Presidents Report



Our high profile in the New Zealand sporting scene was very evident through 1988 and we must continue to maintain and even build on this profile as we move towards our 50th Jubilee year 1989.

Our world champion, other world ranked players, and the high esteem with which the NZSRA is held in administering the sport, ensures we are a strong voice in the international scene.

Susan Devoy is squash to a lot of the public at large, and the whole of the New Zealand Squash fraternity must do everything practicable to enable Susan to remain at the top for as long as she wishes.

Congratulations on her feats for 1988 and all the best for the 1989 World Championships.

There is ever increasing pressures on players and administrators in our sport to continually perform at high levels. We must ensure that all is done to support players that give us the profile squash has. To this end it is becoming very evident that willing administrators are not as readily available as in past years. This is not only so at New Zealand level but continues down through Districts and Clubs. We must be very aware of the administrator "burn out".

Membership

It is difficult to put a reason on why our membership overall continues to fall. It is of grave concern.

Some statements have been made as to "what are New Zealand doing about it." We at the top level can only do so much and we are continually monitoring the situation. The grass root clubs must also play their part in firstly maintaining their membership and secondly, increasing it. The whole sport benefits from a healthy membership, not just the NZSRA coffers, as some of our critics think.

National Squash Week

The ultimate here would be to have a National Squash Week with every Club and District in the country participating. This would really establish a total public awareness. The spasmodic response over the last few years has brought increases in membership in some areas. I congratulate those that have worked hard and especially the Te Aroha Club in winning the Club of the Year award for their efforts during 1988 Squash Week.

A united front in 1989 could see Squash Week turn our membership movement around and head it back towards and even past that 50,000 mark.

Sponsorship

New Zealand Squash is indebted to our many sponsors, whose assistance is very much appreciated and valued, however big or small the contribution.

We continue to strive to give sponsors the rewards and returns they justly deserve, and will continue to encourage our sponsors to become involved in all aspects of our sport.

Our sincere thanks to those sponsors that leave us in 1988 after many years of support.

Domestic Playing Scene

The domestic playing scene is very strong, from the National Championships down to F grade teams events. With an increase of over 4000 competitive players on the Unisys National Grading List since the beginning of 1987, the scene is going from strength to strength. While this is not always evident in teams events, I feel that outside influences, like the financial situation have a big say in teams involvement. It is of concern that we have had a District default in the Junior Teams event. It is a sign that our playing scene is becoming the victim of the overall financial predicament.

International Scene

Highlights in the International arena have been Susan Devoy's success, Ross Normans fight to maintain his position in the top four, Joanne Williams' rise into the top 10, and the feats of our Junior Men in the World Championships.

We do not have the broad base of players that other countries have to support a strong international scene but at all times we must strive to utilize all our resources to continually perform creditably at international level.

This establishing of the NZ Squash Institute at the end of 1987 was a great step forward in support for our elite players. Now under the control of Rob Crothall, Institute Head and Technical Director, and a Directorate, the Institute is slowly gaining momentum. Considerable support from the commercial world will be the key to success of the Institute as we cannot hope to support this venture from general funds.

The 1988 NZ Open was the best supported event since the inception of this event in 1976. A truly magnificent entry in both the mens and womens fields.

Harvard Squash Vision

This is the company set up to promote and ensure the use of the clear view court. This court is our show piece and we must do everything in our power to ensure its use. To use this facility only once in New Zealand in 1988 is not giving us the return our investment warrants.

The cancellation of the series that was to be held in June was a devastating blow to Harvard Squash Vision and NZ Squash. Circumstances beyond the control of both parties dictated and we were left with nothing.

General Activities

Probably the best promotion the NZSRA currently has is the "Micro Court". The brain child of Butch Gifford and a band of Waikato supporters has given the "getting involved" area a great boost.

Support to have this area a full Kiwi Sport status must be encouraged. This can only be done by having courts throughout the country. This is where our future champions are going to come from.

The areas of Masters, Refereeing and Coaching continue to flourish and it is pleasing to see our referees recognised on the International scene.

Conclusions

We go forward to 1989 knowing that the public at large are well aware that there is a sport called squash rackets in New Zealand.

We must continue to set new goals and strive to achieve them for the betterment of our sport and wishes of our sponsors.

Robin Espie in his term as Executive Director did a tremendous job for squash out in the field. We thank him for this and wish him every success in the legal profession.

Thanks to all involved in NZ Squash for the support you have given to what has probably been an up and down year.

All squash players should be aware of our selling points and go out and use these to promote our sport.

We move towards our Jubilee year of 1989 knowing that we have a strong playing and administrative base. With three World Championships to contest, this could be our year.

Publicity and Promotion



In March 1988 "Squash Week" was again held in an effort to help clubs boost their membership.

This year the responsibility was on the districts to co-ordinate with their clubs. The districts that were enthusiastic and organised did benefit and it is clear that the concept behind Squash Week is sound and does work, providing clubs do participate. This year saw the added incentive of the "Club of the Year" competition. Every Club in New Zealand was eligible to enter and the contest was judged on the most activities carried out by that club over the period of Squash Week. The winner this year was Te Aroha, congratulations to them, their dossier showed they were extremely active over Squash Week and benefitted greatly. Timaru Club were highly commended for their efforts.

1989 will see the competition run again with the date for Squash Week being March 13-19.

There is no doubt that at this present time we have the best promotional avenue open to us at our finger tips, in Susan Devoy. Susan is truly a great ambassador for our sport. She attracts media coverage wherever she goes. Districts and Clubs should be going to great lengths to take advantage of the opportunity to promote their club whenever Susan is in town.

New Zealand is indebted to Susan for her willingness to spend time touring the country, playing the domestic circuit and carrying out promotional activities. Of course this year we had the added advantage of several overseas players competing on the domestic circuit, brought about by our registration to ISPA and WISPA.

Certainly the strength of the womens entries added excitement to the Moro Series and once again this provides an excellent avenue into promotion and publicity. The Media are there on hand ready to accept information. It is important that each District has a person responsible for promotion and publicity. Indeed two Districts, Auckland and sub-district Southland have taken a positive move and employed personnel to do this very job.

With our present economic climate it is no longer realistic to expect suitably qualified personnel to put in the considerable hours and expertise required on a voluntary basis.

Organisation is the key word, that means time. It is important to have a person dedicated to the role in order that sponsors, media and outside interested parties can relate to one person, that they are dealing on a one to one basis and not just dealing with a name of an organisation.

Finally many thanks to all those who gave their time freely to take on the task of promoting and publicising our sport in '88. Regardless of the influences that dictate economics in the future, Squash will always have a need for dedicated volunteers.

Special thanks to all media personnel, Radio, Newspapers and Television who presented our sport to the public.

International Events and Tours

The size of this sub-committee is justified by the tasks handled during the 1988 season. The formation of the New Zealand Squash Institute and the squad concept of our National Teams have been the major features of the year.

Many thanks to the President Alan Watton for his presence at all meetings held during the year especially when I as Convenor was a tyro on this important committee.

International Players

Susan Devoy continues to keep New Zealand Squash at a very high profile with her winning of the World Crown in Auckland late last year and made the British Open hers once again in 1988. The respect the other top women players have for her was endorsed by their presence in New Zealand often for many weeks by some of them during the 1988 season.

Ross Norman continues to hold a high position in the Mens world rankings and currently holds fourth position. The retirement of Stuart Davenport following the last Mens World Championships has left a void that will be hard to fill although Rory Watt (32) and Stephen Cunningham (50) have advanced up the ranking during the year. Glen Wilson particularly in the latter part of the domestic season has shown that he also has made rapid improvement in 1988.

Joanne Williams has advanced to a ranking of (9) in the world and had some very good wins during the year.

Although bouyed by Susan Devoy's magnificent win in the Individual Event the Teams Event was somewhat an anti climax and Susan found the going particularly tough after the mental and physical effort required to secure the Individual Title at the start of the Championships. The Womens Team finished a disappointing third in the Teams Event.

Congratulations to Susie Simcock the Championship Director and her Committee for the successful running of these Championships.

Jane Weir has been appointed Senior Womens 1989 World Championships Squad Manager.

1988 Barclays Junior Mens World Championship Team

Ranked eighth, this team vindicated the pre Championship preparation carried out at All Season Squash Centre to finally finish in fourth position. This teams preparation was a forerunner to the planned preparation of all our Championship Squads and the result augers well for the continuation of this programme.

Many thanks to the Manager, Trevor Colyer, and all the many others who helped prepare this team. The high standard of fitness achieved drew wide comment from other nations competing in Scotland. Trevor Colyer has been reappointed Squad Manager to prepare the 1990 Championship Squad.

1989 Moro Junior Womens World Championships

After much haggling over dates these Championships are to be held in Hamilton from the 28th of August to the 9th of September 1989. Lois Smith has been appointed Championship Director and she has assembled a Championship Committee with a wealth of experience in running such an event.

Aileen Somervell has been appointed Junior Womens Squad Manager and has been working with her Squad throughout the 1988 season. A South Island tour was undertaken during this time and the buildup for the Championships next year will gather momentum over the summer months.

Senior Mens World Championship Squad

Neven Barbour has been appointed Squad Manager to prepare the team for the World Championships in Singapore and Malaysia in October 1989.

Our men finished in second position at the last World Championships but the retirement of Stuart Davenport will leave a void that will be hard to fill, but Rory Watt, Stephen Cunningham and Glen Wilson are all capable of considerable improvement over the next year and along with Ross Norman will provide a firm base to select our team from.

Our thanks go to Don Cotter who has guided our Senior Mens Team through the last two World Championships and set a high standard for those following in his footsteps.

Masters Squash

This is a real growth area in New Zealand squash and has been recognised by Management by the calling for nominations of a Director of Masters Squash who will attend Management meetings to report on Masters matters.

Another Test Series with Australia has been undertaken under the Management of Gower Dallimore. The team unfortunately lost the Series 2/1 but once again they were closely fought encounters and the Aussies managed to triumph at home. No doubt next years series will bring forth the same dedicated commitment from the New Zealand team.

Honda NZ Open

This event attracted the best fields both men and women ever to play in New Zealand except for a World Championship event.

Congratulations to Tournament Director Don Cotter and his team for their effort in making the tournament the success it was.

Moro Series

For the first time ever the Circuit was registered with both ISPA and WISPA as tournament carrying points for world rankings. This was particularly successful as far as the women were concerned and to a lesser degree with the mens events.

The decision has been made to register the womens events with WISPA for the 1989 season but to not register the mens events as it could preclude our top players from the Series and they have indicated their intention to play more tournaments in the 1989 season.

NZ Squash Institute

The major task of the year has been the setting up of the administrative and financial structure to get the NZ Squash Institute up and running.

Five Directors, headed by Rob Crothall, have been appointed to formulate policy and criteria for player participation at the Institute.

Already much work has been done and rapid progress has been achieved during the 1988 season.

NZ Sports Foundation

Once again we must acknowledge the tremendous support given to our players and teams by this organisation.

Without this support our International programme would be in disarray and we would not enjoy the high profile we currently hold.

Conclusion

My thanks to all those who have helped me during the 1988 season. As a greenhorn to the International Events and Tours Committee I have had to rely on substantial input from many others from all facets of squash. Your contributions have made the task at hand much more enjoyable and meaningful.

National Events

The 1988 National Events Committee continued with past policies of reviewing the timing and conditions applicable to all National Events conducted throughout the year.

The success of these tournaments is dependent on competent clubs willing to host these events. To those Clubs who have been involved in the running of events — our sincere thanks.

The presence of the Players Representative John Oakley at our meetings proved invaluable on many occasions. Our thanks to John for his time and efforts.

