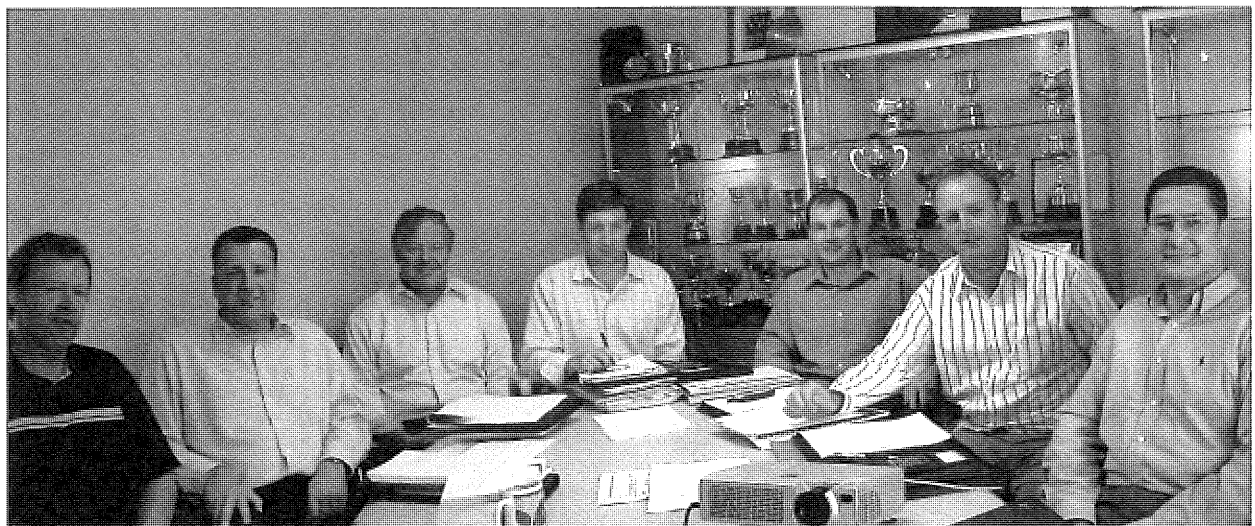

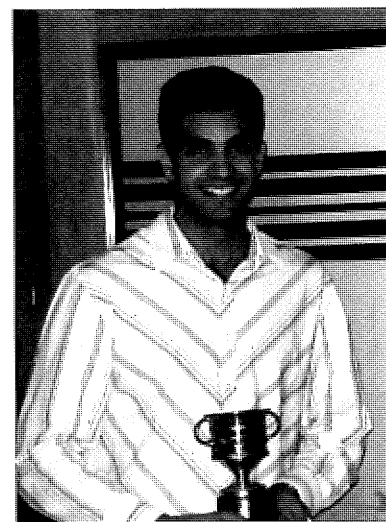

Chairman's Review

Squash is lucky with the calibre of its people. In a number of different areas within our sport we have wonderful people working hard to sustain and progress our sport. The combined efforts of all have seen good progress in a number of areas in the last year.

High Performance

Progress is particularly evident in high performance.

Our two international teams that travelled to world championships performed brilliantly and were highlights this year.

The Senior Womens team travelled to the Netherlands finishing third in the world. This was an outstanding achievement. It was great to receive compliments from squash people in other countries on the professionalism of our team.

The Junior Mens team travelled to Pakistan finishing seventh. It is not often that we have seen Australia finish behind us at this event.

The players in both teams deserve considerable credit for their discipline and professional approach. In particular however, I want to note the significant contribution that Dave Clarke had made to our high performance programme. The results of both these teams are clear indicators of the success that has resulted from his skill and hardwork.

It is of course important that there is a broad structure sitting in behind the elite international level. It has been pleasing to see an increasing number of coaches, the upskilling of coaches and the increasing numbers of talented players in our coaching programmes.

To enhance this further we have recently appointed Glen Wilson as Coach Development Manager which is a newly created position.

The future is exciting. We now have 20 players with world rankings which compares to just 4 players just a few years ago. In 2006 we will be competing in the Commonwealth Games (where we had considerable success in Manchester 2002) and will host the World Junior Mens Championships in Palmerston North.

There has been considerable progress in this area and my thanks go to Dave Clarke, Brett Reid (our current High Performance Manager) and Wayne Werder, who held this position but left us earlier in the year.

Participation

Squash in our country is primarily played in our 230 clubs. The number of commercial facilities is quite small.

If we are to grow the sport then this must occur in our clubs. Many of our clubs are professionally run and have facilities that will attract new people to our sport. These are however too few.

Many of our clubs are run by an insufficient number of hard working volunteers who are simply able to sustain the club on an annual basis. Facilities are often tired and there is no on-site management.

What sort of impression do new people to our sport have? In these days of high expectation of customer service and facilities, the impression may not be good enough to achieve the type of growth we want to see in our clubs. Many of these issues involve clubs in our urban areas where the competition for leisure time and the leisure dollar is fierce.

We are conscious of our need to support our clubs but in the end must rely on the people within our clubs to make the difference.

This year we updated our promotional material and distributed this to clubs at no cost. Thanks to Callum O'Brien and Shelley Kitchen who feature in the material and to Dave Bassett for his creative work.

We have placed a club toolkit on our website. This was developed by Central Squash. The material will assist clubs in their organisational and administrative work.

We successfully applied for additional funding from SPARC and will shortly look to appoint a contracted part-time person to support our Squash Development Officers and focus on district and club development.

We completed our Squash Development Manual and will update our Club 2000 material. Further written coaching resources were completed.

The primary tool for the development of the game has been the significant investment in the development of network of Development Officers. Before we can grow our sport, however, our administration, facilities and programmes have to be up to scratch. Before we can sell a product the product has to be in a form that the consumer will want to buy.

Our product is our clubs.

Best Practice

We have been involved in governance, management, human resources and communication reviews and audits this year.

Squash New Zealand is a small organisation and its Board all volunteers. We strive to be as effective as we can in the administration and promotion of our sport.

I acknowledge the support of SPARC in these reviews that have helped to make us a better organisation.

We will continue with the benchmarking tool. This involves the collection of statistical and financial information and comparing the performance of our districts. This will prove a useful tool in identifying areas of best practice that can be shared throughout the country.

Financially we have had a good year. We have been able to grow our income other than through levies which have remained static in recent years.

Thanks

We expect a lot from our Squash New Zealand staff. We are indeed fortunate with the commitment, calibre and professionalism of our people. My personal thanks to Peter Fergusson, our Chief Executive, for his total commitment and support.

There is a considerable amount of administrative work which is tackled enthusiastically and ably by Vivienne Brumby, Kerry Torrie and Jan Lewis.

Rob Walker has had another outstanding year at Club K in Wellington. The income from this is important to our organisation and we are fortunate to have Rob looking after Club K for us.

I want to thank the Trustees of the National Squash Centre which made good progress during the year.

My board members – Jim O'Grady, John Sangster, Alistair Snell, Grant Utteridge and Neil McAra – are a very capable group who give considerable time freely. Thank you for your support and effort.

Our district presidents and volunteers in numerous areas and in our clubs share an obvious passion for our sport. This is evident in the goodwill throughout the squash community. I thank you for your commitment to the game. It is important however, that we continue to work together not just to sustain but to grow our sport.

In the middle of 2005 the International Olympic Committee will decide if squash will be an Olympic sport in the 2012 Olympic games. I hope that the tireless work by our own Susie Simcock and World Squash will finally achieve its goal and that in 2005 the squash community will meet as an Olympic sport.

