# Presidents Report

1991 has been a year of steady development for New Zealand Squash following a year of many changes and innovations. For the first time since 1984 we have recorded a growth in membership. This in some part may be attributable to the new levy structure but credit must also go to our development policy and the positive action some Clubs have taken. Although the increase is very welcome there can be no room for complacency and we must continue with all efforts to promote and encourage Clubs in the quest to further bolster numbers.

NZ Squash players have had a good year on the international scene. World Champion Susan Devoy easily retains her number one ranking. Ross Norman continues to be ranked amongst the top men. The Junior Womens Team performed very creditably at the World Championships in Norway.

A group of junior New Zealand players participated in the Australian Age Group Championships, with some outstanding results. Jade Wilson, Sarah Cook, Leilani Marsh all winning their respective titles and Chad Sunde finishing runner up in the boys under 17.

The New Zealand Mens Team will have competed at the Worlds Teams Championships to be held in Finland during November and it is hoped they will retain their place in the top four.

Domestically some of the highlights of the season have been Susan Devoy winning her ninth national title and Glen Wilson his second. The UDC Finance Satellite series continued and proved to be very competitive especially in the mens division. The series plays an important part in developing our promising players.

The 1991 Smokefree Open attracted a top field of international squash players including both current World Champions Susan Devoy and Rodney Martin. The Open was hosted for the first time by the Hamilton Squash Club and the Club must take a lot of credit for a very successful event. The finals were played in the Founders Theatre in Hamilton with the titles being won convincingly by Australians Chris Dittmar and Robyn Lambourne.

Earlier in the year there was some doubt over the future of the Open, but the generous sponsorship provided by The Health Sponsorship Council and Freshup enabled this prestigious tournament to take place. NZ Squash is very grateful for their support and looks forward to future association.

The World Masters Championships were held at the North Shore Squash Club in October. The final entries totaled well over 500. A tournament such as this obviously takes an enormous amount of organisation and the North Shore Club and organising committee are to be congratulated on the running of such a magnificent event.

## UDC Finance Squash Institute

The Institute is playing a major role in the development of NZ Squash players. In the relatively short time the Institute had operated it has assisted many players in their training and participation in major tournaments. NZ Squash is very appreciative of the considerable amount of involvement by the members of the board in what has been a difficult period of establishment. The financial contribution made by UDC Finance and the NZ Sports Foundation is gratefully acknowledged.

## NZ Squash Centre

The Squash Centre continues to thrive under the guidance of Manager Dennis Cheyne and the Board of Management. In difficult trading conditions the Centre had managed to produce a profit close to the previous years. The contribution made by the Centre forms a large part of NZ Squash's income and the efforts of Manager and Board is greatly appreciated.

## Hillary Commission and the New Zealand Sports Foundation

The Hillary Commission plays a large part in financing many of NZ Squash activities. Without this support we would find it very difficult to maintain many of our programmes and we express our gratitude for this assistance. In addition to its support of the UDC Institute the New Zealand Sports Foundation has also continued with assistance of New Zealand teams and its contribution fully appreciated.

## Media

New Zealand Squash again acknowledges the contribution from the various sections of the media who continue to provide extensive coverage of the sport.

## Tasman Exchange and ISRF

This year a Tasman Exchange meeting was reintroduced and this proved very useful with both countries having a lot in common. One of the many suggestions to emerge was the participation of a New Zealand team in Australia's National League, it is hoped this could become a reality in 1992. Among other matters considered were more frequent visits of players especially at junior level.

Bill Murphy has very ably represented New Zealand at international level and Susie Simcock remains involved as Vice President of the International Squash Rackets Federation.

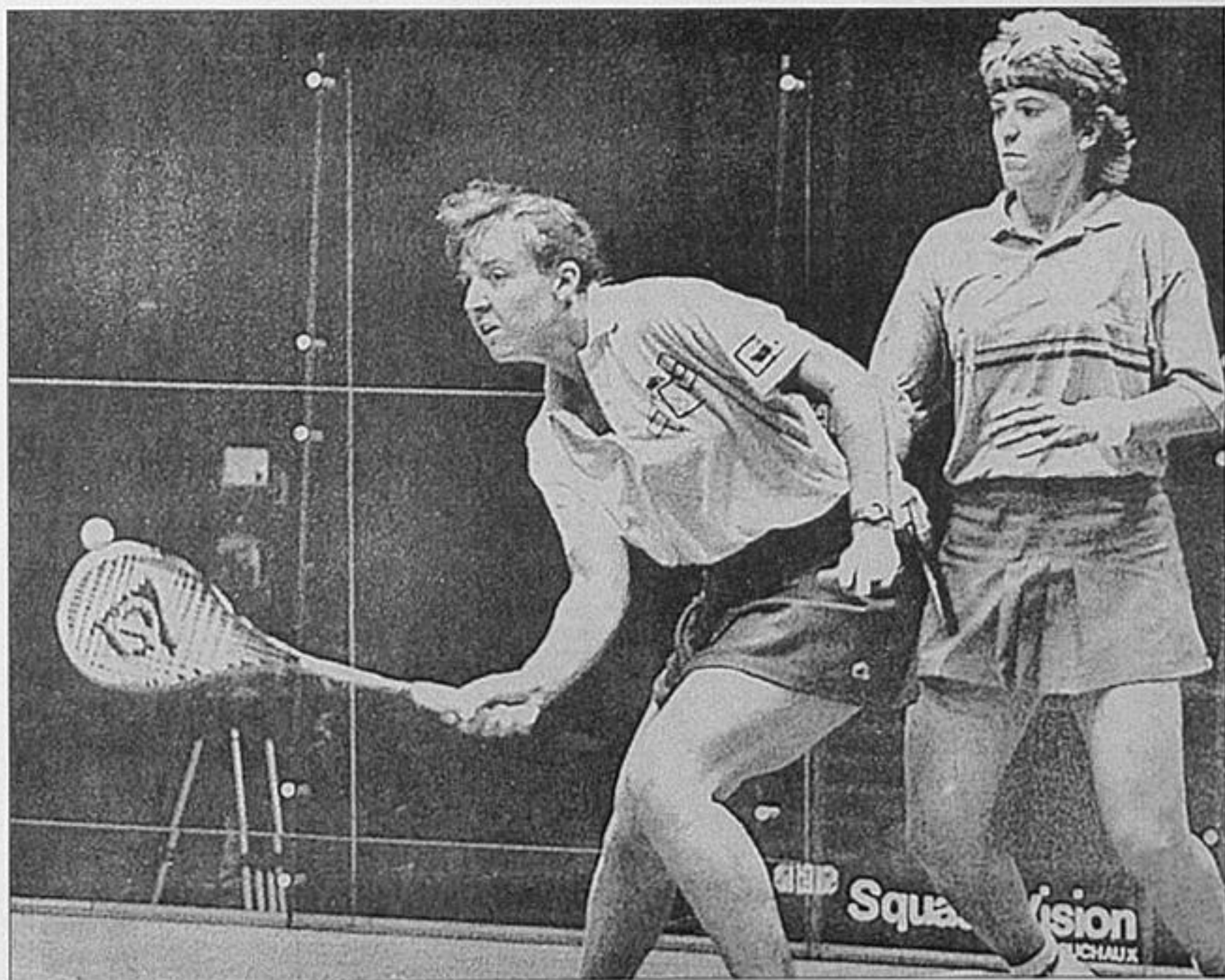
## Management and Administration

# National Events

The sub-committee had a very active year with besides the normal duties, completed a total review of the senior domestic programme and conducted a survey of Point a Rally scoring (PARS) for the International Squash Federation which included trialing PARS at several venues.

## PARS

Of the 400 questionnaires so far received the results were fairly predicable with 67% against any move away from the current scoring method, for serious play. However, in the fun or social tournament 90% preferred PARS.

A majority thought their game tended to be more defensive and shorter in duration but found it to be an easier method to score with a good cross section of players from "A to F" and a wide range of ages were included in this survey.

The North Island Championships and UDC Satellite circuit tournaments were trailed for PARS with a similar result being recorded.

## Review

The review of all domestic senior events was completed with status quo remaining in most cases and only minor alterations to other events.

A format was agreed on for a national league event and hopefully depending on the availability of sponsorship this can commence in 1992.

## Cousins Shield/Mitchell Cup

Hamilton Squash Club was host to a most successful competition with 9 women's and 13 men's teams participating, the same overall number as in 1990.

A notable double was recorded with top seeds Henderson Squash Club winning both events.

## Under 23 Championships

For the second year running this event

was held at the Parkview Squash Club in Palmerston North. A total of 40 men and 20 women entered with Leilani Marsh and Grant Linton emerging as respective winners.

With the restructuring of junior squash this was probably the last time it is held, as an under 21 event is emerging which after all is the age group that this tournament has been catering for in recent times.

## Unisys National Graded Teams Championships

This continued to be a popular championship with 605 teams contesting their District play off's and 92 teams participating in the national finals.

The rules for both the District eliminations and national finals are currently being updated to remove the odd anomaly.

## National Championships/Inter-district Teams Event

A thoroughly modernized Kawarua Park Squash Club in New Plymouth hosted the 1992 "Nationals". A most relaxing and picturesque venue overlooking the coastline.

Susan Devoy continued her winning way capturing the women's title for the ninth time, and Glen Wilson the men's for the second year running.

The teams event followed a new pool

format of "top 5 - bottom 5" set up which was promoted to provide more evenness in pool play. This in fact did make the competition tougher but failed to produce a "finals day" with several teams not participating on the last days play being their turn for a bye. A recommendation is to hand to revert the teams event back to the "old" system.

The men's title was claimed by Bay of Plenty with Waikato taking out the women's.

# Squash Development

If our sport does not develop it will die, slowly but surely.

Squash development must be a combined operation between New Zealand Squash, Districts and Clubs. The New Zealand Development Committee supplying the initiative, Districts the support and Clubs most of the action at grass roots.

With the UDC Finance Squash Institute taking the main responsibility for elite and emerging player development the main thrust of the Development Committee has been at Club level with it's emphasis on Club member promotion and retention and all it's attendant ramifications.

The Squash Development Director, Butch Gifford with his mammoth tour of New Zealand Clubs has achieved the impossibility - direct word of mouth communication between New Zealand Squash and Club officials and members. All statistics show that word of mouth is the most effective means of communication.

Hopefully Clubs will take advantage of the messages Butch gives and conversely that Districts and New Zealand Squash listen to what the Clubs are saying.

The world has turned around many times since the heyday of squash in the seventies and early eighties.

People have changed, attitudes have changed and Clubs must change. Not change for change's sake but a realistic appraisal adapted to the modern needs of the players, public and promoters. Other sports have lifted their profile and administration ability and competition has strengthened.

The NZS Development Committee is asking Clubs and District to take a clear look at what they are doing, where they are going and why, and to have a plan and purpose that will keep them ahead. Some of these aspects include,

- \* Officials and administrators need to be well trained and motivated so that Clubs and Districts are organised and efficient.

- \* Clubrooms should be attractive, clean and tidy, with facilities updated and maintained.

- \* The needs of members must be researched and met, with new and old members courted and cared for.

- \* Support for squash programmes in schools is imperative. The microcourt is our promotional weapon and helps to ensure that squash can compete with all the other sports available to schools. Club backing is essential for consolidating any interest and therein lies the real future of our sport.

- \* Publicity, promotion and marketing should be high on the list with every opportunity taken to gain publicity for Club activities. Make your community aware of your Club and players.

- \* To make coaching of coaches a priority, especially the 0 level for Club coaches. Have a coaching programme that caters for juniors, beginners and promising players.

- \* Most of all use the resources, training and funding that are available through the Hillary Commission.

The Hillary Commission supports all the above objectives and New Zealand Squash is appreciative of their guidance and financial assistance. Resources available through the Hillary Commission are,

# Squash Development Directors Field Report

The year has been both very full and rewarding as far as I am concerned.

I have become involved in the very important area of club and member promotion and retention, and so will spend a fair bit of time on this aspect of development.

During the first part of the season it was planned to visit 80 Clubs whereas I finished up visiting 67 officially.

However, I have whenever possible visited other Clubs en route to those given to me by the Districts. Some of these Clubs are not affiliated to the District and New Zealand Squash but I believe it is important to maintain as much personal contact as possible.

## Club Promotion and Membership Retention

A number of points have arisen from these visits to Clubs.

The first and most important is the most basic - "communication". A lot of Clubs do not have the most efficient means of distributing information that goes to the Club via the Secretary.

As both NZ Squash and Districts we need to look at how we communicate with the Clubs, to send any Club Secretary a great wad of information means that most of it does not get to whom it may concern.

You can never tell people too often as the V.I.P Scheme programme demonstrated clearly this year. Despite many circulars and reminders to Districts etc I would say less than half of the Clubs knew of the scheme.

I believe with a little more thought in the posting out of mail, we could help the Clubs become more efficient. A one page resume of the pertinent points of "this mailing" - response dates noted etc - a warning of next months requirements - a forewarning to two months in advance - would help the whole Club Committee to be aware and perhaps do things before it gets to the "quick it was due back last week" scenario.

Most of the people involved as Secretary/Treasurer/President of Clubs are already busy people, the thing they do not need is to have to wade through heaps of mail to get a few major points.

The second question asked is one of "where does our levy money go?" I have no problem answering this but some Clubs are absolutely aghast when they find out their District levy covers coaching, referees, administrative assistance etc. This phenomena is common to all Districts - I do not know the answer except to say that someone on District Management Committee should do a short resume of "what the District levy covers" for your next District AGM.

The third area of Club concern is marketing of squash as a sport. More and more Clubs are looking to New Zealand Squash to take the lead in this area and I believe we must address this problem in the very near future.

