, and to Andrew Doig for his involvement as Masters Liaison Officer.

The concept of a separate Masters Administrative Committee is a new one and it has certainly resulted in better communications.

Minutes of the numerous committee meetings have been going out to the District Co-ordinators and they have been most appreciative of the increased flow of information.

Although the format has worked reasonably well and a lot has been achieved, there are certain areas of concern.

Most of these relate to the fact that Masters squash activities have evolved their own particular format which differs from some of the guidelines which have been formulated for mainstream squash activities.

There is a need for specific guidelines to cover all aspects of Masters activities and although we have gone a long way towards this in the course of our years activities, much still needs to be done.

It would also seem desirable for committee members to have specified functions with a brief form from the committee to carry out certain activities and report back on the results.

This would lead to greater satisfaction and effectiveness and would help to reduce the confusion which developed in some areas this year.

GUIDELINES FOR THE FUTURE:

N.Z.S.R.A. management will need to address itself to the formulation of recommended procedures for the future.

Confusion has arisen this year because some peripheral administrators have not known whether to deal directly with the N.Z.S.R.A. or with the Masters Sub-Committee.

The Masters committee would recommend that further consideration be given to increasing its scope of activity within the overall N.Z.S.R.A. framework.

Greater independence in the planning and financial areas would enable the committee to operate with more flexibility in response to the particular demands of Masters Squash.

TRAINING AND COACHING OF TEST TEAMS:

For better or for worse Masters squash is now just as serious as any other area of squash activity and in future more attention must be given to the preparation of test teams to do battle with the Australians.

Rivalry is as intense as it should be, and if New Zealand is going to hold its own there must be specific training and coaching programmes prepared and formulated from an early stage of each year.

To achieve the best results this would have to be a paid position unless some other incentive could be offered.

In conclusion chairing the Masters Sub-Committee has been an interesting and informative exercise from the point of view of human relationships, and hopefully I am a little wiser for the experience.

In this context I am reminded of my old friend Ron Ansell, who pioneered Masters Squash in Australia.

We were talking about the trials and tribulations of being an administrator and he remarked that in this area one should never be surprised when human beings act like human beings.