CEO's Report

Before my report looks at the more serious elements...I have been in sport for a lifetime and in administration of sport for several years – the support and fun I have had this year has been unbelievable...my heartfelt thanks to all that have shared a laugh, shared a story and made me feel part of their team...it has made my year.

Squash New Zealand has faced a challenging and busy year that, in reflection, has provided some very strong outcomes and results. It is worth taking time to acknowledge these milestones but also recognise that these are merely stepping stones toward making our sport stronger.

Some of the key highlights in the 2003/4 year include:

- **The Financial Outcome** – we have produced another strong financial outcome. While subscription contribution reduced this year (reflecting a real concern over the accuracy of returns) our work with funding entities (and particularly SPARC) has resulted in a further growth in income levels...and, in turn, increasing investment back into our sport.

Also, not as evident, in the Financial statement has been the capital investment that has gone back into assets (eg: the Squash New Zealand Offices) – that is now contributing to our ability to drive down costs.

- **New Location** – a project (including the moving associated) that we underestimated in terms of time, strain and effort. The result however is a wonderful asset, set in a great environment, that reflects the professional nature of our organisation and the significant overhead cost savings that are now beginning to flow from this.

- **SPARC** – our relationship continues to grow from strength to strength – and this important link has certainly contributed to our sport this year both financially and internal development. Squash New Zealand was one of a small number of sports invited to take part in an external Governance and Management Review – this enabled us to gain a good understanding of how we operate as well as offer ideas and tools to assist us to develop further.

- **Support Resources** – several business cases have been developed this year (via SPARC) to gain funding to support the wider development of our game – particularly at District level. Tagged funding has been provided to put in place two areas of support – a Coach Development Manager and a District Development Manager (contracted part-time).

Those attending the National Conference/AGM will have

the opportunity to welcome these people 'on board' and discuss their interim plans going into 2005.

- **High Performance** – another outstanding year of development and reaching milestones. Dave Clark, Wayne Werder (for the first part of the year), Brett Reid (joining us in April) and our team of Coaches have poured many hours and effort into the programmes – the results are a fine testament to their vision, values and hard work.

We celebrated the improving form of our National Junior team (finishing 7th in the World in Pakistan this year) and took immense pleasure in celebrating the Bronze medal winning National Women's team competing in the Netherlands.

Our sadness at the retirement of World Number 1 Carol Owens early this year has been tempered a little with the continually improving results coming from the National High Performance Programme – and Carol's continued involvement in, and around, Squash as well as some Coaching in the programme.

The success of the PSA and WISPA events (10 in total) here this year, allowing 20 players (and our team of National Referees) to join the International ranks and gain a 'taste' of International level squash – was also a significant step forward – one we are planning to build on next year.

- **Club Kelburn** – Rob Walker celebrates his 10th year driving Club Kelburn to another successful year. The combined total of Club K's contribution to Squash exceeds \$1 million over that 10 year period – which is fantastic result.

- **World Masters Championships 2008** – a further 'feather in our cap' was announced recently. Following on from the successful bid to host the 2006 World Junior Men Championships (in Palmerston North) we have been successful in gaining the 2008 World Masters Championships to be played in Christchurch. The tender document and presentation developed by Canterbury Squash and Christchurch District Council was a very professional product that impressed many of our International counterparts...well done.

- **Re-Branding** – with the help of Dave Bassett and BrandNew we launched a new brand this year – along with Club Style Guides, posters and bumper stickers. The logo capturing a well known catch line – have fun, get fit, play squash – targeting the growing younger market,

promoting key social trends (getting fit and having fun) and looking to appeal to the casual market.

This new style of branding (supported by Shelley Kitchen and Callum O'Brien) has been a significant 'hit' around the country. The brand continues to be rolled out at District/Club level on walls, trailers, websites, letterhead, signage, T Shirts and banners.

- **Susie Simcock, Officer - NZ Order of Merit** – congratulations Susie, who was honoured in the Queen's Birthday Awards for her services to sports administration and Squash. Susie continues to promote and support Squash New Zealand in her role as Emeritus President of the World Squash Federation.

- **Junior Growth** – although our major Junior Tournaments created event management headaches for organisers this year due to large numbers...it is a healthy problem to deal with. Not only were entry numbers well up – the calibre and grading of players at these events reflects the success of District and National Coaching Programmes.

- **Districts and Clubs** – the personal highlights of my year tend to revolve around the people I meet in Squash (that's why we are all here), the camaraderie, goodwill, humour and great support that I get and see on my visits to tournaments, Districts and Clubs...my only complaint is that I don't get to do it more often.

Our Club 'shop front' network remains key to the growth and health of our sport into the future – the ground swell of development, growth and promotion can be supported at National level but the real drive (eg: upgrading facilities, opening doors, operating soundly etc) has got to begin at the each Club.

- **Sponsors and Trusts** – our loyal sponsors - Dunlop, Crown, Prince and Farah Clothing continue their great support. Once again the Charitable Trusts have provided considerable support to our sport – not only at National level but throughout the country.

- **Website** – as I write this prose we are developing a new site (bigger and better) to cope with the booming interest in our site. We should be in a position to launch the new look and base functions of the site at the National Conference...before finalising and officially launching the site.

My thanks go to:

- **The Squash New Zealand team** - Vivienne, Brett, Dave, Kerry and Jan. Often working well beyond what is required to enable us 'punch above our weight'.

- **The Executive Council** – the supplier of wise advice, great direction, good governance, healthy debate and a healthy dash of enjoyment - an absolute pleasure this year (once again)

- **District Presidents and Development Officers** – passionate people working hard for our sport – often the generator of my lighter moments, grassroots feedback and top support...many thanks.

- **Our voluntary Directors**

- Hank Scott, retiring this year (to Referee) - Hank (and wife Rose) have been a permanent fixture, behind the scenes, at most of our major Junior events for many years, offering sound advice, support and 'walking the walk' for Squash New Zealand, a great ambassador for New Zealand and our game – thanks Hank

- Jan McAra, constantly pushing the Refereeing cause, supporting and developing the network we have and looking for that next wave of refereeing numbers that we so desperately need – thanks Jan

- Judy Cooper, as always getting Masters planned, organised and done with limited fuss – thank you Judy

- Butch Gifford, our 'Oceania man', the man fun was invented for and another great ambassador for our country within Oceania

- Steve Scott, running out of superlatives to describe Steve... just know he is banned from retiring (sorry Steve) – and thanks for your time and efforts

There are a large number of people I haven't been able to mention by name... referees, volunteers, parents, players, coaches, partners, to each and every one – my deepest thanks.

In closing - I believe we have a sound base to work from however progress in the growth of our game has to happen at club level (eg: facility upgrading, entry and access to our sport, social activities, availability of coaching etc) - this is even more critical going forward. Thinking and planning at all levels needs to go beyond a 'season by season' approach... as society continues to change (and expectations change) our clubs (like it or not) will need to change and change rapidly, they need to understand their own market (and their competition) and operate more as a business entity to survive.

High Performance Manager's Report

Introduction

I arrived at Squash New Zealand in April (the 13th!) after six years working in a tertiary education environment and, concurrently, four years being involved with the New Zealand Academy of Sport programme (as a sport psychologist but I try and keep that quiet).

It was clear when I arrived that a tremendous amount of planning and work had been done by a number of people over the previous three to four years to enable the current High Performance Programme to be set up. Consequently, the High Performance Plan underpinning the programme gave me a clear understanding of the philosophy and structures that drive the programme and its implementation.