Clubs in general feel "left out" in some of the areas they in fact have the greatest input into. How many Districts have circulated something asking for suggestions on how inter-club could be made better? How about some thoughts on tournaments. Is the way squash is administrated in your District best for all the Clubs in the District?

## Training & Qualification of Coaches

Coaching has received a facelift and some may be wondering what this re-accreditation scheme is all about.

It would be fair to say that following on from the seminars run in Auckland, Palmerston North, Christchurch and Dunedin many more people this year have finished up with an accreditation as a coach, than has been the case in years gone by. Provided the Districts follow the simple rules regarding registration of coaches we must finish up with a system that will be easier to operate than we have had in the past.

Most of the targets set by the committee for 1991 have been met and this reflects on the efforts of those coaches within the Districts who have done their thing, and then some, to ensure this happened.

## Club of the Year

This year we did away with National Squash Week as we have had in the past and in it's place a competition that is judged over a longer period of time, was introduced.

The winners for 1991 is College Rifles and congratulations go to that Club for their effort over the year.

## Club Member Handbook

The new member handbook introduced in 1990, seems to have fallen from favour with a small number requested this year following really good feedback from last year.

## Club Management Handbook

This booklet has taken a long time to produce, and whilst the regional Sports Foundations do run very good courses for Club administrators, this booklet will be specific to "squash" and should over the years become the real "reference book" for Clubs.

## Kiwisquash & Squash in Schools

As many are aware a change is proposed for our Kiwisquash programme in the very near future. A short seminar session at the Annual Conference will cover all the points required to ensure a continuation of the programme.

This year more and more requests have come in from schools for a semi permanent court. This is obviously the best way for squash to grow as all it then takes is for a teacher to decide on a squash module for his/her physical education programme and it can happen.

All Districts should be looking at encouraging schools to build their own courts.

Congratulations to the TeKuiti Squash Club for their foresight in contributing \$500 to the local primary school to build a Microcourt.

A very good response by Secondary Schools to the Slazenger Secondary School Championships held in Timaru this year, was most encouraging. Many of the players in school teams are in no way involved in squash other than through this event. The winning of the event by schools outside the major centres is a good indication that despite all the best efforts of some, there is no telling who will win. Congratulations to Ashburton and Gisborne for their fine efforts over the three days.

## Player Training & Development

There has been some major steps in the competition framework towards a more "player orientated" based structure.

While we still have a long way to go

for this to be introduced there are some very positive moves that will set the ball rolling.

One area that concerns me however, is the non acceptance of the Point a Rally Scoring (PARS) by a large percentage of players.

For our sport to develop and grow we must look for ways to make the game more and more attractive - not just to the purist - but to "Joe and Jean Bloggs".

An example surely must be cricket, no one wanted "One Day" rubbish until crowds of people turned out to watch it, then it was accepted as an alternative.

PARS is an alternative. Many Clubs use it now in a small way for fun tournaments, we really need to adopt it as a way to run recognised tournaments, with a time limit on how long the match will run for, so we too can schedule a whole weekend's play for our busy squash players with NO delays due to five set games etc. The only way to score these matches is by point a rally.

## Womens Squash

We have recently held a specific meeting to address some of the problems we have in New Zealand and will be able too soon tell you of what positive steps we have taken from this meeting. On the membership returns in at the time of writing this report, it looks as though our overall percentage of female to male players is slightly higher than last year, this is just reward for those Districts who have targeted this area. I hope that the final figures do not belie the early indications.

## Maori Squash Development

This is an area that is still being fully investigated and we see the need for some special needs in this area. Due to the involvement of an already functional Maori tournament committee, it is possible for money to become available through the Hillary Commission to assist in a small way some of our really talented Maori youngsters.

Meetings are still taking place to establish the guidelines and structures to deliver a development programme and will be ongoing I am sure.

## Conclusion

I would like to take this opportunity to say a real big "thanks" to all those people within Clubs and Districts who have put themselves out to have me in their homes. Without your generosity we would not be able to complete the programmes we wish to.

This year as always there has been some great debate on squash - where it is going etc, and that is a good sign.

# Commercial

With the announcement late last year that Honda were not continuing their sponsorship of the New Zealand Open, major emphasis had to be placed on finding a replacement sponsor. The committee believes that this event as the major showpiece of New Zealand Squash must always take place with the best possible quality fields and with nationwide television coverage.

Despite the obvious marketability that the Open has achieved over recent years the committee experienced considerable difficulty in finding new sponsors.

Several factors contributed to this problem, primarily the current economic climate with resulting shrinkage in available sponsors and also the requirement by both television channels for perceived non major sports to pay a fee which covers all costs associated with the event thus adding a not insignificant premium to the sponsorship figure.

## Smokefree and Freshup involvement

Being one of the few major squash playing countries to stage a combined men's and women's event (both with top prize monies) also ensures that the sponsorship level that we seek is not small. Consequently the Commercial Committee was pleased to negotiate a co-sponsorship arrangement with the Health Sponsorship Council (Smokefree) and the N.Z. Apple & Pear Marketing Board (Freshup) which ensured that the events both took place and received quality prime sports time television exposure.

## UDC Finance

In addition to its valuable support of the UDC Squash Institute, UDC Finance continued its generous backing of the Satellite series which this year comprised the Auckland, Wellington and South Island Championships. These championships provide an ideal vehicle for our up and coming international players and fit neatly with the philosophies of the UDC Institute. UDC's ongoing magnificent

contribution to New Zealand squash cannot be overestimated. Mention must also be made of the Institutes other major sponsors namely All Seasons Squash & Fitness Centre and Hi Tec who both play a key ongoing role.

## Dunlop Slazenger

One of the most pleasing new sponsorships negotiated in 1991 saw Dunlop/Slazenger supporting the entire junior squash area. This support covers all the junior national events together with the Slazenger Squad (NZS emerging players group) and is for a three year term. Coupled with a new three year ball adoption agreement also confirmed this year it can be seen that Dunlop/Slazenger are major supporters of New Zealand squash.

## Shell Todd Oil National Championships

Another pleasing aspect commercially was the ability of Kawarua Park, as the host club of the 1991 National Championships, to establish a favourable sponsorship for the event with Shell Todd Oil. This freed up general funds which have been required to underwrite the event in the last few years and is now a requirement for any club applying to host the event.

## World Masters

One disappointment was the inability to put in place an overall sponsor for the World Masters event but the organising committee were successful in finding a series of co-sponsors headed by Rheineck and Hertz, of differing degrees thus ensuring the financial viability of the event.

## Unisys and Hertz

Valuable sponsorship arrangements were also continued with Unisys Computers and Hertz to whom we extend our sincere thanks.

## New Opportunities

Of recent times a proposal has been sent to all New Zealand Clubs to ascertain support for a sponsorship arrangement with Bluebird Foods which would benefit both the clubs directly and also New Zealand Squash.

Provided a good proportion of clubs become involved there are considerable benefits for all parties.

## Perspex Court

The New Zealand Squash owned perspex court was used only once this year for the New Zealand Open. Opportunities for its hireage remain limited and this has been compounded by a second court going in to Australia. Discussions are currently being held for several hireage opportunities for 1992.

## Promotional Opportunities

The Commercial Committee promoted a two match series between Ross Norman and Glen Wilson in August and the Kapiti and Burnside Clubs, who took the opportunities presented around such events, reported tremendous feedback.

The committee next year aims to introduce a national league that will involve New Zealand's top players, which should provide a new national profile for the sport

and something that venue clubs can vigorously promote.

### Smokefree 1991 Open

Following the success of the 1990 New Zealand Open held at Auckland's Aotea Centre and with that venue's unavailability for the 1991 event the decision was taken to retain the event in an up-

market environment. To this end the 1991 event was held in Hamilton with the early rounds being played at the Hamilton Club and the semi-finals and finals being played on the perspex court at Hamilton's Founders Theatre.

Although the event was robbed of considerable interest with Susan Devoy's early withdrawal, local interest was extremely good with pleasing support for the

final rounds. New Zealand Squash's thanks are extended to the Hamilton Club and it's organising committee for the magnificent job done in hosting this event occasionally under difficult circumstances.

# Rules & Refereeing

This year has provided the most active season for me personally since I have been involved with refereeing. The Referees panel has assessed an unprecedented number of 9 candidates for national accreditation and similarly an unprecedented number of 5 New Zealand referees have been involved in overseas appointments.

It is pleasing to be able to report that last year's gains in national refereeing personnel have been surpassed in 1991 with six out of the nine candidates being deemed worthy of national refereeing status and this is reflected no doubt in the travel budget returns for national assessments.

Congratulations go therefore, to newly accredited referees Doug Flint and Dave Conza (Auckland), Maihi Tana (Northland) and Freda Walker, Nigel Lloyd and Michael Allred from Canterbury.

The strength of the organisation of Canterbury refereeing is well in evidence in these results. Half of our new referees are from that District and all of them of a playing ability that allows them to be regular District representatives at National Events.

Hopefully the interest shown in refereeing by highly ranked players is an ongoing trend as it is a great help to have experienced player-referees wandering about looking for work and meaningful experiences at such tournaments as District Opens and the Nationals.

Along with the six new national referees we have acquired a fourth international referee. As a result of his efforts during the Women's World Championships in Sydney last October, Gavin Whyte has been awarded international referees promotion. This is a worthy reward for Gavin considering his continuous support for refereeing in Canterbury and all New Zealand.

We were fortunate in 1991 to notch up important refereeing experience due to the welcome appearance of several overseas players competing in the UDC Finance Satellite Series and the New Zealand Open.

With the likes of Phil Larmer, Tim

Garner, Simon Baker and Billy Haddrell to push our top players (and refs) around, the Satellite Series provided a timely teething ground for local in-experienced referees and a sometimes toothache for others of us.

The New Zealand Open at Hamilton progressed with barely a hitch thanks mainly to the now taken-for-granted superb organisation by NZ Squash and the home club. And also as far as we referees were concerned, to the quietly efficient and professional abilities of the tournament referee, Gary Hutchison.

We were faced with the same hoary old chestnut concerning seating for markers and referees. Again our position at the Founders Theatre was much too distant for our liking.

This problem is not restricted to New Zealand however, it is virtually universal (Alpha Centauri being the exception) and the seating position provided for the World Championships in Adelaide was certainly no better. We can only hope to be able to work towards an arrangement suitable to management, referees and television by the time of next year's Open.

Last year I reported on the agreement in principle to produce a new refereeing video.

The wheels are well and truly in motion now with Gavin Whyte and Gary Hutchison in regular contact with the production company, Informedia, in Christchurch. The first wisps of white smoke are now appearing with the project

being close to the scripting stage (October), so we should be seeing some tangible results early in the new year.

On an administrative level this year has seen the first involvement in my tenure, of a member of NZ Squash management on the referees committee. I feel it has been beneficial to the referees panel, and to management, to have had Len Mashlan as Chairman and effectively liaison officer between referees and management.

It is gratifying to note, also, that two Districts Auckland and Bay of Plenty have appointed convenors this year, after those positions had lapsed in 1990. The office of District convener of referees can carry onerous responsibilities especially if that District is one that covers a large geographical area, so we are pleased that the voices of those two Districts will be heard again.

The Derek Cook Memorial Trophy for services to refereeing this year was awarded to Kaye Jackson in recognition of her unstinting contribution to refereeing in Northland. Kaye has provided the profile of refereeing in the far North from zero to twelve (on a scale of 1 to 10) over the last two years and Northland is now qualifying more club and district referees than any other District. We should be cognisant of the fact the Kaye's dedication to Northland's refereeing cause is even more remarkable when we consider her main area of endeavour in squash is in coaching. It is just as well she does not live in that town where the cows do not like daylight saving.

On the international scene this year New Zealand referees have been more active than ever before.

The Men's World Championships in Adelaide were represented from New Zealand by myself as part of the required quota of international referees and by John Haines as International Assessor. My expenses were met by the host organisers while John was part funded by Squash Australia, NZ Squash and ISRF.

We were both made to feel most welcome and were royally treated by the tournament organisation which could not



be faulted. Our relations with our Aussie counterparts were very cordial which may have been the result of ice-breaking exercises of previous years (or perhaps merely the natural huddling together of a harassed minority!).

I was fortunate enough to be invited to referee the final between Jahangir Khan and Rodney Martin and I must say it provokes interesting emotions to look back at being involved in that historic match (and more so the aftermath).

Our remaining two International Referee's - Peter Highsted and Gavin Whyte, officiated at the Malaysian Open in Kuala Lumpur where Peter refereed the final between Jansher Khan and Brett Martin. Once again they were well looked after by Chris Foo and SRAM, so it appears our initial forays into referee exchange between Asia Pacific countries have been well received.

Also in the international sphere NZ Squash was asked in conjunction with Squash Australia to nominate a Technical Director to travel to Papua New Guinea to advise and officiate at the Squash Tournament at the South Pacific Games in September.

Vern Pere jumped at the chance and it was not till after he had bought his flippers that he found out he was allowed to fly there.

Vern performed another great ambassadorial job for NZ Squash, making a name for himself Pacific wide as an organiser and referee. He was burdened with the additional post of ISRF representative for Oceania Squash Federation discussions and he reports that all members of the fledgling union are exuberantly enthusiastic in their approach to improving refereeing standards. I am sure the flames of that enthusiasm were fanned appreciably by Vern's own drive and expertise.

On a sadder note we have received notice of the retirement from refereeing administration of our senior International Referee, my predecessor, John Haines.

John is one of the inaugural team of International Assessors and is a member of the ISRF Rules and Referees Committee. He was a part of that committee that met in Toulouse several years back and began formulation of the most recent rule changes.

As a past New Zealand representative he has provided a players perspective to refereeing squash at all levels and is highly respected by players worldwide.

John's background in education and psychology has been used to good effect with his presentation of a paper of "The Psychology of Refereeing Squash" at the first referees school in Kuala Lumpur in 1989.

