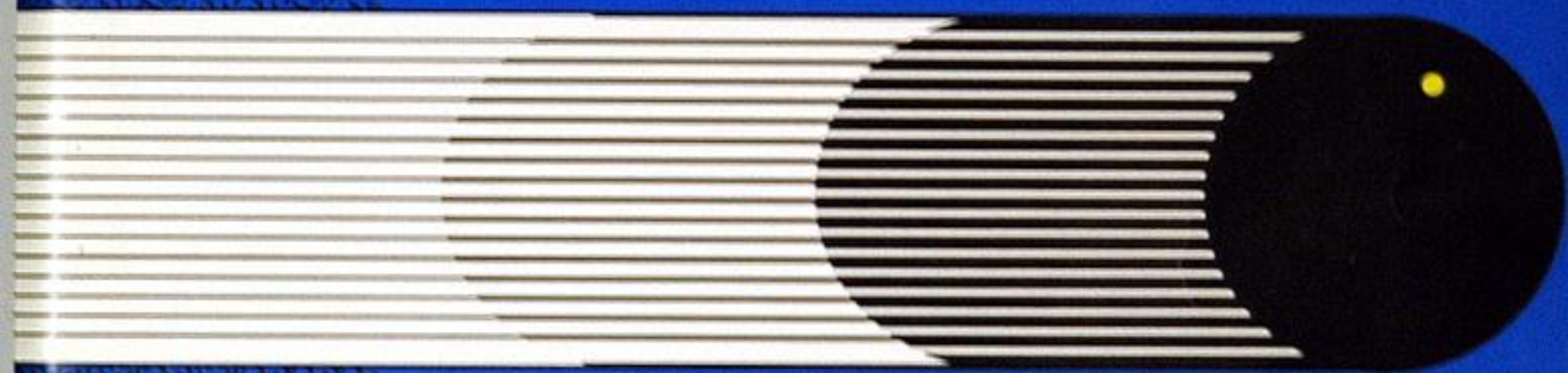

1990 Designated Susan Devoy Year

While New Zealand as a country enjoyed its 150 year celebrations during 1990, the Squash year very definitely belonged to Susan Devoy. This great New Zealand sportswoman has had many successful years which have seen her awarded the New Zealand Sportsman of the Year trophy and the MBE. However 1990 with Susan creating a new record of three world titles could possibly be argued her best ever.

Beginning the year in April with a superb performance to snare her seventh successive British Open, Susan Devoy a fortnight later systematically destroyed a similar field and one which included a much harder draw personally lined up against her, to win the inaugural Hong Kong Challenge.

Then followed a brief letup before taking on the New Zealand circuit including wins in the three UDC Finance international satellite events. After that a short hop across the Tasman to win her first Australian Open title, which coincided with that event gaining international status for the first time.

Back in New Zealand again Susan Devoy in August defended her Honda Squash Open for the seventh time turning on a daunting show. While her form was a little below her very best high standards, she showed in repulsing three successive hard five game challenges her exceptionally strong mental attitude. A performance which led Australian men's star Chris Dittmar to rate as 'amazing' when acknowledging the times she fought back from what looked like imminent defeat.

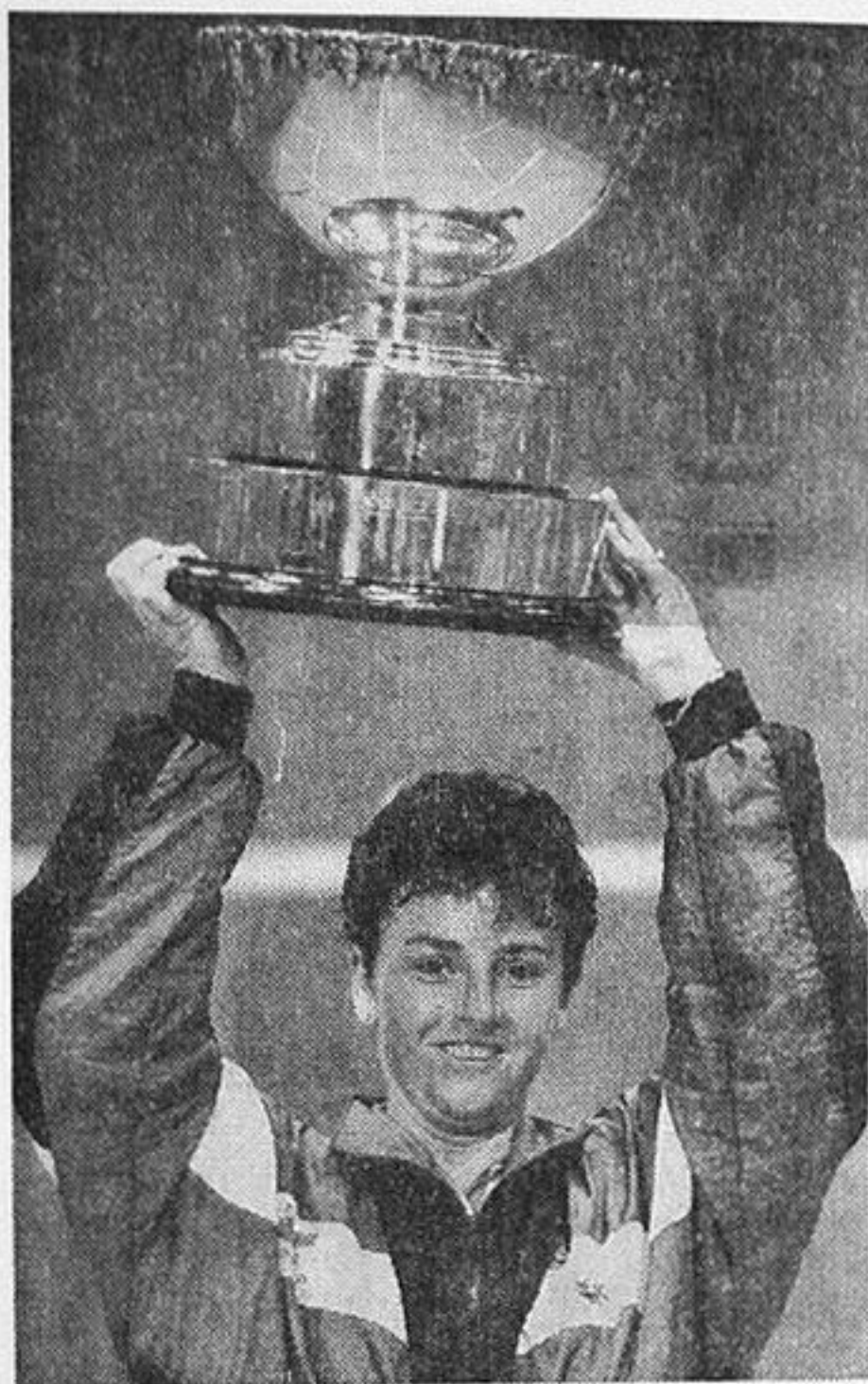
The build up for the long awaited world championships continued and as part of it Susan Devoy easily chalked up her 8th national title win in Hamilton. Then the 26 year old set about her final four weeks preparation for Sydney in total earnest.

While nobody had managed to beat her during the year, or for that matter for 18 months, there were a number of players giving themselves a good chance in the World Championships. The standard of women's international squash was improving fast and also because Devoy's own great form had somewhat eluded her in the months since she had returned from England and Hong Kong.

While some of her early round performances in Sydney, especially the nerve racking quarter final match where she was staring defeat in the face when two games down, seemed to confirm this perception the sheer brilliance of New Zealand's highly respected international star was just resurfacing. Extreme power, sublime speed, and ruthless aggression, combined with all her renowned racket skills overflowed in two great back to back performances. Firstly in the semi finals against Danielle Drady, Australia's highest ranked player. Then, on the following day Sunday October 14, in front of a large crowd at the New South Wales State Sports Centre, and watched by a live television audience estimated to be over 800,000 in New Zealand, Susan Devoy annihilated the reigning world champion Martine Le Moignan dropping only 12 points on the way to a record third world title.

A performance that left everyone awe struck and many believing they had seen the greatest women's squash player ever.

As such 1990 can justifiably be designated Susan Devoy year.

Presidents Report

1990 has been a very eventful year for the New Zealand Squash Rackets Association. The redirection programme was put in place at the time of last years AGM and throughout the year aspects of New Zealand Squash have been reassessed.

There have been some notable events such as the launching of the UDC Finance Squash Institute, the very successful Honda Open, but undoubtedly the main highlights were once again provided by Susan Devoy.

At the beginning of the New Zealand season Susan won her seventh British Open title and after winning the Honda Open in Auckland crowned a great season when she regained the World Championship title. The final which was televised live from Sydney attracted a large audience in New Zealand and reaffirmed Susan's position as New Zealand's most popular sportswomen. Squash owes a huge debt to Susan for keeping the sport to the forefront in the media. Without her involvement squash would not receive a fraction of the current publicity. Susan is also a great inspiration to younger players and when the time eventually comes for her to retire it will leave a void that will be impossible to fill.

Other notable events on the international scene include the continued involvement of Susie Simcock as Vice President of the International Squash Rackets Federation. As Susie is also convenor of the Institute Board her contribution to the sport is certainly considerable.

Leilani Marsh produced a grand effort to win her age group in the Australian Junior Championships, Leilani looks assured of having a great future in New Zealand squash.

This year has also seen the emergence of Glen Wilson as a top senior international player.

The Honda New Zealand Women's team finished a very creditable third in the World Teams Championships and the UDC New Zealand Junior Boys performed well to finish a respectable fifth in Germany.

Following the women's world championships Joanne Williams confirmed that it would be her last international event and has since announced her retirement from all competitive squash. Joanne has played a very significant part in New Zealand teams for many years and at the same time been a great ambassador for the sport, New Zealand Squash's thanks and good wishes are extended to her.

The New Zealand Masters team lost the test series in Australia although team members Kay Marshall, Brian Simpson and Jill Roberts won Australian age group titles.

At home the 1990 Honda Open featured the best draw of world ranked players ever assembled in New Zealand. The contribution of Honda and the organising committee ensured the event was a resounding success and the input of all involved is greatly appreciated.

This year saw the introduction of the UDC Satellite series. With \$30,000 prize money at stake three tournaments were played on successive weekends in Auckland, Christchurch and Wellington. This series proved to be popular and helped fill the gap caused by the abandonment of the players series.

Membership

Registered membership continues to decline although at a slower rate than in previous years. Management is convinced the present levy system is outdated and does not reflect an accurate picture of membership numbers. It is interesting to note that player

numbers on the grading list continue to increase.

Clubs & Districts must assist National Administration to make membership growth our first priority.

UDC Finance Squash Institute

As already noted the Institute was officially launched in April after a considerable amount of involvement by the Board of Directors. The establishment of the Institute is seen as an integral element in the developing of international players. New Zealand Squash is very grateful to UDC Finance and the New Zealand Sports Foundation for their financial support which has enabled the Institute to operate. The foresight and time contributed by members of the Institute Board is acknowledged as without their persistence the Institute would have never become a reality.

NZ Squash Centre

The Centre has produced excellent results since the appointment of Dennis Cheyne as Manager. The profits from the Centre continue to contribute a large part of the association income. The present Board have improved the Centres viability considerably and New Zealand Squash greatly appreciates their efforts.

Redirection Programme

As outlined at last years AGM, Management has reviewed many aspects of the sports operations. In the last year we have had the launch of the Institute, have appointed a Chief Executive, a full time Director of Squash Development, revamped many of our sub-committees and relocated the national office to Auckland.

Management is at present reviewing all aspects of Junior and Youth squash and the National competitive structure. Reports from these two committees will be presented at the AGM.

The Microcourts continue to operate well in most Districts but unfortunately to date we have been unable to secure a sponsor to help with expenses.

Media

The NZSRA again acknowledges the contribution from the various sections of the media who continue to provide solid coverage of the sport.

Hillary Commission

Many of our activities are made possible by the financial support of the Hillary Commission. We are very grateful for this assistance.

Administration

NZ Squash has been fortunate to have had Bill Murphy back serving squash again as Chief Executive. Bill has continued to contribute a tremendous amount to administration. As well as his day to day activities he also plays a major role on the Institute Board, is a member of the Squash Centre Board and has very ably represented New Zealand at International level.