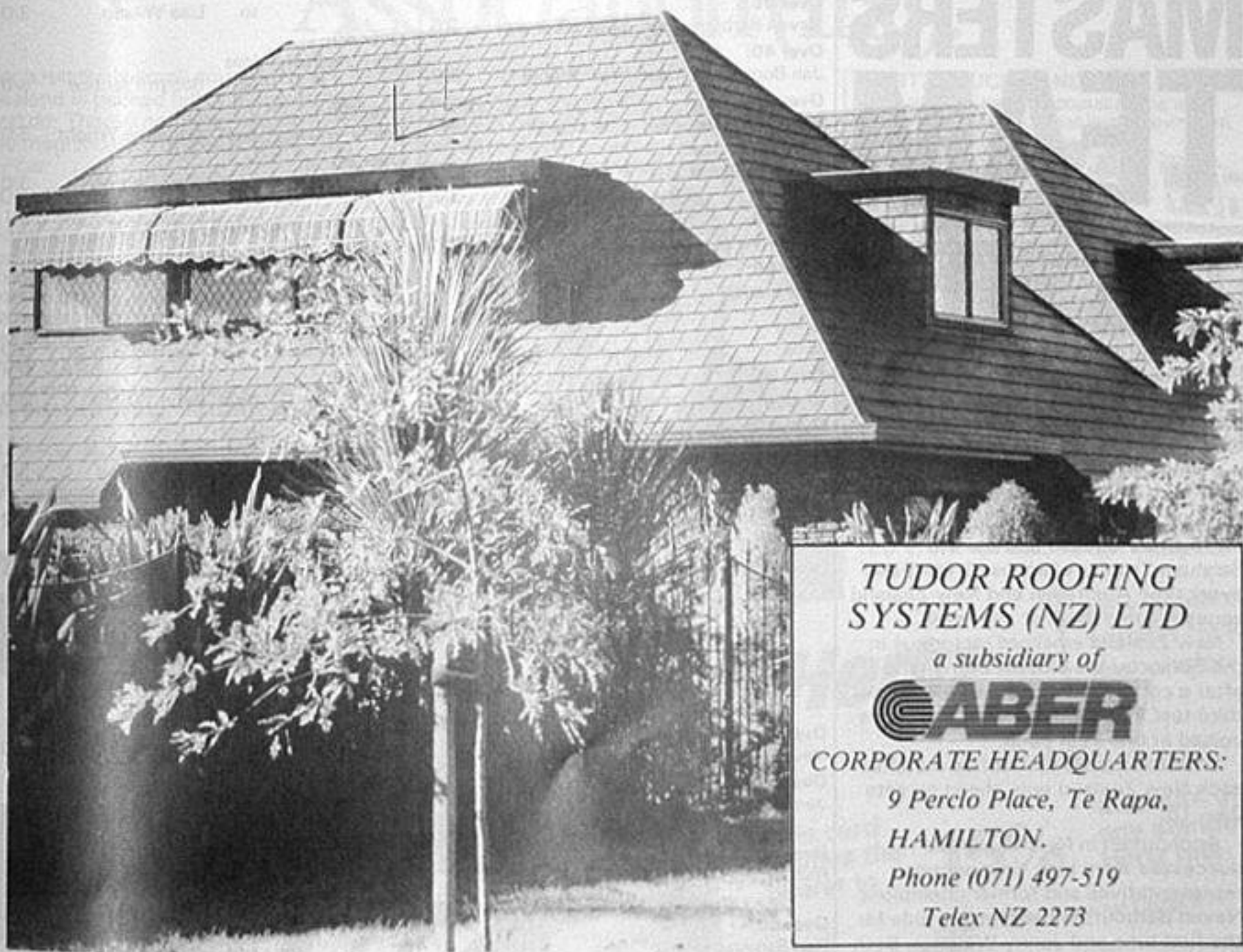

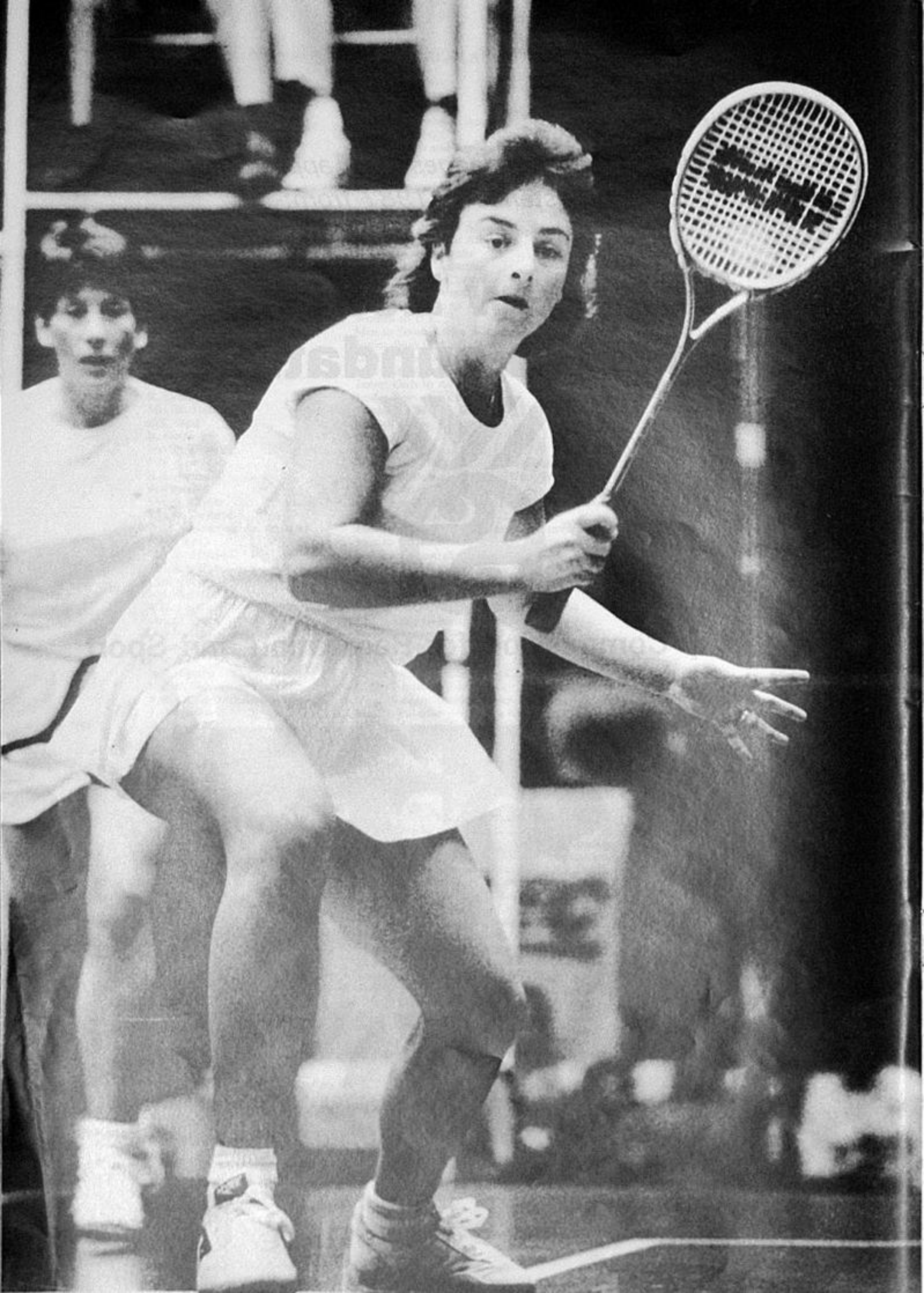

FINANCIAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 1987

INCOME AND EXPENDITURE

The net surplus of \$21156 compares with the initial forecasted surplus of \$1017. The final result of the year reflects the positive effect that sponsorship and N.Z. Sports Foundation Grants received have had against our major international events expenditure.

Unfortunately there has been another serious decrease in affiliation membership, resulting in a levy income decrease from budget of \$32500. Continuing increases in general administration, especially in areas of travel and meeting costs, postages and tolls, and Office Running Expenses, meant the Association could have been faced with serious forecasted financial expenditure reductions if the International Events costs had not received this timely Sponsorship and Grant input.

The major highlights in the annual results as against forecast are:

- (a) N.Z. Sports Foundation Grants towards International Players, and the Mens and Womens World Championships Teams, meant that much of the budgeted expenditure in these areas, both in the International Development Group and in the World Championship Team preparations, was effectively subsidised.
- (b) The Honda City N.Z. Open Sponsorship from the New Zealand Motor Corporation, and the input from the Clear-View Court operation, now means that the Association has not subsidised this event from its general operations.
- (c) The continued support from our Commercial Sponsors has meant all of our major events are able to be run financially attractive to players, and with less financial input from the Association.
- (d) Membership drop of over 3000 members has resulted in the affiliation levy decrease, and meant controls on budgeting expenditure were needed earlier in the year.