This same background has allowed him to be an effective foil to influences about him that may be a little less structured or subtle and this stabilising ability will be sorely missed in New Zealand and world squash as he is also stepping down from international duties.

We wish him well in his future in other fields.

Finally, once again I should like to thank the Referees Committee, Gary Hutchison, Gavin Whyte, John Haines and Len Mashlan for their dedication and hard work in what has been a demanding year.



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# Computer Gradings

## Sponsors: UNISYS

The UNISYS Computer Squash Grading System has now been in operation for five seasons on a national basis. As at the September 1991 grading list there were a total of 21,317 players on the list, 13,360 male and 7,957 female. When compared with the same point last season this is a fall of approximately 1,960 graded players.

Given the change to the method by which NZS affiliation fees are now levied, the drop was not unexpected, with most clubs removing inactive members from their grading list during the early part of this season.

Prior to the commencement of the 1991 season, a number of changes and adjustments were made to the computer programme, the most visible being the addition of "player points" to the published grading lists. Without doubt this change resulted in individual players taking a far greater interest in their position on the grading list than in the past. It was however some time before players realised that failure to gain or lose points as expected was caused by the fact that particular tournament results had not been included in the list.

The addition of the player points to the published grading lists also gave rise to comment in respect of the manual adjust-

ments made by the National Statisticians to the points of some top B1 and A grade players. Adjustments to computer points of individual B1 and A grade players have been made over many years and it is only this season that adjustments to the points have become obvious.

However, it must be remembered that the grading list is a national one, and in this respect the adjustments are made to ensure that the list is a creditable reflection of the standing of individual players on a national basis.

The Grading Committee are considering this matter with a view to changing the computer programme to eliminate the need for the majority of the manual adjustments currently made.

Overall the UNISYS Computer Grading System is working very well at a national level, with 141,297 results being entered for the season up to the October list and by the November list it is estimated that the final figure for results recorded will be close to 155,000.

The delay in receiving tournament results continues to be a problem as does the use of incorrect player codes and while the problems are at a club level these two matters need to be addressed by individual Districts.

Charmian Hayes as National Co-ordinator has continued to do an excellent job and without doubt, along with the assistance of Vivienne Brumby and Harry Meekin, her work has contributed greatly to the successful operation of the system. Likewise, the work of the District Statisticians is substantial and their part in the overall operation of the grading system is also acknowledged.

Finally, the thanks of New Zealand Squash and all graded players must go to UNISYS for the on-going and very valuable support and assistance they provide towards the operation of the system.

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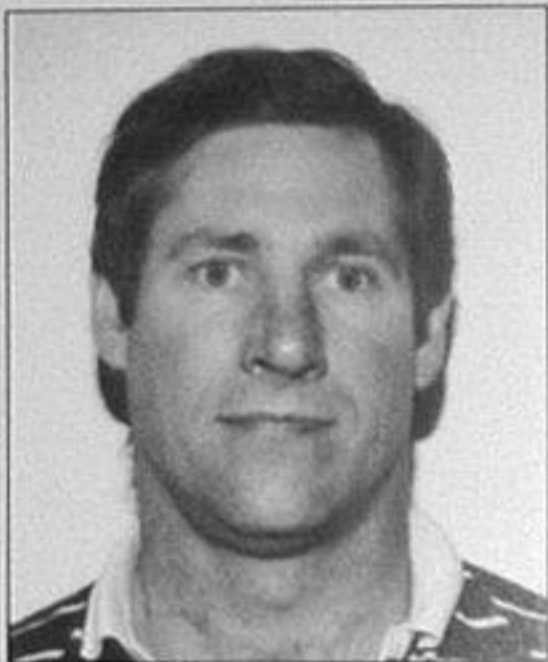
# Statistician's Men's

1991 followed the 1990 example with the production of seven grading lists. This had proven to be a very good decision as it keeps players gradings more current than under the previous four list situation.

The major change in the 1991 season grading lists was the publication of players points on each grading list. I believe this has had the desired effect of generating more interest and, therefore, more knowledge in how the grading system works. It had also displayed to the players what effect a missing tournament result can have on a player's grading. This, hopefully, will put more pressure on players recording their correct player codes and tournament controllers to make sure that all results are sent in within one week of the particular tournament. These are still the major problems with the system.

Production of players' histories were also restarted on request from players and these again showed what effect missing, incorrect or late results have.

The publication of points had also made more people aware of the manual adjustments performed by the National Statisticians at A and B1 levels. This has resulted in a discussion paper by the Chair-

man of the Grading Sub-committee being sent to all Districts and further discussion is expected at the NZ Squash AGM. This continued discussion and monitoring of the grading system can only be for the good. It is important that the methods of grading are constantly reviewed and changed when deemed necessary. I caution though in making it too easy to become an A1 or A2 player. If it does then in a few years another grade, international, may need to be added above A1 and

the current discussions will start once again.

Unfortunately 1991 has been my final year as Mens National Director of Statisticians as I am settling overseas for an unknown period. I have enjoyed the role and would like to thank all those who have helped me over the last two years. I would also like to thank all the players who have discussed gradings with me. It is only by asking questions and giving personal viewpoints or ideas that we will keep thinking about the system and questioning if it needs to be changed. It should only be changed to try to keep it fair to all the players, not just for the sake of changing it for a few.

I would also like to thank all those Club and District Statisticians for their voluntary hard work during 1991. It sometimes seems a thankless job, but without their effort there would be no gradings.

Last, but certainly far from least, I would like to thank Charmian Hayes, the National Co-ordinator, whose sterling effort is the reason we get grading lists printed at all.

# Women's

As affiliation fees have been tied in to grading list numbers, this had also seen a general tidying up of players on the lists and we should now have an up to date record of current active players. With the advent of players points being published on the grading list this has led to quite considerable discussion among players and has certainly made players more aware of the way the grading system works. It has also highlighted the manual adjustments that are made at the top level. With the grading list being a national grading list the top grades quality must always be

maintained. At the present time a discussion paper had been circulated to Districts outlining suggestions for refinements to the system thus reducing the number of

manual adjustments made at the top level.

Our lists have continued to arrive on the scheduled date and this is due to the efficient work put in by Charmian Hayes. The amount of voluntary work put in by both District and Club Statisticians is not always recognised and I wish to thank all those involved, in this often unrewarding job. It will always be an ongoing job of the District and Club Statisticians to educate our players of the system and the need of the correct code.

As the year has progressed it is again very pleasing to see the juniors making strong inroads in the senior ranks particularly in the A and B1 area and we must continue to encourage their high quality performance as these are our future top players.

# International

Our domestic based players Glen Wilson, Paul Steel and Philippa Beams gained overseas competition in Australia and Asia during the season and have taken on North American tournaments on their way to Britain during October.

Also a group of players from the U.D.C. Finance Squash Institute, under the guidance of Rob Crothall; attended the Australian Age Group Championships in Brisbane in Mid August.

## Professional Players

Ross Norman has shown a new lease of life during the year and has moved up the world ranking to seventh position.

Rory Watt has not played the International circuit due to coaching commitments in Holland, but has made himself available for the Men's World Championships in Helsinki.

Susan Devoy, has at the least, had a very upsetting and traumatic season. The well documented events of 1991 need no further elaboration except to further convey to her our sympathy and good wishes for her immediate future and plans to try for a further British open title in April next year.

## UDC Squash Institute

With the first full years operation now behind us much has been learnt and great progress made. As with any new venture there is a certain amount of trial and error and only by this process will we finally end up with the right formula needed to produce world class elite squash players to keep New Zealand squash represented at the highest level on the international scene.

It must always be kept in mind that the Institute has been set up as a school of excellence, and as such will be used to develop young squash players with potential to help them become full time profes-

sional players. It may take several years to come to fruition so miracles should not be expected in the short term. It is a long term project and will require much fine tuning.

## 1991 Junior Womens World Championships

This UDC sponsored team maintained their world ranking in finishing fourth. The team went very close to upsetting Australia which would have clinched them a place in the final. The team performed well but the lack of tough international competition beforehand took its toll in the end.

Congratulations to Aileen Somervell and her team of Leilani Marsh, Sarah Cook, Nicola Cosgriff and Louise Rogers.

Leilani Marsh performed the best in the individual event reaching the last eight but was beaten by the eventual runner-up Sabine Schone.

## 1991 Mens World Championships

Unfortunately due to Finland's failure to find a sponsor for the individual event a separate World Open was held in Adelaide in late July, with Rodney Martin of Australia upsetting the almost invincible Khans to win the title.

The teams event was in Helsinki, Finland, in early November and a team of Ross Norman, Paul Steel, Rory Watt and Glen Wilson, under the guidance of Neven Barbour, was selected to represent New Zealand.

## Smokefree/Freshup New Zealand Open

This event took place in Hamilton in mid August. The level of sponsorship received enabled us to only register the womens event on the World circuit. A top field was assembled in the womens event.

The mens event attracted a good overseas entry but not at the same level of the last few years.

Congratulation to the Hamilton Club for their successful hosting of this event.

## International Squash Rackets Federation

Once again we are fortunate to have Susie Simcock as Vice President of the world body. Susie has attended several ISRF meetings during the year and attended the AGM in Helsinki held in conjunction with the Mens World team event. Bill Murphy as the New Zealand Squash representative to the ISRF also attended the Helsinki AGM.

## Asia Pacific

New Zealand attended the meeting of Asia Pacific circuit countries this year, held for the first time in Pakistan. It is most important that we retain our strong links with this group of countries.

## Oceania

The world has been divided into five squash playing regions. Europe, Africa, America, Asia and Oceania. This has been to bring squash into a true international structure along Olympic games guidelines. Bill Murphy has been appointed Oceania's inaugural representative and has already attended a meeting of the regional representatives in Germany earlier this year.

New Zealand has offered to host the first Oceania Age Group Championships for players under 19 and under 17 in May 1992.

# ISRF Representative

The push to globalize world squash and establish a regional platform has progressed strongly during 1991.

The first two "eastern bloc" nations from Europe have joined what will be known soon as the World Squash Federation, while pending formation of the Oceania and Africa regions in 1992 will extend membership of the world body to near 100 countries within two years. Major development of the international "softball" game in North and Pan America will eventually guarantee the long term success of squash as a major sport worldwide.

Closer to home the Oceania Squash Federation (OSF) will be formed next May at the same time the inaugural Oceania Age Group Championships are held. It is hoped this move will bring all the squash playing nations in the South Pacific that much closer together and enable development of the game throughout the island area.

## ISRF Annual General Meeting

The 1991 AGM held in Helsinki in November adopted a number of principle changes that will come into effect in 12 months. These included,

- \* Name change to "World Squash Federation" to incorporate changing the sports official title from "Squash Rackets" to Squash.

- \* Rationalizing the principal officer structure to include three Vice Presidents on a wider geographical base, and to extend the term of office.

- \* Management of world squash will be carried out by the four principal officers and five regional representatives.

- \* Regional and international membership will be self binding on nations.

- \* Bi-annual general meetings as an option.

A working party over the next six months will also put forward to the 1992 AGM proposals to change membership and voting criteria which may see the executive membership status of 14 present countries voted out.

## World Championships

The Mens event in Helsinki, Finland and the junior womens event in Bergen, Norway confirmed the growing depth of the sport but also highlighted the challenges now taking place to the traditionally higher placed nations. This includes New Zealand and we will have to work extremely hard on talent identification and development programmes to remain in the top groupings.

Team sizes at world events and whether to increase to four or five in number will be a major consideration over the next year. As emphasis develops on regional tournaments for world championship play offs this issue will arise further.

World events scheduled over the next few years include;

1992: Junior Men - Hong Kong

Open Women - Canada

1993: Junior Women - Malaysia

Open Men - Pakistan

1994: Junior Men - New Zealand

Open Women - England

1995: Junior Women - Malaysia

Open Men - to be confirmed.

With the inaugural world masters held in New Zealand this year the event should now take up permanent place on the world calendar. Especially as other regions appear to be accepting the terminology of masters now.

No venue is as yet confirmed for 1993, however Hong Kong have indicated holding the 1994 tournament.

## Mini Squash

The international "junior" game of minisquash was launched in Helsinki and should provide a much needed opportunity for young players to be introduced to the sport. In New Zealand minisquash will ideally compliment the micrcourt and kiwisquash programme.

## Doubles Squash

Emphasis is now being put on the game of doubles squash with court specifications now out for both "hard ball" and "softball" games. Shortly updated rules will be available. This should eventuate in doubles squash being played worldwide and new courts being erected.

## Clothing Rules

ISRF rules have now been adopted for world championships and will act as guidelines for nations to use also.

## Racket Specifications

Promulgation of virtually unlimited racket head size has resulted in major changes to racket design in the past 12 months. Detailed specifications have now been adopted limiting further size increases with philosophical debate rampant as to the effective changes "largeheads" have brought to the game.

## Honorary Membership

Murray Day of New Zealand has been made a honorary member of the ISRF. Along with John Horry of England, he is the first to receive the award and Murray's contribution to the world squash has been appropriately recognised.

## Squash Vision 2020

A seminar looking at where our sport would need to develop in the next 25 - 30 years raised a number of topics. The most telling being that squash must have other facilities surrounding it as a sport. While this is most relevant in commercial centres it remains equally important in Clubs.

# The Bidwell File

For me the 1991 squash year will always be tinted with sadness.

In April Susan Devoy's marvellous run of seven consecutive British Open titles was ended in the quarter finals by England's Susan Wright.

On a rare day Devoy could not arrest her decline against the No. 13 seed after leading by two games to one, and her ousting eventually paved the way for perennial bridesmaid Lisa Opie to at last win a British Open.

New Zealanders could still live with that though even if Devoy was none too happy. Basically she had long achieved pretty well everything worth winning in the women's game, had become arguably the best women player in the history of the sport, and over the years had been such a superb champion and role model for our sportsmen and women.