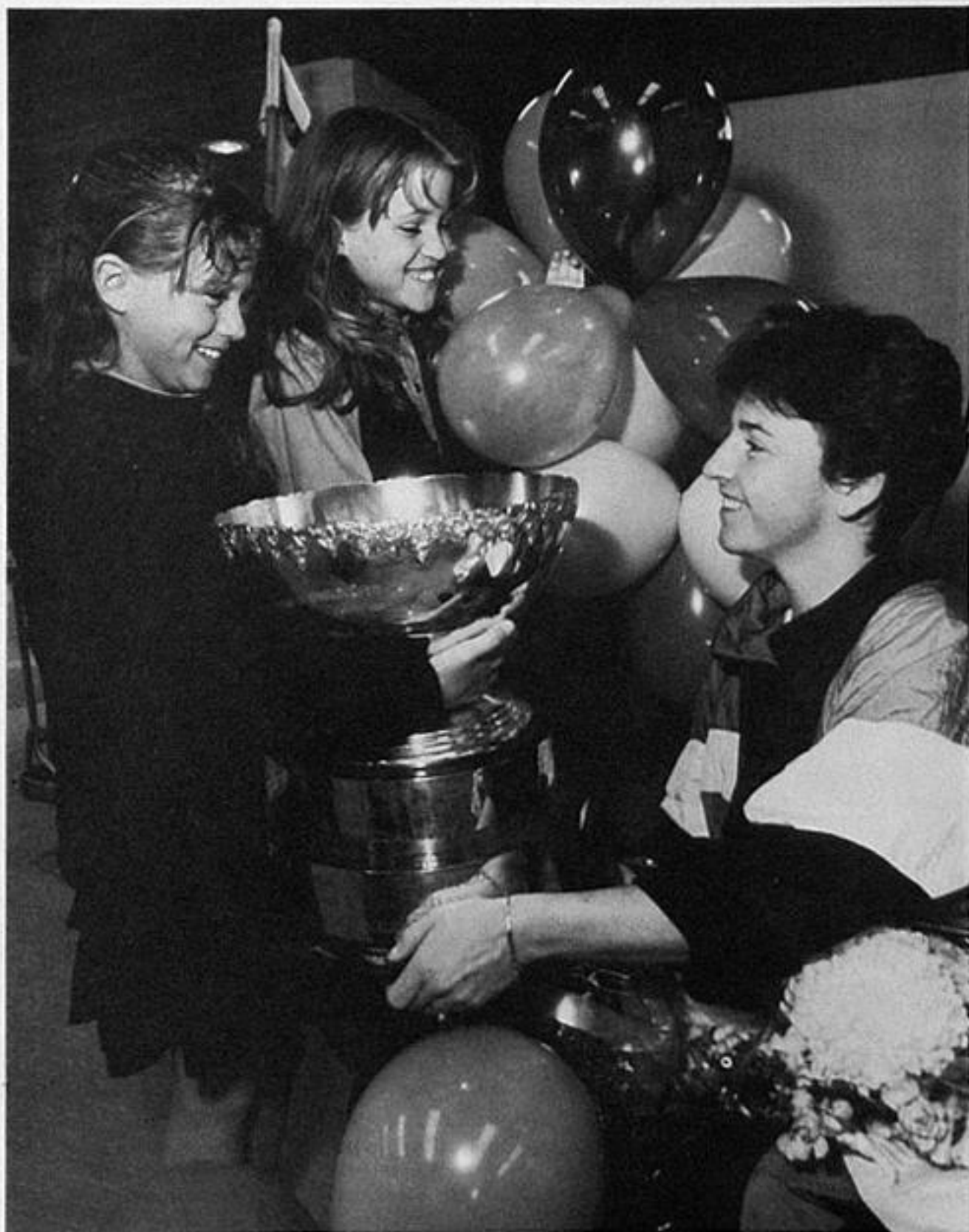

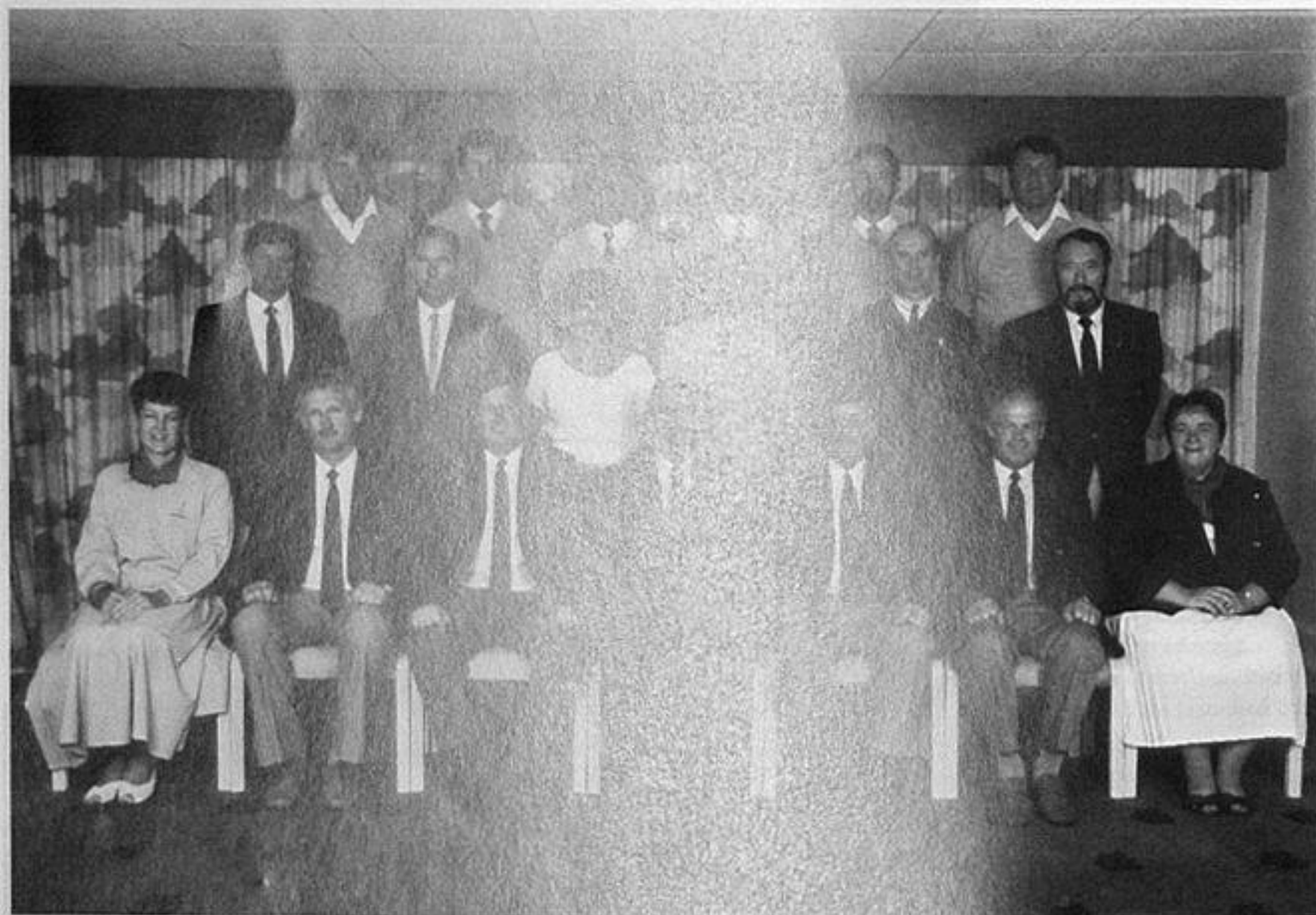

National Events

The sub-committee met on three occasions during the year and continued the policy of reviewing all the previous years events, setting dates, venues and overseeing rules and conditions.

This year there was one major change to the National programme - that was the dropping of the "Players Series" and the introduction of the "Satellite Series".

The aim of the satellite series was to have three truly inter-national tournaments which would be added to the Asia-Pacific events with the hope of encouraging overseas players to enter and also to give New Zealand's top players the opportunity to establish and improve their world rankings.

This was achieved with three successful tournaments being held. It was encouraging to see all of the top New Zealand players entering plus a number of overseas players. With this success it is hoped that the series will continue and become an important part of the Asia-Pacific calendar.

We are indebted to UDC Finance for their sponsorship for this series and we are very thankful for this and their total support.

All the other National Events were run on similar lines as in previous years.

Cousins Shield/Mitchell Cup:

This event was held at the Remuera Squash Club with 15 men's teams entering the Cousins Shield and 7 women's teams in the Mitchell Cup, a similar number to the previous year. Henderson men's and Remuera women's won the respective events.

Under 23 Championships:

Held at Parkview S.R.C. where numbers were slightly down from 1989. Lynora Hati won the women's and Shane Adams the men's.

National Club Teams Championships:

This graded event is still the most popular event for the average affiliated squash players. There were 605 teams entered at district elimination level and 96 teams representing their district at the national finals.

National Championships / Inter-district Teams Event:

The Hamilton Club successfully hosted and arranged this nine day event. 192 players entered the individual event with Glen Wilson winning the men's event for the first time and Susan Devoy the women's for the eighth time.

For the first time a district was not represented in the respective events when Midlands did not enter a women's team, otherwise all other districts were represented. Wellington won the men's and Waikato the women's titles.

General:

A special committee has been formed (following the September Management Meeting) to review National Events and I hope that this committee is constructive and changes are not made just for the sake of changes.

To bring back profile and prestige to our events efforts must be made to regain sponsorship.

Finally on behalf of the Association, I would like to thank all clubs who hosted and organised the various national events as without them there would be no events. Congratulations to all players and teams who won events during 1990. My own personal thanks to the other members of the National Events sub-committee for their involvement and support.

It has been a pleasure being involved with squash players and administrators at National Events level during 1990.

Squash Development Report

The Squash Development Committee was formed as part of the NZSRA's redirection programme and was charged with establishing a National Development Programme with an emphasis on membership promotion and retention and on strengthening the overall playing standard of squash from grass roots upwards.

At the same time Butch Gifford was appointed as the full-time Director of Squash Development. One of his first concerns was to visit every District and canvass them for suggestions, criticisms, new ideas and problems in the system. This personal communication created a much needed liaison between New Zealand Management, Districts and Clubs.

The Squash Development Committee thus served as a sorting post for many ideas, some practical some impractical but all helping to bring the administration of squash into the 1990's.

It has consequently been a year of evaluation, exploring the system and examining change with two special review committees addressing the areas of Junior Development and Competition Framework.

Hopefully 1991 will see the successful implementation of many changes with an updated player development programme, a new coaching syllabus in place and a positive programme of club-member promotion firmly established.

The main areas of responsibility were identified as:

1. Club-member promotion and retention
2. Kiwisquash and squash in schools
3. Player training and development
4. Training and qualification of coaches
5. New club development.

Club-member Promotion:

National Squash Week formed a major part of promotion again with clubs being supplied with a list of activities as well as promotional posters and handouts. Many clubs prefer to do their promotion in their own time and others enthusiastically adopt the National Squash Week but however it is attacked the opportunity is there to promote one's club and the game to the fullest extent.

Congratulations to Invercargill and Waiuku Clubs for jointly winning the "Club of the Year" award, this year supported by the *Sports Goods Association*. Both clubs showing exceptional drive and initiative in their weeks performance.

Congratulations also to Ellerslie Squash Club for raising the most money prorata for the Squashathon.

The club-member promotion programme is an extension of National Squash Week and it has to be recognized as an ongoing scheme and not a once a year ritual around the squash week itself.

The committee also produced in time for National Squash Week a 'New Member's Handbook' which was enthusiastically received by clubs. This is a mini encyclopedia of information designed to inform new members with everything they need to know about their club and squash in general and every joining member should receive one. Extra copies are in stock at the New Zealand Squash office.

In planning stage and close to production is a 'Club Management Handbook' which should do the same for club committees - a guide to all relevant matters from running meetings and tournaments to finance and sponsorship.

There are also new avenues being explored such as a National Discount Scheme, direct mailing of a National magazine to all club members, while the Squash Development Director keeps a close liaison with associated sporting bodies such as Hillary Commission, Kiwisport, CANZ, New Zealand Sports

Distributors, and Sports Foundations etc.

Kiwisquash and Squash in Schools.

Kiwisquash is an area that continues to thrive and it is the Committee's responsibility to ensure all microcourts are being used to maximum advantage and that all clubs appreciate the importance of kiwisquash. Children who learn that squash is fun will be likely to take it up as their sport. Squash to survive needs numbers and Kiwisquash children are our future members.

Another responsibility is to ensure the success of the Teacher Education programme involving:

- * Teaching squash coaching to Teacher Training Colleges.
- * Teaching squash coaching to teachers already in the schools.

Squash in schools is a follow on programme and will become more so as intermediate children who have experienced Kiwisquash move into secondary schools. Promotion of squash in schools should be a priority of all Districts and Clubs. To help establish a foothold in schools a questionnaire was sent to schools throughout New Zealand on their involvement in squash and copies of their replies were sent to Districts for actioning. Clubs need to be encouraged to give support by allowing off peak court times to schools for coaching and competitive play. It is rewarding to see that most clubs readily respond to this and some also allow school children who were non members to play in their ungraded tournaments. The success of the national Secondary Schools championships in Hawkes Bay is indicative of the popularity of the game and the numbers involved in playing squash at secondary school level.

Player Training and Development and Training and Qualification of Coaches.

These areas will be dealt with in the Squash Development Director's report but broadly our aim is to widen our sport's participation base and to develop skills and techniques in players that are in line with the UDC Finance Institute

of Squash standards. The coaching syllabus is being updated improving the standards and making the levels readily recognizable. In line with club promotion particular emphasis was put this year on O level coaching training in order to achieve a broad base of volunteer coaches in every club to help with junior/new member coaching. With the help of the Hillary Commission several seminars were held to encourage women to participate in this coaching programme.

Summary

The Squash Development Committee has a new name but the basic aim has not changed - that is to improve the standards of play and to promote the game.

With a full-time Director of Squash Development and with support from the Hillary Commission it is now possible to achieve these goals but it will still need support from all Districts and Clubs.

The Committee thanks all those who contributed to the various sub departments over the year. Julie Barbour - squash in schools, Denis Scott - Kiwisquash, Lois Smith - player development, Malcolm Vaille - training and qualification of coaches.

Director of Squash Development Report

Club Member Promotion & Retention

This area as the Squash Development Committee convenor has mentioned is the one that will from now on give not only the clubs but districts and New Zealand the greatest satisfaction. By increasing the numbers and better utilization of members the retention rate should increase, players should attain a better standard of play, and by doing so the base of the whole squash pyramid is broadened. The only thing that can happen then is for the pyramid to get higher and better players must emerge from that.

The club member handbook sent to clubs for squash week is the first step to giving new members an insight into how a squash club works. It also shows how they as a member of that club can achieve their goals and it is designed to provide an annual programme of the clubs events all which can only be good for the club as well.

The proposed club involvement in the Club Member Promotion and Retention programme is currently being circulated to districts and we should be fully involved with clubs on this by April of the new year.

Any way that utilizes the club facility should be continually looked at and by having people coming through the door, even though it initially may be for some other reason, can lead to new members eventually.

One of the other areas of promotion for individual clubs that has been tapped into is the street maps. It will take eighteen months before all club premises are plotted onto every map but it will give squash a slight edge over other sports. We are still working on magazine and other areas of advertising (free) but this area is quite difficult to tie down.

The Hillary Commission during the year allocated funds to women's squash and again this will be available in 1991 and it will be spent on trying to promote women coaches and players. Districts will be allocated part of these funds and special or separate sessions during the week will be arranged with them.

Kiwisquash

A likely national sponsorship for this area has not materialized as yet however there are some districts that have picked up Hillary Commission funding through Local Body District and City Councils. One example is the Manukau City Council who want to buy a microcourt and trailer and then let Auckland Squash run it. They of course want the court for their holiday programmes and that is not a problem to squash. At the time of writing this report all the applied for Local Body grants have not been decided so the overall level of funding from Community Councils is not known.

The ability of the microcourt to generate interest has continued strongly. The reports from different schools that children "love it" still pour in. There are eight schools throughout New Zealand looking at building their own court, with only the Pukeatua school having already completed one. This school is a four teacher school about 70kms south of Hamilton. We must continue the impetus created and fully realise the importance of our involvement with Kiwisport. With 26 other sports now vying for participants squash must not throw away its involvement in the programme because of costs. Each district must look at how it runs its own programme and cut its "suit" to match the "cloth" available; and in the meantime the NZSRA is continuing its hunt for a national sponsor.

Extremely successful teacher training programmes have been conducted recently at both Auckland and Hamilton Teachers Training Colleges. In all over 850 teachers tested Kiwisquash, many for the first time. An evaluation at the course was done by the teachers which should be of interest to everyone and available by mid December. It is hoped after the success of these courses that the rest of the Teachers Training Colleges in New Zealand run courses next year.

Squash in Schools

This is an area that we in squash can fully support while not always being directly involved. Districts can do this by way of "teaching" days for those teachers who do want to take squash in their school but do not know very much about the sport. The result of the circular sent to schools earlier in the year showed that a large percentage of schools were in fact seeking some sort of assistance. Most teachers do not need a complete seminar on squash coaching, which would include "teaching principles", but only require a practical squash lesson. Clubs can benefit from what is now an accepted part of every schools sports programme and that is the Leadership Awards. The schools run this programme and clubs can obtain lists of those pupils who have passed the award and offer them the opportunity to become squash coaches.