To summarise the season, the Mana Club ran a very successful Under 23 Championships. The 1989 event has been allocated to the Tokoroa Club who hosted the event in 1986/87.

The Cousins Shield/Mitchell Cup event was run by the Hawkes Bay Squash Club and again proved to be very popular. The revamp of the rules regarding player eligibility seemed to receive general acceptance. Although some concern was expressed over the position of overseas players.

Next years event will be hosted by Geysers City.

The Moro Series was probably the most successful yet. With several overseas players participating most tournaments received widespread publicity. There was some slight adjustment to the points system this year which proved to be satisfactory.

It is planned to reduce the 1989 Series to 10 tournaments. Initially this was to be done by the deletion of the North and South Island Championships but with the withdrawal of Northland from the Series it has been decided that the North Island Championships should be reinstated as a separate event.

Palmerston North hosted the Railfreight National Championship and our thanks must go to the Club for their efficient handling of this event. The 1989 event will be hosted by the Christchurch Squash Club.

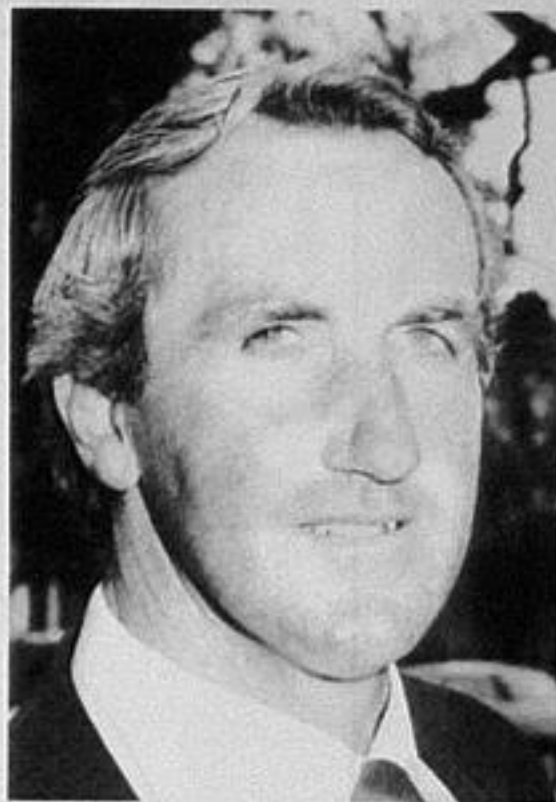
The National Graded Teams Event continues to thrive and is probably the highlight of the year for the average club player. The number of teams participating was slightly down on last year but was still most satisfactory taking into account all relevant factors. One area of concern continues to be the large numbers of applications for players to be added to the June Grading List for the Team Event.

All applications were resolved one way or another after referral to the relevant District Statistician.

The Hertz N.Z. Masters Event is being hosted by the North Shore Club in Auckland. A record 310 entries have been received.

Next years event has been tentatively allocated to Ashburton.

The Tournament Schedule had been revised with most District Championships now being played over successive weekends.



With the Junior Womens World Championships being played in late August early September — the Nationals have had to be slotted in Mid September.

Finally I would like to thank all members of the National Events Committee who have assisted throughout the year.

Coaching Convenors Report



It had been apparent for some time that the logical development of coaching in New Zealand should be the formation of a New Zealand Institute of Sport, which has in fact been established this year.

The emphasis of the Coaching has now changed with the responsibility of the development squads transferred to the International Events Committee and the Institute leaving the main role of this committee to develop and extend the coaching scheme from Club level through to the point where the Institute would take over. The role of National Director has been strengthened by the appointment of Debra Rodgerson in a secretarial aid role with one of her main responsibilities being newsletters and the flow of information to the Districts. This had been very successful and communication has improved accordingly. However communication is a two way thing and Debra is very receptive to any news, suggestions or criticisms that could be put in her newsletters. It was necessary to start the year with a positive programme of training seminars, newsletters and coaching aids and this was achieved. The meeting of Coaching Directors at the AGM followed by a seminar in February gave the right direction for the year with the supply of coaching material giving the necessary backup.

Examination papers have been updated and rewritten. Badges are available for successful coaches. The number of people now sitting the exams is very encouraging.

The Coaching Scheme has worked well in most Districts though with disappointingly negative results in both Midlands and Southern. Where Districts have shown enthusiasm progress has been made particularly with the smaller clubs.

With the unavailability of Dardir this year a District Exchange Scheme was set up, with organised coaching courses structured for each District's needs set up with Coaches attending from neighbouring Districts.

A Senior Coaching Course for invited senior coaches will be held early in 1989.

The most exciting development this year has been the promotion of squash in schools through the developing of the Micro court by Butch Gifford. With the backing of Kiwi Sport we need only now to find a sponsor to make this project a reality throughout New Zealand. An exciting concept!

With Sports psychology becoming an important part of coaching I leave you with the following quotation from 'Sports Coach'. "... awareness, answering and action - are skills to learn. If players can become aware of negative thoughts, can answer them with more realistic and adaptive views, and then take action to break out of what are really self imposed dilemmas. They gain control and learn skills that lead to effective self-motivation ... positive thought patterns, improved attitude, self motivation ... extends the potential of the player."

Selectorial



This year's Selectorial band consisted of two members from last year and Mr Barry Gardiner from Christchurch, who became the new boy in the team.

At the beginning of the tournament season we had planned our workload for the year and with the number of overseas players playing in the Moro Series this year it was important that the Selectors watched our New Zealand players fronting up against some of the best players from around the world. To this end we planned and attended nearly all of the Moro Series.

The Moro Series as it stands at present is a great series for N.Z. players and is of more benefit to the women players, who are able to achieve W.I.S.P.A. points, but unfortunately the I.S.P.A. rules for the men are different, which once the players have reached a good ranking in the world, actually finish up losing points by playing in our Moro Series.

I hope that this situation will be tidied up before the 1989 Moro Series starts.

We are very fortunate indeed to have playing in N.Z. right through the Moro Series, our World Champion Susan Devoy. I am sure that if Susan didn't play our N.Z. circuit we would not attract the number of overseas players to the country that we have done this past season. The N.Z.S.R.A. are deeply indebted to Susan for her contribution to squash.

Joanne Williams also showed some of the form that she is capable of and should finish with a very good world ranking.

Ross Norman has had quite a hard year on the World Circuit but his desire to remain competitive has kept him right at the top of world squash.

We were extremely pleased to see Stephen Cunningham come home and play in the Moro Series and the Railfreight Systems Nationals, and whilst congratulations must go to Stephen, it is also pleasing from a selectorial viewpoint to see the improvement in Glen Wilson.

One of the greatest disappointments that we have had during the year has been the performance of some of our younger and perhaps more talented players who, despite being given every opportunity by us, have failed to grasp that opportunity and it would appear that it matters little how many opportunities you give them, they only abuse them. These players could not realistically expect to receive too many favours in future years.

The development over this past year of a Squash Institute, and a tidying up of some of the areas left over as it were, from the I.D.G. and Coaching is a very forward thinking step. It would be hoped, that the more professional approach given by the Institute will rub off on our players, and hopefully inspire our younger players to better and greater heights.

The most contentious issue during the year was the announcement of Liz Irving in the 1989 Womens squad and her inclusion in this squad was not something that was done without a lot of thought. At the time of writing this report her availability to play for N.Z. has not been decided. If her final choice is to play for Australia and not N.Z. and she finds herself as she did last year, sidelined, then SQUASH will be the loser.

The most improved players this year were Paul Steel (Bay of Plenty) and Charmian Hayes (Auckland). Their steady improvement over the year warranted their selection.

Finally I would like to thank Trevor Colyer and Barry Gardiner for their support and co-operation during the year. Each one of us has our own thoughts and opinions and I believe that the many hours of healthy discussion we seem to always have when we are together, has bought about measures that may well have far reaching effects on the policies of the N.Z.S.R.A.

Report on Micro Court Project

N.Z.S.R.A.

The manufacture and establishment of Micro Court, rackets, balls etc started almost twelve months ago and a lot of experimentation was done to ensure the size of the court, the length of the rackets and the density of the ball was correct, to make the game successful.

A very important aspect of the design was safety. The rackets had to be designed or of such a design that they would not take off childrens knee caps etc, but rather just fall to pieces when struck against something solid. The court itself had to withstand not only the children crashing into the sides of it, but also many buildings and many takedowns, without it losing any strength.

The whole idea behind the micro court has been to introduce to children the correct grip and the basic fundamentals of the game, so that in later years they will be able, or more capable, of striking the squash ball correctly, and enjoying the game of squash.

The spin offs that we at first though may take place, were simply that children may wish to become junior members of a local squash club. The fact that we seemed to overlook was that when the children become interested in squash, they bring down their parents to the Squash Club and the Club finishes up with new senior members.

As well we have school teachers who have never been able to hit a squash ball but have been successful on the micro court, and have joined a local Club. They find with a little bit of practice, and that there are available to them, smaller rackets, and faster balls which makes them successful at hitting the ball rather the feeling of uselessness people get when they take a full size racket, an extra super slow ball and the rallies only last one serve, one hit and thats it.

Everywhere the court has been it has attracted attention. Once it has been in a school for longer than a day you will find it is being utilised for every spare minute that the door is open to allow either the children or the teachers access to the court.

At the time of writing this report well over 2000 children have had an introduction to the game of squash.

The pilot project that was run in the Waikato in conjunction with Kiwi Sport has proved to be enormously successful. The Kiwi Sport co-ordinator for the Waikato District has been absolutely flooded with requests for the court and from about the 1st October has had to turn down all further requests as there are no weeks left in the schedule until the end of this year. The first term of 1989 is already fully booked. John Shuttleworth, Manager for Sport on the Hillary Commission, is adamant that this project must go N.Z. wide and become a full time Kiwi Sport. He himself has had games on the court and is very impressed with the amount of fun and skill that can be obtained by the use of this court. At this stage we are not sure how much money is available from the Hillary Commission for this project, but an application was lodged some months ago and we await the outcome with interest. We had hoped that a nationwide sponsor would have been obtainable, but so far this has not been the case.

A proposal for sponsorship has been done in the Waikato, but this sponsorship would only be for the Hamilton Education Board area in conjunction with the Waikato Sports Foundation and Kiwi Sport.

It may be that each District may have to combine with their local Sports Foundation and tie up a sponsorship in that way. The Hillary Commission will be announcing thirteen Sports Foundation throughout N.Z. and there will be overlaps in quite a few districts.

The benefits to our sport from this project I think are many and varied. You have to see the children using the court to fully appreciate its full worth. It may well be that the benefits to squash take some years to come to fruition, but they most certainly will.



Refereeing



This has been another busy year for referees. National referees to qualify include Hugh Leabourn and Laurie MacPherson (Auckland), Alan Hartley (New Plymouth), Grant Stone (Wellington), Barry McLauchlan (Midlands), Fred Williams and Wayne Smith (Christchurch).

Each year there is always a number of qualified referees who choose to go on the inactive list so it is encouraging that there has been a steady supply of new candidates coming forward. Despite encouragement however one area of concern is the relative lack of women prepared to become qualified as referees. This will continue to be an area of emphasis for the Refereeing Committee, particularly in view of the World Junior Womens Championships being in Hamilton next year.

Following the Womens World Championships last year Peter Highsted and Chas Evans were confirmed as International Referees. Outside the U.K. New Zealand now has more internationally qualified referees than any other country.

Achieving more accuracy in using the correct markers calls has been an area of continuing emphasis this year. At national level there has been a marked improvement but more work remains to be done at club and district level.