There was always next year, Devoy having showed yet again what she was made of the previous October in recapturing her world title in Sydney.

Then in August came the news that Devoy and her husband John Oakley were to become parents for the first time, which helped explain why she had just been beaten in the Australian Open.

The congratulations flooded in, and it suddenly seemed that Devoy would be retiring after deciding against it at the start of the year.

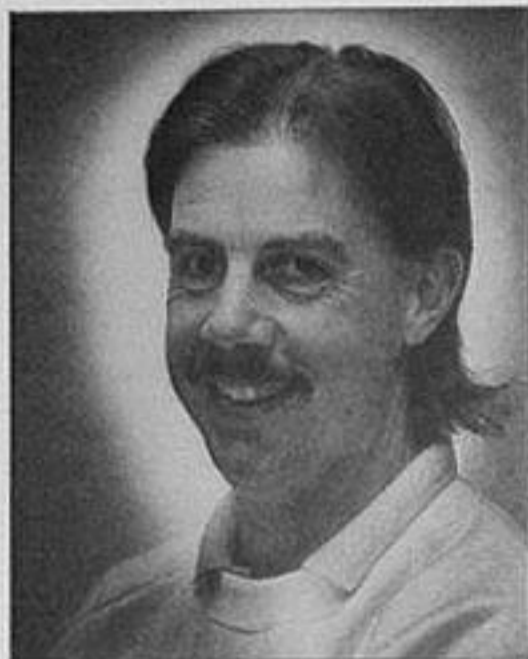
She was advised she was still able to contest the troubled New Zealand Open to be played for the first time in Hamilton.

For months one of the world's premier tournaments had been in jeopardy till the Health Sponsorship Council came to the rescue.

All was well when Devoy came through her first two matches without incident. But then came the news she had withdrawn from her quarter finals, and subsequent disclosure Devoy had suffered a miscarriage.

Within just a few days Devoy had experienced just about every feeling life had to offer, and she was disturbed by the news her father had had a heart attack.

It was all so shattering for Devoy, and her highly supportive family. For several

weeks squash was the last thing on her mind.

But to emphasise the guts and fight that have been two of her most admirable qualities over the years Devoy fronted up to the National Championships in New Plymouth.

Just for a moment Donna Newton thought that after years of playing second fiddle to Devoy she might at last win a national title, something that Devoy had denied Joanne Williams in numerous finals.

Devoy though put on a brave face, picked herself up, and proceeded to flatten poor Newton in the final.

Devoy was so brightened by the experience she was threatening to return to the international circuit at the time this piece was being written.

She looked like being lured to a major tournament in the Netherlands by the size of the prize-money, and concern that she was in danger of losing her No. 1 world ranking for the first time since the mid 1980's.

Devoy's highs and lows tended to be the among the few occasions when squash grabbed a slice of significant media attention.

It was yet another indication that Ross Norman apart there is hardly anyone else capable yet of capturing media exposure, and Norman is in the country for only short periods every year.

This has to be of concern to the sport's administrators. In playing numbers squash

is still one of this country's major sports yet its media interest seems to be flagging if anything.

Most players pay only minimal attention to the deeds of Devoy and company, being far more interested in their own efforts. For them our better players are rather remote. They rarely get the chance to see them, and when the opportunity is there they seem to much prefer to play themselves.

The New Zealand Open did little to create much hype when televised on the Sunday. By then Devoy and Norman were absent, and the two finals were one sided, both matches being completed in three games.

The new world champion Rodney Martin was only a pale imitation of his true self, apparently carrying an injury, and offering little resistance against Chris Dittmar, and Robyn Lambourne made short work of an out of sorts Danielle Drady.

As this country strives to produce players able to take over from Devoy and Norman, so vital to the securing of sponsorship and Sports Foundation grants, it needs the positive publicity which encourages our youth to take up squash.

There is still no one looking like breaking through among the women. Philippa Beams did not progress quite at the rate hoped for this year. Marie Pearson still being able to keep her at bay even after a period of inactivity.

Glen Wilson and Paul Steel are not yet ready to take over from Norman, who despite being in his 30's has actually improved his world ranking in the last year to seventh, a remarkable achievement.

Wilson's asthma problems have tended to blight his development, and there seems a lack of confidence and even motivation at other times. When in form he can be quite devastating as he exhibited in thrashing Steel to win his second national men's final.

At a lower level I detected a renewal of interest in playing tournaments, which I think will be reflected in increased membership numbers, and the feat of Leilani Marsh, Sarah Cook and Jade Wilson in



winning the Australian under 19, under 17 and under 15 titles had to be the most encouraging aspect of the competitive year.

Even if the Australian standards had slipped a little it still represented a remarkable feat. To beat the Australians on their own patch you have to be on your toes, and the trio did not just beat their opponents they pummelled them in to submission.

For the sport's wellbeing the trio badly

need to be provided with the right incentives to fully develop their talents.

At the other end of the scale New Zealand staged the inaugural World Masters Championships at the North Shore Club. By all accounts it was a memorable occasion. Masters squash is clearly a growth area, which can only have been strengthened by what occurred at Labour Weekend.

It's certainly an area worth looking after. The sort of people involved are just as likely to be those in positions to be making decisions about possible increased sponsorship of squash.

## Selectorial

At the beginning of 1991 the Selectors prepared a criteria for the 1991 season:

- to select a monthly seeding list of 16 players, men and women, based on form for that month, for the months of May to September inclusive,

- to select for release in October/November an end of the season ranking list of 16 players, men and women, based on form over the full season,

- to select the best mens team available to compete for New Zealand in the 1991 World Teams Championships,

- to select the most improved mens and womens players for 1991.

During 1991 at least one selector attended the following; Under 23 Championships, Cousins Shield/Mitchell Cup, Smokefree N.Z. Open, U.D.C Finance South Island Championships and 8 out of the 10 District Opens - (including the North Island Championships).

Seeding lists were prepared each month from May to September on results of these tournaments to give an accurate basis for the seedings for those tournaments following. A final ranking list was completed in October based on overall performances during the whole season. The policy of the selectors, as circulated to all senior players, was that a minimum of 5 of the major tournaments needed to be played for any player to be considered for the ranking list. Although the selectors did

have some discretion on this depending on circumstances particularly where it involved overseas based players.

The selectors are indebted to the National Director of Statisticians, Harry Meekin for providing computer results of leading players matches during the year. This assisted in giving the selectors an overall view of each player on a month by month basis. These computer results included inter-club results as well as results of tournaments. There is room for more use of the computer in the selection process and as an extension of the computer results sheets it may be possible in the near future to have seeding lists and rankings done by computer. (Presumably tournaments would have to be graded according to the standard of the player competing - this no doubt would be dependent on the amount of prize money available etc).

The U.D.C tournaments drew an excellent response from overseas players especially from Australia and the compe-

tion was of a high standard. So much so in fact that there was very little for the selectors to do after the first or second rounds of the qualifying event as there were not usually more than one or two kiwis who had survived at that stage.

The selection of the mens senior team to compete in the World Teams Event in Finland in November 1991 was not an easy task. This was due to poor form, by his standards, from Glen Wilson, the evenness in standard of the other leading candidates and very late in the picture, the availability of Rory Watt who had not competed domestically at all during 1991. The criteria, the selectors were given in choosing the team was to select the best team available. In the event the team selected was Ross Norman, Glen Wilson, who showed a welcome return to form, just at the right time, in winning the New Zealand Title, Rory Watt and Paul Steel who by his consistent form during the year deserved his first senior New Zealand representation. The unlucky player was Danny McQueen who had performed to a high standard for most of the year and who had, at selection time, maintained a clear edge over Michael Allred and Wayne Werder.

Wayne Werder in fact was selected as the most improved mens player for 1991 and this was a just reward for a season which saw his game consolidate and then advance to a domestic seeding in June of No. 4. Sarah Cook was a relative outsider to take the most improved womens player as there was some close contenders all of whom would have been deserved winners of the award. Sarah was however, un-

ranked in 1991 and her No. 8 ranking in 1991 does give an indication of her improvement. She played very credibly for the New Zealand Junior Team in Norway and it was pleasing to see her after winning the award, go on to win the Australian Under 17 Title.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow two selectors Sandra Tinkler and Barrie Matthews for their input over what has been a very long season. Although both Sandra and Barrie

have had long associations with the game they have both maintained a rapport with the players and this is still an essential ingredient for a selector (computers or not), plus of course the ability to talk in to a telephone for seemingly hours at a stretch!

**W**ayne Werder of Hamilton and Sarah Cook of Christchurch were awarded the coveted most improved player trophies presented at the National Championships at Kawaroa Park in New Plymouth.

19 year old Werder had a very solid season which saw him improve his national ranking by two places to no. 7 and his international ranking to 171, up 26 places. His most creditable performance was undoubtedly the nationals where he reached the semi-finals upsetting the fourth

seed Michael Allred on the way.

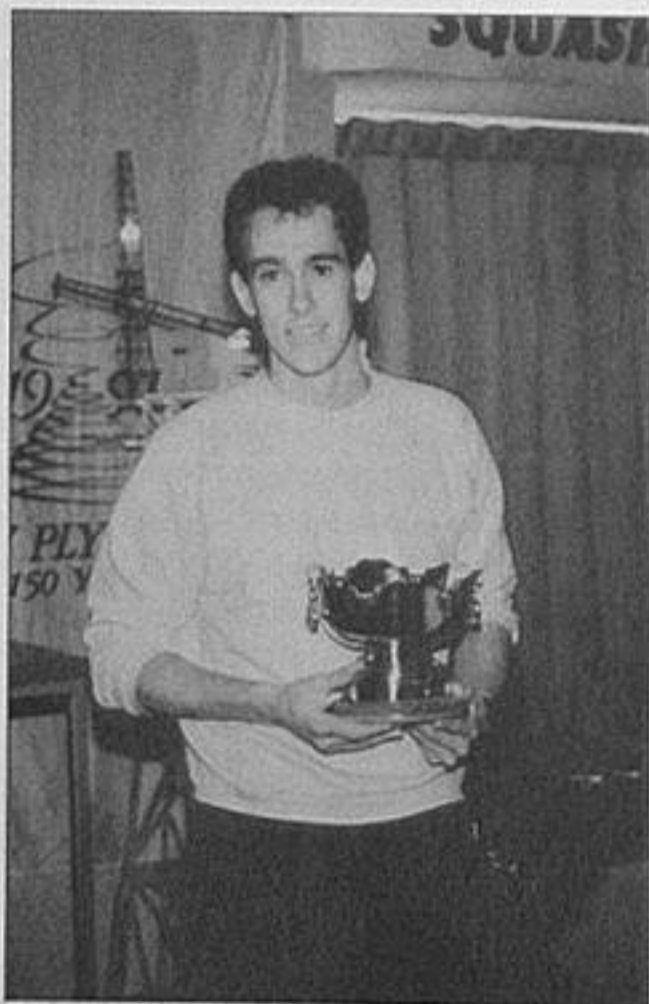
Werder was the 1990 National Junior Champion and no. 1 in the Junior Mens World Championship team that competed in Germany that year.

Earlier this year he spent four months in England on a developmental programme under the guidance of the UDC Finance Squash Institute.

Cook, another member of the UDC Finance Squash Institute, capped off a very impressive year which included winning the New Zealand and Australian un-

der 17 titles. Only 16 years of age, Cook played No. 2 in the New Zealand Junior Womens team at the World Championships in Norway in July putting up some outstanding performances both in the individual event and the teams championship.

While No. 2 in the junior rankings behind Leilani Marsh, Cook has been rewarded with a first time ranking of no. 8 on the national ranking list, recognising her tremendous improvement.

# Ranking Lists

Susan Devoy the world squash champion and New Zealand's former world title holder Ross Norman remain unchallenged at the top of the national squash rankings for 1991.

Although there has been noticeable improvement in the rankings in the younger brigade, nobody yet has reached a position where they look like displacing Devoy or Norman from the premier positions.

In both the mens and womens rankings, which reflect performances over the last twelve months, there is very little change in the top order from the previous year. The leading four mens positions are dominated by the members of the New Zealand team to compete in the World Championships in Finland in November. The current national champion Glen Wilson retains his no. 2 position by virtue of some excellent late season form and is followed by Rory Watt at no. 3, being the same positions these two players held in the 1990 rankings. Paul Steel has moved in to no. 4 position, up one place from last

season.

Danny McQueen has been ranked no. 5, not having appeared on last years list due to insufficient tournament results. He is followed by Michael Allred and Wayne Werder, two players who have improved their rankings from 8 and 9 respectively.

Besides McQueen there are four other new faces on the ranking list. Mark Tapsell comes in at tenth spot with Grant Linton no. 11 and Grant Katters at no. 16.

The National Selectors have placed Linton one position ahead of UDC Finance Squash Institute colleague and national junior champion Daniel Sharplin. Sharplin beat Linton for the junior title in August.

The retirement of Joanne Williams, ranked behind only Devoy for a number of years has seen Donna Newton and Marie Pearson move in to second and third positions respectively. Newton particularly having had some excellent results during the year.

Two young players Philippa Beams

and Leilani Marsh have continued their improvement in the rankings, Beams up two places to no. 4 with Marsh making a similar rise to the no. 5 position.

Marsh headed the New Zealand junior team to the World Championships earlier this year and her other three team mates Sarah Cook, Louise Rogers and Nicola Cosgriff have all been rewarded with first time national rankings. Cook, the most improved player in New Zealand this year, has moved straight in to no. 8 position, with Rogers at 12 and Cosgriff at 15.

Solid performances during the year have also seen Nita Pearson and Jenny Bell improve their rankings significantly.

Pearson up four positions to no. 6 and Bell five slots to no. 7. While experienced campaigner Cheryl Tekani has returned to the rankings in no. 11 position having not competed so regularly last year.