The Secondary School tournament run in conjunction with New Zealand squash is a real bonus for squash. It gives children the taste of competition squash even though many of them are not affiliated squash players. Together with the Secondary Schools Squash Committee we must be looking at how the event can be run when it becomes even larger than it was this year.

The International Squash Rackets Federation is looking at a junior game that would probably suit a school competition also and we await the final approval of this game with interest.

Districts should be encouraged by the interest being shown by Secondary Schools in our sport, which does have a direct link with the Kiwisport

programme through the Award scheme. Also as children move from Intermediate schools to Secondary the initial Kiwisquash skills learned need to be progressed and clubs are the logical next step for these people.

Congratulations to those districts who have successfully run inter-school competitions this year and good luck to those who are contemplating running competitions next year.

Player Training and Development

This area, as many will be aware, is undergoing major revamping. The competition framework is being looked at and during the AGM will be discussed with some changes possibly being made for next year. At the same time a review committee is currently looking at Junior/Youth development including how best to look after the more promising juniors.

The New Zealand Junior development squad programme has been put on hold until after the review committee recommendations emerge and over the next few weeks a policy to ensure that best is done for younger players should be in place.

Some districts have become aware of the waste of money on some players in the past and are looking long and hard at ways to best utilize the district funds. To them I say well done, to the rest of you I think you should do a stocktake. I know you will be

"surprised" when you see the results.

Training & Qualification of Coaches

This area is now well into a remodeling programme and assistance with this important part of squash has been sought to ensure the modularising of the syllabus is correctly carried out and each module has an examination that is applicable to it. Districts have been notified of the way requalification of coaches will be carried out and this will start in March of next year.

There may be coaches who do not want to requalify and this will be sad for squash and for them. However we must raise the standard of coaches throughout New Zealand and the requalification is simply the first step to achieve this. In our sport, as is the case in many others, we must always be trying to raise the standard of skills and the overall level of general play. Coaching is the only way this can come about in a reasonable period of time.

To all those districts who have continued to produce coaches in numbers, I say congratulations. To all those who have gone out and attained C.A.N.Z. qualifications, also well done! It is our intention to cross credit C.A.N.Z. qualification with our new accreditation scheme but it is still too early to say exactly which level will cross with it, and how it will finally affect the squash examinations.

Promotion of coaches is another important area and until we have clubs

using coaches in a similar way to golf coaches we won't really see the best of our coaching system.

Conclusion

It would take you too long for me to thank individuals for the hospitality and help they have offered over the last year, but to all of you a real great "thanks". We may not all agree on everything within squash but it is a healthy thing to be able to disagree and keep on talking about other things.

Every district and club has something different to offer New Zealand squash and with such a mixture of ideas I am sure New Zealand squash is in good shape. As I have ended all my squash development bulletins this year with a "Thought of the Month", I feel I should also end this report with a quotation, this one written by an Indian Guru:

If you don't follow through your creative ideas, someone else will pick them up and use them. When you get an idea of this sort, you should jump in with both feet, not just stick your toe in the water.... Be daring, be fearless, and don't be afraid that somebody is going to criticize you or laugh at you. If your ego is not involved no one can hurt you.

Commercial Committee Report

As part of the redirection of the NZSRA as recognising the increasing effect that sponsorship plays the decision was taken to form a Commercial Committee. Specific areas of responsibility covered by this committee are the arranging of and servicing of all NZSRA sponsorships, marketing and managing of the Perspex Court, promotion of the Honda NZ Open, event coverage and liaison with Television and any other commercial/promotional activities.

Sponsorships

The announcement of the UDC Finance Squash Institute (reported elsewhere) was the highlight of the year in this area. UDC Finance joined Honda NZ as the principal sponsors of the NZSRA and the support given by these two companies to our game was superb. Understandably the recent announcement by Honda that they would not be continuing their sponsorship of the NZ Open nor the NZ Women's team from 1991 onwards was equally disappointing. Honda have been a loyal supporter of the NZSRA for seven years but believed "the time was opportune for them to pursue new sponsorship opportunities that would more aptly support their future direction". New Zealand Squash is indebted to the magnificent support from Honda over this period which has helped maintain New Zealand at the forefront of world squash.

In addition to its support of the Institute, UDC Finance also sponsored the UDC satellite series which established a series of three international tournaments including the Auckland, Wellington, and South Island/Canterbury championships.

In all UDC proved magnificent sponsors during 1990 for New Zealand Squash and that support is valued very highly by the NZSRA.

A number of other sponsors play a very important role in squash and both major and support sponsorship agreements have been entered into with Dunlop Slazenger, All Seasons Squash and Fitness Centre, Unisys (NZ) Ltd, Hi-Tec, Sun Alliance and Hertz New Zealand.

Our sincere thanks are extended to these companies.

It is disappointing to report an inability to secure major sponsorships for the National Championships, the Player Series (now discontinued) and the Microcourts. The current state of the market place makes it extremely difficult to attract certain forms of sponsorship to areas where visibility and awareness, particularly through television, is limited. After protracted discussions with a large national company, its recent decision not to proceed with sponsorship of the microcourt was a major blow. The committee recognises as crucial the need to establish funds for all districts through the microcourts to ensure their ongoing viability and use.

New Zealand Sports Foundation

Recognition must be made of the significant role that the New Zealand Sports Foundation played in the instigation of the UDC Squash Institute. The Foundations support of squash has been very strong over the years and its backing of this important project is welcomed.

Perspex Court

Following the outright purchase of the court in 1989 it has been used twice in the last twelve months - in Kuala Lumpur for the 1989 World Open and in

Auckland for the 1990 Honda Open. Transportation costs to potential Asia Pacific sites make it difficult to be competitive when tendering but the committee is determined to protect the returns of the court when it is used outside New Zealand.

The court after some minor repair work remains in first class playing order.

Promotus Advertising Ltd

The committee wishes to record its thanks to Promotus Advertising for the excellent work they have been doing for New Zealand Squash in a number of commercial and promotion areas since becoming involved as honorary consultants to the NZSRA this year.

Honda Open

Major emphasis was placed on this event this year. Following last years disappointing attendances the decision to opt for the new Aotea Centre as a final venue was based on the need to raise the event profile and take it "up market". Whilst staging costs were obviously expensive the record attendances for both the semi finals and finals vindicated the committees decision. The large onsite crowd together with the home audience (televised expertly by TVNZ) witnessed a spectacular event staged superbly. An outstanding entry of the world best players ensured the success of this event. It is vitally important that a new sponsor to replace Honda be found quickly to ensure the maximum exposure that this event gives our sport, a matter which the commercial committee is pursuing with priority.

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Refereeing Report

Refereeing showed itself to be in good heart this year with the elevation of four referees to national level. It is pleasing to note that all four of these new national referees are, or have been, players of 'B' grade or above. Accordingly Brian Chard, Carol Chard, Ian Newton and Kaye Jackson are to be congratulated for their efforts.

Susie Simcock, as an ISRF Vice President will be pleased to observe that 50% of these graduates are women and consequently the number of women referees at national level has now increased by 22%. There is still a need however to encourage women to referee at club level or else the higher ranks will eventually be starved of candidates.

The ISRF training video "Let Please" - not to be confused with our own rather dated rules video of the same title - was made good use of during the season with most of the referees and top echelon of players being given the opportunity of viewing and commenting on it. Immediate improvements in the standard of refereeing by those attending these showings was noted. More widespread use of this training device is hoped for next year.

Initial progress has been made towards the production of a replacement of the New Zealand "Let Please" video with a firm in Christchurch being requested to present a format and costings to NZSRA Management by the time of the AGM.

Player assessment of referees was conducted during the latter rounds of the North Island, South Island, National championships and during the Honda Open with varying degrees of success. The main problem was encountered in the time consuming task of chasing up players, distributing and collecting the forms.

The UDC Finance Squash Institute, through the director Craig Lewis, as an example to all players offered full support in any disciplinary action required concerning the behaviour and dress standard of any of its members, and the referees panel is pleased to report that there was not a problem in this regard.

From a referees point of view the Honda Open at the Aotea Centre was certainly an occasion and a half. This is a magnificent setting in which to hold a squash tournament and we appreciated the luxurious seats in the first row of the balcony. However, I am sure most of the referees privileged to officiate at matches at this venue would quite happily have endured less comfortable arrangements if it had meant being

positioned thirty metres nearer the court. A special thank you is in order here to the players in Auckland for their understanding of our difficulties, some of which were alleviated by the use of a "tin umpire" for the first time in this country.

The Derek Cook Memorial was awarded this year to Gavin Whyte from Canterbury for his unbounding enthusiasm, organisation skills and reluctance to turn down any opportunity to improve his refereeing abilities, anywhere, at his own expense. A special award for diplomacy and subtle dry wit should also go to Gavin for his efforts and his tolerance under trying circumstances at the World Women's Champs in Sydney, where the presence of NZ Referees (especially one under assessment for International qualification) was not initially appreciated in accordance with the warmth propounded by the instigators of CSR (closer squash relations). Gavin was part-funded by NZ Squash.

I attended the Sydney event at the request of the NSW SRA as part of their obligation to provide four international referees for a world championship. John Haines was invited to attend as an assessor by the ISRF but was unable to do so. Peter Highsted on holiday in Australia at the time of the teams tournament turned up as a spectator and was asked if he was prepared to make his services available for the remainder of the programme. The organisers welcomed the extra manpower and expertise that Peter's presence provided and Peter was retrospectively part-funded by New Zealand.

So New Zealand's international referees are still keeping as high a profile as is possible in this part of the

world.

During this year discussions were held with Clifford Goh of Singapore SRA and Chris Foo of the Malaysian SRA with a view to referee exchange between our countries, a scheme that involves the host nation providing accommodation. Hopefully we will see the first of these educational and experience enhancing exercises implemented in 1991.

I had occasion to be concerned at some media coverage pertaining to the performances of referees at the Honda Open. If the journalist is reporting the comments of a player involved in a particular match I expect that is fair game, but to make personal judgments on rulings by qualified referees is perhaps swinging from a shaky bough.

This problem surfaced, on a larger scale, in Sydney, with, in one case a player being set up to say something she did not want to, and even then being mis-quoted. It has been mooted that perhaps the match referee or tournament referee or both be present at press conferences and witness to what is said, maybe being asked to contribute words of wisdom of their own.

I should like to express my gratitude to the referees panel, Messrs Haines, Hutchison & Whyte, for their appreciable input to keeping refereeing on a sound footing in this country.

All active referees (National and District) deserve a pat on the back for their efforts in performing a sometimes onerous task. We do it because we wish to be involved but at times it is a trying exercise.

Finally I should like to thank all those players who have approached myself and other referees during tournaments, whether it be while watching a match or at some very rare moment catching us ordering a coke at the bar, and have requested to discuss some aspect or other of refereeing. This phenomenon was most noticeable this year and is an encouraging sign that those involved in the playing of the game are prepared to show more of an interest than in just their forty minutes on court.

Computer Grading Report

Sponsors: UNISYS

The UNISYS National Computerised Grading system has almost completed its fourth year of operation and overall the system is now producing consistent and meaningful results.

Currently there are 14,734 men and 8,551 women on the list, showing a reduction of 227 and 179 respectively over the August 1989 list numbers.

Several Districts have 'culled' out some of their 'deadwood' over recent months and the lists are now showing a truer record of the active player numbers.

Getting results in on time still remains a problem, but overall the whole system is working well and when the problem of processing back dated results is addressed and rectified by the committee during the down period of December - February, then we will have a very capable system in operation. Of the five lists in 1990 that include results (April no results, November still to come) there are 136,065 individual results in the machine. It is estimated that this figure should be more like 160-170,000 if all tournaments come in.

A total number of outstanding tournaments should be available at the AGM, and these will be published District by District.

Charmian Hayes as National Co-ordinator of the system does a tremendous job and were it not for her enthusiasm then I'm sure the whole system would be a lot more difficult overall to handle. Problems should be addressed to Charmian in the first instance by Districts. Our thanks to Charmian for the work and time put in.

The seven lists of 1990 would appear to be one too many. The committee and indeed the District Statisticians AGM will review this, but in the end it will probably be the timing of National Events that determine the list numbers and dates.

Our National Statisticians continue to do a very good job, especially in

monitoring the A and B grade movements. They get some curly complaints at times and in the main are able to handle them with the decorum of a good arbitrator. Thanks to them for the work they do.

Finally, the thanks of all graded players and that of the NZSRA must go to UNISYS for the support they give the national system. Earlier this year NZSRA representatives met with the UNISYS Director of Marketing and discussed several aspects of the operation of the system.

From this a full report was provided to UNISYS including the future projected expansion and UNISYS have very generously provided additional hardware to make the system even more efficient.

My thanks also to a hardworking Grading Committee. After 6 years at the helm I will certainly be looking for a break in 1991.

Men's Statistician Report

1990 saw an increase in the number of grading lists produced from four to seven. The lists were all produced on the scheduled dates thanks to a great effort once again by Charmian Hayes.

The frequency of the lists initially took some districts by surprise with results being supplied to Charmian too late for an up-to-date list. However, by the end of the season this had greatly improved. Most people don't realise the amount of effort and time put in by Club and District Statisticians. Our thanks go to all those who voluntarily worked towards keeping the grading system as correct as possible.

It was pleasing to see the juniors moving through the grades. However, with the NZ Junior team being selected early season it did cause some to question the system. The juniors played many early season games prior to some of the more experienced players starting to play competitively. On the first two grading lists of the year this had the effect of seemingly mis-rating some of the juniors above more experienced players. It must be remembered by all that the grading list is a snap shot of the gradings at the time of the list being produced. It is as up-to-date with current form as the results that have been input into it.

This was my first year in this position and during the year I attended tournaments in a number of Districts. It is hoped the remaining Districts are visited during 1991. While at these tournaments I took the opportunity of talking to as many players and officials as possible re the grading system. The points that kept on coming up were:

- * Juniors must be watched and helped up the grades when appropriate.

- * It was great having the number of grading lists but perhaps the dates need revising to take into account the number of tournaments played during periods of the year.
- * There is still confusion on when manual adjustments are appropriate.
- * Players are still confused at how the system works and more education probably is required in this respect.
- * There is some wish for a national on-line system where up-to-date seedings can be derived.
- * There needs to be a policy for the treatment of players who do not play or play very few games during the season.

Generally, where people understood the system, there was approval.

This year also saw the delivering of information from the grading system to the NZ Selectors. This allowed them to have on paper all the recorded results of players in the "NZ seeding area". The feedback from the selectors was very favourable and I believe this transfer of information should continue.