One of the problem areas at national events this year has been player reaction to the NZSRA dress standards. With sponsorship becoming essential to many of our top players in particular, many are under increasing pressure to wear clothing which does not meet the current dress code. While tournament referees are always appointed at national events and are responsible for maintaining the NZSRA dress standards, there would be less confusion for players if at district and club level tournaments the same dress standards were insisted upon.

Recent media publicity has highlighted the problem of misbehaviour on court and in particular the use of offensive language. Referees will need to take a harder line on this and have received endorsement from the players meeting at the National Championships to do so.

At this years AGM of the ISRF the following rule changes were approved and are to become operative from 1 May 1989:

1. One serve rule
2. 90 seconds interval between games
3. Elimination of provision for separate warm up
4. Deletion of reference to one metre of side wall
5. Deletion of reference to ball having to hit the side wall for it to constitute 'turning'.
6. Players are not permitted to request a change of marker or referee.

The NZSRA supported all rule changes with the exception of players no longer being able to request a change of officials. The tournament referee now has the sole right to replace either marker or referee before or after the commencement of the match.

A change to the accreditation of International Referees has also been made. Instead of being examined by ISRF assessors, feedback on referees will form a major part of the assessment procedure and will be considered annually by a Review Committee.

The Derek Cook Memorial Trophy was awarded this year to the writer.

The coming year promises to be an equally busy one with revisions of the rules booklet and examination papers being required, and with preparation of referees for the World Junior Championships.

I would like to acknowledge the support of the refereeing committee of Chas Evans, Gary Hutchison and Nichol Taylor, the District Directors and those who have acted as tournament referees.

Anne Murphy has again been of invaluable assistance and I would like to record also my appreciation of the support provided by Robin Espie, and more recently David Moore.

Womens Statisiticians Report

The 1988 year has been a year when all competitive players have had to be more realistic with their gradings. This year has produced more results than was envisaged — in fact the present computer can't cope with the amount of results which shows that most Statisticians are doing their job extremely well.

The grading list is one area in New Zealand Squash in which all competitive players are affected and to this end I believe having it computerised has been a forward step by Districts supporting it. I would like to thank those District Statisticians and Club Statisticians who have put the extra effort in ensuring that the system is given a fair go.

We are very fortunate in having Charmian Hayes being able to be employed after Kaye shifted North. Charmian has a special interest in the computer system and being a top competitive squash player she sees things from a players point of view as well as the computer side. She has also been able to train other people on which she can call on to input results which makes the system not entirely reliant on one person.

Whilst the system will only be 100% proof with 100% results put in it seems that we are well on the way to this end. It is very pleasing to see much more movement in grades than before (both up and down) and this is a healthy situation. There will always be anomalies to any system and the Computer Grading Committee are very aware of these and are working to rectify them.

Juniors are an area of my concern, and statisticians must be aware of this group, especially when putting them on the list — not everyone starts the grading list in F2. Any rapidly improving junior must be kept closely watched and manually adjusted to keep in line with their improvement, and it is very pleasing to see the younger women starting to emerge in A2.

I believe that it is only now that we are beginning to have a more meaningful and realistic grading list based on results — not peoples own assessments — and as time progresses I would hope that any refinements to the system are made quickly and met positively by all concerned.

Computer Grading

It is now two years from when the decision was made to fully computerise our National Grading system. While there has been many problems along the way, the current committee are working hard to right all the areas of concern and produce the ultimate grading list. The August last list went a long way towards this and did indicate that computer gradings were moving players both up and down the list, at last.

Last years report stated that problems were being caused by the hold up of results by Districts but this was being ironed out. I am afraid this is not the case, and while some Districts are very good and keep up to date, some show almost a complete lack of responsibility in this area. We cannot have a true list unless we have complete results.

Charmian Hayes, in each instance she has produced a list in the last twelve months, has included all results to hand. This is estimated to be only 75% of actual results that should have been in. As far as players are concerned, results from a National Event has no more importance than an F Grade tournament result. The committee agree with this.

Our sponsored computer from UNISYS, is now proving to be completely inadequate to handle the job of computer grading. Discussions are currently being held with UNISYS and it is hoped a new machine will be available in the not too distant future.

It would seem that some Districts are considering withdrawing from the computer grading system on the basis of cost and the service being given. I think all Districts and Clubs should have a long hard think about this. Everyone is very ready to blame the computer system, but how can players be given satisfaction when their results are just not being input. Money is being paid for only a three quarter effort. The committee cannot go out and physically make statisticians send in results or ensure that players use correct codes and write legibly. (One tournament had 50% errors on codes and legibility). The committee want to see computer gradings succeed in 1989.

I.S.R.F. Report

The 21st Annual General Meeting of the International Squash Rackets Federation was held in Brisbane on 15 September 1988 and was attended by 21 member countries. The two days prior to the Annual General Meeting were again set aside as seminar days in which a range of topical subjects were openly discussed and helped in defusing the heat from several Annual General Meeting motions.

The following were the main decisions reached at the Annual General Meeting:-

Juniors:

- Age limit reverting back to Under 19 with effect from 1/1/89
- Junior World Championships to be held during 1 July-30 September period
- A junior competitor must qualify on the last day of the event
- No change to be made to either age limit or dates for 4 years from 1/1/89

Rules:

New Rules Rewrite to become effective on 1/5/89 includes the following changes:

- One serve rule with the cut-line in play
- 90 second interval between all games
- Elimination of provision for players to change referee during a match
- Deletion of reference to 1 metre of side wall
- Deletion of reference to ball having to hit side wall for it to be turning

Referees:

International Referee programme for the next 8 years, incorporating player feedback on referees adopted.

ISRF Panel Tutor Programme also adopted.

Masters:

Official recognition given to World Masters by staging a World Masters Individual Championship event and International Teams event in 1990 for Men and Women. This was our remit and as agreed the event will take place in either Australia or New Zealand and would be organised by an International Masters Committee comprising Australian and NZ personnel.

South Africa:

Motion to ban South Africa from being a member of the ISRF defeated.

Experimental Rules:

Experimental rules were authorised for nominated events on the ISPA World Calendar of events for 1989. Formal report on these rules to be presented to 1989 ISRF AGM. The changes are:

- Tin shall be reduced in height from 19 inches to 17 inches
- There shall be a 2 minute rest between all games
- Point-a rally scoring (Note naming, as decided to get away from use of term American scoring)

Membership Fees:

ISRF fees for 1989 to remain same as those set in 1988.

World Team Championship Rules:

New set of rules approved. Basic change is that top 12 teams from previous teams championships will be placed in 2 top pools and rest go into 2 bottom pools. Those teams in top four finishing positions in top pools to arrive at positions 9-16 etc. This ensures the ties throughout are better matched and it gives the opportunity to progress from the bottom to the top pools.

Event Naming:

Member nations can only use word 'World' for events which have been given the rights to a world title by the ISRF.



Rights Fees:

From 1992, for ISRF World Championships a rights fee of £1,000 for seniors and £500 for junior events to be charged.

Anti Doping:

Set of rules and regulations approved.

Election of Principal Officers:

Biennial elections to take place instead of annual. The principal officers shall not serve in the same office for more than 2 terms in succession.

Medical Committee:

ISRF to set up committee to advise on medical and psychological matters.

World Championship Calendar:

1990 Junior Boys event to be held in Dusseldorf, Germany.

Tendering documentation for 1992 events being sent out.

The International Squash Rackets Federation now has a membership of 65 countries, and it is hoped that Eastern Europe will soon come into the fold with squash having recently been introduced into that region the ISRF is presently pushing for exhibition status for squash at the Olympics at Barcelona in 1992 and if granted full participation for the 1996 Olympics, which would give tremendous exposure to squash.

The meeting was more constructive than the previous year's one and all member countries are now prepared to accept decisions which may not suit their own country, but overall are the most suitable for squash as a global game.

It was good having Susie Simcock (Womens Committee), John Haines (Referees Committee) and Murray Day (ISRF guest) in attendance at the meeting and their support was appreciated.

Players Representative

We have witnessed a most successful Moro Tournament Series this season after a large number of overseas players have competed throughout and media coverage has been at an all time high. By virtue of our top organisation, good prize-money levels and high standard of play we have achieved the best domestic tournament circuit in the world — a credit to all involved.

It is anticipated that we will see a further strengthening in the womens circuit next year with even more overseas players chasing WISPA points while we also hope to attract more foreign men by withdrawing the Moro circuit from ISPA. It is felt that while ISPA registration has helped this year in projecting the likes of Glen Wilson well into the worlds top 100, continuation next year may be detrimental to the ranking of not only Glen but also our top 3 professionals. It is a situation that needs to be reviewed every 12 months to ensure that we are attracting the highest possible calibre of overseas player while providing competition for our budding squash talent.

Congratulations to Glen Wilson and Joanne Williams, winners of the Moro circuit this year, Glen played in all but one of the 12 events and with strong showings in the National Championships and the NZ Open, has made the most of the domestic series.

With the Moro circuit reduced to 10 events next year competition is



likely to be even more fierce from the outset.

A special mention should be made of the sterling work done by our national referees, a group often overlooked when tournament reviews are done. The players gave a vote of confidence and appreciation to referees during the recent National Championships and believe our tournament scene is well served by this group.

One subject of much wrangling in the past has been which ball should be used at open level but this season we have seen very little dissatisfaction after the introduction of the Dunlop Double X. It now remains to be seen whether B or C graders around the country will also be able to use the Double X.

Highlights of the year from our players include Susan Devoy's retention of the British Open Title, Ross Norman's consistency in holding down the No. 4 world ranking despite intense competition from the Australians and the high placing achieved by our Junior mens team in Scotland. Not only has Glen Wilson shot up the rankings but also Joanne Williams has continued to chip away at the worlds top 10 and has been rewarded with a ranking of No. 7. Meanwhile Stephen Cunningham has continued to dominate the domestic scene including his hat trick of national titles and has been a model of professionalism for our younger players to follow.

We have an exciting 12 months ahead with our Senior Womens team looking to challenge for their first world teams title in Holland in March, after Susan Devoy attempts to become the first women to win three consecutive world individual titles. Our Senior Mens team will travel to Malaysia later in 1989 to contest the World Championship and this country plays host to the Junior Womens World Champs. With a test series against Australia also on the cards we have enough major events in place to ensure that our sport maintains its high profile.

Finally a word of thanks to our national sponsors for their backing. Honda has become synonymous with squash in New Zealand and their personal and financial interest has been tremendous. Railfreight and Moro also have made significant contributions to our premier events.

N.Z. Institute of Squash

The goal of maintaining New Zealand's high profile in world squash has been given further impetus with the setting up of the N.Z. Institute of Squash.

The aim is to promote, provide encouragement and develop opportunities for potential International NZ Squash players to pursue and achieve excellence in squash in conjunction with their work or education.

The Institute is based at the All Seasons Complex, Te Atatu South, Auckland. All facilities have been available at no cost to the Institute, and the NZSRA wish to record their appreciation to the owners for this gesture.

Mr Rob Crothall has been appointed Head and Technical Director. He and fellow Directors Neven Barbour, Trevor Colyer, Susie Simcock and David Moore have a wealth of joint experience to set the Institute on solid foundations. Approval has been granted to add to this directorship.

The Institute was formalised by the NZSRA in early June 1988 and although it is assisting with initial funding the plan is to be self sufficient in 3-4 years. The preparation of our international teams becomes a major responsibility of the Institute and these activities will be financed by the International Events & Tours budget.

Advisory services such as the medical profession, physiotherapists, nutrition and diet and physical fitness testing are now in place. Other back up services are also being organised and some of our top players have already had access to these.