- (e) Office Operating Costs, including Salaries and Communication Costs, have increased in recognition of higher workloads, plus costs of meetings, travel, etc., have meant higher than forecasted costs in these areas.

(f) The slower than expected introduction of the "Club Coach" Scheme has meant the budgeted expenditure in this area has not occurred, plus good management in the Referees area has controlled internal travel costs well below forecast.

(g) No financial results of the Womens World Championships are reflected in these Accounts. Any costs incurred in relation to this Event are held in deferred expenses.

New Zealand Squash Centre

The New Zealand Squash Centre has produced a net surplus of \$114493, compared to the previous year of \$99256. Activity and Revenue increases, and well controlled budgeting, have meant this Centre is operating very effectively under the Management of Murray Mc Gaughran.

A \$30000 dividend was paid to the Association this year.

Capital Investment Fund

This fund stands at \$140000 at 30/9/87 after an injection of \$80000 from the N.Z. Squash Centre this year.

This fund is held for Club Loans, and to fund other investments of the Association. Its major use in the past year has been to fund our share of the Clear-View Court through Harvard Squash Vision Limited.

Harvard Squash Vision Limited

The Association's investment in this Company is recorded at the cost of its 50% share of the Company.

No financial results of this Company are reflected in these Accounts.

International Reserve Fund

The International Reserve Fund (detailed in Note of Accounts) has again received a substantial injection of funds from the Roy Mitchell Estate Trust - \$23217 (1985/86 \$23839). The 50c levy on members for the 1987 Womens World Championships

raised \$23879 (1985/86 \$24372), and both year's monies have been passed over to the controlling body for the Event.