I wish to thank all those who helped me this year, especially Alan Watton, Vivienne Brumby, Charmian Hayes and all the District Statisticians.

Women's Statistician Report

The 1990 season approached us with the greatest change being the introduction of seven grading lists, with no editing taking place. This was a very positive step to producing a very up to date grading list based on players current results. Districts were soon to realise that the list was to be produced regardless and any late results would not be included in the current list thus penalizing many of their own players - this had the result that by the end of the season results were coming in very efficiently.

This year has been particularly pleasing in seeing juniors move more rapidly on the grading list and it is very encouraging that four junior women have gone to A grade - surely this is where our strength must come from.

We are very fortunate in having Charmian Hayes as National Co-

Thank you to the District Statisticians and Club Statisticians who put many voluntary hours of work into making this grading list as accurate as possible. It still seems player education has to be an ongoing thing even up to reminding players they have to have a code.

The grading list has come a long way from its first inception and I can only see this good trend continuing with the Computer Grading Committee always searching for ways to improve it.

1990 has been a very active year within the international arena in which New Zealand Squash has been represented at two world championship events, the Junior Men's at Paderborn, Germany in late July and the Senior Women in Sydney, Australia during October.

Also the announcement of sponsorship and funding for the UDC Finance Squash Institute at the 1989 AGM was a dream come true for many supporters of this concept, aimed at developing a larger base of international level players for New Zealand.

Susan Devoy

1990 has been a wonderful year for Susan Devoy, regaining the World Championship and in doing so establishing a record of three titles.

Also Susan for the seventh time in a row won the British Open Title and added an eighth Honda Squash Open Championship to her impressive record. All credit to her for her attitude on and off the court. Susan is the major profile of NZ Squash and makes media headlines wherever she goes. Undoubtedly she has the highest profile of any woman in sport in New Zealand at the current time.

UDC Finance Squash Institute

The funding of the Squash Institute by UDC Finance, the NZ Sports Foundation and the NZSRA should enable Squash to develop players in the important elite area. The Institute is seen as a 'school of excellence' and is to be used to introduce our leading emerging players to the tough requirements of preparing for the world international circuit and future New Zealand Teams. Although only fully operational for six months it played a strong role in preparing the players involved with this year's world championships.

Junior Men's World Championship

The UDC New Zealand Junior Men's team while only finishing fifth this time it still provided a very creditable performance.

The continuing emergence of continental European nations was very evident and it is not going to be any easier at future events to maintain our high placings of the past.

Congratulations to Trevor Colyer, as team manager and his team of Wayne Werder, Daniel Sharplin, Tristan Franklin and Grant Linton.

During the individual event held prior to the teams event, Wayne Werder performed best of the New Zealanders, reaching the last sixteen.

NZ Women's World Championships

Especially with Susan Devoy's great win in the world open preceding the teams event New Zealand's international profile remained high at this event. The Honda New Zealand team finished third, as seeded, immediately ahead of the ever improving European countries but some distance behind the very strong England and Australian contingents.

Joanne Williams who has performed with distinction over many years in New Zealand teams has, following the championships announced her retirement from international squash and her contribution to ensuring New Zealand's world position in the sport is greatly acknowledged.

Honda Squash Open

This is the showcase of New Zealand Squash and the Avoca Centre proved to be a superb venue, with up to

1,600 people attending the finals. The class of entry vindicated the reputation this event now has worldwide. Congratulations to Don Cotter who has overseen this event for several years now.

International Squash Rackets Federation

New Zealand is indeed fortunate to have Susie Simcock as Vice President of this world body. Susie's contribution to New Zealand Squash is enormous, and with much happening on the world scene, it is imperative that we are represented wherever possible at the highest level on International Squash organisations.

The ISRF AGM, held in Sydney during the Women's World Championships, saw Bill Murphy attend as New Zealand's representative, along with the President Ray Southey and Director of Squash Development Butch Gifford. The ISRF representative's summary of the meetings appears separately in the annual report.

Asia Pacific

New Zealand again attended the meeting of Asia Pacific circuit countries, this year held in Hong Kong, which continues to play an effective role in keeping the circuit and other international matters common to this area, to the forefront of the international scene.

World Squash Promoters Federation

This body, to which the NZSRA is affiliated, is only in its second year and has yet to fully develop its potential, however it has been able to apply some influence in the important area of regulating the direction path of the quickly expanding world circuit, especially the mens events.

ISRF Representative Report

Internationally squash has continued to make significant strides during 1990 and the International Squash Rackets Federation (ISRF) as the governing body of the sport has itself undergone major changes.

With the new officers, led by Malaysia's Tunku Imran and including Australia's Bob Finch, New Zealand's own Susie Simcock and Malaysian Prasad Pillai, a very forthright and businesslike approach has been installed. This has been further enhanced in latter months with Ted Wallbuton in place as the Executive Director and for the first time his important position is able to concentrate fully on ISRF matters, rather than sharing time with other growing areas of the sport. This has coincided with the shift of the ISRF office to Hastings in England, taking with it the women's players body (WISPA), but leaving the more advanced mens players association (ISPA) to further its requirements separately.

The implementation of the Executive Committee Members structure at the recent AGM in Sydney will allow a major thrust towards developing the five continental regions comprising Africa, the Americas, Europe, Oceania and Asia. This has two major priorities - firstly, and very importantly, to develop and promote the sport in these regions. There are huge opportunities available for growth including the Eastern bloc countries, the United States, China, other Asian and a number of African countries. Strong federations in Asia and Europe are already working extremely well on this but it now needs the other three regions to properly develop and co-ordinate. Nearer home for example there are at least a dozen countries outside of Australia and New Zealand playing squash in the south pacific area but not involved with the ISRF as yet.

The second priority is to ensure the regional thrust ties in towards involvement in 'major games' with the continued move to establish squash as an Olympic sport.

These moves do require increased funding and the ISRF will always struggle in this area while trying to keep membership subscriptions as low as practical, however it is pleasing to see international accreditation projects and

sponsorships are now playing a significant part of this.

The role of the International Squash Tournament Board (ISTB) has been further established. Led by the ISRF and including ISPA and WISPA as well as the relatively new World Squash Promoters Federation, it has a critical role to play right now and into the immediate future to ensure that the world wide tournament programme including world championships are effectively co-ordinated. During a period when the sport is growing strongly in the international competitive arena.

New Zealand continues to play an active role along with other asia pacific countries to ensure the major events in these regions retain a high profile. In addition this interaction has enabled valuable progress in other developmental areas of the sport amongst asia pacific neighbours.

New Zealand and Australia need to further establish mutual trans tasman activities and in doing so provide a sound footing for the growth of the Oceania region.

ISRF AGM.

The 1990 AGM was held in Sydney during the women's world championships in October and from the meeting the following were the main items.

World Championships

Progress continued with establishing longer range venue allocations, stabilizing annual time slots and the rationalizing of the teams event formats.

Applying from 1991 the men's and women's team championships will be played (where 24 teams are entered) in six pools of four teams over a duration of six days this means the top eight seeded teams only will effectively be playing for first place however it has been introduced to retain the overall individual and teams event within a two weeks duration.

Including allocations made in Sydney the future world championship venue schedule now stands as:

Kuwait remains under consideration for the 8th Junior Men's World Championships in 1994 and allocation of this event has been left open until April 1, 1991.

Time slots for the various championships will now be as follows:

Juniors : between 1 July - 30
September.

Open Women : during last two weeks
of September and first
two weeks of October.

Open Men : during last week of
November and first
week of December.

Rules of Squash

Approval was given to allow the ISRF from time to time to request or authorise its members to carry out certain rule experiments. This was to establish a mechanism to ensure experiments are properly co-ordinated.

As a result all countries are being requested to undertake experimentation of the point-a-rally scoring method in particular and during 1991 to establish whether there is any consensus to pursue this system into the more traditional areas of competitive squash. Any rule changes internationally remain under moratorium until 1992.

Refereeing

The international refereeing programme continues to advance and a number of bylaws have been introduced and/or upgraded to increase international refereeing participation at events.

Honorary Membership

Honorary Membership of the ISRF has been introduced with the objective of such membership to be granted to those individuals who have given outstanding service to the ISRF.

Racket Specifications

The ISRF "dimensions of a squash racket" have been freed up by deleting the requirement for a maximum width across the face of the framework of the head while increasing the depth across the face by 5mm, to 25mm. This is aimed at encouraging more latitude in design without diminishing the safety factor.

Squash Ball Specification

A new specification for the yellow dot squash ball was approved. This won't have any effect on balls com-

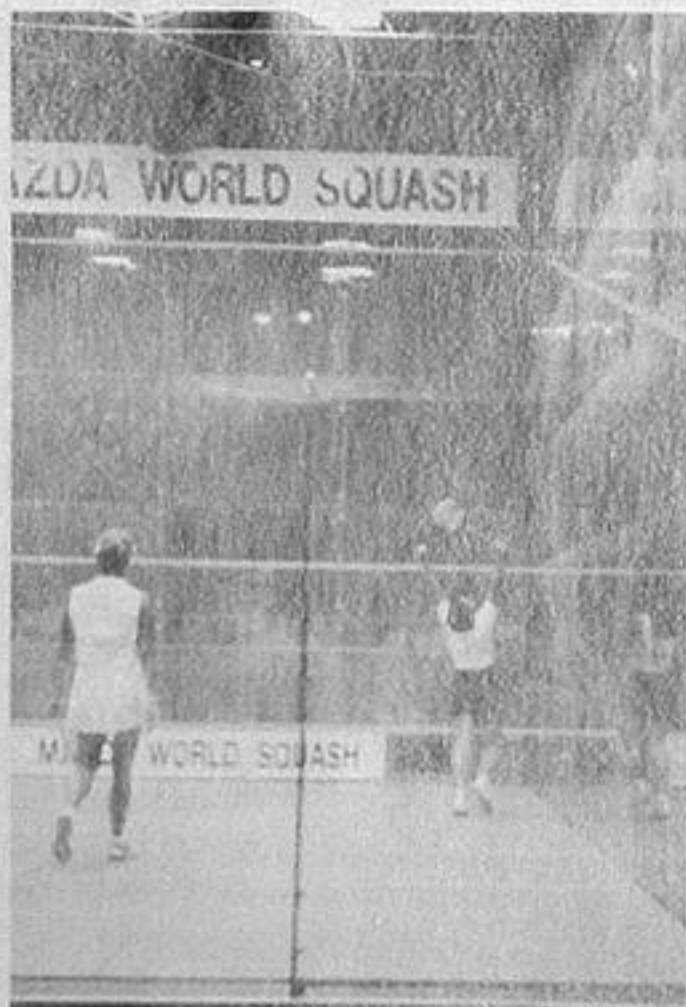
monly used in New Zealand but as a result of extensive testing undertaken in the past two years now provides a specification that is appropriate to a wider range of temperature and updates the traditional specification measurements.

Seminar Sessions

The AGM conference successfully continued its series of seminar sessions including topics on medical, junior development, coaching, technical development, the marketing of squash and also women's squash promotion. The ISRF is developing a modified squash game that can either be played on a full size court or on a court such as the NZSRA micro court. The next twelve months should see this fairly advanced with a launch planned during the world championships in Finland next November. The ISRF has also established an international coaching committee to develop and co-ordinate coaching programmes worldwide.

The Bidwell File

Noted New Zealand sports journalist Peter Bidwell here, in his regular contribution to the NZSRA annual, casts an objective eye over the path of Squash in 1990.

No matter how you look at it any review of 1990 keeps coming back to Susan Devoy.

For all her periods of self-doubt beforehand, particularly during the Honda New Zealand Open at the magnificent Aotea Centre, Devoy reinforced her right to be regarded as the greatest player in the women's game in recovering her world title in Sydney.

It was amazing during the early rounds of the championship at the Thornleigh centre to hear how well Britons Lisa Opie and Martine Le Moignan were playing, how Australia were going to supply the winner from one of their powerful squad, and how ripe the top seeded Devoy was to be eliminated.

The word was that Devoy had been lucky to win the New Zealand Open in August, and that the other women had caught her up in terms of fitness and mental toughness. She was rapidly becoming yesterday's champion.

They forgot though that since losing her title in The Netherlands 18 months earlier to Le Moignan that never a day went by when Devoy did not think about avenging that loss or was not reminded of the final result.

Devoy desperately wanted that title back, her whole approach to playing was focused on nothing else. She was prepared to flog herself in training countless matches against men to ensure she was ready for whatever eventuated.

It was all fairly low-key till Devoy struck Australian Liz Irving in the quarter finals, a player of immense ability but one with a record for not winning often enough in tight situations.

The considerable number of New Zealanders in the gallery at the Homebush Sports Centre were stunned in to silence when a nervous, tentative Devoy lost the first two games to Irving, the second after leading 6-2.

It was going to require a brave, error-free performance to win from here, and a rather shaken Devoy was extremely relieved to get through in five games.

To those watching it was agonizing, hardly the performance to engender optimism for Devoy's semi final the

following day against No 3 seed Danielle Drady, of Australia. Though Devoy's husband John Oakley was confident that the fright was just what she needed to pull herself together it remained to be seen.

Devoy erased all the doubts with a ruthless display against Drady, who beforehand had rather fancied her chances. The nerves were gone, and Devoy more easily got up the court to dominate a despondent Drady in straight games.

Such was her authority that Devoy was immediately installed as the favourite in the final the following day against Le Moignan, which the New Zealander never looked in danger of losing.

Not that Le Moignan gave in at all. Devoy was at the top of her game, and with the pressure Le Moignan's unorthodox style led to mistakes.

As such Devoy became the first player to win three women's world titles, and with seven consecutive British Opens to go with them Devoy has carved herself a position of permanent eminence in the game.

As this article was being written there was the prospect of Devoy continuing her career, if not for too much longer. Had she lost in Sydney that may have been it but the decisiveness of her later performances may have encouraged her to contest next year's British Open.

At 25 Devoy still enjoys the thrill of competition despite the agonies she puts herself through. Fear of failure has been a big motivating tool but Devoy is

running out of goals now.

Training is a hassle. Equally Devoy is not sure what avenues to pursue should she give up playing.

After the sport's stuttering for a year or two in New Zealand it was pleasing to notice the advances made in 1990.

This included moving the association's headquarters from Tauranga to Auckland and Bill Murphy's major influence as chief executive, the establishment of the UDC Finance Squash Institute, the staging of the New Zealand Open at the superb Aotea Centre after some rather drafty venues, the ability of the junior men to maintain their standing by finishing fifth in the world championships in Germany, and the climb made by Glen Wilson on the men's circuit with Ross Norman entering the twilight years.

Just when Wilson's career looked on the verge of faltering in England about British Open time assistance with an asthma condition, and at last evidence of a hunger for success led to rapid progress, and the satisfaction of toppling fellow professional Rory Watt to win the New Zealand closed title in Hamilton.