Players not considered due to playing insufficient National/District tournaments Shane Hagan, Rodney Bannister and Lynora Hati.

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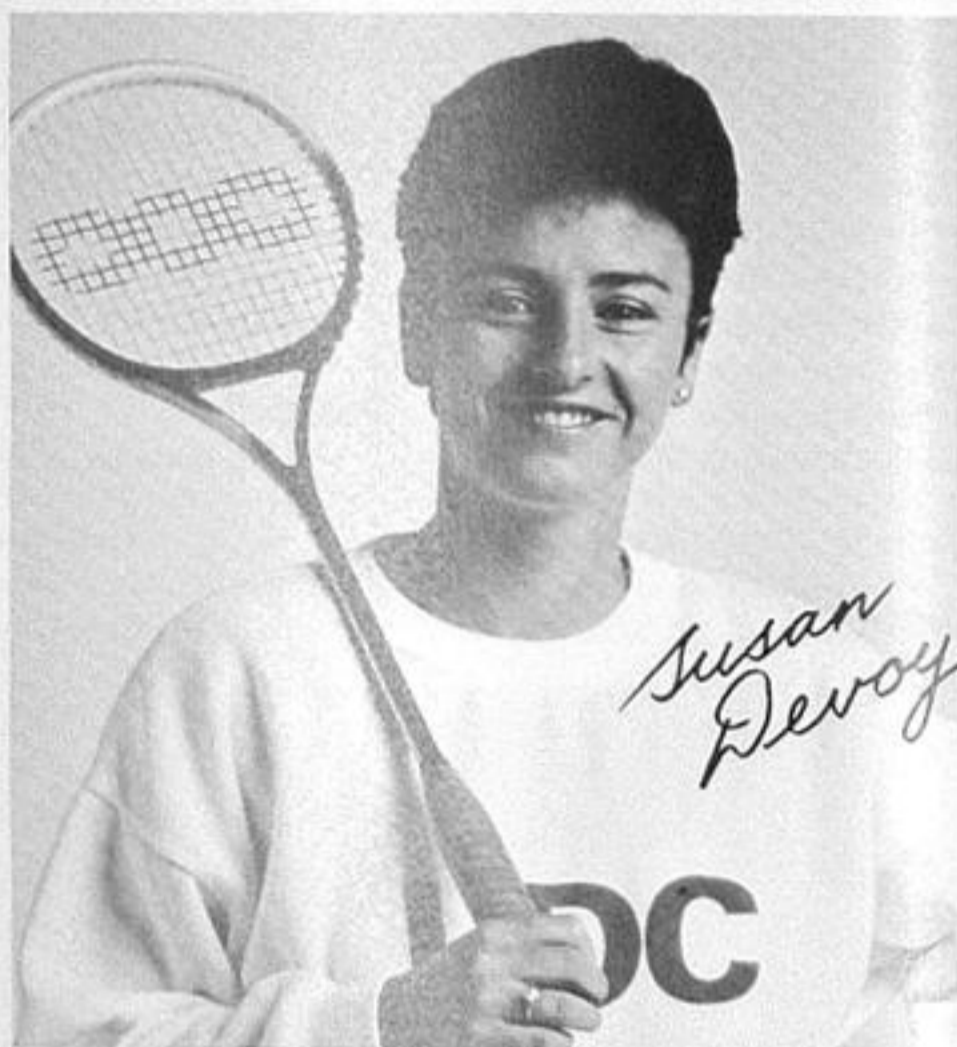

Werder and Susan Devoy utilized the facility till after the British Open earlier in the year while Marie Pearson also relocated there for a short period.

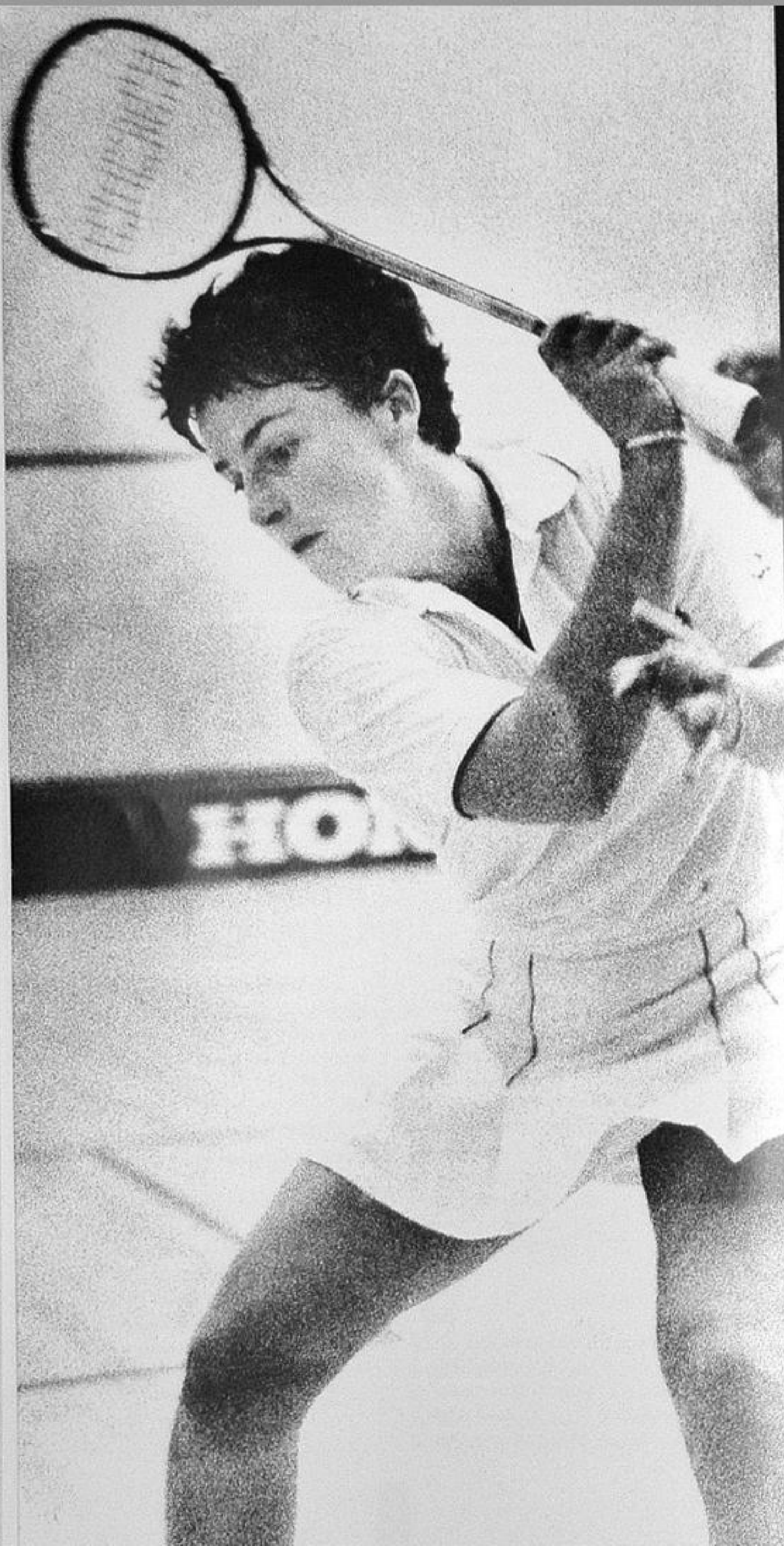

## New Zealand tournament programme

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# Mens World Team Championships

The New Zealand team in finishing fifth at the 13th Mens World Championships held in Helsinki, Finland in November preserved a long standing record from the first championships back in 1967.

No New Zealand mens team has finished out of the top 5 and the latest kiwi group, who were seeded fourth, showed plenty of grit and determination to head off an improving bunch of nations that saw a number of changes to the world ranking order. Amongst this came the demise of Pakistan dropping to an unheard of 8th placing.

New Zealand's line up included former world champion Ross Norman, who after a surprising loss in the first match against Canada, rallied to record superb wins in all his other games to set up the end result.

Controversial selection Rory Watt played at no.2 and called on all his experience to clean out the Netherlands second string in the vital third rubber for the fifth and sixth play off.

National champion Glen Wilson was

probably the star of the team, winning his first five matches impressively. When holding 2 match balls in the fourth game and looking like ending the event unbeaten, he surprisingly ran out of steam in the fifth game against his experienced Dutch opponent however, leaving his two team mates to tidy up. Nonetheless Wilson's form was encouraging and the week of very hard mental application should assist his career no end.

Paul Steel, like Wilson, competing in the first world championship at open level would have gained valuable experience from the two matches he played. Especially in his vital rubber against the Egyptian no.3 which saw him face the real pressures of team squash for the first time.

The championships started with a frustrating loss against Canada in the opening tie that meant New Zealand would be struggling to make the cut off for the top four places, this was made worse when in the other critical pool clash Egypt took one match off defending world champi-

ons Australia and left New Zealand needing a 3-0 victory over Egypt to qualify. Manager Neven Barbour went for broke and elevated Wilson to no.2 against the highly talented Gamal El Amir however, found the overall depth of his team short on the day and had to take 2-1 victory in the end.

Seeing the chance of third place slip away, the New Zealanders came back well and removed Germany 3-0 and Sweden 2-1 before eventually ending the championship with a 2-1 victory over the Netherlands.

Without Jahangir Kahn, Pakistan who were seeded to meet Australia in the final, very nearly crashed out of the top 8 which could have seen them missing the opportunity to play for the 1993 title in their home country. Australia and England however, continued their strong runs with the defending champions being too classy in the final result. While hosts Finland thrilled their huge army of supporters by taking third place.

# Smokefree Squash Open

There was considerable doubt earlier in the year whether the prestigious New Zealand Squash Open would hold its place on the world tournament calendar due to sponsorship difficulties.

Late in the piece however, sponsorship from the Health Sponsorship Council under the Smokefree banner and then additional input from the N.Z. Apple & Pear Marketing Board and Freshup, guaranteed the event being held.

The Smokefree Women's Open retained its international grand prix ranking status while the men's event was not registered internationally, nonetheless it still attracted a number of top players.

The Hamilton Squash Racquets Club made an impressive job of hosting the tournament with the semi-finals and the finals played at the Founders Memorial Theatre where the NZS perspex court was assembled on centre stage.

World champions Susan Devoy and Rodney Martin, the latter having captured

his crown only days before the Open started, were the major draw cards. Devoy, sadly due to health reasons, could not complete the tournament which saw the title for the first time in eight years go to an overseas player.

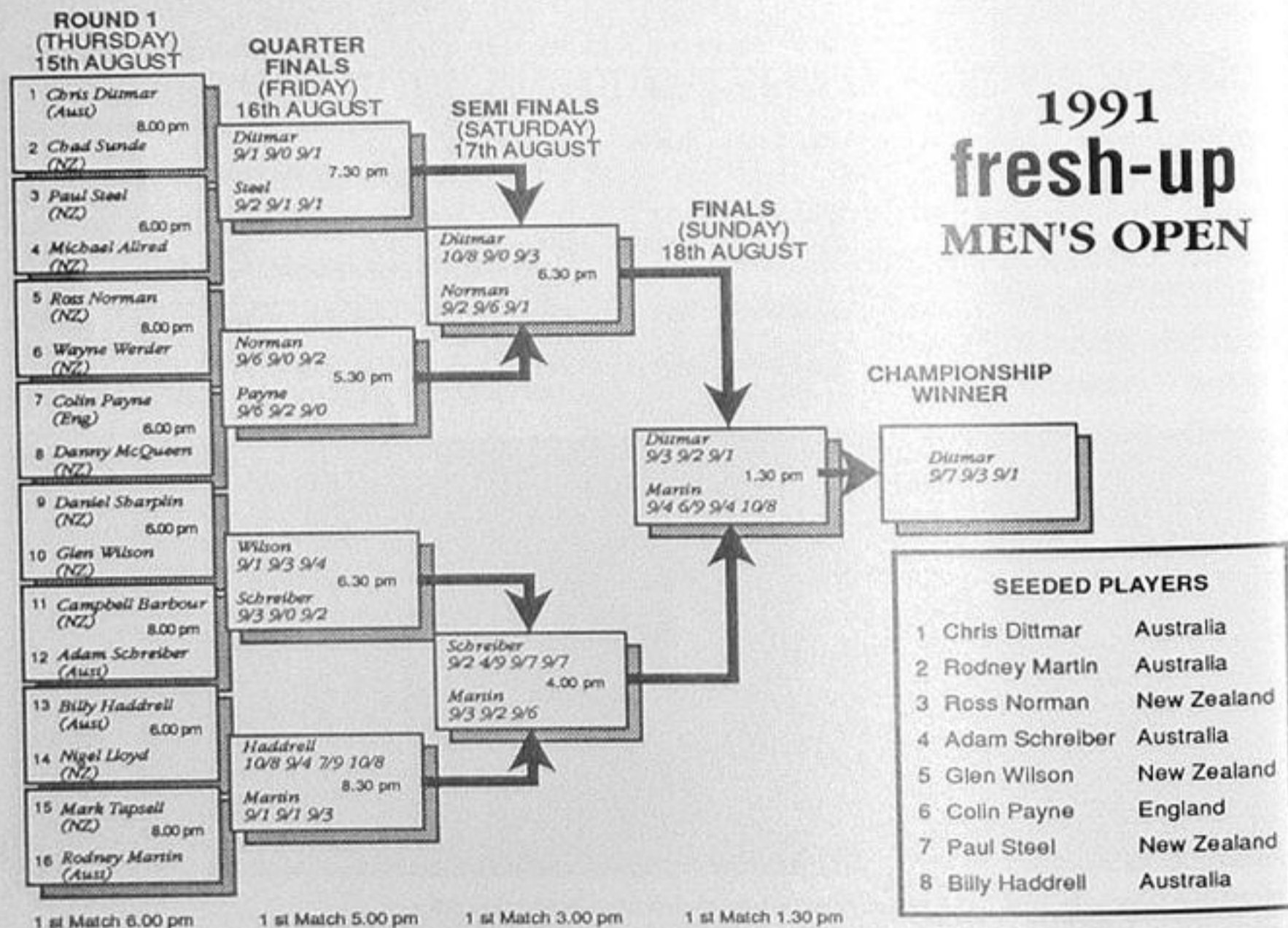
The winner Robyn Lambourne of Australia beat her fellow country person Danielle Drady in the final while in the men's championship the former title holder Chris Dittmar continued his impressive displays in New Zealand putting away the newly crowned world champion Martin decisively.