The Institute should be able to assist and advise Districts and Clubs on squash related matters in a short space of time and will each year talent scout potential players to participate in Institute programmes. These will be largely by application.

1988 In Review

How one of New Zealand's leading squash writers saw the 1988 season.

NZSRA does not necessarily endorse all Peter has to say but welcomes an outside point of view.

The 1988 competitive year was a qualified success, among the best in the history of the association.

The field for the Honda New Zealand Open was without parallel, the Moro Circuit benefitted greatly from being part of the world tour, a number of New Zealanders moved up the world rankings and the junior men made a great advance in finishing fourth in Edinburgh.

These highs were offset somewhat by the late cancellation of the challenge series, a deterioration in the behaviour of players off and on the

court, concern over the lack of player depth, particularly among the women, and a general reduction in the numbers taking part.

The entry for the open could hardly have been bettered with nine of the women's top 10 ranked players in the field and seven of the first 10 men.

In the end Jansher and Dittmar produced probably the best final in the open's history, a thrilling five game affair on the clear view court at the Chase Stadium just after Susan Devoy had doused the fire of Lisa Opie in the women's final to earn her fifth successive open crown.

Earlier Jansher had been much too strong for Norman and Dittmar ended the splendid run of England's exciting teenager Del Harris, the world junior champion, in the semifinals.

While there was disappointment that Norman could not make much impression on Jansher, winning just four points, there was delight with the increasing international poise of Joanne Williams, who toppled then world No. 2 Liz Irving in a four game quarter final before taking a game off Opie in the semis.

With \$25,500 available for the women, which placed the open in terms of prize-money second only to the British Open, it was easy to understand why so many had come but trying to fathom the reasons for the men to arrive for \$44,500 was more difficult to explain.

Despite strenuous denials popular belief among the players was that Jansher would have been given illegal appearance money to take part but even if that were correct it still didn't explain why so many others should show.

There were feelings that this year may be an exception for New Zealand due to the International Squash Players Association decision to extend the minimum grand prix tournament requirement for a ranking from 10 to 14 events by January, the fact so many of the top players were Australians and that the tournament was the first of the season.

With such a high calibre entry and continued quality organisation the tournament had to be among the best for the year, standards the association may find difficult to emulate for future opens.

The open helped erase the bitterness surrounding the cancellation of the June challenge series, which was to feature Jansher against Norman and Devoy against Michelle Martin, who had upset the world No. 1 in the French Open.

Thankfully the association's decision to have the Moro Circuit registered to carry world ranking points proved a winner with England's Martine Le Moignan, Rebecca Best of Ireland, Australians Michael Perry, Irving and Robyn Belford, Anthony Chua of Singapore and Babette Hoogendoorn of the Netherlands, all making significant contributions over the 12 tournaments.

Williams won the women's series from Charmian Hayes and Annette Owen, the latter a past national champion on two occasions, who made a welcome return to serious squash, and New Zealand's man of the year, Glen Wilson, was a decisive victor of the male competition.

Susan Devoy only made four appearances but with the maximum points, she still finished fourth overall, and Stephen Cunningham was similarly dominant in the three tournaments he contested, none more so than the South Island Championship final in Invercargill when he thrashed Wilson in 16 minutes and conceded just a solitary point.

Such was the favourable response of the overseas contingent that there is every prospect of a greater number coming next year.

After heading off Scott Harrison, Perry and Michael McSherry by a huge number of points, Wilson headed for Australia where his enthusiasm and desire for success were rekindled.

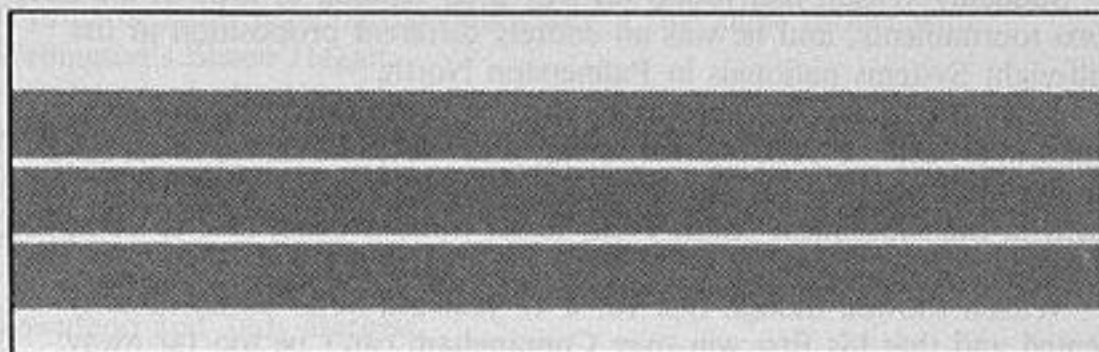
In the Australian Open he beat a member of the top 20, Jamie Hickox, and backed that up by disposing of Singaporean Peter Hill, ranked in the 40's, in the opening round of the New Zealand Open.



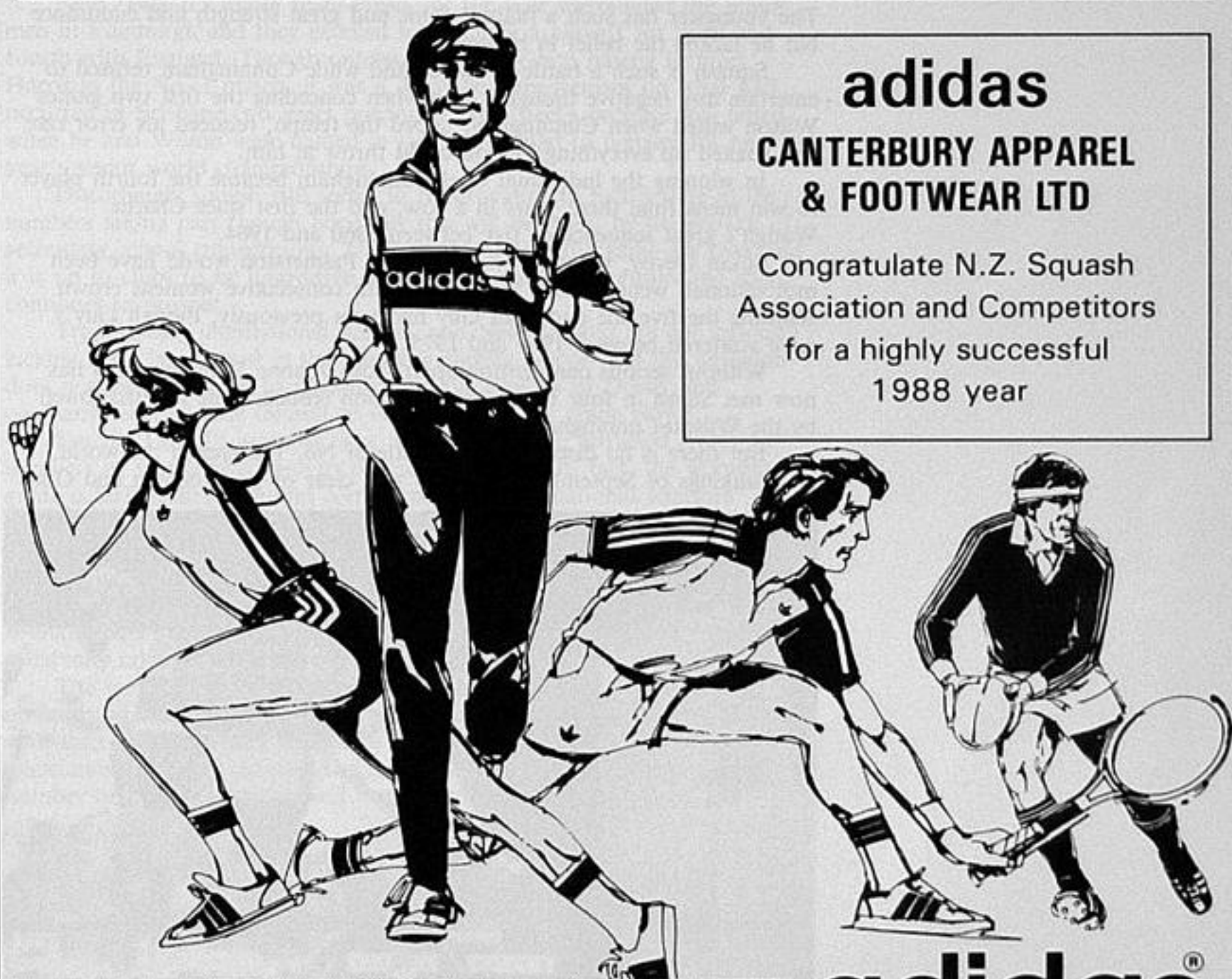
Robyn Lambourne and Susan Devoy, Honda NZ Open.

Suddenly Wilson had found his way after tending to drift in the later Moro tournaments, and he was an entirely different proposition in the Railfreight Systems nationals in Palmerston North.

This time he did not cave in against the professionalism and tough mental approach of Cunningham, being just two points away from winning the mens final in four games and having matchball at 8-7 in the fourth in the subsequent teams event finals without being able to complete the task.

Wilson showed though that for a 17 year old he is extraordinarily talented and that his first win over Cunningham can't be too far away. The youngster has such a mature game and great strength and endurance but he lacked the belief in himself.

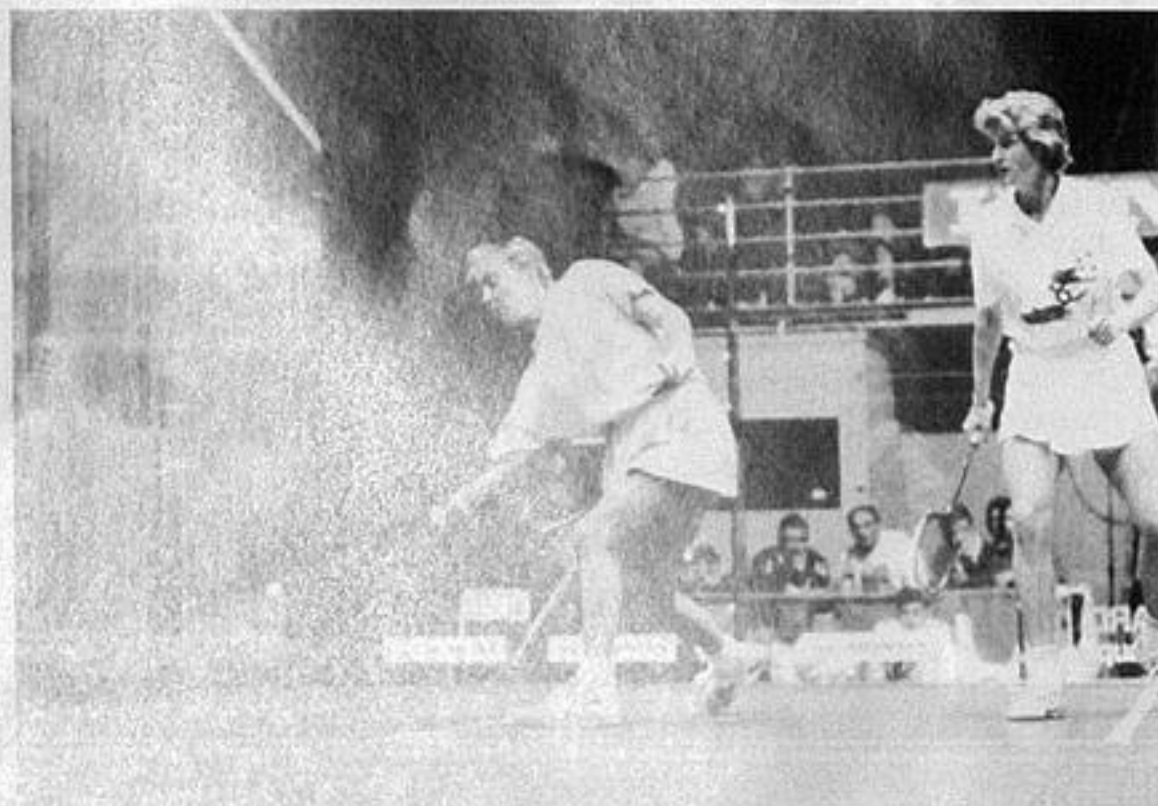
Squash is such a battle of minds and while Cunningham refused to entertain any negative thoughts even when conceding the first two games Wilson wilted when Cunningham upped the tempo, reduced his error rate and soaked up everything Wilson could throw at him.