Wilson's fortunes turned on the international satellite circuit where he won five tournaments, and hauled his world ranking from the 90s into the mid 40s. Back home he won all three UDC satellite tournaments in convincing fashion, and to beat Watt twice in Hamilton provided a further boost.

In recently reaching the final of the Bermuda Open Wilson lifted his ranking to 42nd, just two placings below Watt, who had a frustrating year, and Norman, ranked 13th, proved he was still an international force by beating brilliant Australian Rodney Martin 15-13 in the fifth game to venture in to the last eight of the world open in Toulouse, the same city where he had become world champion four years earlier.

A relaxed Norman was back home for a week in September during which he expressed a desire to represent his country at next year's worlds, and to spend time in the future helping the youngsters succeed.

The setting up of the institute under

the direction of Australians Craig Lewis and David Fear, Neven Barbour and Rob Crothall took time to function properly, and there was sadness that last year's junior world finalist, Lynora Hati, decided she did not want to be involved.

It is to be hoped Hati is not lost to the game, particularly with Devoy and

Donna Newton's plans uncertain, and Joanne Williams having announced her retirement in Sydney.

Marie Pearson may soon be left to prop up the women, assisted by the emerging Philippa Beams, who did so well in Sydney, and perhaps Hati.

Overall though the Squash Rackets Association can be immensely proud of their achievements in 1990. Properly run the institute promises to provide New Zealand with a pool of players capable of maintaining this country's high profile on the world circuits.

Players Representative Report

The 1990 squash season was very active both domestically and internationally for New Zealand players and teams.

Our top ranked players performed extremely well in the most important events on the international squash calendar - the Mens and Womens World Opens. Firstly Susan Devoy's win, regaining her world crown created tremendous public support with live T.V. coverage, and must surely go down as one of if not the top sporting achievement by a New Zealander in 1990. With Devoy backed up in the teams event by Joanne Williams, Donna Newton and Marie Pearson, New Zealand finished a creditable third, with this being both Williams and Newton's final teams event for New Zealand - both have now retired from the international scene. Congratulations to both after many years of service to New Zealand representative teams.

On the mens scene both Ross Norman and Rory Watt made their presence felt at the World Open in France with upset victories. Although not marvelous seasons for both, it is good to see Norman still playing to a good international standard at the ripe old age of 30, and encouraging for Watt to end the year on a good note. Congratulations must also go to Glen Wilson who has made excellent progress this year, greatly improving his ISPA ranking and winning a number of ISPA events, both here and overseas.

Our junior boys, after much build-up and training performed well in Germany finishing fifth, although with an ounce of luck it could have been higher. Wayne Werder made the most of a tough individual event, and pushed many higher ranked players.

On the domestic front a successful year with all National events running well. The UDC satellite series was introduced

for the first time combining the Auckland, Wellington and Canterbury/ South Island Opens, and should attract even greater overseas talent next year. With no tournament Players series, the District Open events had to stand on their own merit. Although successful this year both management and districts must monitor these events closely, as they are the life blood in getting top players around New Zealand.

The National championships were conducted very smoothly by the ever efficient Hamilton club in September. Top rate performances by Glen Wilson and Susan Devoy earned them respective New Zealand titles. Waikato, as expected took out the Womens Interdistrict teams event while the Wellington mens team overpowered Auckland to gain their first teams title since winning the event in 1983 at Timaru.

One area causing great concern is the teams event. A two division format has been proposed and through the players meeting has been generally accepted. Although personally, at first a great believer

in the above format, much thought must be given in weighting up the 'pros' and 'cons' before introducing or changing the format at the AGM. Proof of this is shown in other sports, in how netball and rugby have both had second thoughts on their current divisional formats.

1990 was also eventful for this was the first year of operation for the UDC Finance Squash Institute. Based in Auckland this facility is the means for our sport to produce players to true international standards. Although there have been teething problems, and a general lack of communication to players, this is now improving and the board of control are optimistic and have very much their fingers on the pulse.

Finally, as I will not be standing as Player's Representative next year due to personal and business pressures, I would like to thank management for their help and wish the incoming representative all the best.

Selectorial Report

The selectorial programme for the 1990 season consisted of the following:

- (a) preparation of monthly seeding lists
- (b) seeding of District and National Open events
- (c) selection of the Honda New Zealand Womens team to World Championships
- (d) consultation with the UDC Finance Squash Institute re scholarships
- (e) most improved players men/women

The selectors attended 9 of the 10 District Championships, which included the North and South Island Championships, the NZ Under 23 Championships, the Cousins Shield/Mitchell Cup, the National Championships and the Honda Squash Open.

Commencing in May with the Waikato Championships, seedings lists were prepared on a monthly basis for use in the seeding of District Open events.

The New Zealand Womens team was selected in August at the conclusion of the New Zealand Open event. There were no great surprises in the players named, with Susan Devoy, Joanne Williams and Donna Newton certain selections. Marie Pearson had started the season vying with Lynora Hati for the fourth spot but had opened a clear gap by the time the team came to be named.

For the national ranking list the selectors continued the policy of requiring players to have competed in at least five District/National events in order to be considered, with the exception of players based overseas.

In the men's ranking list three of the New Zealand Junior Mens team gained places in the top 16 whilst all four of the 1989 New Zealand Junior Womens have been ranked in the womens top 16.

The selectors had little difficulty in selecting Glen Wilson as recipient of the mens most improved player award after a highly successful season which saw him shoot up the world rankings and take his first New Zealand national title

with a great victory over Rory Watt in the final.

Philippa Beams took the womens award on account of her steady rise up the rankings over the course of the season. As well, in the South Island championships, she recorded fine wins over Marie Pearson and Donna Newton. It was pleasing to note that Philippa continued her good form at the World Championships in Sydney in October in defeating the fourth ranked Irish player.

The 1990 season was noticeable for the fact that especially in mens competition quite a number of junior players had achieved standards which enabled them to compete at advanced open level. However disparity was noted in the seedings of open and junior events, due in part to the fact that the junior selectors were unaware of the results of junior players in open events. Should the trend of participation by junior players in these events continue, it is suggested that the convenors of the senior and junior selection panels arrange regular liaison to ensure uniformity in approach.

I am now completing my term on the selection panel. I would like to thank my fellow selectors Barrie Matthews and Barry Gardiner for their cheerful input and patience during the lengthy conference calls.

NZSRA Ranking Lists 1990

World squash champion Susan Devoy and former world title holder Ross Norman again head the national rankings for 1990. National champion Glen Wilson's elevation to second behind Norman in a year of major change around in the men's rankings, and very little movement in the top women's rankings are the features of the lists.

Wilson's fine international performances and particularly his victory over Rory Watt in the national final in Hamilton earlier this year has seen him improve from 5th position in 1989. While Watt, ranked three by the selectors, holds a better international

ranking than Wilson the national panel has used its selectorial discretion to place Wilson ahead of him.

Another feature of the men's top 16 list is eight new entrants into the rankings. This follows on from 1989 when seven new faces appeared, indicating significant change in the overall men's competitive arena in New Zealand squash over the past two years.

New Zealand representative Scott Harrison's performances earlier in the season retained him fourth position while Whakatane's Paul Steel has continued to improve his claims to where he is now fifth, ahead of Nigel Lloyd of Christchurch who appears on

the list for the first time in the high position of 6th. This follows some excellent performances in the middle part of the season including the defeat of Harrison in the first round of the UDC Finance Auckland Championships.

Anthony McMurtrie (Hamilton) returns to the rankings after a couple of years away from the competitive scene while Michael Allred (Christchurch) coming in for the first time last year at 12 has improved four places. New Zealand junior champion Wayne Werder of Hamilton and his world junior team mates Tristan Franklin (Christchurch) and Daniel Sharplin (Ashburton) have gained their first

senior rankings with Werder being awarded 9th position. Other players to appear for the first time included Hamilton's Rick Cartmill, Shane Adams from Auckland and Keri Keri's Malcolm McBain.

Susan Devoy as the No. 1 in the world sees her national position unchallenged, with fellow New Zealand representatives Joanne Williams at two and Donna Newton three, the same positions they have held for many seasons. Marie Pearson, the new member in the New Zealand women's team this year has exchanged positions since last season, at 4 and 5, with Lynora Hati of Reporoa, who had a

disappointing season given her tremendous results in 1989.

Philippa Beams, from Christchurch, the winner of this year's most improved female player award has jumped from 11 in 1989 to No 6 while New Zealand junior champion 17 year old Leilani Marsh from Hamilton has continued her impressive strides winning 7th spot after a first time entry at 12 in 1989. Besides Devoy, Williams and Marsh, Waikato District are well represented with in total seven players in the women's top 16. Others include Kay Collins who has retained her position in the middle of the list at 8 with youngsters Angela Toal and Nita Pearson immediately below her.

UDC Finance Squash Institute's scholar Jo Smith has been rewarded for a solid years performance with a first time No. 11 ranking along with other new rankings Jenny Bell (Waikato) at 12, Judith Hill (Auckland) 15, and Jenny Norton (Southern) in 16th position.

To be considered for the rankings players had to compete in at least five district or national fixtures during the year which resulted in a few players, notably including Dan McQueen from (Rotorua) and Shane Hagan from Wellington not receiving rankings despite impressive showings at the national championships in particular.

19 year old Glen Wilson (Wellington) capped off a remarkable season when awarded the most improved male player of the year trophy presented at the national championships in Hamilton.

Following a couple of leaner years where the promise shown in earlier junior days had not been quite fulfilled, Wilson, in a revitalized manner won an impressive lineup of titles during the season including the national championships. Five satellite circuit victories also saw him improve his world ranking over 60 places as well as move to number 2 in the NZSRA ranking list behind New Zealand's long time international star Ross Norman.

The women's award went to Philippa Beams the 20 year old Cantabrian who during the season climbed from 11th in the rankings to 6. In doing so she recorded excellent results against a number of higher

ranked players. Whilst she did not win any major titles during the year her performances in the UDC Finance Satellite Series were a highlight of an excellent season for Beams. In addition,

a month following the award, she performed very creditably in the women's world championships in Sydney reaching the third round of that event.

UDC Finance Squash Institute of New Zealand

The UDC Finance Squash Institute of New Zealand was successfully launched on May 17 at an official function held at Ellerslie Racecourse in Auckland. Special guests included the Hon. Sir David Beattie (President of the NZ Sports Foundation and NZSRA Patron), Mr Jeff Pitt (Managing Director UDC Finance Ltd), Messrs. Graham Davy & Keith Hancox (NZ Sports Foundation), and world squash greats, Geoff Hunt & Susan Devoy.

We are very appreciative of the corporate backing provided by UDC Finance along with the NZ Sports Foundation support and NZSRA funding which has enabled the Institute to become a reality.

Our principal aim is to foster the development of outstanding young squash players into international competitors. The concept is to create a supportive environment finely tuned to the special needs of elite squash players.

Planning and programming for the Institute began in earnest in December 1989 following the sponsorship and funding agreement reached in principal during November 1989.

The initial establishment period has been very positive and has focused predominately on two main requirements. Firstly to establish a long term management and operating policy. Secondly to provide an ongoing day to day programme involving the Institute members.

Board meetings, consultant meetings and administration meetings are held to facilitate the ongoing programme.

Consultants

A core of consultants have been established following the appointment of Mr Craig Lewis a physical educationist and sports psychologist, as the full time Institute Director in April. These include Rob Crothall and Neven Barbour as squash consultants and John Mayhew, Tony Edwards and Jeni Pearce available as medical and nutrition consultants.

More recently David Fear, a highly qualified coach from Australia has been engaged for the coaching.

revolving around general consultancy, player motivation and promotion of the Institute. Her involvement has included participation in training sessions and taking part in Institute activities including the inaugural "Clinics of Excellence", held recently.

Institute Programme, Activities and Membership

Sixteen scholarship holders were initially identified and the operating programme of the Institute began immediately following the launch in May.

A number of members have been regularly using the Institute base for day to day training. Others have remained at their home base attending the Institute facility when appropriate.

It has become clear that to receive full benefit of the Institute, scholarship holders need to be based at the Institute. The facilities, expertise available and stimulus of training with other elite players are the major benefits which makes this desirable. Although located at the Institute players will remain affiliated to their homebased clubs and districts in national competition.

Some scholarship holders will still however be remaining in the home environment outside Auckland for schooling reasons and attending the Institute on a regular basis.

In October current and new scholarship applications were assessed. A number of the original scholarship members have been continued and new scholarships have been awarded for 1991.

Current international players who are not scholarship members are offered membership at the Institute. These players are recognised as an important part of the competitive training of scholarship members. They are offered full use of the Institute training and consulting facilities and some tournament travel.

It has been recognised that youngsters under the age of 16 years are generally not of appropriate maturity and development stage to cope effectively with the physical and mental demands of the full time Institute programme. However it has been recognised that there are players of exceptional talent under 16 years of age who would benefit from some involvement from time to time with the Institute, e.g. within school holidays, Institute clinics and consultancies in their home territory, and this will be part of the ongoing programme.

The Institute budget and other resources are primarily targeted toward scholarship members and the level of assistance provided depends upon the individual scholarship holders playing programme in relation to their current progress. Players generally fall into two categories - domestic programme and international programme, with the latter being the natural progression of the former.

International Programme

Earlier in the season Marie Pearson spent January to April in England while Glen Wilson and Paul Steel had February to June competing in Hong Kong, the United Kingdom and the United States. During August these players, along with Joanne Wilkins (and Susan Devoy) competed in Australia while Wilson and Steel also took on the Asian events in the Asia Pacific circuit.

Wilson has since been competing in Canada and Bermuda leading up to the World Open in November in France. Leilani Marsh attended the Australian Age group championships in October.

The Institute provided travel and sustenance assistance where appropriate with programmes aimed specifically at international experience, establishing international rankings and in two specific cases providing more international competition for prospective members of the women's representative team.

Rory Watt (current international category) returned to New Zealand over a seven week period in August and September where he trained at the Institute and competed in tournaments.

The UDC NZ Junior Men's team who competed in the World Junior Champs in Germany in July trained and prepared at the Institute over a 6 week period. Three of the four players of the NZ team returned committed to

continue full Institute programmes. The Honda NZ Women's team with Marie Pearson making her debut also prepared at the Institute prior to playing in the World Women's Individual teams event in Sydney in October.

Overseas Players at the Institute

A Singapore development group spent time at the Institute in May/June while three players, two from UK and one from USA spent several weeks training with Institute based members. A Hong Kong player is scheduled to be at the Institute in December. This overseas involvement is considered important to provide player variation especially for the younger NZ players. It will also in time provide an exchange base for NZ players going overseas.

Institute Scholarship Applications

Applications for the Institute are on an annual basis closing each September with programmes starting October/November for scholarship holders.