Lambourne was impressive in her performance against Drady winning in three straight games, although in the semi-final she had considerable difficulty in getting past her other Australian world team mate Liz Irving in a close 4 game battle. English player Fiona Geaves reached the semi-finals by virtue of Devoy's default in the quarter-finals stage where she went down in reasonably quick time to Drady.

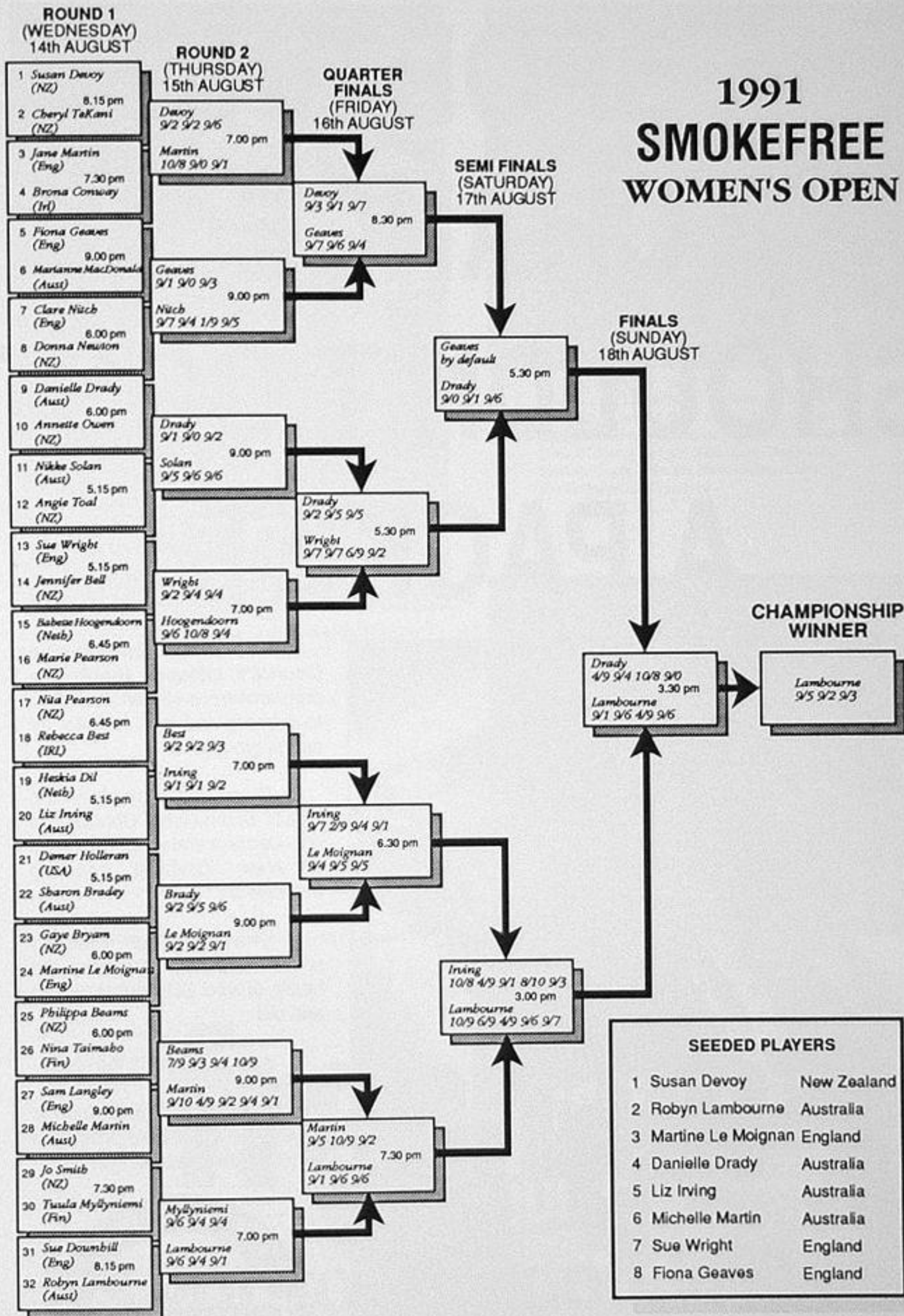
In the strong women's line-up, and other than Devoy, Philippa Beams was the only kiwi to reach the second round of the 32 draw.

The men's 16 draw saw a number of locals get the opportunity to compete against top international players with Chad Sunde, Daniel Sharplin, Campbell Barbour and Mark Tapsell all qualifying. However Ross Norman, Paul Steel and Glen Wilson were the only three New Zealanders to progress to the second round which was quarter-final stage. Steel losing to top seed Chris Dittmar and Wilson going down to late replacement Adam Schreiber of Australia in an exciting 4 game encounter. Dittmar lived up to his top seeding by removing Norman in reasonably short time with Martin disposing of Schreiber.

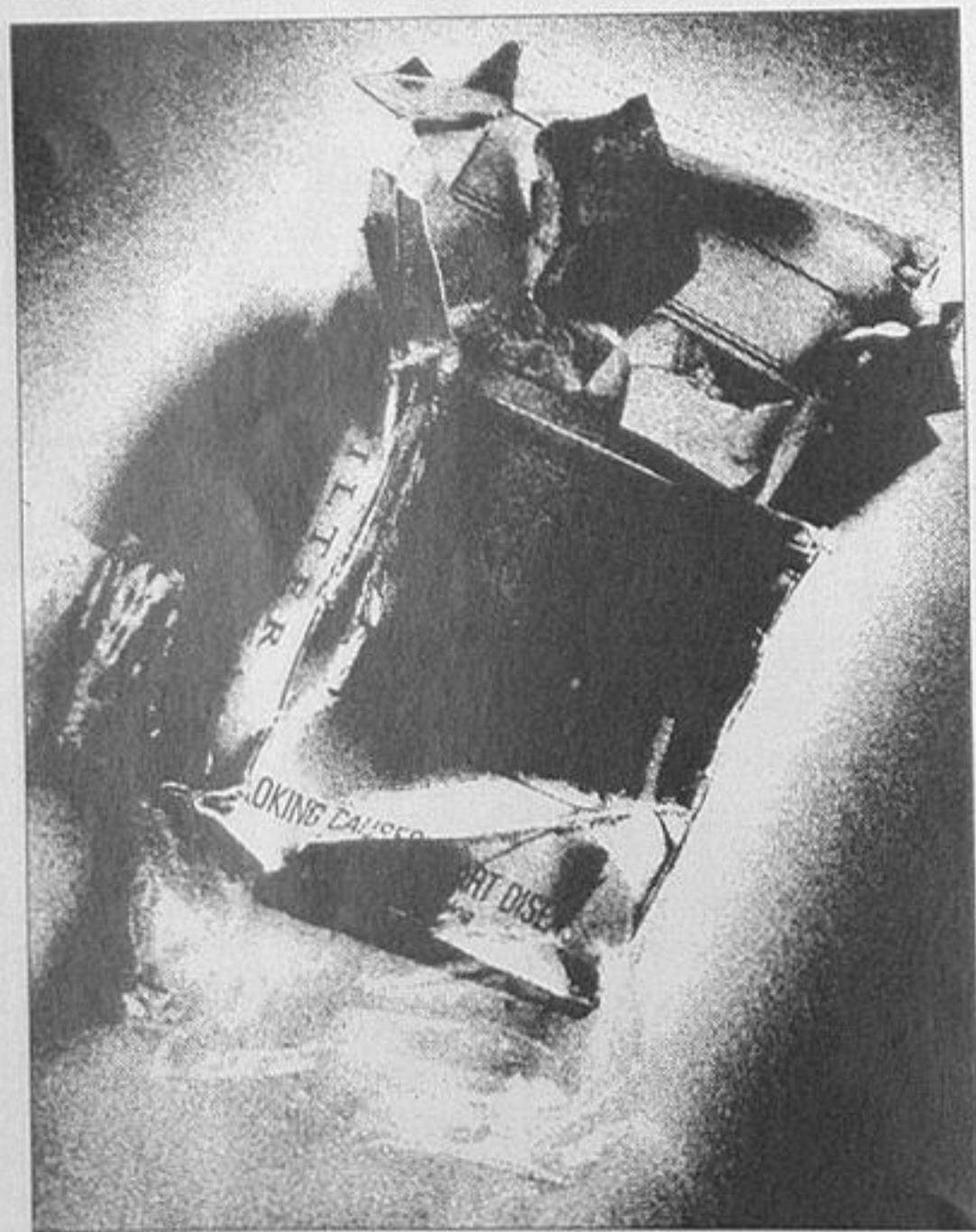

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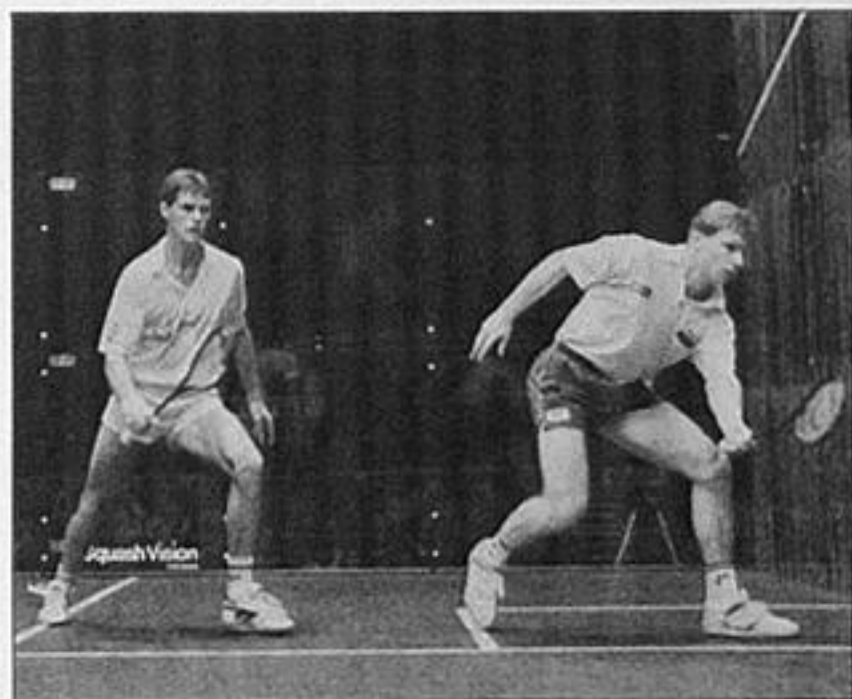

# Finance and Planning Report

for year ended 30 September 1991

## Income and Expenditure

The final result of the years financial activities shows a surplus of income over expenditure of \$27,179, which is considered most satisfactory and compares with a budgeted surplus, as approved at last years Annual General Meeting, of \$2,500.

At the first management meeting in 1991, when final details were available of likely income from grants, sponsorships and endorsements, the budget was altered to take in to account all known variances, and a re-budgeted surplus of \$1,400 was adopted for the year. The achieved surplus when compared with this figure is also very satisfactory and arose through several gains and losses.

Sponsorship obtained for the New Zealand Open was not as much as initially planned, but this was offset by downgrading of the men's event and other cost cuttings.

Although the contribution from the New Zealand Squash Centre was significant, downturns in court hire income was not wholly offset by it's better trading performances in all other areas. This resulted in the surplus available to New Zealand Squash being down by almost \$14,000 for the year when compared to the budgeted return.

Savings in management committee expenses of over \$6,000, staff and office operating costs (\$13,500), postage, tolls and freight (over \$5,000), and development (almost \$7,000), were partly offset by agreed extra expenditure on producing a new refereeing video at \$10,500, and international meetings of \$2,000. However the extra surplus could be attributed largely to straight cost savings in general management and administration.

## New Zealand Squash Centre and UDC Finance Squash Institute

Separate revenue and expenditure statements are shown for these two entities which are operated as separate bodies, with their own management boards. Both the operating surplus of the Centre and the

funding obtained for the Institute and it's transfer together with New Zealand Squash's contribution, are shown in the New Zealand Squash accounts.

The Centre and the Institute continue to be vital parts of New Zealand Squash and their contribution and costs, impact heavily on the overall finances of the association.

## Levies

The change approved at last years AGM to the way by which levies are charged to clubs throughout New Zealand, has proceeded very smoothly, with only a few clubs failing at first to grasp the change from an individual levy to a club levy concept.

Now that the first year's problems have been overcome, we have for the future a system that provides fairness and has the added advantage that income from levies can be much more accurately projected.

We are at present collecting and collating the membership returns from all clubs, which are separate from levy returns and the information which will be obtained from these, will enable New Zealand Squash to plan more effectively for the future.

## Hillary Commission

The generous support of the Hillary Commission in providing funding for the

development and administration of squash in New Zealand is gratefully acknowledged. Without it's support many of the happenings in squash would not be possible.

## Shane O'Dwyer Trust Fund

As at 30 September 1991 the Shane O'Dwyer Trust Fund stood in excess of \$22,200. The fund, in memory of one of New Zealand Squash's leading identities, is overseen by New Zealand Squash with a separate Board of Trustees, chaired by Life Member Michael Sumpter.