In winning the individual final Cunningham became the fourth player to win mens final three years in a row, and the first since Charlie Waugh's great sequence of five between 1960 and 1964.

Susan Devoy, whose only problem in Palmerston would have been motivational, went on to a record her sixth consecutive womens crown eclipsing the five she and Pam Guy had won previously, though Guy's were scattered between 1969 and 1975.

Without serious competition apart from Joanne Williams, who has now met Susan in four finals, the champion tended to be overshadowed by the Wilson-Cunningham matches.

But there is no disputing her mantle of No. 1 player in the world. The rankings of September 1 had her well clear of Le Moignan and Opie

with Lucy Soutter fourth and Irving having slipped to fifth. Encouragingly for New Zealand Williams appeared at No. 7, and will need to play up to it next year if this country are to improve on their present ranking of third behind England and Australia.

On the men's list Norman was still hanging in at No. 4, just ahead of Rodney Martin with Rory Watt at No. 32 and Cunningham 50th. Of considerable encouragement was Wilson's ranking of 70th and Harrison's appearance at 81st.

Cunningham's second win over Wilson was a key factor in Bay of Plenty with just four players retaining their national inter-district title. They beat Wellington, seeded fourth, 3-1 in the final.

Assisting Cunningham were John Oakley, Paul Steel and Robert Wyatt, the latter winning the final clash, a five game thriller with Wellington's Shane Hagan.

Top seeds Auckland had been pipped on a games countback by Wellington after they had shared their semifinal clash 2-all but there was no such hiccup among the women with Auckland marching relentlessly on to yet another championship with a 4-0 scoreline over Canterbury in the final.

Members of their team were Donna Newton, Hayes, Owen, Fleur Townsend and Judy Burgess.

New Zealand's major team effort for the year surrounded the junior men in Edinburgh and they excelled by reaching a playoff for third and fourth with England. Though outclassed, with Wilson having to meet Harris in the No. 1 match, it was a dramatic improvement on what had occurred in Brisbane two years previously, and Steel's promise was noted when he and Wilson were named in the mens squad to prepare for next year's senior world championships.

Disturbingly squash still seems to be struggling to halt a slide in the numbers taking part though hopefully this will be offset by the growth of secondary school competitions. The boom years for the game are over and it is up to clubs to be innovative and better organised to ensure the sport continues to prosper.

Traditionally international success, and New Zealand are not seriously lacking here, is reflected in the numbers playing a sport but this situation does not seem to apply to squash where the exploits of Devoy and company seem of little interest to the average lower grade player.

Equally Devoy's example does not seem to have attracted large numbers of young girls keen to emulate her deeds. In fact, the womens game is lacking in depth and commitment and the national selectors acknowledged the problem by choosing Irving in the world championship squad at the conclusion of the nationals.

Subsequently Irving, who has a New Zealand passport, withdrew but it is of concern there are no serious challengers to the top three of Devoy, Williams and Newton and so few talented youngsters who look capable of eventually taking over.

The mens situation is better without there being wild cause for optimism and a number of those with talent are letting themselves down with their behaviour and reluctance to commit themselves. The national association hopefully arrested the decline in behaviour by disciplining a number of players and they will need to continue their vigilance.

1988 Honda NZ Open

A star studded field, some startling upsets, and some brilliant squash all went to make the 1988 Honda NZ Open Championships a great success.

This is the thirteenth year of the open attracted nine of the world's top ten women which included Susan Devoy as womens number one and Joanne Williams at number nine, and seven of the best ten men, including Jansher Khan number one in the world and New Zealand's own Ross Norman at fourth.

The womens final between Susan Devoy and Lisa Opie was predictable to the very partisan crowd in the Chase Stadium, and a straight three game win in 47 minutes by Susan was taken for granted.

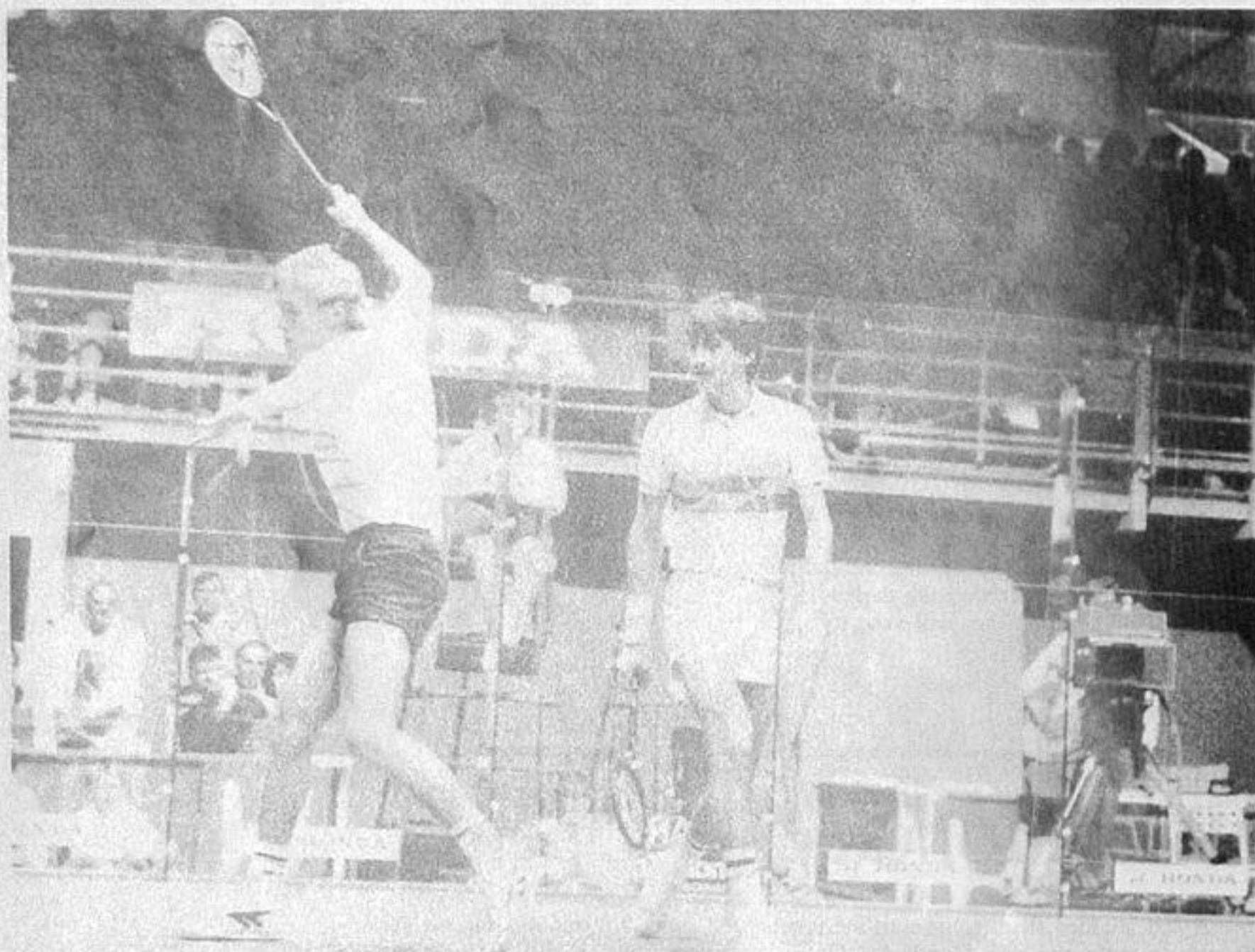
Earlier games featured New Zealand Joanne Williams beating Liz Irving in the Quarter Finals only to go down in the semi finals to Lisa Opie. England's Martine Le Moignan who had spent time this year on the New Zealand Circuit, beat fellow England player Lucy Soutter in the Quarter Finals, but went out in five games to Susan Devoy in the Semi Finals.

An early upset in the womens section was the defeat of world number seven Michelle Martin by Robyn Belford ranked sixteen.

In a field of thirty-two players, fifteen were from New Zealand and some of our younger up and coming players were able to gain valuable experience by competing with top overseas players.

The Mens events supplied much of the drama, and world junior champion Del Harris of England was responsible for much of it by beating defending champion Rodney Martin in the second round, and followed this up by taking Tristan Nancarrow in the quarter finals.

Harris at nineteen years of age had to face Chris Dittmar the worlds

number three and the young lion was tamed by the older more experienced Dittmar in three straight games.

Ross Norman made it comfortably through to the semi finals where he met Jansher Khan, Ross, former world champion could make no impression at all against the skills of Jansher, and scored only 4 points in a 41 minute match.

Glen Wilson, New Zealand triple Junior Champion further enhanced his prospects by reaching the second round where he did well to win thirteen points against world number 3 Chris Dittmar.

Here is how Peter Bidwell, one of New Zealand's most knowledgeable squash writers saw the mens final.

"In one of the best finals in the history of the Open Jansher beat likeable second seed, Australian Chris Dittmar, in a five game thriller 9/0 9/7 5/9 7/9 9/7. Yet again the left-handed Dittmar was thwarted in his bid to beat one of the top two Pakistanis for the first time.

The match could not have been much tighter in the finish and Dittmar said afterwards that this was probably the closest he had come to defeating Jansher in more than ten clashes. He lamented his poor start - "I didn't hit the ball in the middle of the racket until I was 6/0 down in the first" - and his inability to capitalise on a 6/2 lead in the second game.

When Dittmar put his shocking start behind him by winning the next two games with some superb squash he had the crowd of a thousand on the very edges of their seats in anticipation.

It seemed, though, that Dittmar's dash was done when he drifted to a deficit of 2/7 in the fifth set, and his dream of finally eclipsing one of the Khans looked as far away as ever.