Applications are open for anyone to apply with application forms being held by District Associations.

Talent Identification

New Zealand Squash's development and coaching programme working in conjunction with the Institute will provide a natural talent identification base. From time to time however talent identification clinics may be held similar to one staged this year in September, in Auckland where a group of potential members were invited to the institute. These players were invited to attend following consultation with national selectors, the Director of Squash Development and player's coaches.

Clinics of Excellence

Two "Clinics of Excellence" have been held in November at Christchurch and Hamilton. These were designed to promote the Institute philosophies of international level player training as well as general coaching methods. Over 80 coaches accepted invitations to

attend. These clinics were also geared toward client promotion for UDC and media involvement.

Bulletin

A quarterly bulletin is being produced and the first edition was published recently. We see this as the public relations vehicle keeping everyone informed of the ongoing work and progress of the Institute.

Support Sponsors

All Seasons Squash and Fitness Centre remains a significant support sponsor by providing the base for the Institute while Hi-tec Sports are producing distinctive Institute uniforms, following consultation with Promotus Advertising Ltd who work closely with the Institute on promotional matters.

Summary

The UDC Finance Squash Institute is now up and running. We currently have 20 scholarship holders. Already we have seen some good progress from a number of our members. 19 yr old Glen Wilston who won the NZ National title, now has improved his ISPA ranking to 42 while Marie Pearson is now an established member of the NZ Women's team with a WISPA ranking of 25 and Leilani Marsh impressed by winning the Australia U/17 age group title.

Finally "thank you" and my sincere appreciation to all Board members and our indefatigable secretary Wilma Halling, for their attendance at meetings and many hours of hard work and time which has been necessary to get the UDC Finance Squash Institute of New Zealand established.

Women's World Championships

Undoubtedly the highlight of the 8th Women's World Championships held in Sydney, Australia in October, was the magnificent victory of Susan Devoy in the world open event regaining the world title she had won on two previous occasions and setting a record of title wins in the process.

Devoy's brilliant performances in the semi final and final in particular, capped off a tremendous year for her. She left no doubt as to her superiority over the rest of the women players in the world and the straight games final annihilation of England's Martine Le Moignan, who wrested the title from Devoy 19 months previously in Holland, demonstrated this fully.

The other New Zealand team members Joanne Williams, Donna Newton and Marie Pearson all performed to their world rankings in the individual championships with Williams going the furthest reaching the quarter finals where she lost to Le Moignan. Newton went out in the third round to England's Lucy Soutter and Pearson,

appearing at her first senior championship, had the daunting experience of running into former world champion Vicki Cardwell in the 2nd round, losing in three games.

New Zealand was seeded third in the teams event and had to withstand a reasonable fight by the fourth seeded Germany team before staving them off to take third place, repeating their performance at the previous world championships.

Following straight forward victories against Scotland and The Netherlands in the first two rounds the teams crunch match was against Australia in round three. The tasman neighbours proved too strong however winning comfortably two matches to one. The rubber was not without its drama though. In her win against the exceedingly tenacious No. 1 Australian Robyn Lambourne, Devoy gave everyone in the gallery and particularly herself, a nasty fright twice crashing to the floor. The latter time banging her head severely against the

wall. It exemplified the grit and determination of the world champion which showed through once again when only partly recovered after a few minutes delay, she returned and fought back from match ball down to take the 5th game 10-9.

New Zealand then came up against England in the semi final and while the team lost 3-0, performances by Donna Newton and Joanne Williams in particular meant the world title holders had to work for their victory. Devoy, still suffering from the injuries against Australia's Lambourne, struggled against England's No. 1 Lisa Opie losing in three games, being the only competitive match the world champion dropped all year.

The finals saw New Zealand dispatch Germany for third placing while in the long awaited battle for supremacy of the world England ran out close but deserved winners against Australia, to retain the title they have held since 1985.

Honda Squash Open

The 1990 Honda Squash Open turned out to be one of the greatest squash tournaments held in New Zealand and with the semi final and final rounds played at the magnificent Aotea Centre in Auckland, the tournament was lifted to a new level of public awareness. A brilliant entry of virtually all the top men and women players in the world guaranteed high quality squash and the associated media coverage and turnout of public to all the matches, including the earlier rounds at the Henderson Squash Club, did justice to the entry.

The event became a major build-up and associated public drawcard for Susan Devoy as a prelude to the world championships to be held later in Sydney. As well the return of Jahangir Khan to New Zealand for the first time since 1987 created tremendous interest.

While Jahangir's fitness and match condition was obviously below peak especially compared to his record breaking 9th victory in the British Open earlier in the year, he showed glimpses of his greatness before losing to an ecstatic Chris Robertson in the semi final. It was the first occasion Robertson had beaten the master.

Jahangir's countryman and reigning world champion Jansher Khan displayed

tremendous skill and ruthless determination in taking out the final from the star studded field.

Defending champion Chris Dittmar tried valiantly to repeat his previous year's performance however went down in the semi final to Jansher Khan in five games without quite producing the drama of their magnificent 1988 finals clash.

While New Zealand's No. 1 player Ross Norman was missing from the entry for the first time in a number of years, other Kiwi players performed well to make the first round of the tournament. Only Glen Wilson and Roy Watt however progressing beyond that point with both players losing out in the next round. Wilson going down in four games to semi finalist and world No. 3 Robertson, and Watt not being able to stop the mercurial Rodney Martin, of Australia.

Devoy in the middle of her build up for the world championships, struggled to find her best form at any stage during the tournament. Nonetheless, and to the urging of the big home crowds, she displayed her tremendous fighting qualities to repulse strong challenges from Australians Sarah Fitzgerald and Robyn Lambourne in the quarter and semi finals respectively, and then

against world title holder Martine Le Moignan of England in the final. All three matches were close and hard five game encounters. In her semi final Le Moignan had beaten 1989 finalist Danielle Drady of Australia in four games.

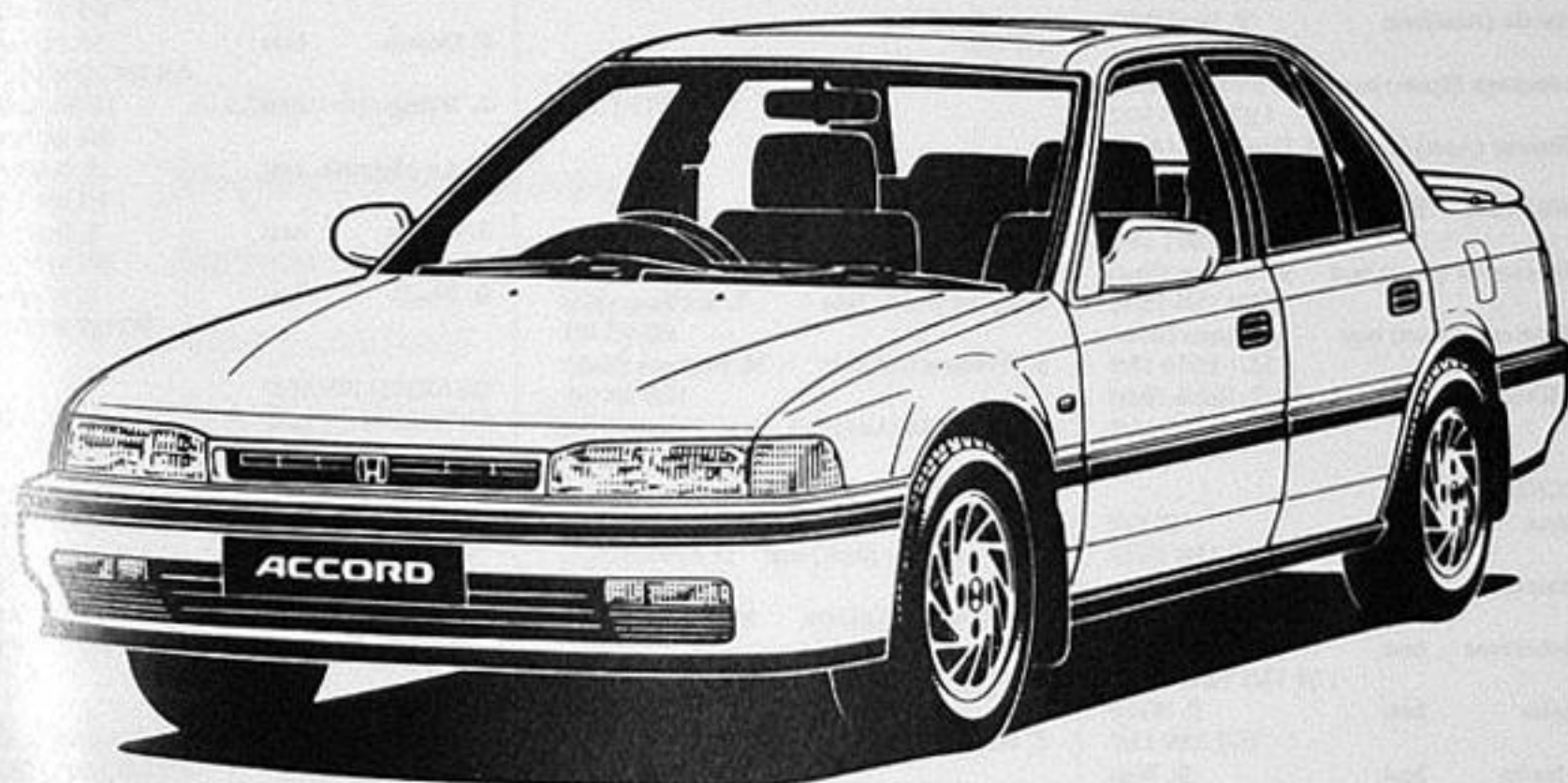
Eleven New Zealanders including former champion Robyn Brownlee lined up in the first round with the majority having to win qualifying matches. Similar to the men most of them fell at that hurdle with only Devoy and Joanne Williams progressing. Williams having the frustration of being drawn against Devoy in the second round.

In all 89 players entered with 61 from overseas including 33 men and 28 women. This included the top seven men in the world and nine of the top 10 women.

Planning & Finance Report

For Year Ended 30 September 1990

Committee

During the year Management agreed that the existing Finance and Administration Committee should be restructured and provided with a broader brief, to encompass ongoing planning considerations for the future development of New Zealand Squash.

The committee was, of course, required to maintain a strong watch over financial aspects of the association - a most important role, especially with the tougher economic times placing greater demand on a decreasing source of support funding.

In consideration of the future plans and directions for the association, the committee agreed to recommend that early reviews be carried out into the junior/youth activities (including the administration) and also the overall competitive structure for New Zealand Squash. This move was adopted by management and the relevant review committees commenced their work in September with a view to having recommendations available by the time of this year's AGM.

In its ongoing role in planning for the future the committee will be continuing to build a structure appropriate for the overall development of the sport, with a review of the present overall administrative structure also likely to undergo consideration in the near future.

Income and Expenditure

Management immediately following the 1989 AGM had a major priority in rebudgeting for the year's activities following the adoption of the "redirection" programme at the AGM. It will be recalled that while a forecast was adopted at the AGM the approval given to further action under the redirection programme required a significant realignment of expenditure and related funding. It is relevant to note that the forecast adopted by the AGM provided for a net deficit of \$53650 after allowing for depreciation, and the rebudget in February, which included for all of the various decisions taken at the AGM, provided for a net deficit of \$55,550.

The end of year position showing a net deficit of \$22884 therefore compares very favourably with these projections

and in turn results in a cash surplus of \$32612 after providing for \$55496 in depreciation.

Delays in the early part of the year in fully implementing the redirection programme helped this result. At the same time the new year commenced with a number of uncertainties arising as to the level of overall sponsorship projected to be available, especially in the areas of national events and junior squash.

With this uncertainty (which continued throughout the year) Management agreed early on that prudent measures for savings should be implemented wherever possible and this was achieved in a number of areas.

Bringing to account the full NZ Squash Centre surplus (referred to further on) also assisted the end of year position.

In the circumstances, and in recognition of the major changes undertaken during the year, the financial result for the association's activities must be considered to be most satisfactory.

Reserves

The International Reserve Fund has been transferred to accumulated funds and the Mitchell Trust funds income normally associated with this is included in Grants, Sponsorships and Endorsements.

Future cash surpluses will be set aside in a general reserve to assist all expenditure including international participation.

Affiliation Levies

Although it is pleasing to note that income from levies for 1990 was very close to that budgeted for, there are still very confusing signals regarding membership numbers, and the proposed revamp of the levy structure should assist this with it utilising known statistics.

The problems associated with establishing a reasonably exact determination of funding available under the existing individual levy system have been well reported and discussed over the last few years, and Management's continuing investigation into a more appropriate system has now reached finality with a recommendation for a change to a Club Levy system, to the 1990 AGM.

Following direction from earlier AGM's, that any new system should be based on 'user pays' policy, management's new proposal utilises fixed measurables including courts and the computer grading system which should provide for a guaranteed analysis of levy income available for each year ahead.

Importantly the proposed changes to the system should also provide for more meaningful membership returns from Clubs, and hence more accuracy in determining the future growth of the sport.

Either under the existing system, or the proposed new system, there is an increase being recommended in the affiliation levy. No increases have been implemented for three years effectively and this has caught up with funding requirements. The recommended increase under the present system is \$2.00 per affiliation member, to \$11.00 for seniors and \$9.00 for Juniors.

New Zealand Squash Centre

The activity of the Centre is shown separately with the report from the New Zealand Squash Centre Board and it is pleasing to record that the Centre experienced a very good year, especially in comparison with the previous year, and with the completion of mortgage commitments this now represents a very well managed and profitable facility.

At the 1989 AGM it was intended that the association utilise a similar level of Centre surpluses as previous years toward its funding for 1990, but the variations earlier referred to required that there be increased draw offs to cater for the association's overall activities and this was allowed for in the rebudget in February.

Now, with the mortgage repaid, policy has been further amended to bring all NZ Squash Centre surpluses into the NZSRA operating income, after setting aside NZ Squash Centre depreciation funds for reinvestment purposes.

UDC Finance Squash Institute

The pleasing success in achieving major financial support for the Institute provided the means for not only the establishment of programmes to improve the development of elite players, but also for rationalizing demand on the association's valuable funding. Under the agreement with the New Zealand Sports Foundation and UDC Finance there remains an understanding for an annual NZSRA contribution of \$50,000. This funding had previously been used in association with pretour preparation, and special assistance costs to players.

The Institute has been fully operational for six months and is run as a separate accounting identity. The funding however from UDC Finance and the New Zealand Sports Foundation is included in the Grants Sponsorships and Endorsements income and the transfer of these funds, combined with the NZSRA contribution, appears in the expenditure schedule. A schedule summarizing the Institute expenditure appears separately in the Accounts.