In short, it was apparent very quickly that the High Performance Programme was based on sound principles of development, learning and performance, and that the foundations of an excellent high performance system were in place. This view has only been reinforced by the last six months. There is, of course, still much work to be done but this work will be more evolutionary than revolutionary. As someone once said (maybe it was Dave Clarke?): "Even the journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step".

The decision taken by Squash New Zealand to promote and support the hosting of PSA/WISPA events in New Zealand has proved invaluable in giving our develop-

ing players the opportunity to play international opponents and secure world rankings points, without the need to leave New Zealand.

One of the High Performance Programme goals is to provide "excellent competitive opportunities" to our players. The competitive opportunities afforded by these events are absolutely critical and I want to thank all the clubs who hosted events in 2004, and those clubs who have indicated they will host events in 2005. Your support and enthusiasm highlight what can be done when everyone shares the same vision.

2. TransTasman Series: Junior Men

Players: Campbell Grayson, Whaiora Moeke, Reece Williams, James Smith, Brent Lewis, Chris McEldowney, and Michael Bill.

Although the boys lost the series 2-1 their win in the third test in Hamilton was significant (this win came after a hard-fought test the night before in Morrinsville), and showed how young players, in the right environment, and with strong leadership, can quickly respond to a challenge and lift their game another level or two. The TransTasman series laid the foundation for what was to follow in Pakistan a month later.

3. World Junior Men's Champs, Pakistan

New Zealand's 7th placing was great effort under difficult conditions. Dave has commented in more detail on these champs but the point I would like to make is that it is critical that these players (and those who just missed out on selection) stay in the programme. Over time, we need to convert our junior reps into senior reps. The junior champs are important as they provide an incredible competitive opportunity but they must be seen as one step along the pathway to winning at international events. I want to congratulate everyone who made the team and performed with guts and belief but I also want challenge those who just missed out to increase their efforts to make sure that next time a New Zealand team is being selected they cannot be left out.

4. World Women's Team Champs

My feeling is that New Zealand's 3rd placing emphasised the important role of cohesion and dynamics (spoken like a true sport psychologist!) in team performance. With Shel-

ley Kitchen our top ranked player at 14th in the world, it was vital that the team worked well together if it was going to achieve a position above its 6th seeding. That it did so and won bronze speaks volumes for the team environment that Shelley, Louise, Tamsyn, Jackie, Julie and Dave created. A valuable lesson as we start working towards the Commonwealth Games in 2006. It was pleasing, also, to see the media and public interest this result attracted. Another reminder that squash is a sport that still matters to New Zealanders.

5. High Performance Programme 2005

As we head into 2005, my focus will be on three key areas:

(1) Excellence in coaching. Greater effort will be devoted toward the development of our coaching resource at both national and district levels. This will be achieved in a number of ways. First, the Prime Minister's High Performance Coach Scholarships will again be sought to help provide high performance squash coaches around the country with opportunities to develop their coaching skills and knowledge. Second, the appointment of Glen Wilson as Coach Development Manager will see the link between the national programme and the district programmes strengthened, and the number and quality of squash coaches around the country grow. Glen obviously brings a wealth of playing excellence to the role, and his recent coaching experiences make him an ideal person to make the connect with developing squash coaches. Third, Robbie Wyatt will take greater responsibility for the National Reserve and National Development Squads, allowing Dave to focus more closely on the National Squad and the professionals in the programme.

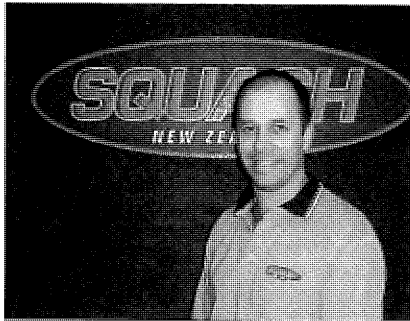
(2) Melbourne Commonwealth Games 2006. The planning and preparation has begun, and the World Doubles in December in Chennai, India, marks the first competitive opportunity of the 2006 campaign. The significance of the

Commonwealth Games for squash means we must ensure we give our players every chance to achieve the two medals we are targeting (campaign title: "Medals in Melbourne" or "M in M"?). At previous Commonwealth Games squash has delivered success. Expectations are high. And while we must temper those expectations slightly with the knowledge we no longer have a World Number 1 in our programme, we still have the players that justify targeting medals. I believe that through planning, preparation, and commitment we will deliver a result everyone in the New Zealand squash community can be proud of.

(3) Communication. "The High Performance Programme has been modelled around a philosophy that unites all players, coaches and administrators in working towards a common purpose. Integration of effort, knowledge, and funding is of paramount importance." These words appear near the front of the High Performance booklet. Quite frankly, if we don't believe in and live by these words we will not achieve our goals. We don't have the number of players or the funding that many of our key competitors have. Nor will our players win because they are fitter, faster, or stronger than our competitors. If we are to compete with and beat the best we must establish a point or points of difference. One point of difference is our ability to all work together. Those of us who have been around sport a long time understand what a difference this can make.

As a footnote, I want to offer a quick but big word of thanks to everyone (Jan, Peter, Dave, Kerry, and Viv) at the Squash New Zealand office (and Wayne before he left Squash Auckland) for making my transition into the High Performance role so smooth. I look forward to working with you in 2005.

National Coach's Report

This year has been a successful year for the Squash New Zealand High Performance Programme. Across the board at senior, junior and district level we have experienced some big steps forward and witnessed some excellent performances.

December 2003 saw Carol Owens claim her 2nd World title in Hong Kong, beating England's Cassie Jackman in the final by 3 games to 1. Carol also retained her World No.1 ranking before her retirement in early 2004. Her skill and determination will be missed not only on the tour but across New Zealand. I wish her well in her new role.

I must also make mention of the move to new pastures of Wayne Werder who undoubtedly contributed a huge amount to the High Performance Programme. He was instrumental in getting the programme to this point and his input will be missed, but not his perception that Waikato is the best Rugby team in New Zealand. He has been replaced by the ready and able Brett Reid who has gone past the point of getting his feet under the table and now has both legs firmly fixed there.

Again it has been great to see the development at District level. Some districts are really forging forward and in some cases employing some full and part time coaches. The standard and participation numbers are improving and this has been reflected in some of the junior events having upwards of 250 players. Glen Wilson joined Squash New Zealand at the beginning of November as Coach Development Manager and he will be assisting the districts with the development of their coaches and programmers on an ongoing basis as part of the High Performance strategy. This will help Squash New Zealand to create closer ties to the districts and provide more support across the country.