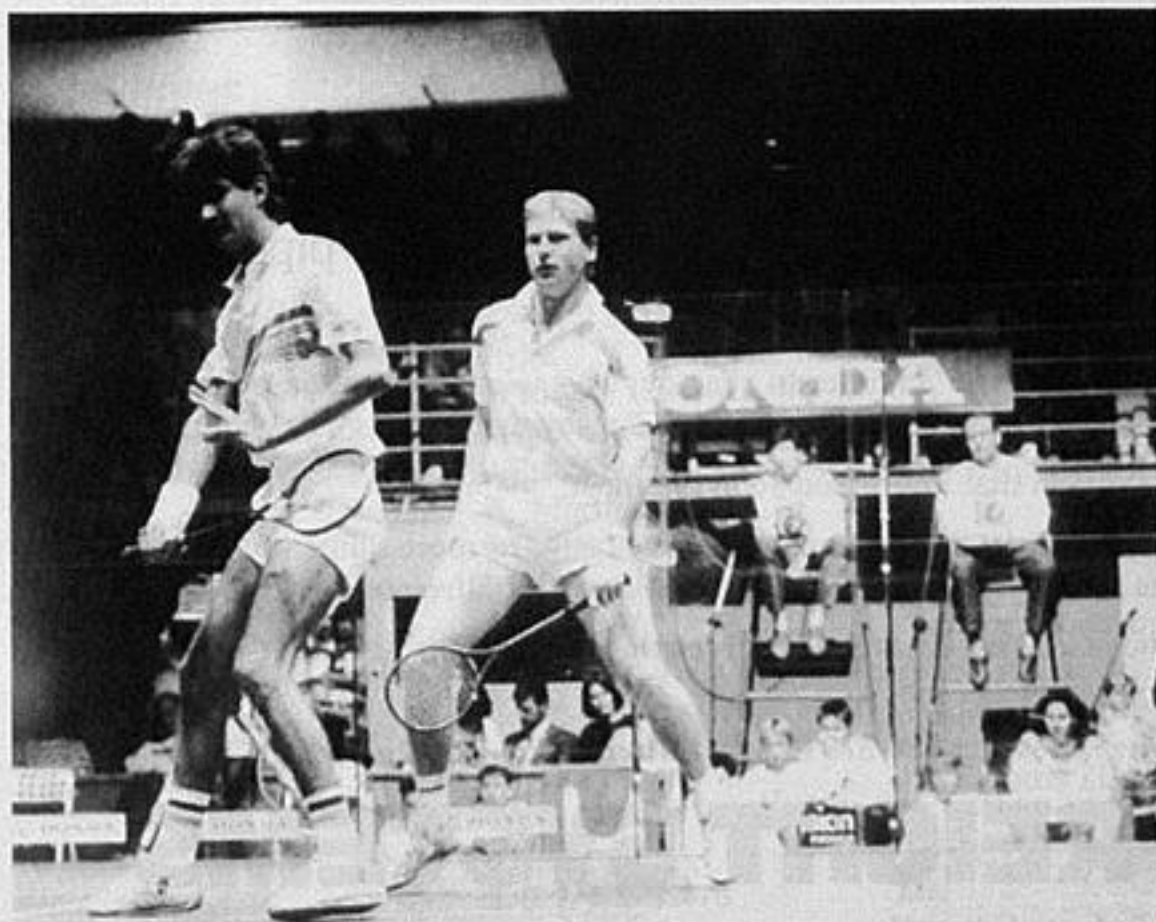
Even then the powerful, ginger-haired world No. 3 was not about to give up and he found something extra in the crisis to cut the deficit to 7/8 before weariness finally got the better of him.

For the most part Jansher had gone serenely along, getting to winner after winner hit by Dittmar, and dragging his larger opponent up and down the court with his precision squash. It took a long time before Jansher started making the occasional unforced error.

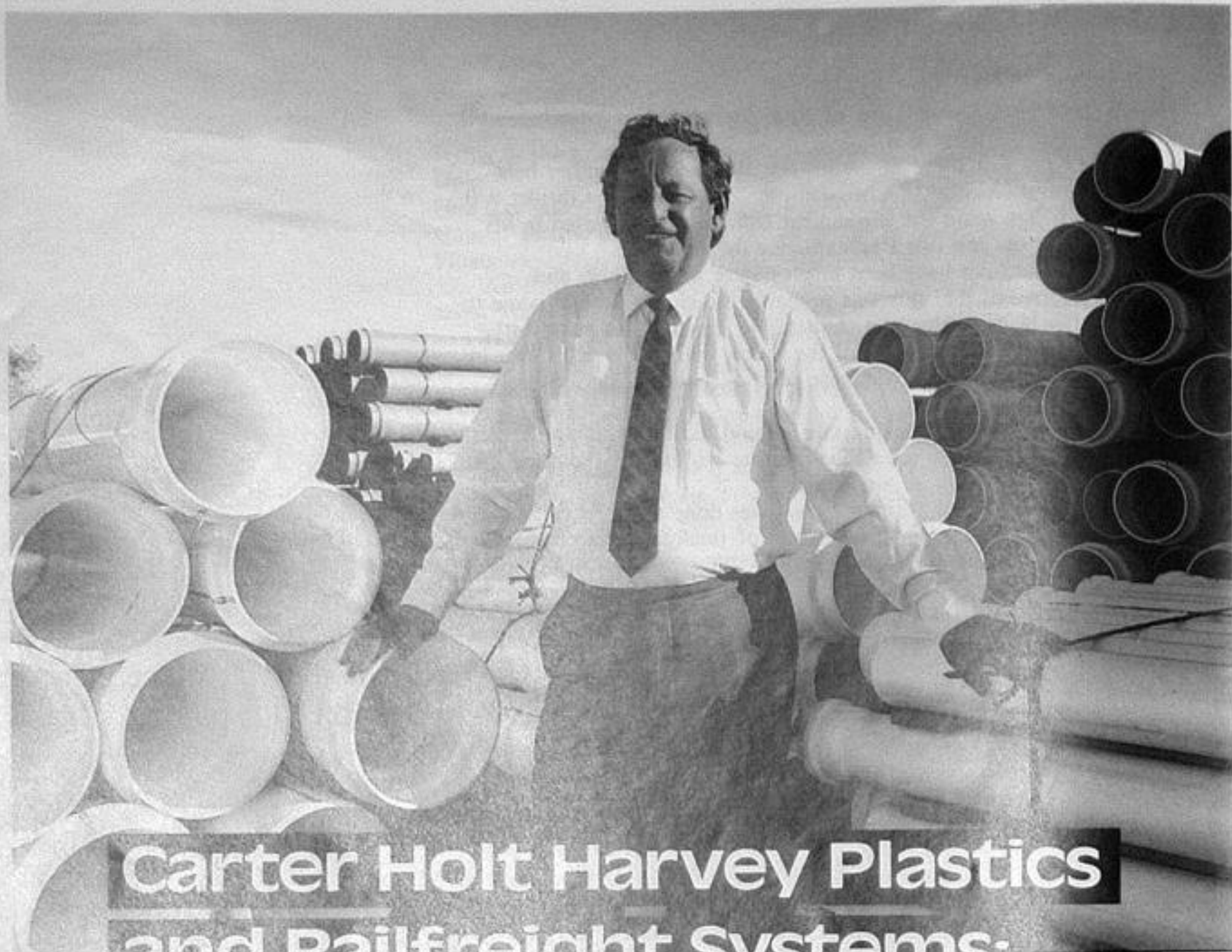
His only outward concession to the tension of the occasion showed when ahead 8/6 in the fifth when he tried to go for a winner off Dittmar's service and showed his annoyance when the ball thundered in to the floor at the front.

Jansher's speed and anticipation make him so hard to combat and he has an excellent range of attacking shots himself.

To watch the tightest of dropshots or boasts picked up with interest by Jansher must have been heartbreaking for the gutsy Dittmar.

Railfreight National Championships

Palmerston North was the host city for this years Railfreight National Championships held September 9-17.

The individual championships had full fields of 64 men and 64 women, and in the teams event all Districts were represented.

Last years champions Stephen Cunningham and Susan Devoy once again triumphed giving Susan her sixth consecutive womens title thereby equalling Anne Stephens record of six wins between 1956 and 1963.

Stephen Cunningham made it three New Zealand Championships in a row, but had to really work hard to hold out young Glen Wilson who came within just two points away from winning the final in four games. However all credit to Stephen for a tough minded response to the challenge from an up and coming future New Zealand champion.

Devoy beat Williams in three straight games in what was their fourth New Zealand finals match.

Amongst the women Charmian Hayes beat Cheryl Te Kani in the quarter finals to meet up with Susan Devoy in the semi finals. A fine effort from a player who has not made the semi finals for some time but who certainly deserved her moment of glory in 1988.

Donna Newton was as usual the other semi finalist with Joanne Williams.

In the teams events there was considerable nail biting and close heart attacks as team managers rallied their players for that last effort.

However last years winning team Bay of Plenty Men and Auckland Women retained their number one positions.

In the mens teams events Auckland slipped from third last year to fourth in 1988, with Canterbury, Southern and Midlands all improving their rankings. Midlands in particular moving from tenth to sixth position.

The womens teams also saw a number of place changes with Waikato showing considerable improvement in moving from eight last year to third in 1988.

The Palmerston North Squash Club maintained the standard of organisation and hospitality that has become a hallmark of the Nationals.

Championship Director Graham Keenan and his band of happy workers certainly earned the tributes paid to them by both the sponsor and NZSRA President Alan Watton at the prize giving ceremony.

It was unfortunate that the behaviour of a small number of players was such that mention had to be made of it at the prize giving and a warning to those concerned issued by the President.

Finance & Administration Report

For the Year Ended 30 September 1988

INCOME AND EXPENDITURE

The net surplus of \$28184 compares with an initial budgeted surplus of \$4694 and when looked at in the light of the further reduction in membership this must represent a satisfactory result.

On the income side the reduction of approximately 9% in membership represented some \$55,000 less in affiliation levies. In February when stock was taken of an expected movement in membership provision was included for a drop of 8%, and action was taken to ensure that appropriate pruning expenditure would give a satisfactory result at the end of the year.

As far as expenditure was concerned the major variations from budget were in relation to office operating expenses, computer grading costs, coaching, and promotion and publicity, although there were increases in Management Committee expenses.

The major variations in expenditure are further explained below:-

- (a) Office operating expenses - possibilities for extended staff coverage were put aside, and action was taken in initiating more mechanisation of the office with the purchase of appropriate office equipment. During the year there was a need to arrange for a replacement Executive Director, and some increase in cost arose during the transition period following the commencement of duties of the new Executive Director.
- (b) Computer Grading Costs - at the time of the budget for this area, allowance for income from Districts (at 60c per player) was not included. The gross figure budgeted was assessed without the \$12000 income representing 20000 players on the grading list.
- (c) Coaching - the "Club Coach Scheme" again showed a slower than expected adoption with resulting savings against the original budget.
- (d) Promotion and Publicity - while the Association recognises a vital role in this area, progress in areas such as the Microcourt project, and Club Coach Scheme, have been seen as assisting the promotion and development of the sport. Work is still continuing on the preparation of promotion material, with the result that costs for this did not arise during the year.
- (e) Management Expenses - the need for advertising and interviews associated with the recruitment of the replacement Executive Director comprise the major increase in costs compared with those budgeted for the year.

New Zealand Squash Centre

The New Zealand Squash Centre has produced a net surplus of \$106753 compared to the previous year

of \$114493. Court usage was up to budget but unfortunately restaurant sales were well down due to staff problems in this area. However the returns to the Association was up to budget at \$30000. Manager Murray McGaughan continues to operate this complex very effectively.

Capital Investment Fund

This fund stands at \$205000 at 30/9/88 after an injection of \$65000 from the N.Z. Squash Centre this year.

This fund is held for Club Loans, and to fund other investments of the Association.

Harvard Squash Vision Limited

The Association's investment in this Company is recorded at the cost of the 50% share of the Company.

No financial results of this Company are reflected in these Accounts.

International Reserve Fund

The fund has again benefitted from the useful contribution of funds from the Roy Mitchell Estate Trust - \$23543, compared with \$23217 in 1986/87. The ability to transfer \$20000 from the fund (\$35000 in 1986/87) to assist financing for the International Events and Tours was realised during the year.

In the next few years there are considerable costs expected in relation to overseas teams travel, and with expected reductions in interest rates the contributions from the Mitchell Trust will fall. The Committee will need to give special consideration to the financial commitments for these future tours.