This year \$35000 (1985/86 \$45000) has been transferred back from this fund against International Events and Tours.

Affiliation Levy

Management is very mindful of the continued fall in membership, and that a large Affiliation Fee increase may have an adverse effect on "social or uncompetitive" players who are vital to our sport, and who we wish to encourage back. This, plus acknowledgement of the "user-pays" principle, has lead Management to offering an either/or alternative affiliation structure to Districts for 1987/88.

Either: Decrease in general affiliation fee to a basic \$5.00, plus a "graded player" charge of \$10.00 for the applicable competitive players.

Or: \$2.50 affiliation fee increase for all Senior Members, and \$1.00 for all Junior Members.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 1987

From Murray J. McGaughran, Manager

The New Zealand Squash Centre has shown a very good result again, after having to spend quite a bit on a heavy maintenance programme during last summer.

COURT FEES

The use of the courts this year has shown a definite increase with some very full weekdays from mid-morning to late closing. This has happened in the latter six months of the financial year and especially since the increased exposure of the game of Squash with the use of the Clear View Court for the Challenge Series and the NZ Open in Wellington and the subsequent television coverage. Waiting lists continue to be long for peak times, with some respite available through the use of the two courts at the NZ Foundation for the Blind.

The new court fee structure this year was accepted without comment from patrons. A slight adjustment may still have to be made due to the expected increase in wages, although the reduced need for maintenance on the courts this summer make it possible to retain the same fees for another year. This would make the cost of a casual game of squash very reasonable compared to other indoor sports.

RACQUETS RESTAURANT

Racquets Restaurant has done very well this year, so much so that we were offered the contract to cater at the Victoria University Staff Club Cafeteria. After initial teething troubles things are going very well, with the end of year profit above

budget. Ms Nicki Dwyer continued to run a well organised restaurant through until her departure overseas at the beginning of June. Ms Christine Bray was Nicki's replacement and we have been very fortunate indeed to attract an excellent cook with many new ideas. The restaurant continues to be very well patronised at lunchtimes and could definitely do with some form of increase in size. Several ideas have been floated, regarding possible developments. Any action here obviously depends on the outcome of discussions with the Wellington City Council on our lease.

THE SQUASH SHOP

The Squash Shop continues to provide a steady income just above budget. This area can only improve with appropriate media advertising and an appropriately experienced salesperson/receptionist. Stock levels have decreased to a level which is more realistic in relation to the annual turnover, with a little further to go.

FUNCTIONS

Steady use has been made of the Centre for Social Functions/Squash evenings by Business Social and Sports Clubs again this year. When suppers or meals are included with their functions, it becomes quite lucrative for the Centre. Renovations and upgrading of the function room and the equipment therein has been delayed until the lease question has been settled. These renovations now however are becoming high priority to improve the surroundings and therefore to ensure continued use of

the facility.

GENERAL

The NZ Secondary Schools Teams Championships were once again held at the Centre and other courts around Wellington, with the finals here at the Centre. The finals were watched by Susan Devoy, who spoke to the players at the prize giving and presented the prizes. This was once again a great success with a high standard of play achieved by our up and coming squash players. The tournament was well organised by Tony Naughton and his helpers. Business House Squash was introduced on Friday nights from late July, to fill some gaps on courts on this night. After a slow start, enthusiasm is increasing, with the 'social' squash becoming a little more serious, but in general a great time being had by all.

Recently Louise Nelson, our main desk receptionist left, being replaced by Lisa Turner.

THE FUTURE

Apart from routine maintenance, any further development of the Centre depends on the outcome of the negotiations on the lease. There is the potential to do quite a bit more with the Centre, which can only be for the good and will improve the already good results being achieved.

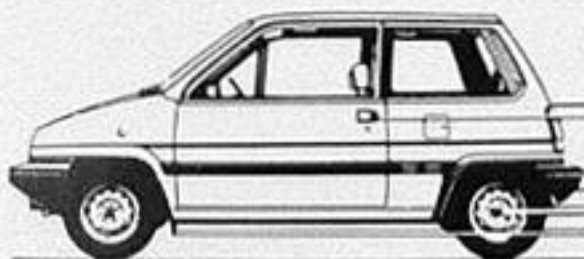


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