No grants were made from the trust fund during the year.

## General Administration

The office is now well settled in Auckland and the financial controls and systems now in place have greatly improved the general administration of our sport.

The committee wishes to record it's thanks to the office staff for their dedicated and tireless work throughout the year.

The Chairman also wishes to acknowledge the work carried out by all members of the Finance and Planning Committee.

# Statement of Accounting Policies

## 1. General Accounting Policies

The measurement base adopted is that of historical cost.

Reliance is placed on the fact that the Association is a going concern. Accrual accounting is used to match expenses and revenues.

## 2. Consolidation

The trading result from the Centre and the operation of the Institute have not been incorporated into the general funds of the Association, due to the different nature of operations. The three Balance Sheets however have been consolidated.

## 3. Stock

Stock has been valued at the lower of cost or net realizable value. Due allowance has been made for slow moving stocks.

## 4. Depreciation

Apart from the Perspex Court referred to in the Annual Report depreciation generally is calculated at the ordinary rate approved for tax purposes except in the case of the New Zealand Squash Centre building and Leasehold Improvements where a rate of depreciation to equate the term of the current lease, due to expire in 1999, has been used.

## 5. Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at expected realizable value. Where a debt is considered to be irrecoverable it has been written off in the accounts.

## 6. New Zealand Squash Centre Valuation

An up-to-date valuation of the New Zealand Squash Centre has been impossible to obtain, but the latest estimate of the of the reinstatement cost of the buildings for insurance purposes is \$2.233 million.

## 7. Goods and Services Tax

All transactions are recorded exclusive of G.S.T.

## 8. Changes

There have been no material changes in accounting policies since the previous financial statements.

# New Zealand Squash Centre

The NZ Squash Centre has had a satisfactory year especially considering the economic situation, with a net surplus of \$76,356.

Court fees declined by 10% but increased shop sales (up 10%) and much better returns, even with very competitive prices, assisted the result. The stringing machine purchased during the year has been a wise investment already paying for itself.

The manager Dennis Cheyne has diligently and enthusiastically worked to in-

crease court usage. The staff at the centre has been stable and efficient. The restaurant is leased to a new operator with increased opening hours and improved decor so continues to be a service and an attraction.

The maintenance programme has progressed during the year with the remaining six courts repainted during the summer. A new roof with air vents over courts 10,11 and 12 was installed with greatly increased air circulation and reduced condensation problems. Painting and other

regular maintenance has continued throughout the Centre.

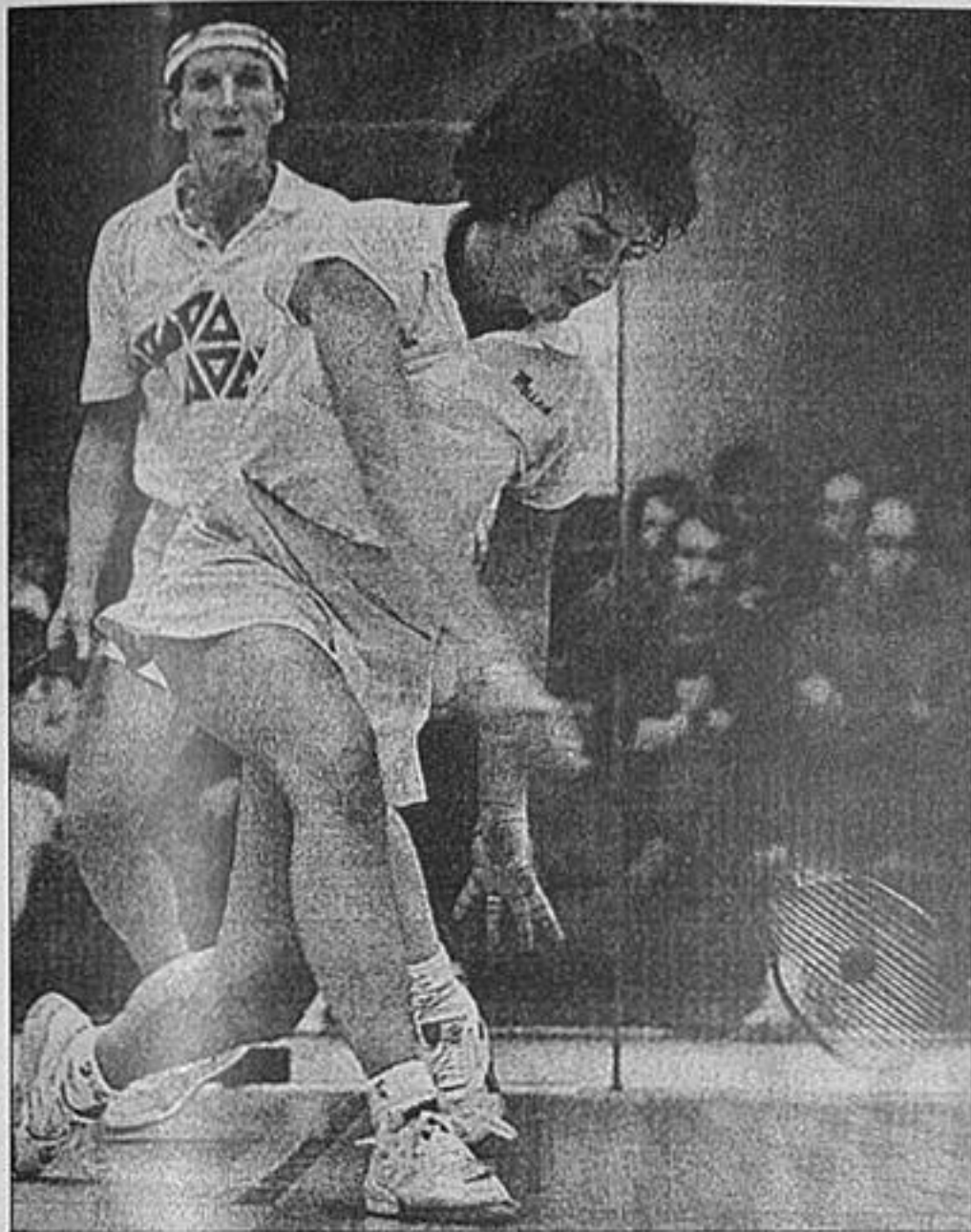

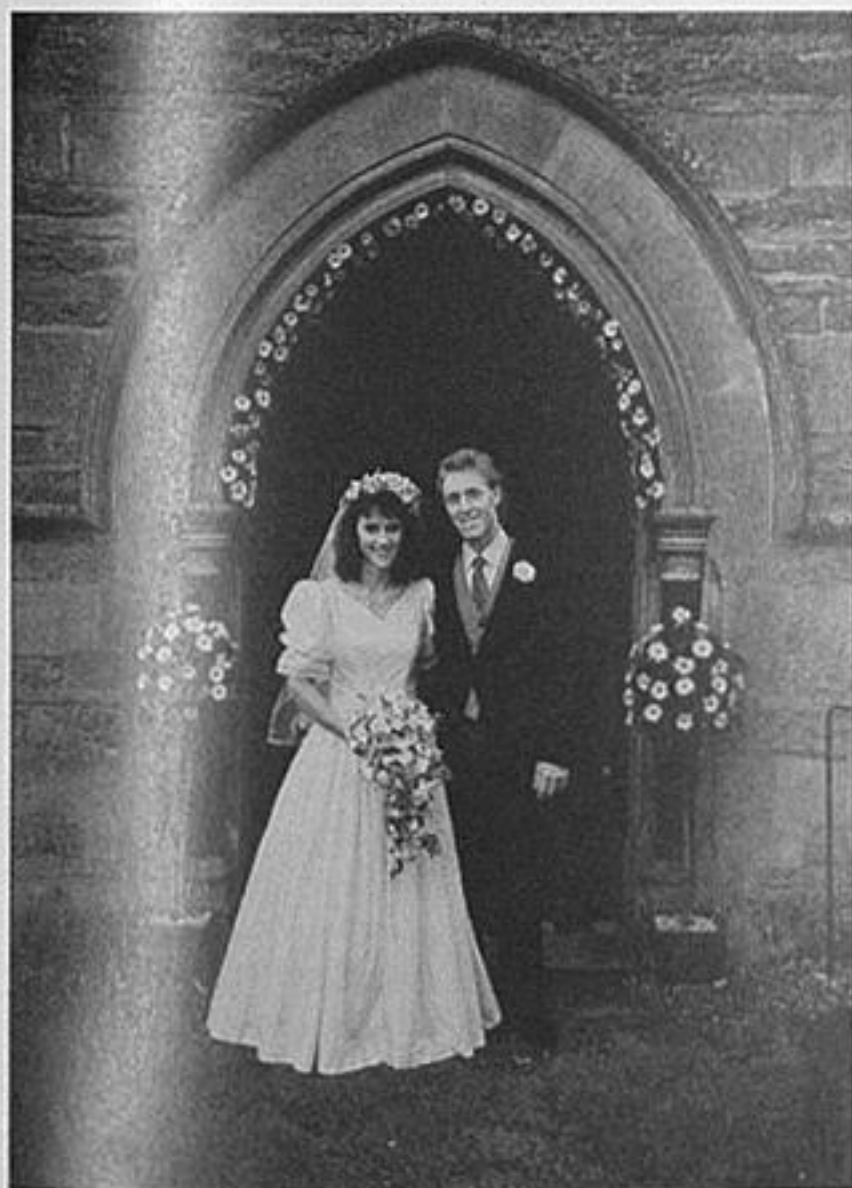
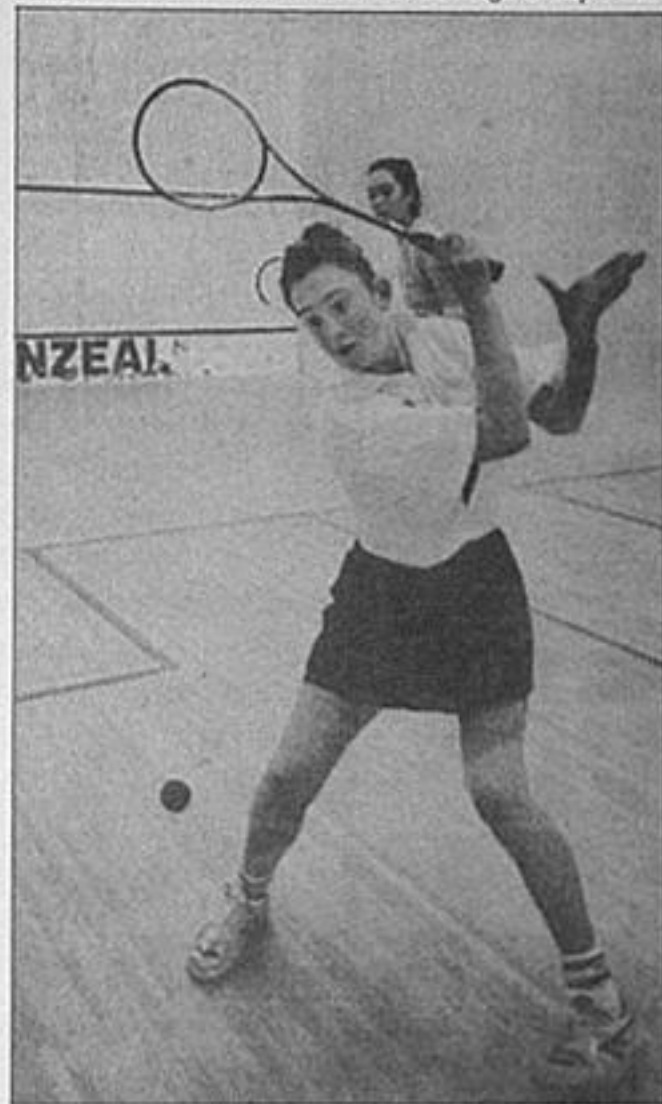

# National Championships

The 1991 Shell Todd National Championships provided some intense squash, especially in the men's event where places in the New Zealand team to compete in the World Championships were at stake. Also the event was notable for the return to the squash court for Susan Devoy following a traumatic time during the New Zealand Open a few weeks earlier.

Kawarua Park's oceanside venue provided a magnificent setting for the championships where the organising committee provided an equally superb occasion.

Glen Wilson and Devoy retained their national titles with consummate ease Wilson for the second year in succession and Devoy her ninth title on the trot.

In the men's championship there was a major upset at quarter-finals stage when rookie Wayne Werder despatched the No. 4 seed Michael Allred in 5 games virtually ending Allred's contention for a place in the New Zealand team. Although they both lost, youngsters Daniel Sharplin and Grant Linton confirmed their improving form by reaching the quarter-finals.

Werder could not sustain his golden run against the rampant Wilson in one

semi-final, however an epic battle developed between Paul Steel and Danny McQueen in the other. McQueen missed a golden chance in the second game which would have eventually forced the match to 5, however it was only after two hours of determined battling from both players that Steel came out on top.

In the final Steel could not lift himself from his strength sapping semi-final and Wilson had little difficulty only dropping nine points on the way to his repeat title victory. Devoy did not lose any games and gave away only a minimum of points in convincingly winning her championship. Nonetheless Donna Newton played courageous squash and to reach the final displayed very convincing form, especially in the semi final where she disposed of Marie Pearson in three exciting games. Philippa Beams the other semi-finalist was no match for Devoy but played well to reach the last four, beating national junior champion Leilani Marsh in 5 games in the quarter-finals.

The inter-district teams titles were played under a new division format for the first time, however this did not prove

favourable with the players and it was very strongly agreed amongst everyone that future events should return to the previous two pool system.

The Bay of Plenty men and the Waikato womens teams displayed excellent form and consistency to win their respective titles. It was a third year in succession for the Waikato team and for Bay of Plenty the fourth win in the past five years.