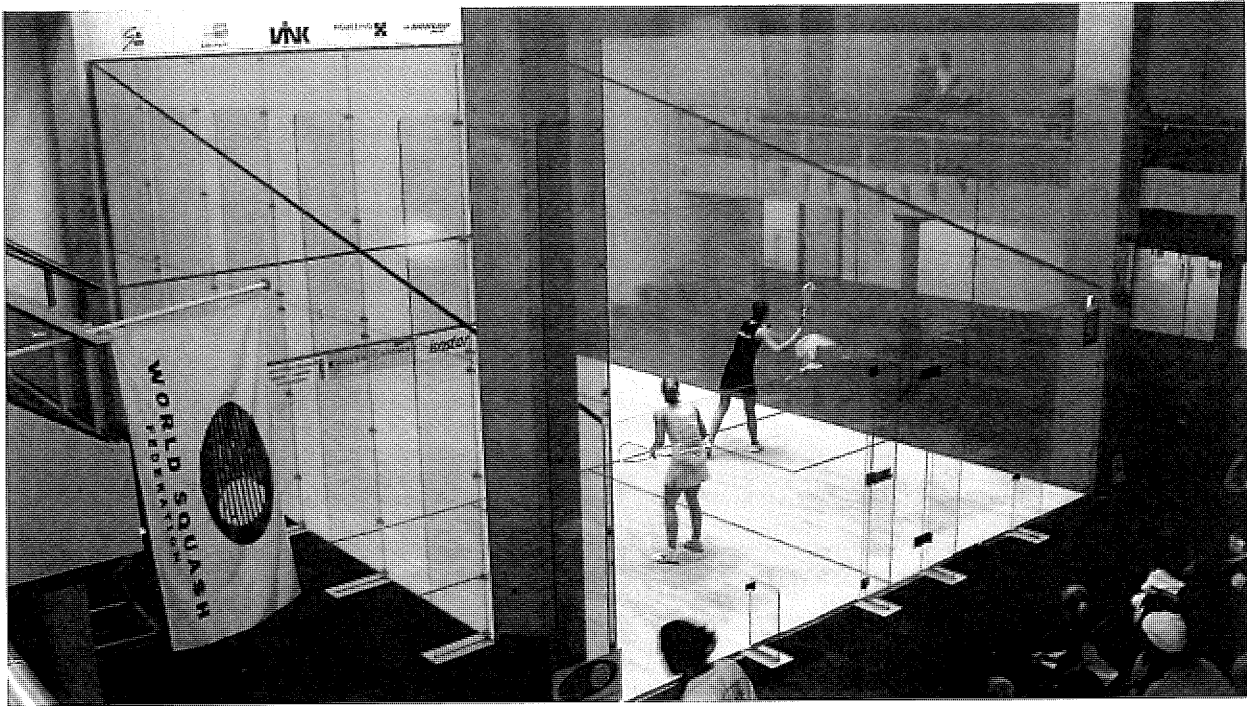
The international scene has been very busy with several international PSA and WISPA events being held in New Zealand. These events were well hosted by the clubs across the country and received well by the international players. Again these events are critical to the player's development and this was borne out with wins in these events by Shelley Kitchen, Tamsyn Leevey, Callum O'Brien and Kashif Shuja. The World Rankings have reflected this in the top four ranked women. Shelley Kitchen moved from 18 to 14 over the past year, Tamsyn Leevey from 58 to 28, Jackie Hawkes from 66 to 54, and Louise Crome back onto the circuit at 56. In the men's rankings Callum O'Brien hit a

career high of 76, closely followed by Campbell Grayson 144, Jared Conning 157, Josh Greenfield 164, Martin Knight 178, Sam Atkins 195. Oliver Johnson and the evergreen Glen Wilson have also been competing on the PSA circuit but have been hampered by injury. These players have moved on average over sixty places on the world list this year.

The women headed off in September of this year to Amsterdam for the Women's World Championships. The team of Shelley Kitchen, Tamsyn Leevey, Jackie Hawkes and Louise Crome started as 6th seeds and had an excellent event beating Austria, Denmark, Belgium and No. 3 seeds Holland in the pool matches. Shelley had a great win in the tie again Holland beating world No 3 Vanessa Atkinson. We then took on the USA defeating them 3-0 giving us a semi final against England. New Zealand went down 3-0 to England with all three girls acquitting themselves well, leaving us with a crunch match with 4th seeds Egypt.

Shelley got the ball rolling again with a fine win over world No.10 Omneya Abdel Kawy. Tamsyn backed up by defeating her higher ranked opponent by 3 games to 1 securing the bronze medal for NZ. This was a huge effort by the ladies. Finishing 3rd without a top 10 player does not occur very often. The girls gave 110% on and off court contributing to the excellent performances and team spirit. I must also make mention of Julie Hawkes whose contribution to the team was immense, with astute tactical knowledge and practical ideas proving to be very helpful in the overall result.

At junior level it has been a very busy year which began with the trip to the Australian Tri Series in Brisbane. The New Zealand contingent included 53 players, 8 coaches and 21 parents, a formidable group to take on the Aussies in their own back yard. The juniors surpassed themselves this year with New Zealand players taking 14 titles compared to Australia's 13, Malaysia 2 and India 1. Highlights included excellent efforts by Paige Benioni, Todd Redman, Moana McClelland, Josh Thom, Reece Williams, Joelle King and Jackie Laurenson. Campbell Grayson defeated all the players that the Aussies could throw at him, taking three Australian U19 titles back to back. The other pleasing aspect of the tour was that the whole group was very competitive finishing in high positions in every event and representing themselves well on and off court. The experience is invaluable for our players and we would hope to

continue this trip in the future.

The Trans Tasman Test Series this year saw us lose out to the Australian 2-1 in the best of three series. The team acquitted themselves very well in all three tests culminating in some fine performances to win the 3rd test, a feat that has not been achieved for several years. Wins for Reece Williams, Whairoa Moeke and Campbell Grayson took the test and they were backed up by great efforts by Chris McEldowney and Brent Lewis. This form was to be taken onto the World Junior Championships where revenge would be sweet with New Zealand finishing four places higher than the Australian Team.

The trip to Pakistan for the World Junior Boys' Championships was interesting with armed Special Forces guarding us day and night. The boys' were not phased by this resulting in some very good early results particularly from Whairoa Moeke who put out a very handy Mexican No.1 which helped our team seeding rise from 10 to 8. The other boys' results also assisted, not the least Campbell Grayson who made it to the top 16 before going out to the No 3 seed.

In the teams event the boys played above themselves beating Ireland and Singapore, before going down to 5th seeds India. We then defeated Wales for a spot in the top eight, (Wales then defeated Australia) and we faced Egypt for a top four place. They proved to be too strong leaving us with India again. The team performed well with Campbell losing 10/8 in the fourth to the No. 1 seed from the individuals, Reece lost in a hard fought five games and Whairoa winning his match at No 2. This pitted us against the 7th seeds Canada. Campbell won 3/0 after Whairoa had earlier scared his opponent with a great pre match haka. Micheal Bill went down in a hard fought

match leaving the tie in Whairoa's hands. He produced a superhuman effort coming back from 3/0 down in the fifth to win and clinch 7th spot for New Zealand. A good result for us coming back from 19th place four years ago. Thanks should also go Robbie Wyatt whose experience was invaluable on the trip.

I must also thank the Squash New Zealand selectors, Aileen Buscke, Nicky Dunlop, Willie Bicknell and Michel Galloway who work very hard behind the scenes to select, seed and deliver national rankings. All three jobs are thankless and difficult tasks but I believe that they have delivered some excellent work over the past few years. As much as we have made progress this year we must not rest on our laurels and will still need to work extremely hard over the next few years to continue to take the High Performance Programme forward. We have to ensure that the districts are developing comprehensive programmes that will allow us to continue to develop the strength that we have gained already. Coaching is a huge part of our player development structure but we also need more coaches involved in the programmes. The key to future success is that we continue to work together in the same direction for the benefit of all of the players across the country. The teams that have represented New Zealand this year have shown unity in pulling on the shirt (or dress), and this has been reflected in the results gained with the teams punching above their weight. I believe that we are on the right track but still only 25m into a 100m race, the test for us is to keep up our speed in a race to the finish.

World Squash Report

Another year of comprehensive administration has passed with the world body attending to game growth and promotion, rules, technical court issues, player welfare, coaching, sports science and World Championships. However, two major events have overshadowed the more general decision making of the Management Committee. They are the Olympic Games and a new CEO appointment.