Administration

During the year consideration was given to the possibility of amending the administration of the sport to an Executive Committee Structure. After a full consideration it was agreed that the present system should be retained. It was acknowledged that there would be some difficulty in arranging for the personnel required to devote even more time to the work of the Association, and the revised structure was seen as possibly alienating those Districts who would not be represented.

The opportunity must be taken to thank all staff employed by the Association for their dedication during the year, and thanks must be extended to both Robin Espie and David Moore in their busy roles as Executive Directors.

Affiliation Levy

During the year the Management Committee continuously discussed the matter of falling membership, and following the direction of the 1987 Annual General Meeting the Committee gave full consideration to the scope for introducing a "user pays" system. The proposal for a system based on the

number of courts and the number of players on the grading list was widely circulated, and the Association was overwhelmed with the response. Needless to say the proposal did not meet with support, and the Association agreed to continue with the present system.

In view of the falling membership and the reasonable result achieved this year, it was agreed by Delegates that the Committee should budget for a nil increase in levies for the next year. The budget circulated for adoption is based on this, but will be

heavily reliant on assistance through Grants and Sponsorships. With a number of sponsorship terms expiring there will be added pressure in negotiating satisfactory replacements.

A continuing close monitoring of expected income and expenditure during the coming year will be carried out by the Committee.

Statement of Accounting Policies

1. General Accounting Policies

The measurement base adopted is that on historical cost.

Reliance is placed on the fact that the Association is a going concern. Accrual accounting is used to match expenses and revenues.

2. Preparation

The accounts have been prepared on an income and expenditure basis.

3. Consolidation

The trading result from the Centre has not been incorporated into the general funds of the Association, due to the different nature of operations. The two Balance Sheets however have been consolidated.

4. Stock

Stock has been valued at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Due allowance has been made for slow moving stocks.

5. Depreciation

For accounting purposes depreciation is calculated at the ordinary rate approved for tax purposes except in the case of the New Zealand Squash Centre building where a rate of depreciation to equate the term of the current lease, due to expire in 1999, has been used.

6. New Zealand Squash Centre Valuation

An up-to-date valuation of the New Zealand Squash Centre has been impossible to obtain, but the latest estimate of the reinstatement cost of the buildings for insurance purposes in \$2.4 million.

7. Changes

There have been no material changes in accounting policies since the previous annual financial statements.

New Zealand Squash Centre

Report For the Year Ended 30 September 1988

The New Zealand Squash Centre in Wellington, continues to be a vital income earner for the Association, especially in the current economic climate. The overall result reflects a general trend to less spending, but with the business showing a surplus around the \$100,000.00 mark, it can be considered to be doing well, among the relatively small group of successful "small businesses".

Court Fees

Court Fee Income matched the figure budgeted for, which shows Squash, for the casual player in Wellington, is holding its own. Saturdays are still the quietest days, with the undoubted competition from other sports affecting patronage. Tuesdays through to Fridays and Sundays continue to be very busy. Price structures and the Peak and Off Peak timings are well balanced to optimise court usage. The Permanent Booking facilities we offer have been well patronised.

In November 1987, the Royal New Zealand Foundation for the Blind decided to terminate the contract involving our administering their two courts in Newtown. The appropriate adjustments were made to the budget.

The possibility of adding two further courts is being investigated in line with other possible developments and renovations.

Racquets Restaurant

Unfortunately, the restaurant result was short of satisfactory due to several factors. The supervisor employed for a few months early in the year, turned out to be less experienced than she had led management to believe. The subsequent returns against cost of sales were below budget. Other factors included a high wage bill through having to pay several lots of holiday pay for staff leaving, and the supervisor employing more staff than necessary especially at quieter times. Patronage has been lower than last year. A questionnaire was distributed to customers and the resulting survey showed up several areas that needed attention, not the least being the need to do a general refurbishment of the restaurant.

Appropriate action has been taken to ensure stricter stock control and pricing, along with rationalisation of staff numbers, especially in the evenings. The new supervisor, Laurie Bane, an ex RAF chef, has done much already to turn things around.

The Squash Shop

Turnover from the shop has been slightly down on budget, but quite satisfactory considering the trend towards less retail spending. Stock levels have been reduced over the year and are now close to an optimal level considering the turnover achieved. The shop remains a good add on facility and service for our customers.

Functions

Steady use of the Function Room/Lounge has occurred throughout the year. This is, however, an area that must be included in the renovation plans now. The work required can be done at minimal costs, as it would be a stage before further developments later.

The Future

Work is under way at present, with an Architect drawing up working plans to refurbish and enlarge the restaurant, as well as upgrade the entranceway. This is the first step in long term development plans, which could include the provision of more space to provide other activities suited to a Sports and Leisure Centre. It is imperative that the restaurant be renovated to keep it up to the necessary standard expected of an eating house, in the first instance and that we should always look to further development and the maintenance of an excellent facility long term.

General

It can not be stressed strongly enough, that this investment of the Association's must be maintained as a top standard Sports and Leisure facility. It must offer high class, viable activities to a wide range of customers, to ensure that the Association gets a good return for it's investment.

Moro Series

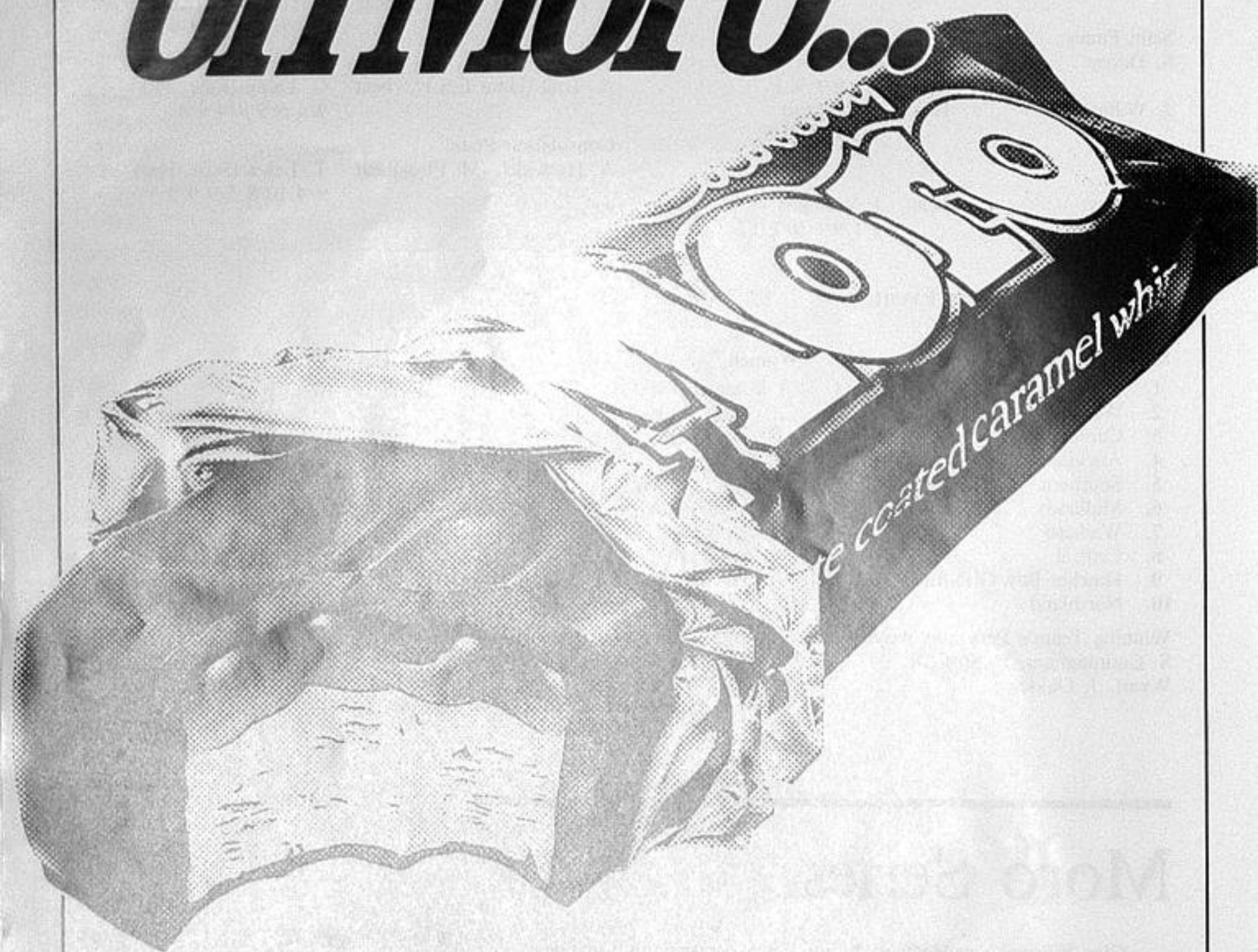

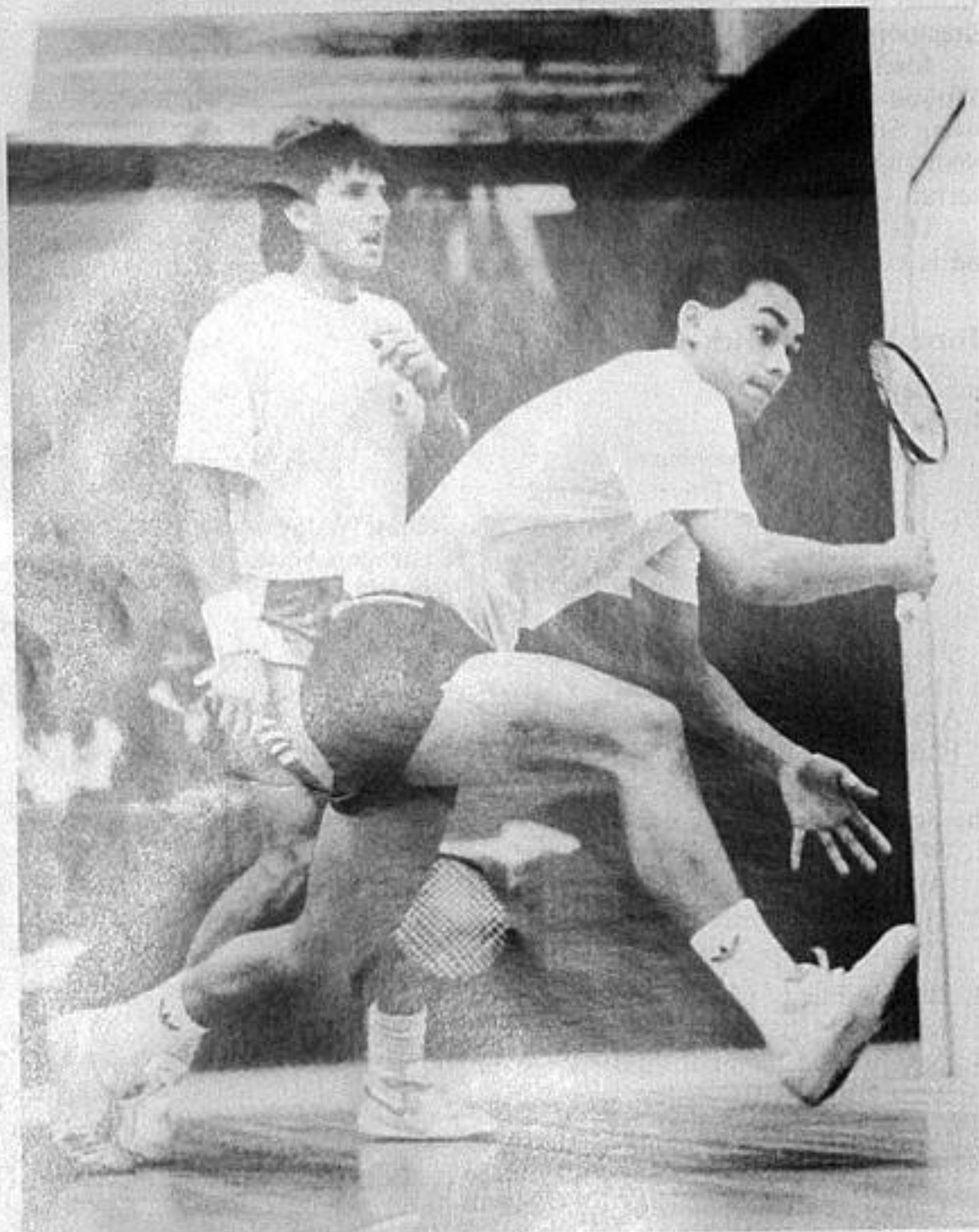
North Island Championships

Masters Squash

Six years ago I saw the first Hertz National Masters Championships held in Nelson. This was the first major senior age group event held in N.Z. Two years ago an inter district teams event was introduced at Christchurch. This has further increased the popularity of the N.Z. Masters Championships.