Hillary Commission

The Hillary Commission continues to provide solid support to the marketing and development areas of squash with grant-aid funding which is generously acknowledged by the NZSRA. The details of this assistance is outlined in the notes to the Accounts.

General Administration

The earlier agreed plan for relocation of the NZSRA office to Auckland had a major bearing on administrative activities during the year, although by year end most difficulties had been

overcome, with the office now operating in the manner intended.

The relocation, and the need to employ and train replacement staff meant that there was a short period where some activities suffered delay, but this was a factor which had been acknowledged when the decision for relocation had earlier been made.

The present staffing complement provides for the satisfactory continuation of administration under the present structure, and should suffice for some time ahead.

The Committee wishes to acknowledge the efforts of the office and staff in overcoming a number of difficulties in a major year of change.

The Convenor also wishes to acknowledge the assistance given by committee members during the year.

Statement of Accounting Policies

1. General Accounting Policies

The measurement base adopted is that of historical cost.

Reliance is placed on the fact that the Association is a going concern. Accrual accounting is used to match expenses and revenues.

2. Consolidation

The trading result from the Centre and the operation of the Institute have not been incorporated into the general funds of the Association, due to the different nature of the operations. The three Balance Sheets however have been consolidated.

3. Stock

Stock has been valued at the lower of cost or net realizable value. Due allowance has been made for slow moving stocks.

4. Depreciation

Apart from the Perspex Court referred to in the Annual Report depreciation generally is calculated at the ordinary rate approved for tax purposes except in the case of the New Zealand Squash Centre building where a rate of depreciation to equate the term of the current lease, due to expire in 1999, has been used.

5. Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at expected realizable value. Where a debt is considered to be irrecoverable it has been written off in the accounts.

6. New Zealand Squash Centre Valuation

An up-to-date valuation of the New Zealand Squash Centre has been impossible to obtain, but the latest estimate of the reinstatement cost of the buildings for insurance purposes is \$2.66 million.

7. Goods and Services Tax

All transactions are recorded exclusive of G.S.T.

8. Changes

There have been no material changes in accounting policies since the previous financial statements.

Notes to Accounts

1. International Reserve Fund

This reserve fund is no longer operating and the balance has been transferred to accumulated funds. 1990 Mitchell Trust Income has been included in the Income and Expenditure account.

4. New Zealand Squash Centre

The total cash received for the year from the Centre has been included in the Income and Expenditure Account.

NZ Squash Centre Report

For Year Ended 30 September 1990

The 1989/90 year has seen a marked improvement in the financial return from the NZ Squash Centre with a trading surplus of over \$89,000.

The year coincided with the first year of Manager Dennis Cheyne so the result is a reflection of his management and dedication to the Centre. The Restaurant/Cafe that was the major problem for the last two years has been leased out thus halting the losses that occurred but is still providing the facility for the benefit of squash and other patrons.

The squash courts continue to be well patronised being only slightly down on budget with the shop sales and drinks/snacks up on budget even with a greatly reduced stock holding. The expenses were well controlled even though the maintenance programme is in progress with six courts repainted in the year with the other six being done in 1991. Painting and repairing the complex is continuing to bring and maintain the Centre to an acceptable standard.

Thanks must go to the following companies for their court sponsorship at the Centre; Honda Cars Wellington; Pro Kennex; Radio Windy; Coca Cola; NZ Apple & Pear Board; Leisure Corp Holdings (Stellar).

The mortgage on the Centre has now been repaid so with continued top management and control the returns to the NZSRA look assured and stable for ensuing years.

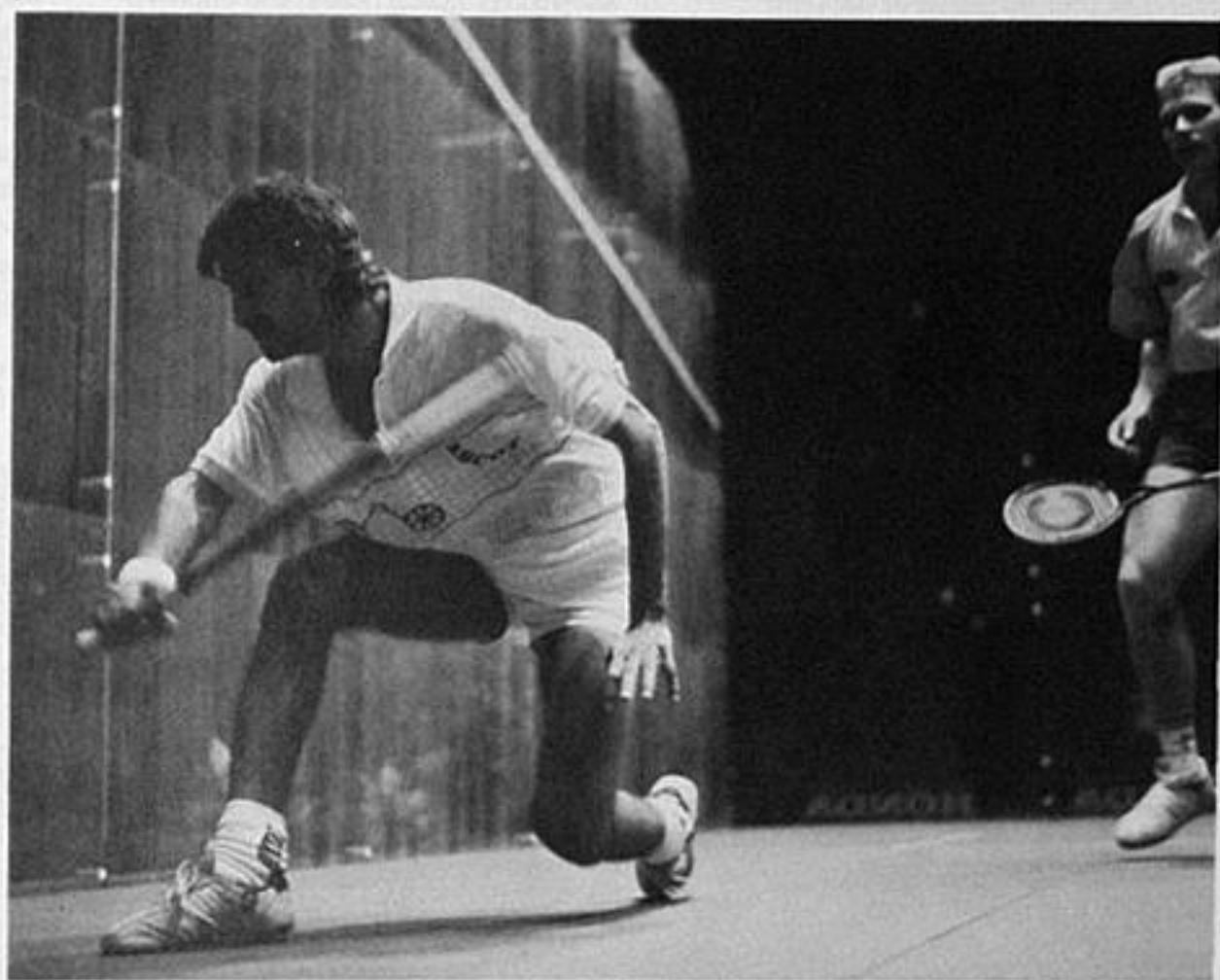

National Championships

This year's national championships, superbly hosted by the Hamilton Club for the 7th occasion provided some excellent squash highlighted by Susan Devoy winning her eighth consecutive title and Glen Wilson gaining his first.

Devoy predictably had no trouble at all in the women's event not dropping any games and only losing a minimum of points. In the semi final she dispatched up and coming Marie Pearson in short order before winning the final against long time contender Joanne Williams in similar fashion.

The four members of the New Zealand Women's World Championship team, named a couple of weeks earlier, proved their selection by all reaching the quarter finals with straight forward victories although it was pleasing to see three youngsters Lynora Hati, Philippa Beams and Leilani Marsh (as well as Pearson) lining up in that same round.

Four times national title winner

Steven Cunningham having retired from competitive squash left the way open for a new mens title holder to be found. Consequently there was extreme interest in the mens event especially with Rory Watt returning from England to play alongside of young international up and comers Glen Wilson and Paul Steel as well as seasoned performers Scott Harrison and Danny McQueen. McQueen provided the upset in the quarter finals where he beat Steel but then found Watt too strong in his semi final encounter. Wilson however showed his match fitness and improvement beating New Zealand representative Harrison in four games in the other semi final.

The keenly anticipated clash between Wilson and Watt threatened to reach great heights especially towards the end of the third game, until all of a sudden Wilson took command to win

that game and the fourth in convincing style for the title. An excellent performance against his higher ranked international compatriot.

In the mens inter district teams championships Wellington, led by new champion Wilson, ran out deserved winners against a solid Auckland lineup while Waikato and title holders Bay of Plenty had to be satisfied with playing off for third and fourth place, with Waikato edging out Bay of Plenty.

Waikato won the women's title for the second year in succession, comfortably from Auckland. The strength of Waikato's women's squash was further underlined when a second team brought into the competition to replace Midlands finished third. Northland continued their rise up the women's rankings with a young team led by Jo Smith to have easily their best performance, finishing fourth.

The drift north of winning teams is

further highlighted with six Auckland clubs winning the ten available titles whereas the previous year only two from that district had been successful.

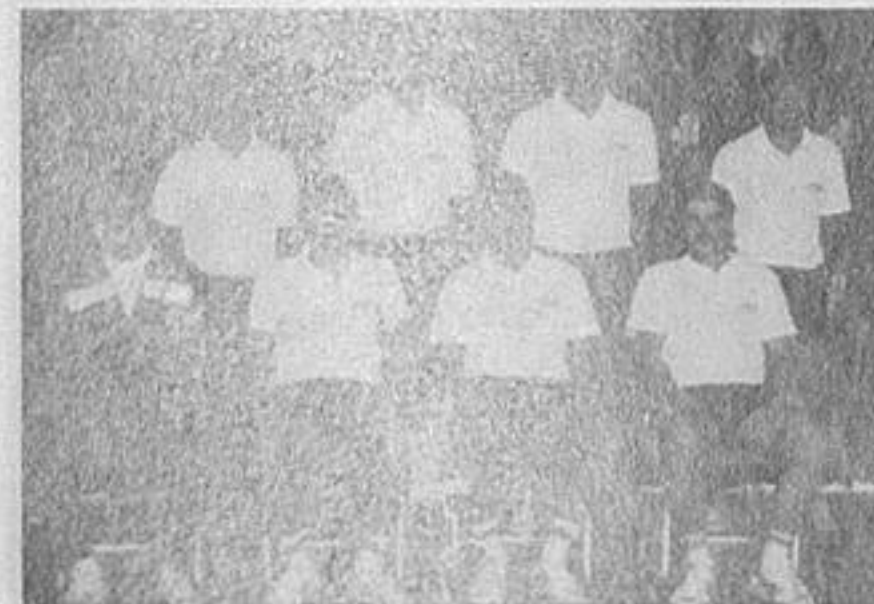

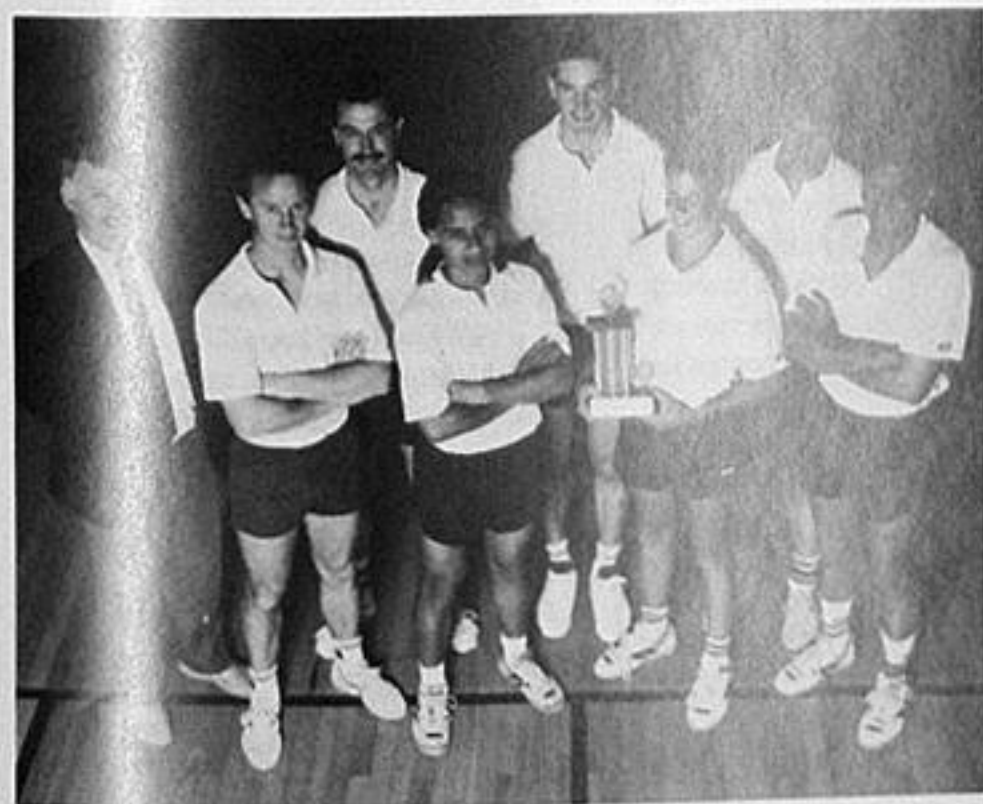

Masters Squash

Masters squash has continued to grow with 71 tournaments listed on the tournament schedule and most Districts holding successful Masters Championships and Masters Interclub. Some of the Districts that are struggling at the moment could look to Masters Squash and its basic principles to provide a boost to their District. Masters Squash allows players to compete and stay in the sport enjoying the social aspects. Basically it must be fun and everyone must pull their weight.

Aspects of the Masters Squash season have been:

Committee - The Auckland based committee has met regularly and has endeavoured to keep in touch with players throughout the country both by telephone and attendance at tournaments.

Selectors - They were:

Gower Dellimore - Auckland
Jan Brown - Auckland
Ray Southey - Wellington
Len Reese - Canterbury

For selecting the New Zealand team the selectors have a major problem in that firstly they have to determine which players are eligible for each age division, then who is available, before even starting to get down to the difficult job of obtaining results, watching players and picking the best team. All this must be done on a zero budget. They are very conscious of the problems and do their best to get all the results but it's up to the players to communicate with the selectors.

Newsletters - These have been put out at regular intervals and have a wide circulation. Nevertheless it is up to District Secretaries, Management delegates and Masters Convenors to recopy the newsletter and ensure that it actually gets seen by the players. It is also up to these people to provide local information that can be included in the newsletter.

District Convenors - These are the people we depend on both to keep things going in their District and to tell us what is going on. We look forward to hearing from you and are always available to discuss things or to help in any way.