Defending champions Wellington put up a valiant performance throughout the three days of the teams event and while they beat Bay of Plenty on a count-back could not sustain solid enough victories over other teams to keep Bay of Plenty out. Canterbury improved significantly on their sixth placing the previous year as did Northland who moved up to fifth from bottom of the table.

The women's competition included only nine teams for the second successive year with Midlands not competing. Auckland pushed Waikatos' superiority strongly, however it was the Canterbury team who provided one of the main highlights improving to third position from a lowly seventh the previous year.

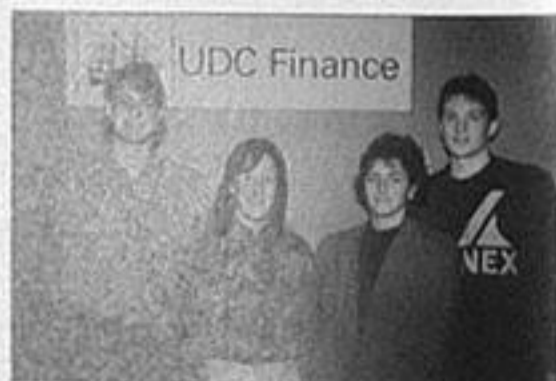

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# Masters Squash

Masters squash is continuing to be a growth area. It is essential that we recognise the importance of this area of squash in relation to the overall scene. National administration is all about numbers playing the game. The maintenance of numbers is not just attracting new players, but keeping the interest, enthusiasm and participation of those already involved in the sport. Thus the growth in masters participation is good for squash and furthermore the bulk of our coaches and administrators come from this area. It has often been stated that the advantage that squash administrators have is that they still play the sport.

This year's tournament schedule listed 73 masters tournaments with 18 in Auckland, 13 in Waikato, 10 in Bay of Plenty and 9 in Central. Some of these tournaments have been extraordinarily well patronised with 560 entries received for the World Masters and 185 entries for both the Auckland and Waikato Masters Championships. Red Beach a two court club, north of Auckland, had 127 entries for their tournament.

Virtually all Districts hold masters inter-club and this tends to be most successful both competitively and socially.

Auckland masters inter-club is restricted to players 40 years and over and C grade and below, and yet has 73 teams and over 450 players.

## District Convenors

These are the most important people in masters squash administration. They are the people who get the inter-clubs going, push for more tournaments and organise their inter-district team. The success in each District depends upon the enthusiasm and commitment of this convenor.

## Committee

An Auckland based New Zealand committee continued to operate and was the lowest cost means of administering the masters area, while still maintaining a line to the New Zealand Management Committee via the National Director.

# 1991 World Masters Squash Championships

The North Shore Squash Club hosted over Labour Weekend the inaugural World Masters Squash Championships.

Although individual masters titles had been held in conjunction with previous open level world championships this was the first occasion for both men's and women's events to be held together and what will be the fore-runner of biannual events from now on.

504 entries were accepted from an original entry list of over 560 including

over 60 players from outside of New Zealand. Countries represented were Australia, Canada, Germany, India, Ireland, Singapore, U.S.A, Western Samoa, Zimbabwe.

The championships were centered around individual titles only although a festival teams event was held in the days following the individual titles, again as a lead hopefully to a regular team championship.

There were ten championship titles at stake while another seventeen graded divisions were competed for.

Of the six men's events, the 35 plus and 45 plus finals were over in quick time as was the women's 45 plus final. However all others were very closely fought, providing some captivating squash for the large crowds watching.

Host country New Zealand won 6 championship titles while Australia took 3 and Canada one.

# Junior Squash

1991 has been a year of changes for New Zealand Junior Squash. There was a great furore at the beginning of the year when the Junior Affairs Committee proceeded to implement the recommendations from the youth and junior squash review, especially the removal of the under 19 divisions from the national age group events. In retrospect I believe that we made the right decision.

## International

In fairness to all prospective world championship team members, all B grade and above junior women players were written to informing them that eight players were to be named at the Slazenger New Zealand Under 23 Championships, to play in a round robin selection series. This would include the Slazenger South and North Island Championships and the Bay of Plenty District Championships.

The trials were the highlight of these events and the girls are to be commended for their good sportsmanship.

The team selected was Sarah Cook (Canterbury), Nicola Cosgriff (Southern), Leilani Marsh (Waikato) and Louise Rogers of (Northland).

Under the guidance of the manager Aileen Sommervell the team performed with great credit to hold their number 4 position and were unfortunate not to beat Australia and finish higher. Congratulations to them all.

In September, New Zealand junior players had further international success at the Australian Age Group Championships. Leilani Marsh, won the Under 19 Championships, Sarah Cook won the Under 17 Championships and Jade Wilson won the Under 15 Championships. Chad Sunde was runner-up in the Boys Under 17 Championships.

## National Events

The Slazenger South Island Championships was the first of the junior under 17, under 15 and under 13 events held.

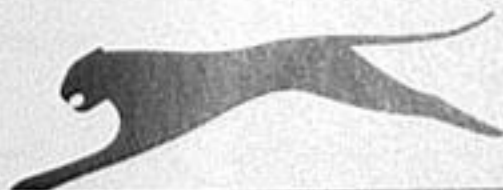

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# Junior Women's World Championships

The UDC Finance New Zealand junior women's team competed in the fourth World Junior Women's Squash Championships held in Bergen, Norway during July and August.

The team comprised Leilani Marsh (Hamilton), Sarah Cook (Christchurch), Louise Rogers (Kaitaia) and Nicola Cosgriff (Dunedin) with Aileen Somervell (Matamata) the manager. The team was selected following the Bay of Plenty Open championships in early June after a series of selection trials.

The kiwis finished fourth which was their seeded position resulting from the same placing at the previous championships held in Hamilton in 1989. While

fourth position was a very creditable result given the rapidly improving strength of junior women's squash world wide, they only narrowly missed reaching a place in the finals when Louise Rogers held 4 match balls but could not quite capitalise on the advantage, in the semi-final against Australia.

The English team, with an outstanding No. 1 player Cassie Jackman, proved too strong again to take their second successive world title, however there was very little between the next four teams with Australia clinching second spot and Germany third.

In the individual event New Zealand's No. 1 player Leilani Marsh lived up to her

seeding and reached the last eight where she ran in to No. 2 seed and experienced international Sabine Schone. Sarah Cook, who put up some of the best results of all the New Zealanders, reached the last 16 narrowly losing 10/8 in the fifth against Australia's No. 1 Meeghan Bell who won her way through to third position. Louise Rogers after running in to Jackman in the second round went on to perform creditably in the Special Plate and after two hard matches in one day went out in the semi-final to England's Zoe Shardlow. Nicola Cosgriff reached the last 16 of the championship where she went down to Australia's No. 3 Camille Rowland.

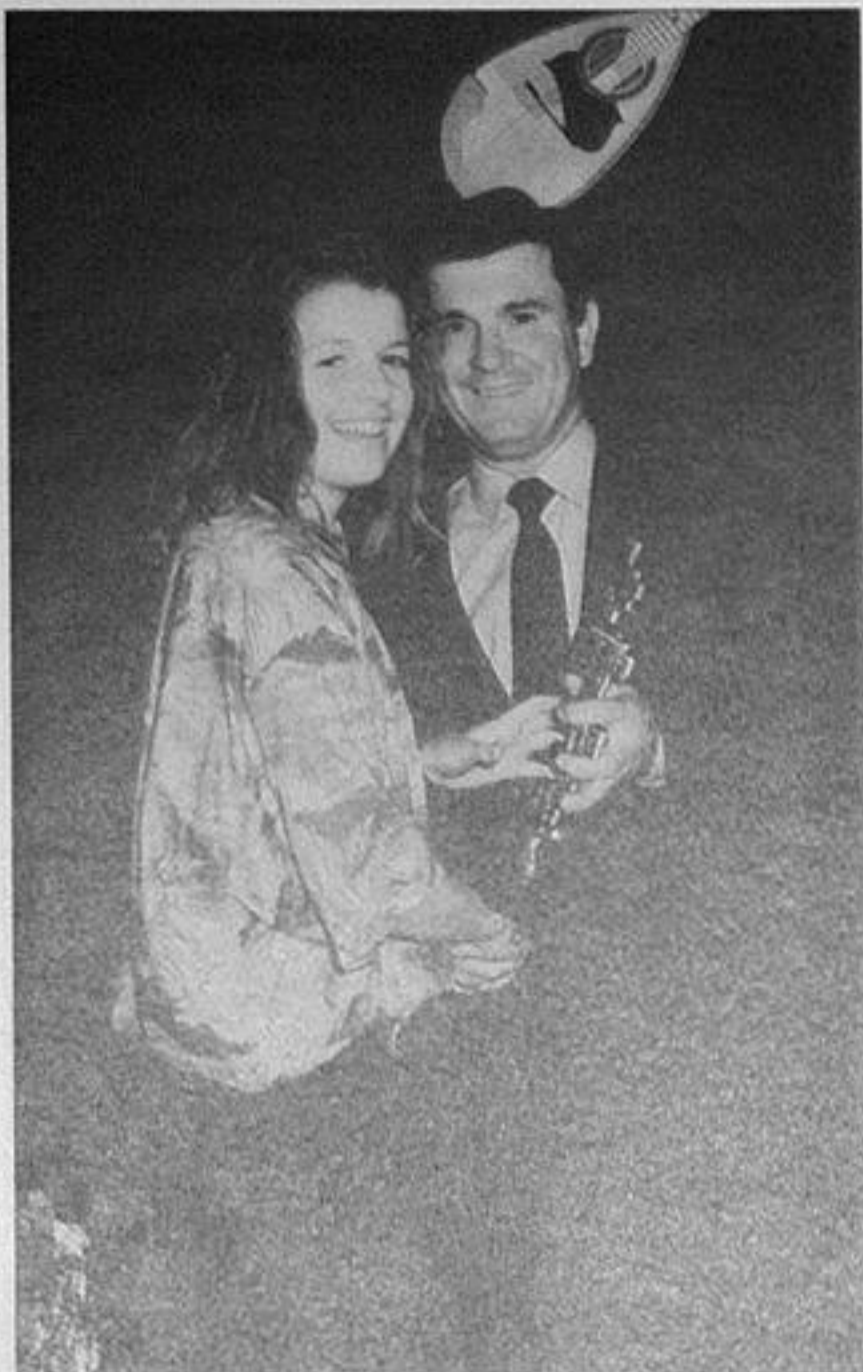

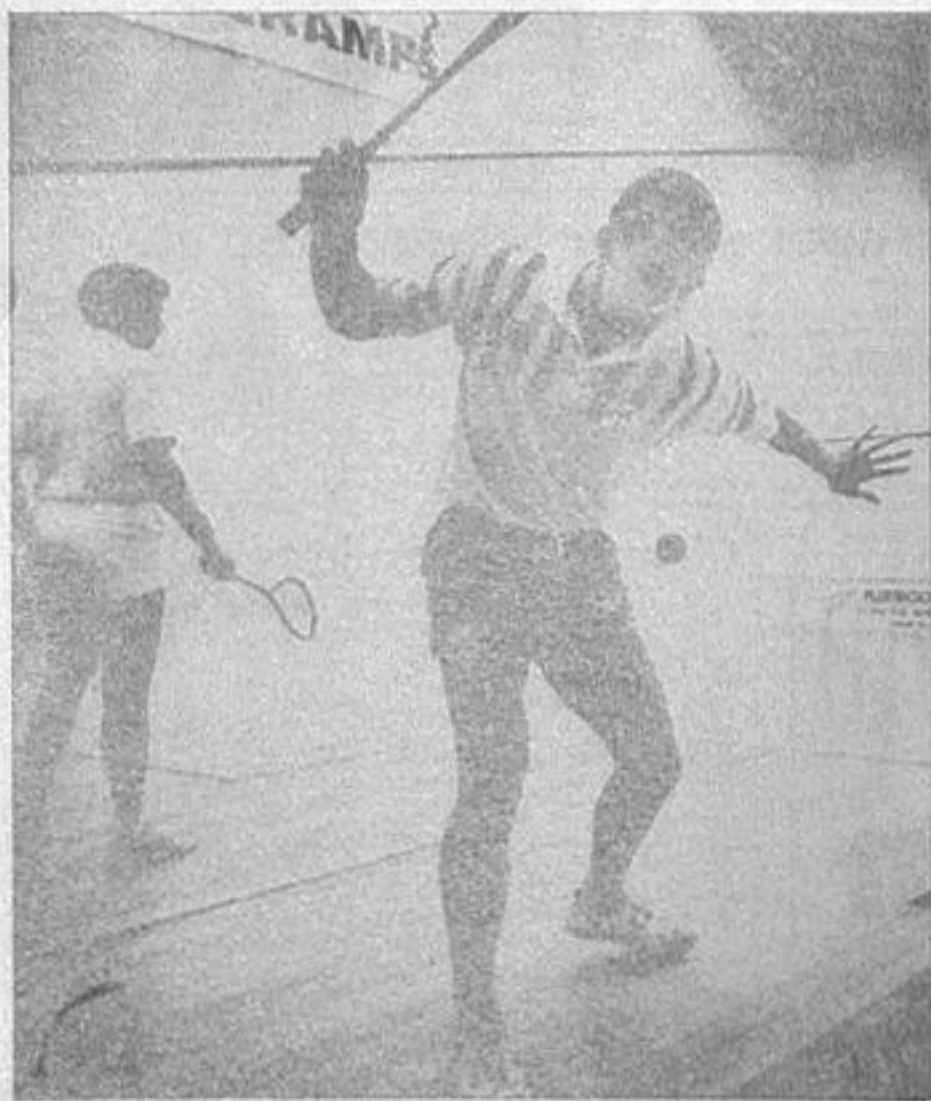