Sponsorship:

Unfortunately our sponsorship since 1982 from Hertz Rent-a-car terminates this year. On behalf of Masters Players throughout N.Z. I would like to thank them for their generous financial support at both District and National Championships. Their sponsorship has played a major part in the rapid development of Masters squash throughout N.Z.

Aber Impeco terminated their National sponsorship during the year and our thanks are extended to them for their generous support and promotion of Masters squash.

Club Tournaments:

The number of Masters squash players competing in tournaments and interclub continues to grow each year. More and more clubs are introducing Masters tournaments on their schedule. To gain sufficient entries at smaller country club tournaments it is necessary to send out personal invitations. Masters players are reluctant to enter tournaments from Club Notice Board posters.

Test Series:

Gower Dallimore once again managed our test team to Australia. The three test series in early September was won by Australia 2-1. Our team salvaged some lost pride with a win in the third and final test. Some criticism was levelled at this year's test team selection criteria. Next year



will see firm guide lines set out at the beginning of the season for players in contention for test team selection.

Administration:

As National Masters Convenor and a member of the NZSRA Management Committee I have found it difficult to be an arbitrator between the NZSRA Management and the Auckland based Masters sub-committee. Approval for the National Masters Co-ordinator to attend NZSRA Management meetings will I hope solve this problem. Misunderstandings between the NZSRA and the sub-committee resulted in the resignations of three committee members towards the end of the season. Apart from this the committee has worked well and achieved what it set out to do — namely the efficient running of National Masters squash in all areas. District Convenors have been well informed of all activities by newsletter and minutes sent out regularly by Rob Roche.

This year's National Championships will see the end of a long and successful era of national squash administration. Chairman Rob Roche will not be available for re-election as National Co-ordinator. Perhaps the father of Masters squash in N.Z. Rocky, due to his tireless efforts and organising ability, is directly responsible for the strength of Masters squash today. In 1985 the National Convenor Warwick Stoupe quoted a famous quotation — "He has awakened a sleeping giant". Indeed Rob Roche has done just that. On behalf of all Masters players thank you Rob.

I would like to thank this year's committee members for their work and commitment during the year. Elaine Penney, Gower Dallimore, Brian and Jan Miles, Phil Sim, Jan Brown and Ron Sandilands. Ex Officio members were Bob Lints and Derek Robinson (National Championship Organisers).

World Masters Championships:

At the I.S.R.F. Annual General Meeting at Brisbane in September official recognition was given to World Masters by approval to stage a World Masters individual and international teams event in 1990 for men and women. It was agreed that the event will take place in either New Zealand or Australia.

In conclusion I would like to thank all District Convenors for their year's input and work in organising Masters squash in their districts, and finally to all Club Convenors who work to ensure that the average masters player continues to enjoy that unique and privileged part of the N.Z. Squash scene — Masters Squash and Fellowship.

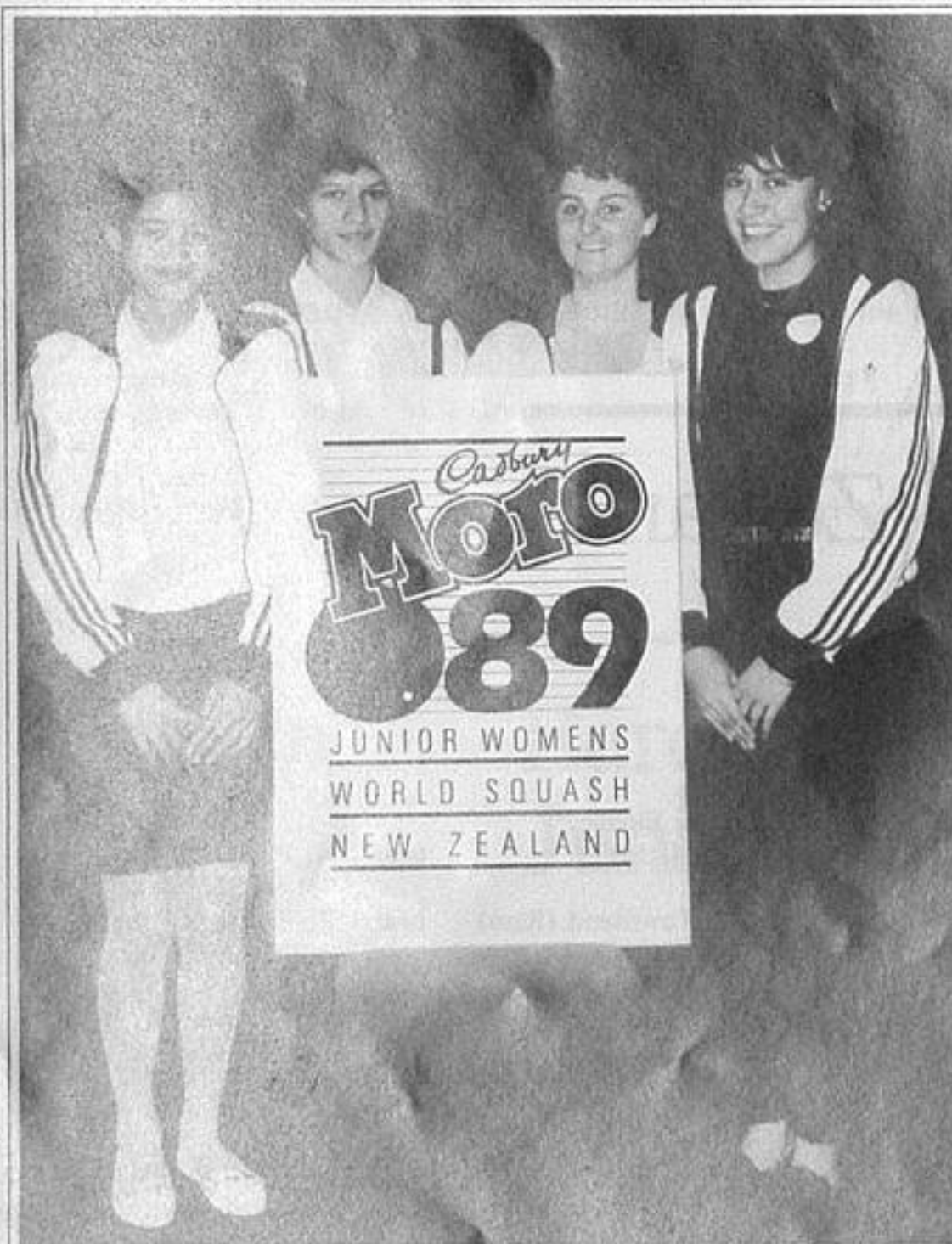

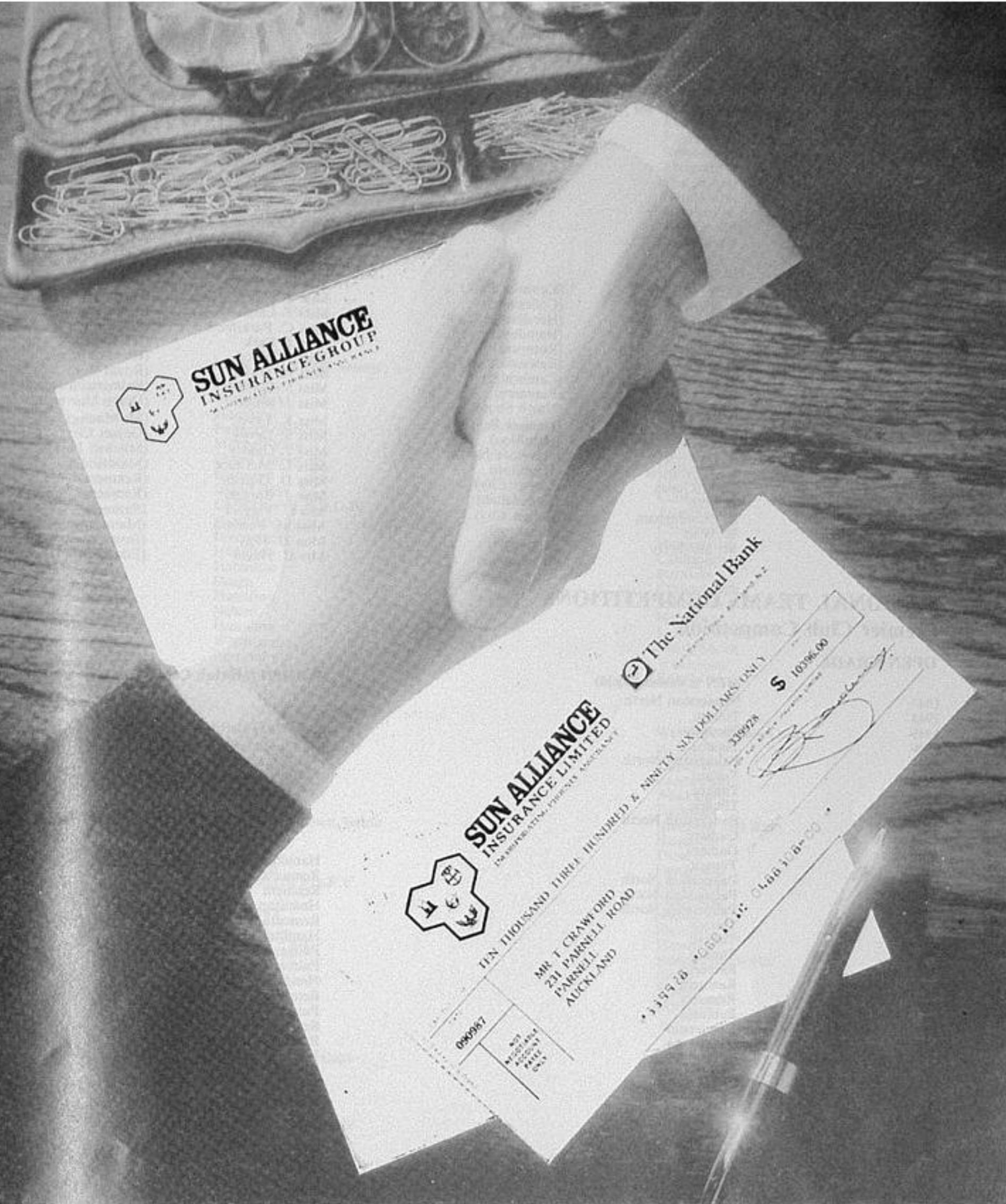