It is mind boggling to consider the numbers of squash players and administrators who benefit by the efforts of the WSF Committees and volunteers who 'keep it all together'. For instance, there are over 15 million squash players in 152 countries. The WSF represents 124 National Associations. With these figures, it is not surprising that we have had a legitimate case for inclusion as an Olympic sport and that this has been an ongoing goal for the past twenty years. During that time Susie Simcock, Past President must be credited with much of the success of raising the games profile sufficiently to satisfy Olympic credentials. The sport is currently included in all other multi-sport events including the Commonwealth Games, Pan-America Games, All-Africa Games and Asian games and is in a position to satisfy all 33 criteria set by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) Board. So where are we at present? Well, we took a step closer last month with the news that the IOC has included squash as one of five Federations that should be 'studied further' with a view to being included in the 2012 Games. Our case now receives consideration alongside current Olympic sports and the other major sports of golf, rugby, rollersports and karate seeking a place. A final decision is due in July 2005.

WSF officeholders are multitalented and have a high level of expertise so with the impending retirement of Ted Warbuton our current World CEO and Secretary General, the Management Committee has worked strenuously this year to put in place an international internet-based recruitment campaign to secure a suitable successor.

Christian Leighton was chosen from a possible 38 applicants representing 12 nationalities a dual Chilean and Venezuelan national, Christian takes over the position early in 2005. Ted's skills have generated a high level of expectation associated with the CEO position. Ted has been an efficient and passionate statesman for the game. I am going to miss the Squash 'loop' of daily emails he maintains keeping the management committee informed of squash happenings.

Grading & Statistics Report

The Grading System is the major part of the National Club Member Register. At the end of September 2004 it contained 16,067 graded players (2003 - 16,595). In addition, the national club member register included a further 7,082 leisure / casual club members giving a combined total of 23,149 "registered" club members (2003 - 23,895).

The total number is considered to be below real club membership numbers as indications are that some clubs are not providing Squash NZ with complete details of their "leisure" members and those players who have access to club facilities on a "casual" basis.

As is the case with most sports, the number of people participating in the sport of squash has a direct bearing on the ability of the sport to attract outside support and revenue by way of sponsorships and grants, from the various sources from which such funds are available.

It cannot be stressed strongly enough that all clubs must

2003 season, was the introduction of the "J" grades, to provide a competitive structure for the young / beginner juniors. At the end of 2003, there were 1095 "J" grade players. While many of them would have progressed up to "F" or even "E" this season, at the end of the 2004 season, there were 1473 "J" grade players, comprising 9.2% of the total grading list and 48% of total graded junior players.

In all other respects operation of the grading system during the 2004 season saw the continuation of the operational policies of the previous seasons, the prime intention of which is to maintain a reasonably even spread of players across the B to F grades.

Graded player numbers across all grades continue to show that generally the policy under which the grading system has been operated for a number of seasons continues to have the desired effect. The early 1990's "bottom end bulge" with 70% of players in E & F grades, has now disappeared, with B grade having 15%, both C and D grade

ensure that all of their "members", regardless of membership category (or the manner in which the users of club courts access the facilities), are registered with the club, the district and Squash New Zealand. The maintenance of full and complete membership registers of all persons who use "club facilities" on a regular, even if casual basis, is of considerable benefit to the sport, at all levels.

A major change to the grading system the beginning of the

each having just under 20% of the players, E grade 26% and F grade 12.5%. Over the past couple of seasons the "E" grade numbers have increased to the point where a minor adjustment appears to be desirable, as Grading Committee policy is to continue to maintain an even spread of "club" players across the range of B to E grades.

Over the past few seasons A2, B and C grade numbers have had a positive effect on the number of player entries

in A, B and C grade tournaments. However it is still very disappointing to see the continued drop in the number of teams entering the National Graded Club Teams event at a district level in 2004 – 296, against 2003 – 303 teams, against 341 in 2002, and 366 in 2001.

No doubt the fall in team numbers is related to the continued fall in the number of senior and masters players. However one must continue to ask if clubs and districts are promoting the event for what it is – a interclub teams championship in each district, with the opportunity for the winning team to represent their club and district at a national championship. No other sport provides its “club” players of all grades with the opportunity of attending a national event and with a national title at stake!

The 2004 season saw the introduction of a multi-function grading list “search” facility, and the continued twice monthly publication frequency on the 1st and 15th of each month.

The regular publication of the grading list on the website continues to highlight areas of concern, not the least of which is the “prompt collection of results”. Possible improvements to this area of the grading system are being evaluated, particularly a viable means by which to provide clubs and districts with the ability to replace a large proportion of the current “paper based” workload with a computer based application. Hopefully we will be able to offer this during the 2005 season, however, until such a facility is available, event organisers need to continue be mindful of

Overall, grading list numbers are slightly down on 2003, and while numerically the senior and masters numbers have decreased this season, the junior numbers have increased.

Some of the increased junior numbers are no doubt due to the young junior players in clubs now being accounted for via the “J” grades. However, some of the increase is also no doubt attributable to the work of the Squash Development Officers and the ability of clubs to now offer new juniors players a competitive structure specifically aimed at the beginner level.

The Squash Grading System continues to be the backbone of competitive squash in New Zealand and its successful operation is due to the considerable input of volunteer time and effort by club and district statisticians. Considerable thanks must be extended to them for their work which benefits individual players and the sport of squash as a whole.

Refereeing Report

2004 has been another busy year for referees. With ten PSA and WISPA events being staged in New Zealand, as well as the local national events, it was always going to be a big ask of our qualified referees. The exposure to that international level was extremely beneficial, helping ensure the performance of our national referees is of a high standard.

Workshops were held at both the South Island Championships in July, in conjunction with a PSA event, with nine national referees attending, and at the NZ Nationals in Hamilton in September, where 13 referees attended. My thanks go to Dave Clarke (National Coach), who addressed the workshop in Hamilton. Dave had just the day before returned from the Women's World Championships, so was able to relay first-hand his experiences and observations from the world scene. These workshops are crucial to the on-going training of referees, as is the continual exposure to high level competition squash. We are very grateful that Squash NZ has been successful in bringing competition of this level to New Zealand. The good news is a similar level of activity is planned for 2005.

Congratulations go to Paddy Martin (Auckland) and Brett Watene (BOP) on achieving their National Referee qualifications Bridget Weaver (BOP), Joanne Palmer (Auckland), Nicky Dunlop (Canterbury), Kevin Mason (Southland), Colleen Parkhill-Burke (Southland), Ian Taiaroa (Auckland) and Joel LeComte (Eastern) achieved their District qualifications. It is very pleasing to see 6 of the 9 in the top half of the North Island. This region was identified as being a concern last year, and was clearly an objective for improvement in 2004. More activity is planned for the Upper North Island in 2005, as it is particularly important to try and ensure our numbers are up for the hosting of the World Junior Boys in Palmerston North in 2006.

Congratulations to Ian Gardiner winner of the Derek Cook Memorial Trophy – Ian has had a very busy year holding not only the position of Convener of Refereeing for Canterbury, but has held office as President as well. He has been very active in promoting refereeing in the Canterbury region and is a worthy recipient of this prestigious award.

Pauline Boyle and Kaye Jackson were qualified Referees who choose to go on to the inactive list this year. Thank you both for your contribution over the years.

It is with a great deal of sadness I accepted Chas Evans's resignation this year. Chas has resigned from all International Squash refereeing also. But on a personal note; thank you Chas, you have been an unbelievable mentor and a great contributor on the Refereeing Committee and while they say no one is irreplaceable I believe in your case that may well be the exception to the rule. These thoughts are those of many in New Zealand and around the world, for you have touched many people; your quick wit and your knowledge of all things including refereeing are going to be missed. I wish you well in your life without squash and know that if the need were ever to arise you will be on hand. My thanks also go to my other two loyal and hard working committee members, Nichol Taylor and Gary Hutchison. Your expertise, knowledge and help have been greatly appreciated. Appreciation is extended also to all my National Referees who so willingly volunteered this year with tournament refereeing duties; you all did an absolutely splendid job.