Budget - We currently do not have a national masters sponsor and operate on a limited budget with team members making a major contribution to tour expenses and selectors paying most of their own expenses. As masters squash continues to grow it will hopefully receive recognition for the role it currently plays and will continue to play in the future.

NZ Masters Championships and Test Series - This was held at Labour weekend in Whakatane attracting approximately 250 entries. The Tournament Director Dave Steel utilised the Whakatane, Marist, Edgecumbe and Taneatua Squash Rackets Club to accommodate the entry. A feature of the tournament was the high standard in virtually all draws despite there being no Australian team playing this year.

It is unfortunate that it was necessary to rely on the NZSRA for the main sponsorship and it is to be hoped that this situation can be improved on in the future perhaps by resorting to individual sponsors for each division.

The tournament featured a number of upsets and new title holders.

Players Meeting - The players meeting held at Whakatane was very well attended possibly due to the players thinking it was a social opportunity rather than a meeting. Some issues did arise and were discussed with quite universal agreement in most cases, including:

1. The Labour Weekend timing of the tournament was agreed to be ideal. This means that the tournament cannot be used as a selection tournament and selectors must ensure that they obtain relevant results from events such as District championships when selecting the team for the trans-tasman test series. Never the less the current champion (from the previous season) would be considered the front runner and it would be up to other contenders "to chase" that player.

2. The Dunlop XX ball was preferred by most of the players and this ball should be used for most championship grades at least at this time of the year.

3. The possibility of adding a 50+ women's age group to the teams event was considered okay but the meeting felt it was far more important to add men's and women's 55+ players to the

teams as they were already involved in the championship and each District would have no difficulty obtaining players in that age category.

It was noted that some Districts are still not entering a team either due to a lack of funding for players, or general disinterest.

4. Host Clubs - It was felt that it was preferable at the NZ Championships to give all players a game at the host venue but agreed that this could sometimes be difficult.

I.S.R.F. World Masters 1991 - This event will be held in October at the North Shore Squash Rackets Club and other host clubs, with Bob Lints as the Tournament Director.

It will be a world first in combining both men and women and will cater for both the world's very best and those who wish to compete at a much lower level.

It will take the place of the 1991 NZ Masters Championship and will be the highlight in two weeks of squash which will include a warm up tournament, a New Zealand / Australia test series and a subsidiary teams event.

The team performed very well with individuals winning three Australian titles and winning the 1st test, but unfortunately losing the 2nd & 3rd tests.

Outstanding performer was Jill Roberts who won all her three test games and the Australian 50+ title. However there were many other outstanding performances including Ken Turnbull winning all three test games (2 of them 3 straight), Barry Gardiner and Jenny Webster winning two out of three test games and finishing runner-up in the Australian Championships to the outstanding performers Freddy Howell and Heather McKay respectively. And also Brian Simpson and Kay Marshall who overturned the form book to win Australian titles in the 40-44 years division.

The first test was drawn 5-5 with NZ winning on games. Highlights were Jill Roberts, Barry Gardiner, Brian Sixtus and Ken Turnbull having in some cases unexpected three game wins coupled with a four game win by Jenny Webster and two valuable games by Brian Simpson who arrived from the airport just in time to take the court.

The second test was played straight after the individual championship and was lost six matches to four with sickness, tiredness and a changed Australian team just tipping the balance.

The third test was convincingly won by the Australians. Despite the odd close match only the oldies Jill Roberts and Ken Turnbull preserved some respectability. The advantages of the home team were emphasised particularly with the opportunity to make team changes. However once again the Australians showed that they are tougher and thrive on continued hard matches.

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Junior Squash

1990 has been a year of change for New Zealand Squash Rackets Association and I believe that 1991 will see further changes which can only promote our sport and hopefully build a strong foundation for the future with our junior squash players.

The first tournament on the Junior Circuit was the North Island Junior Championships held at Kaitia in early May and as usual in the far North the event was organised very well and hopefully the event helped promote squash in that area.

Two weeks later the South Island Junior Championships were run at Ashburton with Ashburton Collegiate Club hosting the event, which involved all three clubs in the area.

During the mid term break in July Tauranga Squash Club ran the New Zealand Age Group Championships involving over 180 entries and experienced big problems with billeting players, as did Ashburton, with the large turnout they received.

Gisborne Squash Club ran the New Zealand Junior Open and Inter District Teams event very capably and introduced school hostel type accommodation instead of motels for many of the Districts, which proved to be very successful.

There have been two major problems that have come to a head this year.

- Attendance at tournaments in areas that are not centrally located, nor have easy access by air. In future consideration will have to be given to locations.
- Billeting. With the high cost of living and the economic climate of the times in future this type of accommodation at Junior national events may have to be limited.

The 1990 Secondary Schools Championships held in Napier under the direction of Alan Watton was a great success involving all clubs in the Hawkes Bay area and congratulations to the winners from the far north and deep south, Kaitia High School and Cargill Boys High in the girls and boys events respectively.

The UDC Finance New Zealand junior men's team, managed by Trevor Colyer competed in the World Championships in Germany in July. The team included Wayne Werder (Waikato), Tristian Franklin (Canterbury), Daniel

World Junior Men's Championships

The 6th world junior men's squash championships were staged during July and August in Paderborn, Germany where the UDC Finance New Zealand team included Wayne Werder (Waikato), Tristan Franklin (Canterbury), Daniel Sharplin (Midlands) and Grant Linton (Auckland), with Trevor Colyer from Auckland as manager. Fifth position was the result for the New Zealand team, dropping from fourth at the previous championships held two years ago in Scotland.

A disappointing early round pool loss against Germany counted heavily against the Kiwis. That default meant a tough assignment against Pakistan to

reach the semi finals and while they battled bravely in losing 2-1, the playoff for 5th to 8th position was the end result. Then followed a good win over Malaysia backed up by a return victory against the Germans which finally saw New Zealand clinch the 5th position.

England, whose four team members all reached the semi finals of the individual championship, proved far too strong when beating Australia in the final with Pakistan taking third spot from a much improved Finland team. The only New Zealander to gain a seeding in the individual event was Wayne Werder and he lived up to this by reaching the last 16 before going

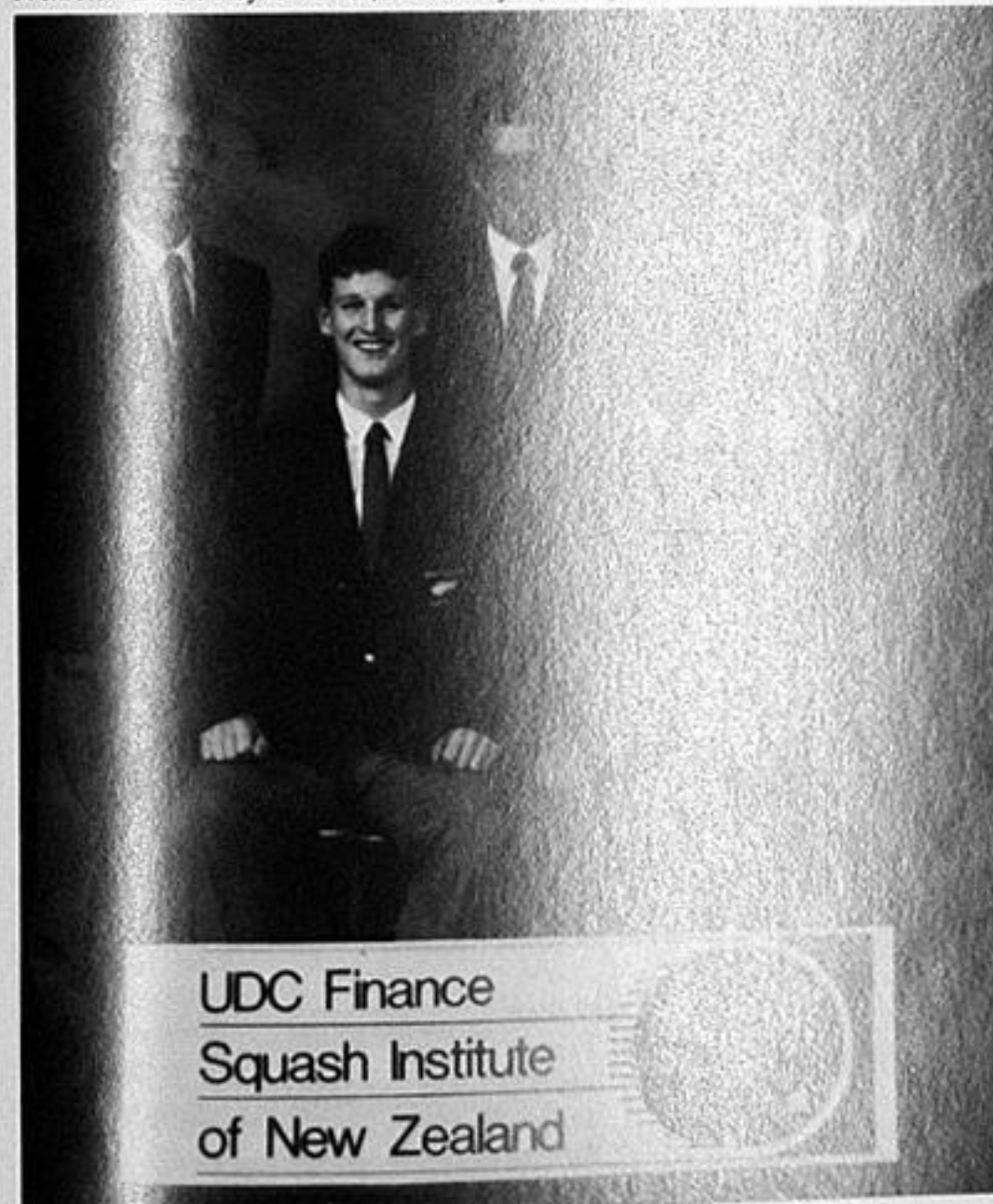
down to England No.3 and semi finalist Aidan Harrison. Franklin, Sharplin and Linton all reached the 3rd round with Franklin losing to the No. 1 Malaysian and Sharplin and Linton both bowing out to Australians.

While the final result was perhaps disappointing it remained a creditable performance by the New Zealanders. Also it is encouraging to find that three of the team since returning are continuing the pursuit of establishing professional careers as members of the UDC Finance Squash Institute where it hoped that the experiences in Germany will stand them in good stead for their respected futures.

NZSRA Rules

The following notices of motions, rule changes and introductions were approved at the 1989 Annual General Meeting held in Rotorua on December 2.

Affiliation Levies

1. "That the Under 13 Junior levy exemption be removed".
2. "That there be no increase in the NZSRA Affiliation levies for the 1990 season.

Masters Director

"That a Masters Director be elected annually by the NZSRA AGM from nominations submitted by the Districts".

Masters Selectors

"Masters Selectors shall comprise of four persons who shall be responsible for selection and submission to the Management Committee for approval and ratification of all Masters players to represent New Zealand".

National Event Venues

"National Event Venues should be allocated two years in advance".

Junior Inter-District Teams Event - Player Eligibility

"If proven that he or she holds

permanent residency, a junior player should be eligible to play in the National event, provided he or she has taken up residency at the date of registration".

Grading List Publication Dates

"That three additional grading lists be published during the playing year and that all lists be without editing, with dates to be determined by the Computer Grading Committee".

Squash Ball Usage

"That the XX ball be used by "A" and "B" grade players".

Shane O'Dwyer Trust Fund

As at 30 September 1990 the Shane O'Dwyer Trust Fund stood in excess of \$19900.

The fund is in the memory of one of New Zealand squash's leading identities who died prematurely, at the age of 39, five years ago.

Marie Pearson, from Auckland, received a grant from the trust to assist her on her United Kingdom tour last January, where she toured with Susan Devoy to develop her international experience.

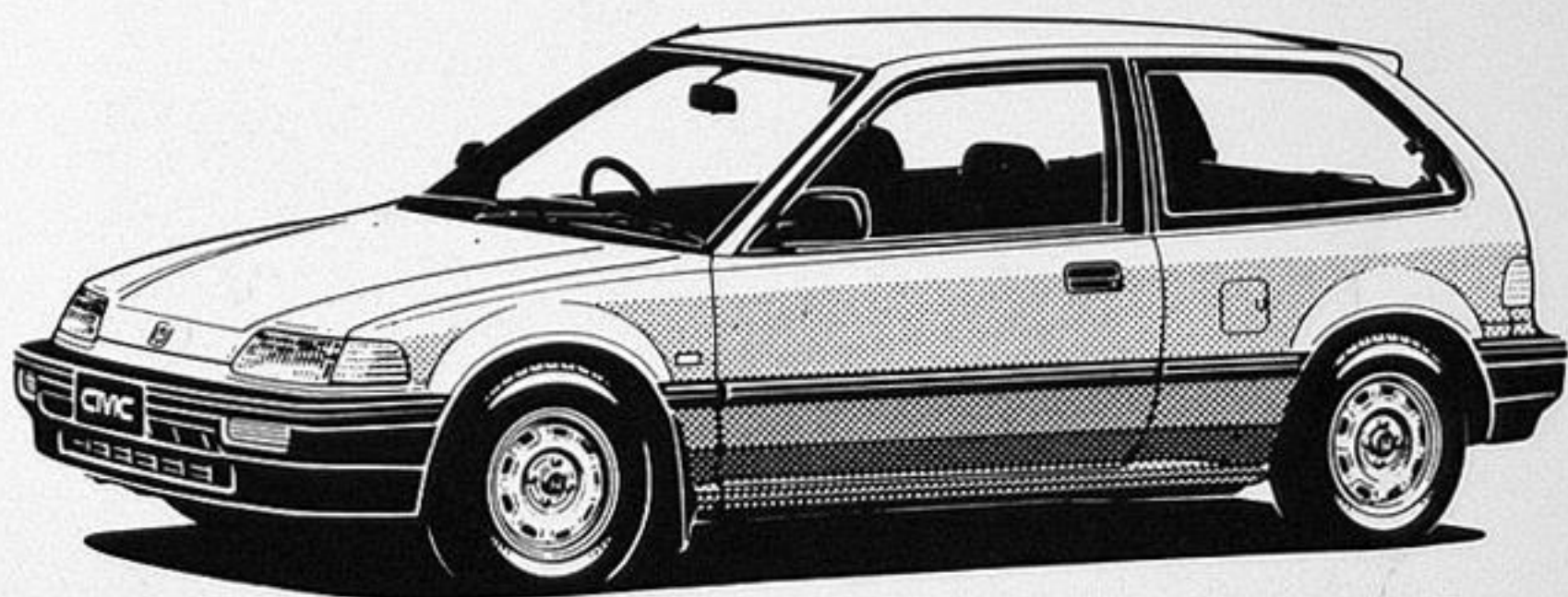