To the District Conveners and District Referees, thank you. You are the people at the coal face and often the ones not recognized. Know that your efforts are noted and acknowledged - please keep up the good work.

Paul Sneyd has been busy applying himself to obtaining International Referee status. He attended several of the PSA and WISPA tournaments around New Zealand as well as taking himself off to the Women's World Champs in Holland. Reports that came back are very positive and will give Paul a strong chance of getting through this rigorous exercise and hopefully get his International qualification. With our only current International Referee, Chas Evans, resigning, having a Kiwi representative remain on the international scene is important – Good Luck Paul.

Many volunteers provide their services every week so that others can participate and enjoy the sport we love. Without Referees there is no game – yet a lot of time is spent questioning decisions and verbally abusing the very people who are trying to help. Refereeing is one of the most thankless jobs associated with Squash. Interestingly enough reading through AGM reports since 1988 the same message is coming through – 'it's an area of concern'. Not enough people are prepared to put up their hands and take on the role of qualified refereeing. And yet, talk to those that are doing it and they will tell you it is rewarding, interesting and challenging, offers opportunity to travel, and allows

you to meet and make new friends.

Referees don't always get it right – we are, after all, human (ask Billy Bowden after his recent visit to India) – but like athletes and coaches we put the hours in and work hard in pursuit of that perfect game. Our vision is 'to change the perception of refereeing' and, while no easy task, our strategy of recruiting and retaining referees is very dependent on Districts. They must give refereeing priority and focus on the recruitment. Our provision for quality training and development will ensure retention, then all us 'Squash Nuts' can go about enjoying our sport knowing the Referees are getting the right support they deserve.

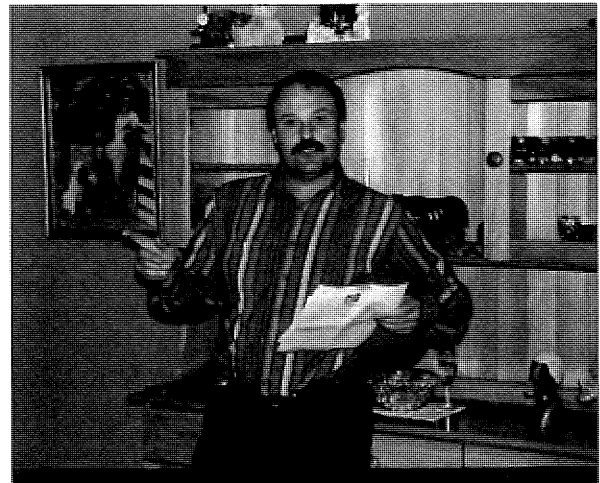

CHAS EVANS

It took International squash referee Chas Evans 21 years to be satisfied with the vast number of world events, Commonwealth Games and finals he has refereed, now he will be missed around the world squash circuit after his resignation from all squash refereeing and management.

Mr Evans was 33 years old when he began refereeing, after being asked for the 1983 World Championships in Auckland.

"I thought I could do as good a job as any one else round the place, back then the average age of the top players was about 27, so I was in the same generation, I could speak to them one-to-one without a problem," Chas said.

He went on to become a National Referee just a year later, and with Peter Highsted and Chris Sinclair, become the first International Referees under the new international referee status in 1987.

Chas served on the Squash NZ Referee Management Committee and as Director of Refereeing for Squash NZ for a number of years.

Former World Squash Champion Susan Devoy recognises the input Mr Evans had in the squash circuit.

"People like him give a service and aren't recognised, it's the players and sometimes coaches that get all the recognition. He is our first and most senior respected ref on the international circuit. It will be sad to see him go, he has done an awful lot for squash," Ms Devoy said.



Lion Foundation 2003 NZ Squash Club of the Year - Tauranga Squash Club

The recipient of the Lion Foundation Club of the Year award for 2004 is the Tauranga Squash Club.

The award recognises the achievements of the club in the areas of growth, best practice and performance during the last twelve months and it is significant that strategic management decisions taken by the club in that period have produced outstanding results.

Part of the vision for the club was to create an "open door" policy. To achieve this goal the club appointed a full time manager in February 2004 to be the "face" of the game. The decision produced immediate benefits with increased accessibility, better communication and increased membership. Providing a "pay to play" option for casual users has seen court hire increase from \$2800 to just under \$12000 for an eight month period.

The club manager adopted and carried out the functions that had previously been performed by volunteers and was able to add professionalism to these portfolios. The club also included a fully equipped pro shop, provided professional coaching and implemented an advertising campaign. The result – membership growth at a record rate (200%) and extremely strong growth in juniors (34 to 135).

Having a manager has enabled the club to develop rela-

tionships with other organisations and the Tauranga Squash Club has developed links with Sport Bay of Plenty, local schools, media and sponsors. Promotional programs within the schools have been a key strategy to the increase junior membership growth and participation. Similarly having the time to pursue sponsors and funding agencies has seen external funding revenue increase by almost \$25000.

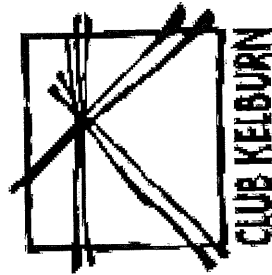
At the playing level the club has been able to provide new initiatives and increase participation. With the support of sponsors new competitive leagues have been introduced, interclub numbers have been increased, the club championships rejuvenated and junior development programmes established.

The club vision includes a second stage of development aimed at providing a facility that is modern, convenient and designed for the future. The club plans to invest in a new facility with leading edge technology and complimentary services that will ensure its future survival and long term prosperity.

THE YEAR THAT IS.

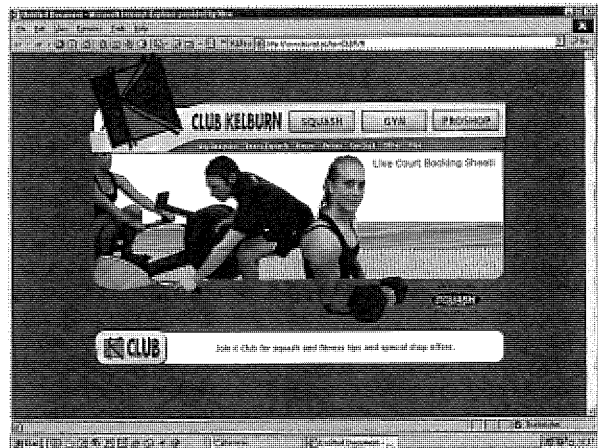
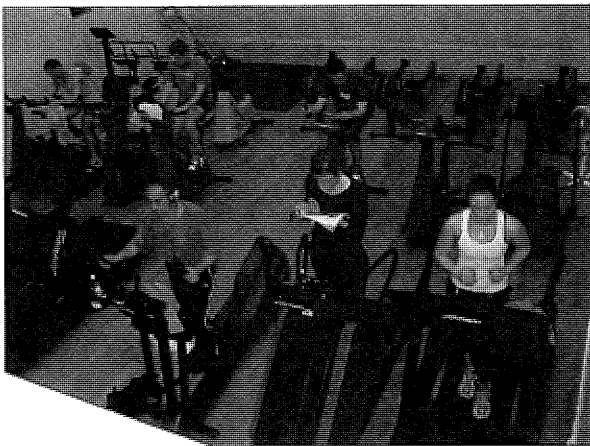

involvement of our Executive Director, Neven Barbour has been essential to the continued improvement in performance of the Centre.

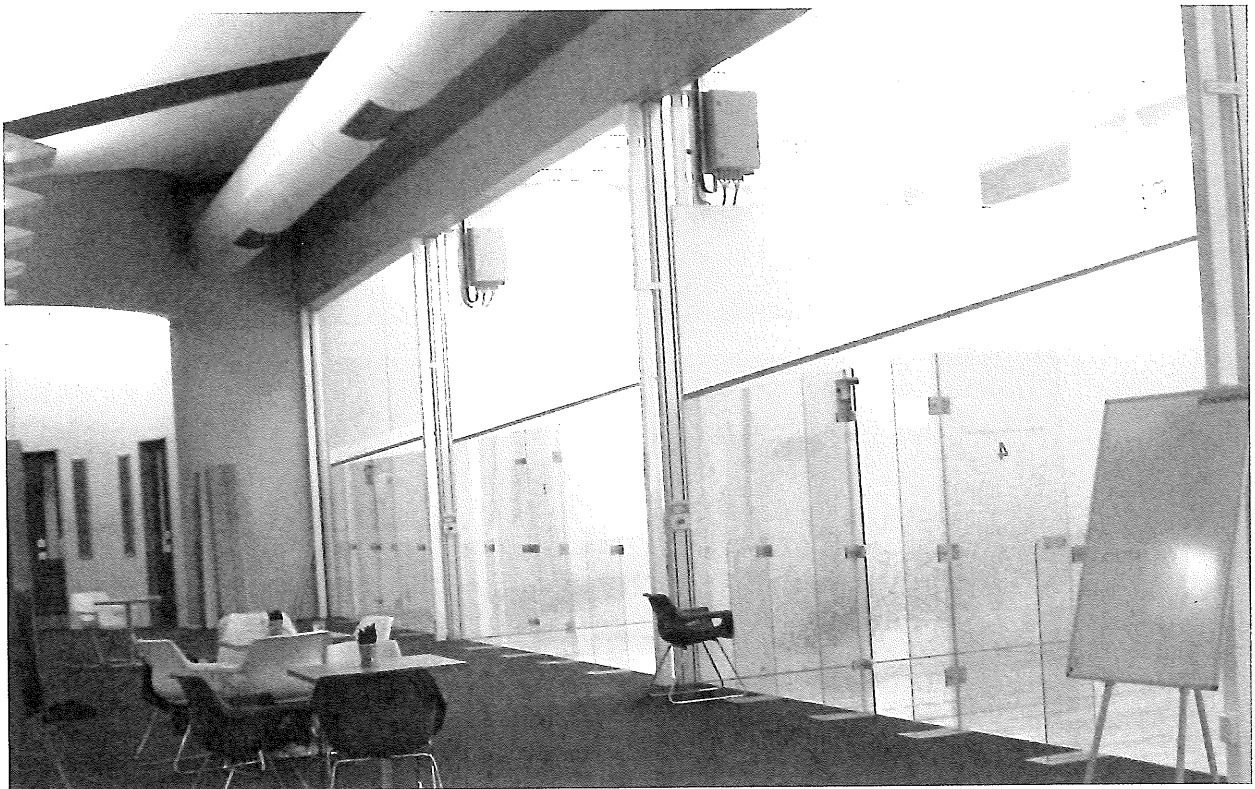

Junior - Youth Report

Juniors Reaching High

In the last four years we have witnessed a very pleasing climb in standard and performance by the top juniors in both male and female categories. It is certainly a pleasure to report that many of the top U19 can now compete on an equal footing with their senior counterparts on the senior circuit. I believe it will not be long before the elite group of New Zealand players is going to be dominated by the 17-22 age group. What we are seeing now augers well for the sport and its future. Joelle's rise to the forefront of junior squash over the last 2 years has been quite exciting but the national championships this year in Rotorua has shown that the position of No 1 is still up for grabs as far as some of her compatriots are concerned. It is always good to see a high standard being improved on but it is better still to see so many actually doing it. This year Campbell Grayson has performed extremely well and has brought credit not only to himself but to squash as a whole and we are grateful for his performance and leadership of the team both in New Zealand (vs Australia) and in Pakistan. His effort certainly raised the expectation and standards of his fellow team mates - and gave the team the strength to raise their overall standing to 7th placing at the world championships. He worked really well through the year and deserved the award of the Mackwell cup.

Playing the Australians

The more junior players travel and compete with other international players, the more significant it becomes that their focus is on winning against top players. It has taken a bit of time for top juniors to reach that level of understanding but clearly the move by high performance to seek regular international competition is paying off. The test series against Australia was another opportunity for top players to really test their overall skills. Our players again got valuable experience as they prepared for the Pakistan journey - and it was good to see that learning was happening on both sides of the ditch.

Sending players overseas and inviting internationals back is not the only factor. The national coach and support staff have to be congratulated on the success they have generated in the current cohort of top juniors. In talking to players and parents, they were always pleased to acknowledge the tremendous work and support the high performance team would put into each player who comes under their training and guidance.

Regional Development

In my report on the national championships in Rotorua, I heralded the fact that champions of our sport were coming from all parts of the country. Although Auckland won the Gifford award, individual champions were from as far south as Riverton, from Gisborne right across to Ohakune. In brief, the player with talent is being discovered by grass-root clubs in all districts and they are then nurtured by the district coaches before high performance reels them in for a detailed tune up. The clubs have a valuable role in the future progress of the game and the continued support of coaching and training of coaches helps all clubs.

North and South Island Junior Championships

Both of these tournaments were well managed by new personnel coming on to the scene of junior events. In Christchurch, Nick Dromgool was enthusiastic and committed and so was the team behind him. He was well supported by Paul Growcott of Squashways and the large management staff on hand made the event a real pleasure to attend. In Palmerston North, they couldn't have been more supportive of our programme and it was good to meet and share ideas with Jan Loney and her team. Running both events one after the other has been a great way to organise these two major events. It seems to keep everyone on their toes and they are keen to get on with it.

The New Zealand Junior Open

The re-introduction of this event after so many years was good for junior squash. The early start of this event in the year means all the top contenders will be using the summer to prepare well and it also means we are able to kick off the season with many players at a higher state of readiness than before.

Secondary School Squash

This tournament went off very well. It was good to see many of the schools taking part. Auckland schools came down en masse and deserved the win taken by Auckland Boys Grammar over Mt Albert Grammar. Congratulations to winners New Plymouth Girls over Upper Hutt College for a great finish to their contest.

The standard remains high and we can be thankful to the secondary schools squash committee and the regional sports coordinators for their contribution to the growth of the game in schools



The Senior Circuit

It's good to see that junior players are making good use of the senior circuit to improve their mental and physical skills. This competition will become more critical as more junior players reach that level of performance. I suspect that next years senior team to the world championships could include more than one U21 player in the squad.

Referees

I would like to thank all national referees who have attended junior events over the last eight months for their contribution to the improvement of the players standards. Along with many other volunteers who have refereed matches, their work is still very important and is part of the development we look for in tournaments.

Final Conclusions:

New Zealand Squash has come a long way since I started in the role. There were many significant happenings and changes during my appointment. However, the most memorable to me was the decision by the Board to seek a National Coach.

I have had tremendous enjoyment doing the task I was asked to do on behalf of SNZ. Being able to attend and report on junior national events has been a privilege for me. I also learnt a lot about coaching and sports management at the highest level and have met many wonderful squash folk (coaches, parents, players and referees) in the process. Now, it was time to step aside and give someone else the opportunity to take up the challenge. Someone new is likely to come with new ideas and perhaps offer a different perspective from that I have tried to pass on from my observations and experiences over the last nine years. I also felt it was time to refocus on another aspect of the sport I had always been keen on before my involvement with the national junior programme.

Audit Report

To the Readers of the financial report of New Zealand Squash Incorporated.

We have audited the financial statements on pages 35 - 37. The financial statements provides information about the past financial performance of New Zealand Squash Incorporated and its financial position as at 30th September 2004. This information is stated in accordance with the accounting policies as set out on pages 38 - 41.

NEW ZEALAND SQUASH INCORPORATED RESPONSIBILITIES

The Executive Council is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements which give a true and fair view of the financial position of New Zealand Squash Incorporated as at 30 September 2004 and of the results of its operations for the year ended 30 September 2004.

Public Sector Grants include funding received from Sport & Recreation New Zealand (SPARC).

The funding is subject to Investment Agreements, detailing acknowledged responsibilities and outcomes upon which the funding is dependant.

It is the responsibility of the Executive Council to ensure that the obligations under the Investment Agreements are fulfilled.

AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES

It is our responsibility to express an independent opinion on the financial statements presented by the Executive Council and report our opinion to you.

The scope of our audit has not included specific testing to ensure the Investment Agreement outcomes have been achieved.

BASIS OF OPINION

An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial report. It also includes assessing:

- The significant estimates and judgements made by the Executive Council in the preparation of the financial statements, and
- Whether the accounting policies are appropriate to New Zealand Squash Incorporated circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards in New Zealand. We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary. We obtained sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatements, whether caused by fraud or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of the information in the financial statements.

Other than our capacity as auditors we have no other relationship with or interests in New Zealand Squash Incorporated.

QUALIFIED OPINION

Control over cash sales for Club Kelburn prior to being recorded is limited. There is no system of control over such sales on which we could rely for the purpose of our audit and there are no satisfactory audit procedures that we can adopt to confirm independently that all cash sales were properly reconciled. In this respect alone we have not obtained all the information and explanation that we have required.

In our opinion, except for the adjustments that might have been found to be necessary had we been able to obtain sufficient evidence concerning cash sales at Club Kelburn, the financial report as presented:

- Comply with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand; and
- Give a true and fair view of the financial position of New Zealand Squash as at 30 September 2004 and of the results of its operations for the year ended on that date.

Proper accounting records have been kept by the Executive Council as far as appears from our examination of those records.

Our audit was completed on 5 November 2004, and our qualified opinion is expressed as at that date.

for the year ended 30 September 2004

I - ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Statement of Accounting Policies

Differential Reporting

New Zealand Squash (Inc) is the New Zealand national sporting organisation responsible for the control, advancement and regulation of the game of squash throughout New Zealand. New Zealand Squash (Inc) is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

The Association qualifies for differential reporting as it is not publicly accountable and does not qualify as "large", as defined within the Institute of Chartered Accountants of New Zealand's framework for differential reporting. The entity has taken advantage of all the differential reporting exemptions available to it.

Measurement Base

The accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on an historical cost basis have been followed. Accrual accounting is used to match income and expenditure.

Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and of financial position have been applied:

Operating Leases

Operating lease payments, where the lessors effectively retain substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased items, are recognised in the determination of operating profit in equal instalments over the term of the lease (refer Note 11).

Stock

Stock has been valued at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Due allowance has been made for slow moving stock.

Goods & Services Tax

The financial statements have been prepared on a GST exclusive basis. All items in the Statement of Financial Position are stated net of GST, with the exception of accounts receivables and payables.

Fixed Assets

All fixed assets are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation to date. Depreciation has been provided at the maximum rates permitted by the Income Tax Act 1994.

Investments

Investments are loans advanced to clubs for renovations and development and are stated at cost.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. All policies have been applied on a basis consistent with those used in previous years.

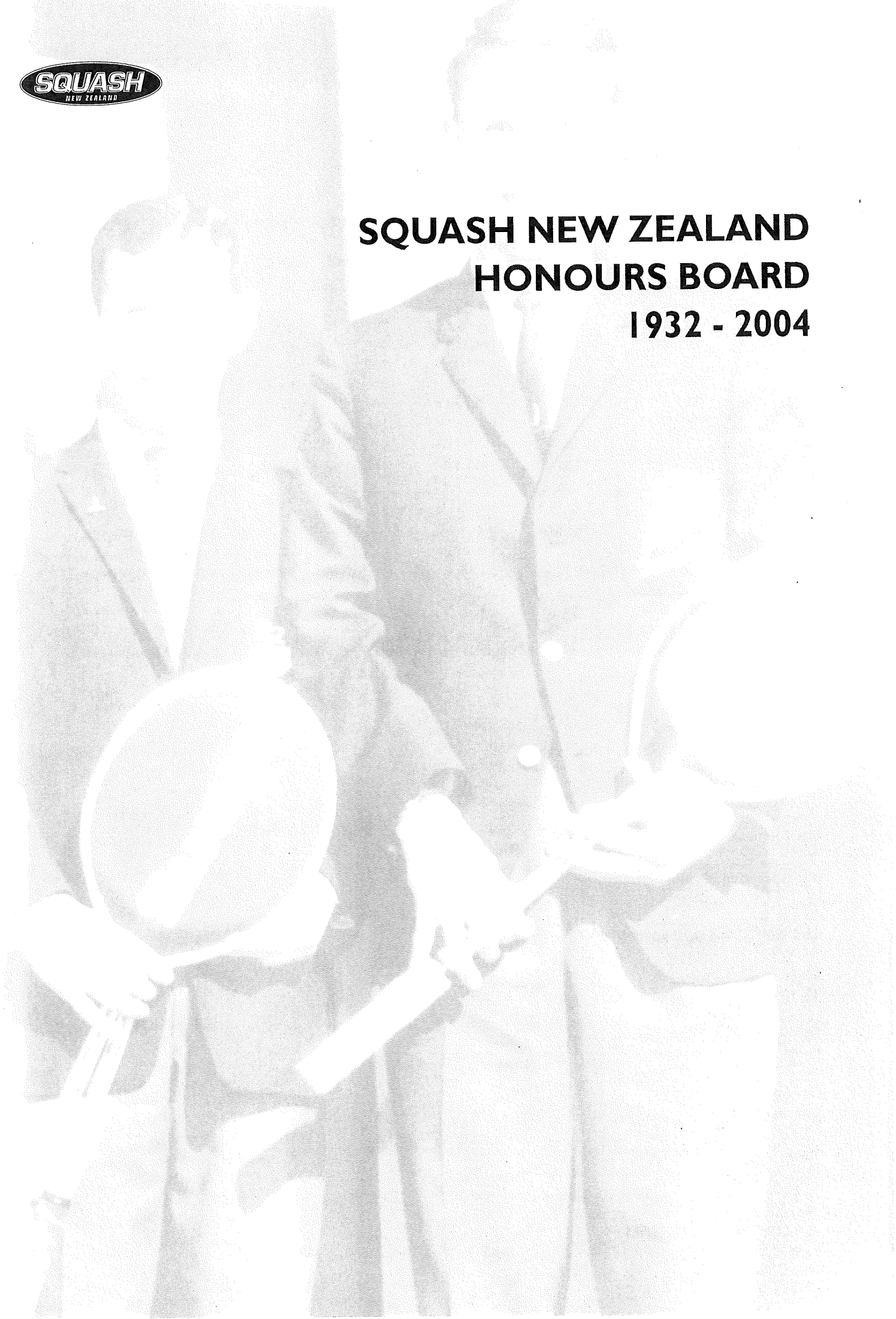
